

He worked for several papers and was part of a partnership in the ownership and operation of several Texas weekly newspapers before he and his wife struck out on their own and took over The Post Dispatch in Post, Texas, in s 1982.

The Burnetts published the Dispatch until 2008, when they moved to Rockwall to take over the Rockwall County News.





Michelle Angela Speede of Rockwall was named to the Dean's List following the spring semester at Radford







### **Open letter to Rockwall City Council**

I have submitted an email request via the Rockwall City Hall to present this attached material to the city council at their next meeting scheduled for July 1.

I served over 20 years with the Houston Fire Department, retiring at the rank of captain/investigator assigned to the Arson Bureau. I presently work for a major insurance concern as a fire and explosion expert witness.

My lovely wife and I have lived in Rockwall for the past 11 years and was not aware the city was dependent on a volunteer force until lightning



struck a neighbor's house during heavy thunderstorms in 2008.

The recent West, Texas explosion incident manifested a glaring short coming that a volunteer force often presents. You can't expect a person to support themselves in a full time career, then apply the same time, energy and interest in a volunteer endeavor-it just won't happen and can lead to disaster.

My concern is the growth of this city demands a full-time fire department force is really needed. I have listed only several comparison and lesser populated cities, but could have gone on and on.

Many folks are not aware of the fire department situation in Rockwall. You are receiving this in hopes of making the general public aware of the dangerous short coming. I plan to appeal to city leaders to address this issue before lives or major property loss is affected.

The following is a brief comparison of professional fire services in relation to what the City of Rockwall is presently providing the tax paying citizens and business of Rockwall.

Duncanville, population - 38, 524. Their fire department has 48 paid personnel split between three 24-hours shifts.

Greenville, population - 25, 557. Their fire department has 52 paid personnel split between three 24-hour shifts.

Weatherford, population - 25, 250. Their fire department has 42 paid personnel split between three 24-hours shifts.

Balch Springs, population - 23, 728. Their fire department has 30 paid personnel spilt between three 24-hours shifts.

Rockwall, population - 37, 490. The fire department has 4 paid personnel on duty 24/7.

This last figure was taken from the Rockwall Fire Department internet site in which Chief M. Poindexter stated in the Message from the Fire Chief, "Each station is manned 24/7 with only one person on duty at each fire station, which equates to one captain and three driver operators."

Based on the above comparison figures, Chief Poindexter also states: "We still heavily rely on part-time and volunteer firefighters, supplemented by a limited paid staff."

Looking at the brief comparisons of like cities, it is obvious the City of Rockwall is way behind in fire protection considerations with comparable and even lesser cities.

In the past 10 years, Rockwall has seen an explosion of growth in housing sub-divisions, the I-30 business corridor and harbor locations have mushroomed with businesses such as car dealerships, travel centers, hotels and scores of department stores. Additionally, several apartment complexes and retirement communities have also come into existence in the city limits.

These property locations are known as "target hazards" in the fire related industry because of the added life and property exposures. Fire protection beyond fixed building systems is paramount, requiring adequate initial response with equipment and manpower. A primary reason neighboring cities now have a fully paid fire department system that is not exclusively dependent on a volunteer response. An antiquated way of thinking that will not work in this day and time with a progressive city business.

It is clear that the property tax revenues have skyrocketed, not to

mention the added sales tax revenues! These additions pro the comparison cities above, yet through all of this, the R Department continues to rely primarily on a volunteer force was first formed out of the necessity of business growth back chee.

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A primarily volunteer work force would not work for t Public works, Rockwall Police or Sheriff's Departments accountability and service reasons! So why is this outday dangerous thinking still prevailing with cities leaders elected protect the citizens of this fine city?

As a concerned citizen, I questioned Chief Poindexter abe last year via a phone call. He was quick to rely and que Insurance Services Office (ISO) statistics and ratings. The comparison cities have prudently addressed their staff conform NFPA standards. As a taxpaying citizen of this city city leadership to act and stop this dangerous form of thinking minimum fire protection. This is not 1903 and never will be, st mindset still prevailing. I only hope and pray that a volunte doesn't unfold like the disaster that occurred in West, Texas.

I am not here to bash the dedicated volunteer force of the Ro Department. My hat's off to them for providing a service I got Having said that, it is time for the city leaders of Rockwall to citizens and businesses with a trained, fully professional fire who will act as an organized unit 24/7. Other cities have, it for Rockwall.

Last week the Taliban opened an office in Doha, Qatar with the US government's blessing. They raised the Taliban flag at the opening ceremony and referred to Afghanistan as the "Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan"-the name they used when they were in charge before the US attack in 2001.

The US had meant for the Taliban office in Doha to be only a venue for a new round of talks on an end to the war in Afghanistan. The Taliban opening looked very much like a government in exile. The Karzai government was annoyed that the US and the Taliban had scheduled talks without even notifying Kabul. Karzai's government felt as irrelevant to negotiations on post-war Afghanistan as they soon will be on the ground. It seemed strangely like Paris in 1968, where the US met with North Vietnamese representatives to negotiate a way out of that war, which claimed nearly 60,000 Americans and many times that number of Vietnamese lives.

For years many of us had argued the need to get out of Afghanistan. To end the fighting, the dying, the destruction, the nation-building. To end the foolish fantasy that we were building a Western-style democracy there. We cannot leave, we were told for all those years. If we leave

Afghanistan now, the Taliban will come back! Well guess what, after 12 years, trillions of dollars, more than 2,200 Americans killed, and perhaps more than 50,000 dead Afghan civilians and fighters, the Taliban is coming back anyway!

The long US war in Afghanistan never made any sense in the first place. The Taliban did not attack the US on 9/11. The Authorization for the use of force that we passed after the attacks of 9/11 said nothing about a decade-long occupation of Afghanistan. But unfortunately two US presidents have taken it to mean that they could make war anywhere at any time they please. Congress, as usual, did nothing to rein in the president, although several Members tried to repeal the authorization.

Afghanistan brought the Soviet Union to its knees. We learned nothing from it.

# The Calling: Markets Turn Waste into Want-satisfaction

A frequent criticism of markets is that private owners have every incentive to dump the waste byproducts of their production processes into the air, water, or land without concern about the harmful effects. More sophisticated critics understand the idea of negative externalities and love to jump up and down about how they demonstrate the need for government intervention. There are a number of responses to these sorts of arguments, as Art Carden and I pointed out in a recent EconLib article. One can note that better defined and enforced property rights, especially privatizing the commons, would turn pollution into a tort and reduce it substantially. One can also point out that the imperfection of markets is not ipso facto a case for government intervention, because the latter is prone to serious imperfections as well.

There's another counterargument, which I think isn't made often enough. The criticism treats the byproducts of industrial production as unambiguous "bads" that have no possibility of being used to satisfy other kinds of wants. That is, it treats the byproducts as being completely without economic value. That's an assumption worth challenging. After all, the byproducts of production are physical objects of potential value. One of the great things about the market is that it provides incentives and signals to producers not to waste anything of potential value. Why dump something if you, or someone else, can imagine a valuable use for it?

As Pierre Desrochers's work has shown, many products that we today regard as useful originated in clever ways to turn waste (and potential negative externalities) into valuable goods. This process of "industrial recycling" has been recognized for centuries, as Pierre has documented. He writes,

as a byproduct. It's often shipped to farms for feed and fertilizers, but as the AP story shows, there's a new use for it:

At the Gloversville-Johnstown wastewater plant west of Albany, it's pipelined from the nearby Fage yogurt plant, where it goes into a 1.5 million-gallon tank filled with anaerobic bacteria, called an anaerobic digester. The resulting methane gas becomes combustible fuel that generates nearly enough electricity to power the plant.

And the local dairy farmers get it:

Finger Lakes dairy farmer Neil Rejman, who keeps 3,300 cows, regularly accepts whey from Chobani. Though whey usually makes up


less than 5 percent of what goes in his digester, it helps Rejman keep running his digester at maximum 1,000-kilowatt-hour capacity.

"Everyone's talking about whey and yogurt as if it's a new problem or a phenomenon. It's an old story," he said. "It's really not a problem for the industry. It might be a little bit of a cost for yogurt manufacturers. But the processors, they're getting a home for it on the farms, so that's a good thing. For farmers, it's a good thing because they're using it for feed, electricity and fertilizer. And the profitable opportunities for value creation, "waste rescue," and that is, by imagining uses for byproducts that others overload

In his classic On the Economy of Machinery and Manufactures, the polymath Charles Babbage (1835, 217) wrote that cheap production of any article was possible partly because of the care taken to prevent raw material waste: "Attention to this circumstance sometimes causes the union of two trades in one factory, which otherwise might have been separated."

Babbage described how horns from livestock were used by many other industries early in the nineteenth century. Some were made into combs and a substitute for lantern glass; others were carved into knife handles and the tops of whips. The processing provided fat for soapmakers, glue to stiffen clothes, and fertilizer for farmers - even toys for children. As Frederick Talbot (1920, 11) wrote in the early twentieth century, waste was "merely raw material in the wrong place."

This process continues today.

My local paper recently had this story about how the Greek-yogurt craze has become a source of electrical power. Yogurt production, especially the Greek version, produces whey, a watery milk substance, consumers are getting renewable power."

This is what markets do: they create incentives not to casually dump byproducts, because what looks at first like useless waste may well have a use not previously known. Economic value is subjective in that goods get value when people perceive that they are able to satisfy a want. Those who don't perceive those possibilities will treat byproducts as "bads" to be disposed of, while those who do will want to rescue them from being wasted. Many benefits of competition and entrepreneurship in a freed market lie in entrepreneurs' alertness to



Brianna Richardson was a three-time state champion for Rockwall-Heath's track and field team.

Now she's a national champion.

Richardson soared 42 feet, 1 1/2 inches - the second-longest triple jump of her career - Thursday, June 20, to place first among Junior Women in the USA Track and Field Outdoor Championships at Drake Stadium in Des Moines, Iowa.

Her only longer jump (42-5 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>) came this spring as a freshman at Baylor University. By placing third or better in the USATF meet she qualified for the Pan American Championships in Medellin, Colombia, Aug. 23-25.

Richardson was the 4A state champion in the triple jump in 2011. The next year, she won both that event (at 40-5 1/4) and the long jump.

In her first season for Baylor, she earned All-Big 12 recognition but barely missed qualifying for the NCAA Division I Nationals by placing 12th in the West Preliminaries. The qualifying cut-off was 12th place.

One of the competitors who finished ahead of Richardson in the Preliminaries was Plano East graduate Jennifer Madu, a Texas A&M graduate. Madu was the 5A state champion in 2012 at 42-4 1/4. In Des Moines, she placed second behind Richardson at 41-5 1/4.

JUNIOR OLYMPICS: Rockwall County has age-group athletes hoping to reach Richardson's level of success.

Five of them placed first last Thursday and Friday, June 20 and 21, in the USATF Southwestern Association Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships at Porcupine Stadium in Springtown.

A total of 23 from two different clubs qualified in 29 events for the Region 12 Championships July 3-6 at Turner Stadium in Humble by placing among the top six in the Southwestern meet. The top five finishers in each Regional event would qualify for the USATF National Junior Olympic Championships July 22-28 at North Carolina A&T University in Greensboro, N.C.

Three of the Rockwall club's four qualifiers for Regionals won events at Springtown. Canyon Hall placed first in the boys' 9-10 shot put at 26-11 3/4, Fiona Dunleavy won the girls' 17-18 3,000-meter race walk in 17 minutes, 13.13 seconds and Thomas Dunleavy was the 13-14 boys' 3,000 race walk in 18:56.21. Destini Jeter qualified for the 11-12 girls' 400-meter dash by placing third in 1:05.68.


Club Vaultitude had two individual champions among its 16 qualifiers in the pole vault alone. Luke Littlefield won the boys' 15-16 title at 13-8 1/2, with three of his teammates - Clark Norris, fourth at 10-11 3/4, and Kyle Oldham and John Guthrie, fifth at sixth at 10-0 - also qualifying. Rockwall-Heath student Will Herrscher, competing for Texas Express, placed second at 13-2 1/2. Noah Sewell led Vaultitude's 1-2-3. boys' 13-14 pole vault by clearing 10-6. Caleb Estes was seen Littlefield third, both at 9-5 3/4.

The other pole vault qualifiers were among the 13-14 girls McKenzie, fourth, and Zoe Elledge, sixth, both at 7-5 14:1 Elizabeth Oberle, fourth (7-11 ¼), Julia Watson, fifth (6-11 ½ Tucker, sixth (6-5 1/2); 17-18 girls - Natalie Hawthorne, fifth Tiffany James, sixth (9-11 3/4), and 17-18 boys - Jonny Lee. 34), and Wyatt French, fifth (12 4 34).

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
