London-Chisolm officially designates newspaper of choice

London-Chisolm city council meeting on October 14, a resolution was passed to designate the Greenville Herald-Banner as its official newspaper. Rockwall County News had been the city government's newspaper for publication of required

information packet provided by the city, by law the official newspaper must be published at must be entered as a second-class postal matter in the county where published; have been and continuously for at least 12 months before the governmental entity or representative

or cites Texas Government Code 2051.048(c)(1), "If no newspaper is published in the county and that will publish the notice at or below the legal rate; the political subdivision shall designate a newspaper that is published in the county in which the political subdivision is located."

Rockwall County Herald Banner is published at 2305 King St. in Greenville; the Rockwall County News is published at 107 E. Bourne Ave. in Rockwall; and the Dallas Morning News is published at 1717

Lovell expressed concerns about the location and circulation numbers of the papers and the

concerns about public notification of the change. At the Oct. 14 meeting, there was no discussion about the state laws that control the city's procedures for designating a newspaper.

At the Oct. 14 meeting, all three papers that the city considered as qualified were sent a notice. The notice stated that the city received a quote from the Rockwall County Herald Banner and Roysie City News for the same papers, but they would run the same notice in both papers for no additional charge.

Mayor Gary Moody clarified that the city did not send a Request For Proposal to the Rockwall County News. He said that certain newspapers included sample legal notices with a request for respective price

for the same notice from the Rockwall County News, Dallas Morning News and Rockwall County News. The prices were \$250.40, \$1,602.00, and \$196.50 respectively.

The city council resolution passed during the Oct. 14 meeting. Mayor Gary Moody asked the council to put the issue back on the agenda for reconsideration. During the Oct. 14 meeting, a motion was again made to make the Herald-Banner the official newspaper and it passed with a 3-1 vote.

Mayor Gary Moody was the single opposing vote. Mayor Gary Moody was absent from the Oct. 28 meeting. The next council meeting will be Tuesday November 11, 2014 at the City Hall building.

Blackland-Northeast Gateway Toll Road issue resurfaces before Roysie City Council

The first item on the agenda for the Roysie City Council meeting Tuesday, Oct. 28, was that of the new employee, Dallas Cline, to the Roysie City Police Department.

He and his wife of 10 years, Teresa, have three children.

During the citizens' participation portion of the council meeting, the topic of the controversial Blackland-Northeast Gateway Toll Road opposition resurfaced. The citizens' participation portion of the meeting is designed to limit participants who have signed up to three minutes to speak on a subject not listed on the agenda; however, no action or discussion may be taken on the items.

According to the Open Meetings Act, "The act allows the public to observe the open portion of a meeting. However, the attorney general has concluded that the Act does not give members of the public a right to speak on items considered in an open meeting. Such right only exists if a specified state law requires a public hearing on an item or if state law requires public comment to be allowed on an issue."

At the Oct. 14 meeting, Bryan Slaton, the local grassroots coordinator and spokesperson for the coalition of the proposed Gateway Toll road, signed up to speak but because he does not live within the city limits he was not allowed to speak. Mayor Jerrell Baley, the presiding officer of the council, chose to allow only Roysie City residents to speak. Thus, the toll road matter was not addressed.

This week, however, Baley was absent and Mayor Pro Tem Janet Nichol, allowed Slaton to address the council, along with citizens Keith Clinard of Roysie City, Linda Knight and Sandra Ritzmann, both of Wylie, and Rede Beitman of Plano. The proposed Northeast Gateway Toll Road, if built, will affect far more cities than just Roysie City.

Slaton began by telling the council, "The toll road is not dead. There has been much speculation in the media that because so many protests had been held and nine cities have now passed a resolution against the building of the road, with Caddo Mills in the process of passing the resolution, that the issue is dead. Fate, Josephine, Lavon, Nevada, Rockwall, Sachse, Wylie, Princeton and Rowlett all have voted no to the issue, with more still to vote.

"We aren't against roads and progress, but are against toll roads," Slaton said. "The toll road has been put on a 10 Plan of Consideration, but it can be brought back up at any time, so it is not over, nor is it dead. Both candidates running for Texas governor, Wendy Davis and Gregg Abbott, are against the toll road."

The others who spoke after Slaton reinforced their fears and grievances against eliminate domain and all the land, water, air and in general, free space, the toll road will eliminate.

After the citizens' participation had ended, Councilman Tom Crowley asked if there wasn't something in the Code of Conduct section of the Roysie City Charter that says that only citizens of the city of Roysie City can speak before the council. Jason Day, attorney for Roysie City, hopefully will have an answer at the next meeting.

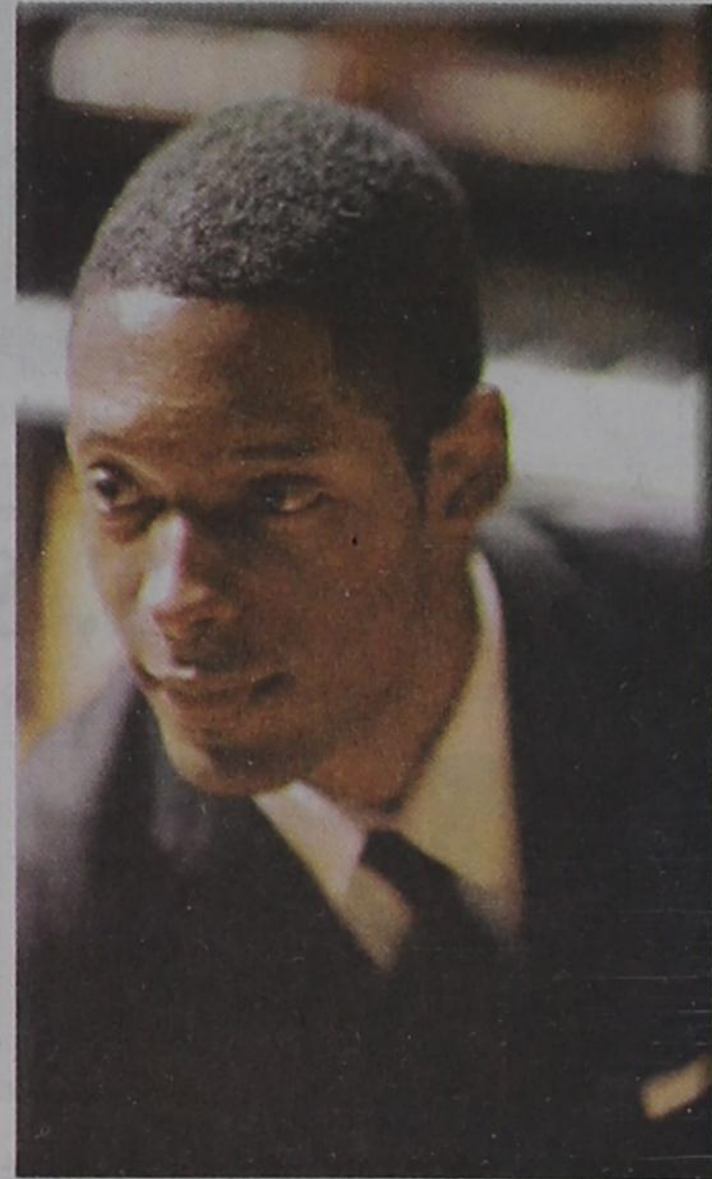

My grandmother always told me ink was in my blood. I know that sounds like a strange comment, but it turned out to be very true.

I grew up here in Rockwall, or as my grandmother would interject at this point, I was the fourth generation in my family to have been raised in Rockwall County.

I just recently moved back to Rockwall with my husband and two young daughters, and the change Rockwall has experienced in the past 15 years since I have been away is overwhelming. The increase in commerce and population is staggering. I still discover new food venues daily and constantly hear of new boutiques opening soon. I'm so proud of what my hometown has become!

I am ecstatic about the upcoming improvements to the town square and how people are rediscovering downtown. It is the heart of Rockwall, and regardless of how far we attain, we should never forget where it all began. The square holds a special place in my heart as is where my family owned and operated our business many years ago.

My great-grandparents and grandparents were the owners and operators of the Rockwall newspaper in downtown Rockwall; it had been in continuous operation from 1883 until 1988.

My grandfather passed away, my grandmother, Jane Bounds, became the sole publisher and editor. I learned very important life lessons at the Success: how to use a typewriter, interact with customers, and importantly, run my first business...a lemonade stand. I placed my lemonade stand prominently in front of the Success, so if you wanted a newspaper, you had to first purchase a glass of lemonade from my stand.

What I remember the most about my grandmother was how much she loved Rockwall County. She was big news, and it was all very important to her. She always had a pencil and pad by every desk in her office and at her home (which we lovingly called the Red House). She explained that a journalist's job was to be prepared!

These words of wisdom had a profound impact on my life. A little over a decade later I graduated from Texas Christian University with a journalism degree. I had my pencil and pad with me as I ventured out into the world of publishing.

I called my grandmother and parents not long after graduation to tell them a publishing company had accepted one of their magazines. I could hardly relay the information out of sheer excitement. I was selling ads by phone! Did I mention I was selling ads for a magazine that didn't even have a printed name? It was an almost impossible job, but I didn't care because I had my foot in the door of publishing. I would become publisher of that same magazine.

I continued working for that company for many more years. The owner recognized my passion for the business and allowed me to train and understand every aspect of the printing trade. He became my mentor, and I was forever grateful.

My most treasured memory was showing my grandmother the very first magazine I published. She was listed as the publisher. It was then that she said, "See Honey, ink is in your blood." Then, I understood what she meant.

Those years in the corporate world of publishing were surreal and life altering, but there were no regrets. I never could put my finger on it.

Then, I moved back home and came full circle. I started focusing on my family, Rockwall and the town that held such special memories. Of course, my grandmother's memory was entwined with the town.

My precious grandmother passed away a little over two years ago, and I was simply devastated. She was just a grandmother but also a confidant, mentor and best friend. What has greatly helped my healing is showing my girls all the special places where Grandmother would take me. I tell my girls daily funny stories of their "Big Mother", and I introduce them to close family friends who have impacted my life tremendously.

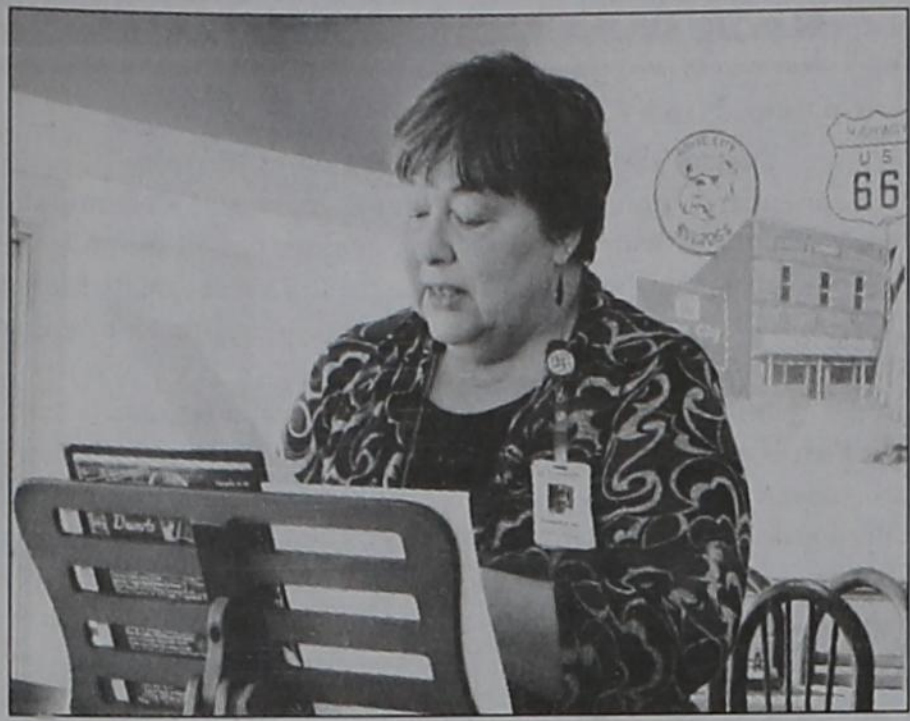

McCarron recently published a book, "Civilizing the Texas Frontier," which chronicles the lives of Mr. and Mrs. James Lowry Smith, early settlers of Amarillo. The book is tied to the numerous evolving civilizing elements of the Texas frontier, including the West Texas roots of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

He previously has published a monograph on the Vietnam War and a collection of short stories.

History – American Armistice Day/ Veterans Day

As the former known as Armistice Day, was originally created as a United States legal holiday to honor the end of World War I, the reflections of armistice Day will be filled with the heroism of those who died in the country's gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing freed us and because of the opportunity it has given us for sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the original concept for the celebration was for a two minute period beginning at 11 A.M., marked by parades and public meetings. Legislation November 11, 1938 and was "dedicated to the cause of to be hereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day' to honor World War I veterans.

On the second anniversary of the armistice, France and the United States held ceremonies honoring their unknown dead from World War I, at the suggestion of church groups, President Woodrow Wilson recommended that this special Sunday include the observance of international peace.

Legislation in 1921 approving the establishment of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. The date of the ceremony. On October

20, Congress declares November 11, 1921 a legal Federal holiday to honor all those who participated in the war. The ceremony was conducted with great success.

Congress adopts a resolution in 1926, directing the President to issue an annual proclamation calling on the observance of Armistice Day. Throughout the 1920s and 1930s, most states established November 11 as a legal holiday and at the Federal level, an annual proclamation was issued by the President.

Congress in 1928, passes legislation on May 13 making November 11 a legal Federal holiday, Armistice Day. The United States has no 'actual' national holiday because the states retain the right to designate their own holidays. The Federal government can in fact only designate holidays for Federal employees and for the District of Columbia. But in practice the states almost always follow the Federal lead in designation of holidays.

World War II and the Korean War create millions of additional war veterans in addition to those of the First World War already honored by Armistice Day.

On June 1, 1954 President Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name of the legal holiday from Armistice Day to Veteran's Day.

In 1968, Congress passes the Monday Holiday Law, which established the fourth Monday in October as the new date for the observance of Veteran's Day. The law took effect in 1971.

Legislation passed in 1975, to return the Federal observance of Veteran's Day to November 11, based on popular support throughout the nation. Since the change to the fourth Monday in October, 46

states had either continued to commemorate November 11 or had reverted back to the original date based on popular sentiment. The law took effect in 1978. Veterans Day is not to be confused with Memorial Day, a common misunderstanding, according to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The rest of Europe soon followed, adopted in the United States until the Standard Time Act of 1918, which established standard time zones and to begin on March 31, 1918. Congress abolished DST as a local option and was observed in World War II, when President Franklin Roosevelt and DST, called "War Time", on February 9, 1942.

1966 there was no federal law on daylight saving so states could choose when it began and ended or drop it. Only California and Nevada had statewide DST

west of the Mississippi, and only a few cities between Nevada and St. Louis. In the 1964 Official Railway Guide, 21 of the 48 states had no DST anywhere.

By 1962 the transportation industry decided the inconsistency was too much for them and it was time for the law to step in. The result was the Uniform Time Act of 1966. Beginning in 1967, the act mandated standard time within the established time zones and provided for advanced time: clocks would be advanced one hour beginning at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in April and turned back one hour at 2:00 a.m. on the last Sunday in October. States were allowed to exempt themselves from DST as long as the entire state did so. If a state chose to observe DST, the time changes were required to begin and end on the established dates. In 1967 Arizona and Michigan became the first states to exempt themselves from DST. Michigan decided to follow the crowd in 1972 and observe DST. In 1972 the act was amended allowing those states split between time zones to exempt either the entire state or that part of the state lying within a different time zone. The newly created Department of Transportation was given power to enforce the law. As of 2014 the following states and territories are not observing DST: Arizona, Hawaii, American

Samoa, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The federal law that established "daylight time" in the United States does not require any area to observe daylight saving time. But if a state chooses to observe DST, it must follow the starting and ending dates set by the law. From 1986 to 2006 this was the first Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October, but starting in 2007, it is observed from the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November, adding about a month to daylight saving time.

According to a survey done by Rasmussen Reports from 2013 found that only 37% think DST is worth the hassle. That's down from 45% in 2012. Forty-five percent of those surveyed don't think the clock-changing ritual is worth it, but 19% are not sure.

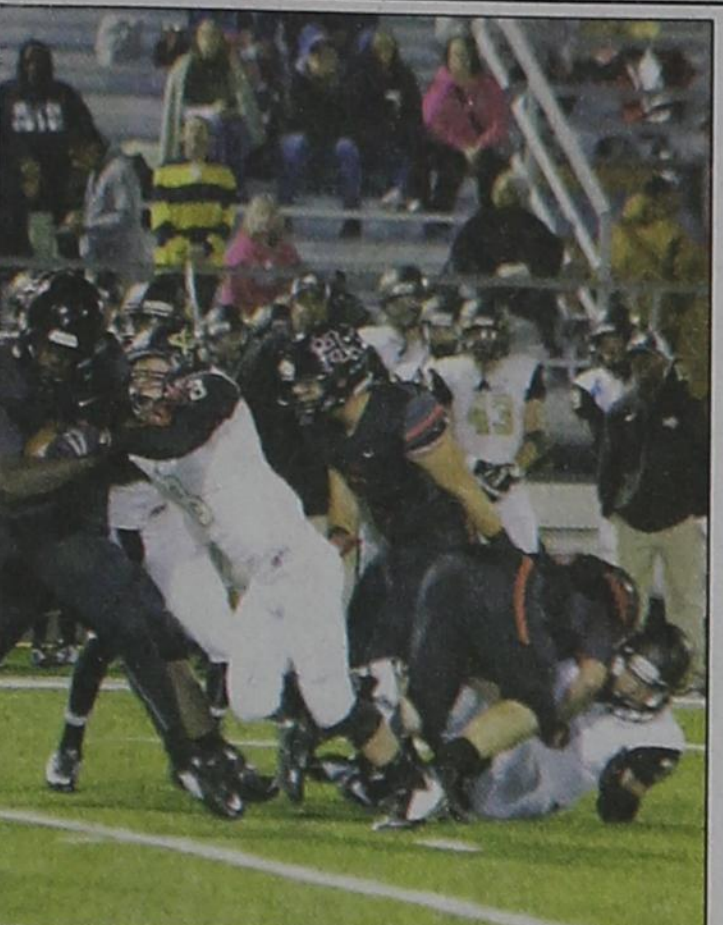

Rockwall Yellowjackets outlast Tyler Lee to remain unbeaten

The Yellowjackets, led by another stellar night from senior running back Chris Warren, survived with a 61-54 win over Tyler Lee in a shootout Friday, October 31 at Rose Stadium in Tyler. Warren set a Rose Stadium record 471 yards rushing and six touchdowns, helping Rockwall to continue their undefeated season. Rockwall (9-0, 6-0) played the game without starting quarterback Will Reed, who was inactive due to an injury, but Warren took control, carrying the ball 34 times for touchdown runs of 61, 84, 73, 3, 60 and 1. Warren scored the Jacket's first two touchdowns, giving RHS a 13-7 lead at the end of one. Following a 31-yard field goal by Tony Pecora, the Raiders took over the second, outscoring Rockwall 28-16 — the Yellowjackets added scores on Warren a run and a seven-yard pass from Xavier Castille to Jaylen Veasley, but trailed 35-29 at halftime. After the break, Rockwall reclaimed the lead off two runs by Warren and entered the fourth quarter up 43-41 score. Pecora nailed a 22-yard field goal attempt, but following a Raider scoring drive, Rockwall found themselves down 46-47 with 6:47 remaining in the contest. Castille caught a 51-yard pass from Jones and completed a two-point conversion to take the lead, and following a fumble recovery by Veasley, Warren put Rockwall up by 14 with a one-yard run with 3:54 remaining. Tyler Lee (4-5, 3-3), who was fighting for one of the two final playoff spots, added one more scoring drive with a 12-yard touchdown pass, but Rockwall held on to clinch the 61-54 victory. Tyler Lee now has to defeat Naaman Forest on Thursday and hope for a Rowlett win over

Sachse for a Red Raider playoff berth. Rockwall racked up 654 total yards while the Raiders put up 528. The Jackets look to finish district play as undefeated 11-6A champions tomorrow when they return home to face the Garland Owls (7-2, 5-1) at Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium for Senior Night. The game will kickoff at 7:30.

The Heritage Christian Academy volleyball team is headed back to the state tournament. Even after moving up from TAPPS 2A to 3A, HCA has qualified for state for the second consecutive year. The Lady Eagles (36-5-2) advanced to Friday's semifinals at Corsicana High School by defeating The Covenant School of Dallas in Friday's Area round and Trinity School of Midland in Saturday's Regional competition, both at Anna High School. HCA, the TAPPS District 3-3A champion, is scheduled to meet Arlington Grace Prep Academy (33-9) at 10 a.m. Friday. The winner would advance to Saturday's 9 a.m. final at Corsicana against the winner of the semifinal between Austin Brentwood Christian (31-15) and Geneva School of Boerne (32-11). The Lady Eagles have been to State before, but have never won a volleyball state championship. Heritage Christian is one of the smallest TAPPS 3A schools. Grace Prep, which competed in TAPPS 4A last year, now is one of the largest in 3A. "It's a big hurdle to climb," said Lady Eagles head coach Ron Hawkins. "They're legit. They were competitive in 4A." After Saturday's Regional victory, Hawkins said, "We have 4 days of practice to get ready for them. They hit hard from every direction on the court. We have to gear up for three hitters in every rotation they have. We have to work on defense mostly, and we have to hammer the ball with them."

In the Area round, he had seen Grace Prep dispatch McKinney Christian Academy, which had lost a tiebreaker match to HCA for the 3-3A championship. The Lady Eagles cruised through last weekend's two rounds after losing the first set to Covenant. Hawkins, Mikayla Smith and Lindsey Hill also had kills, with Smith's second giving the Lady Eagles a 24-21 lead and set up the final point on Madison Hill's serve. Before entering the playoffs, HCA had rallied from being down two sets to one to defeat Denton Calvary Academy in a warm-up match. Madison Hill had 23 kills, Hawkins led the team with 12 digs and 19 assists, Fauley had 11 digs and Lindsey Hill 10 and Becky Scherel made five blocks. Calvary had swept the Lady Eagles in an August match.
