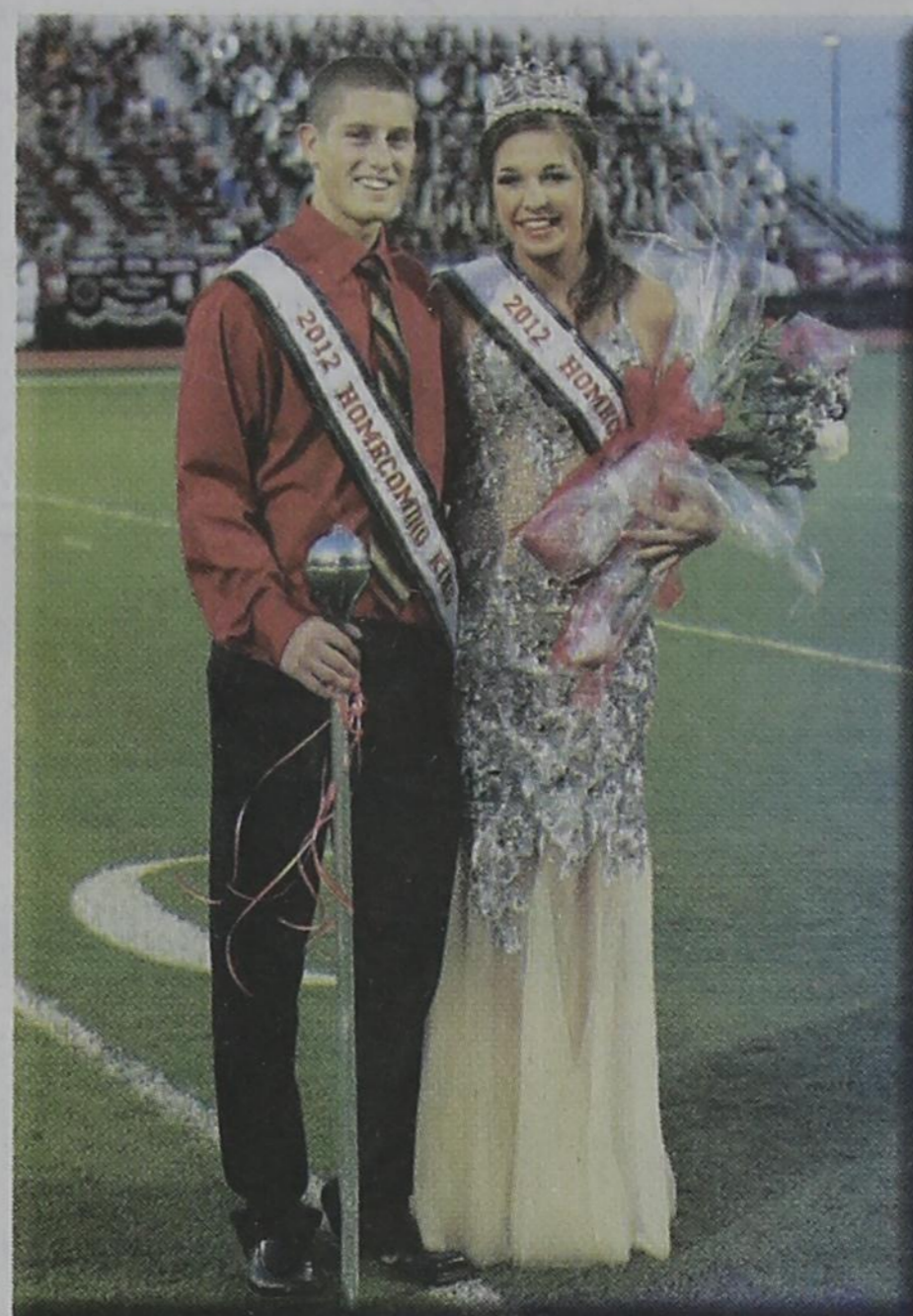

City of Heath approves 2013 Annual Operating Budget

The City Council unanimously approved the 2013 Annual Operating Budget at its Sept. 18 meeting. The budget will go into effect for the new fiscal year on Oct. 1. Budget highlights

• Valorem tax rate of .3433 cents per \$100 of taxable property within the city limits.
• Sewer rates by \$6.88 monthly
• Monthly water rates by 22 cents per 1,000 gallons.
• 3% for most city employees: Most Department of Public Works employees will receive a 4% increase, although some will receive a 3.39% increase, although some will receive a 3.39% increase, although some will receive a 3.39% increase. The City Manager and Assistant City

Manager are receiving no increases in the new budget.

* A new entry level DPS position: The creation of an entry level DPS position allows for a Fire Marshall/Inspector position to be filled from within the Heath DPS ranks.

* A new Project Engineer position: This position will be allocated 50% to the General Fund and 50% to the Utility Fund. Responsibilities include review of development plans for water, wastewater, paving and drainage. It also provides project management, planning and engineering for the Capital Improvement Program. Funding for this position comes from a temporary use of current fund balance. It is anticipated that new development revenue will offset the expenditure. If such revenue is not realized, expenditures can be curtailed mid-year.

Also on the council's agenda was a Public Hearing concerning an ongoing issue related to a derelict property at 531 Hubbard Drive but

no one took the floor. A citizen and homeowner who lives near the abandoned property petitioned the council at the Jul. 3 meeting, asking for code enforcement or demolition consideration. While the structure was very recently demolished by the owner, clean-up and grading of the lot, which is necessary for maintenance, including mowing, has remained outstanding. The council voted to issue an order to property/land owner, establishing a thirty day period for compliance, after which further action may be necessary by the city. The property owner, Rob Whittle, is a co-developer of the Heath Golf and Yacht Club development with which the city of Heath is involved in ongoing business discussions.

In another vote, the council approved a request by Tri Terra Development granting an exception to specific ordinance code requirements related to the Phase 5 addition of the Stoneleigh development. The property is just over 128 acres, located near the southwest corner of the intersection of FM 550 and McDonald Road. Work is anticipated to begin immediately.

In business pertaining to the new North Water Tower, a savings of \$14,202 is being realized as a result of some piping and valving changes and related control systems.

Discussion and action related to the Terry Park Retaining Wall collapse, was postponed to a future meeting, as was any contemplated litigation talks related to the subject in a closed Executive Session.

A short, closed Executive Session was held to discuss ongoing litigation regarding the city's Official Newspaper Selection, in which no action was reported.

Boys & Girls Club Duck Regatta fundraiser was just ducky

The Harbor District has played host to many fundraisers along the shores of Lake Ray Hubbard, but probably none as successful as the Rubber Duck Regatta benefiting Rockwall Meals on Wheels and the Boys & Girls Club of Rockwall County.

The event raised more than \$40,000 for after-school education programs. The winners were Boys & Girls Club board member Brenda Hargrove, Rockwall Mayor Marshall Ariana Hargrove. Gary Freedman, Rockwall Mayor, was emcee for the day.

Several thousand little blue rubber ducks took part in the main Baby Duck Race in the Harbor's large fountain and 67 corporate ducks, decorated by sponsoring companies, floated against each other to be first over the spillways and into duck racing history.

The day began with more than 300 participants in the Family Walk and Waddle and 5K Duck Dash along the shore of the lake. Dozens of vendors lined the walkways, with many donating their day's take to the fundraiser. The Duck Fest Dunk Tank featured such area luminaries as Rockwall Mayor David Sweet, incoming Justice of the Peace Mark Russo and former Rockwall Council member Stephen Straughan.

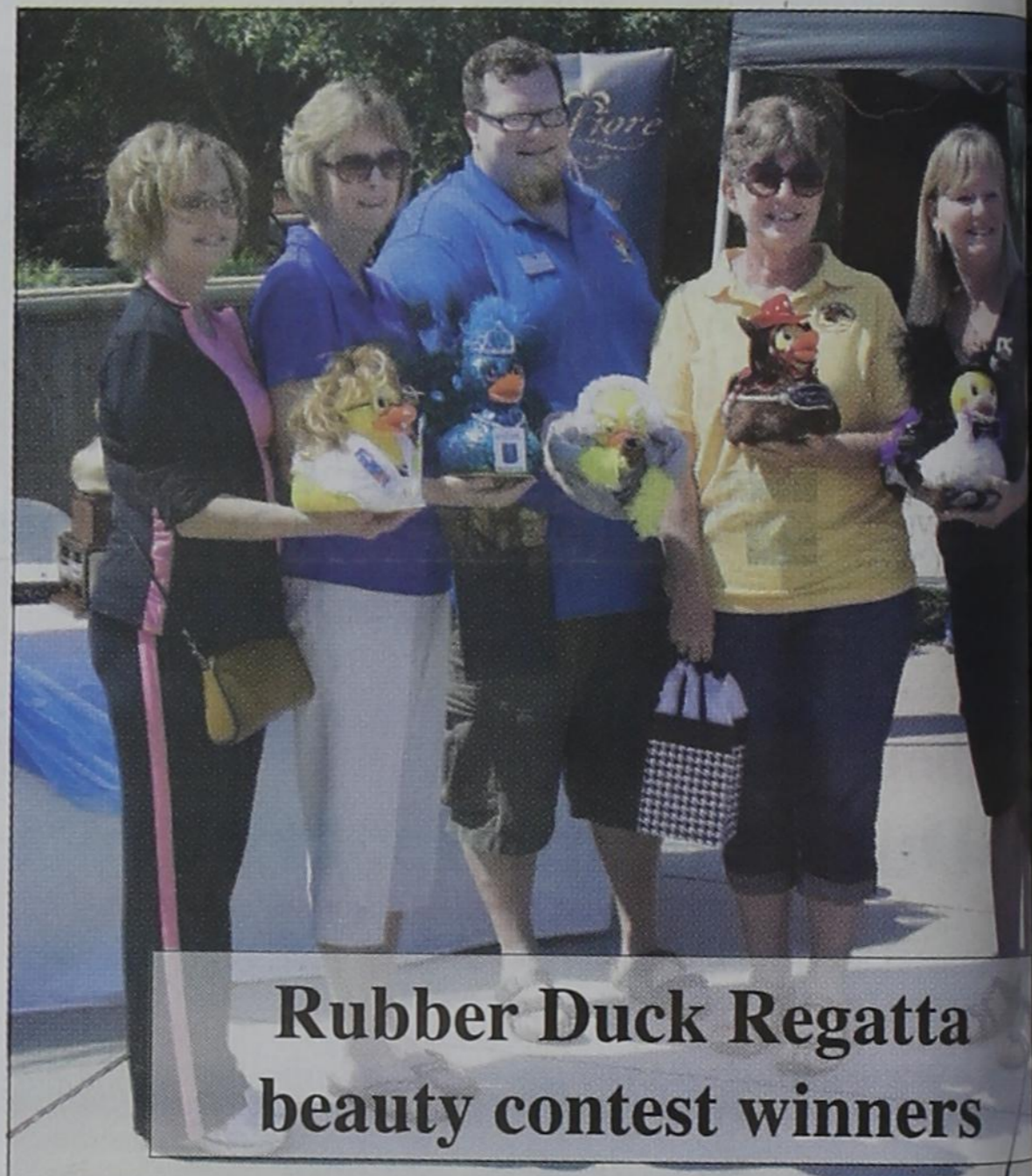


Grady celebrates 100th birthday

On God's Word

The veil of the Temple rips from top to bottom...Matthew 27:53

According to Matthew 27:53, the veil of the Temple ripped from top to bottom soon after Jesus died. A review of God's word in the Epistles, related to the veil will shine more light on this very important subject.

Hebrews chapters 7-10 provides excellent details about the veil's purpose and meaning. The Temple and veil made by physical hands were symbolic of what was to come in the future. It says in Hebrews 9:9, "Which was a figure for the time then present..." Later in verse 24 it says, "For Christ is not entered into the holy places made with hands, which

are the figures of the true, But into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God for us."

During the Old Testament times, the high priest had to enter into the holiest part of the Temple and make sacrifice for the sins of God's people. This had to be done periodically. Our Lord Jesus was the final and everlasting High Priest who did not enter into the physical room, but appeared in the presence of God for all of mankind. His sacrifice was not an animal, but instead he gave himself to be the final Passover lamb according to God's will.

The splitting of the veil represented a complete change of spiritual administrations. This connection can be found in Hebrews 8:8, "For finding fault with them, He says, 'Behold, the days come, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah.'" And again in verse 13, "In that He says, 'A new covenant,' He has made the first old. Now that which decays and waxes old is ready to vanish away."

The new covenant is also discussed in Hebrews 9:15, "And for this cause he [Jesus] is the mediator of the new testament, that by means of death, for the redemption of the transgressions that were under the first testament, that they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance."

It says in Hebrews 10:9-10, "...Lo, I come to do thy will, O God.' He takes away the first, that He may establish the second. By the which will we are sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once and for all."

By the death of Jesus Christ, the Old Testament under the law was nullified and the separation between God and His people was ripped in two

allowing anybody to enter into the true holiest of the

Jesus Christ who is currently seated in heaven.

The second covenant represents a new administration "great and notable day of the Lord" mentioned in Acts 1:8 with holy spirit. It will continue until the day of the Lord.

Let's conclude with Ephesians 2:13-15, "But now in Christ Jesus, who sometimes were far off are made near by the blood of our peace, who has made both one and has broken down the wall of partition between us. Having abolished in his mind the law of commandments contained in ordinances, he has created in himself one new man, so making peace."

God lovingly gave His first born beloved son so that we can live life fully in our liberty that is in Christ Jesus. Many people are not under the condemnation of the Old Testament and can richly live more than abundant lives.

Praise God for His perfect love toward us through Jesus Christ our Lord!

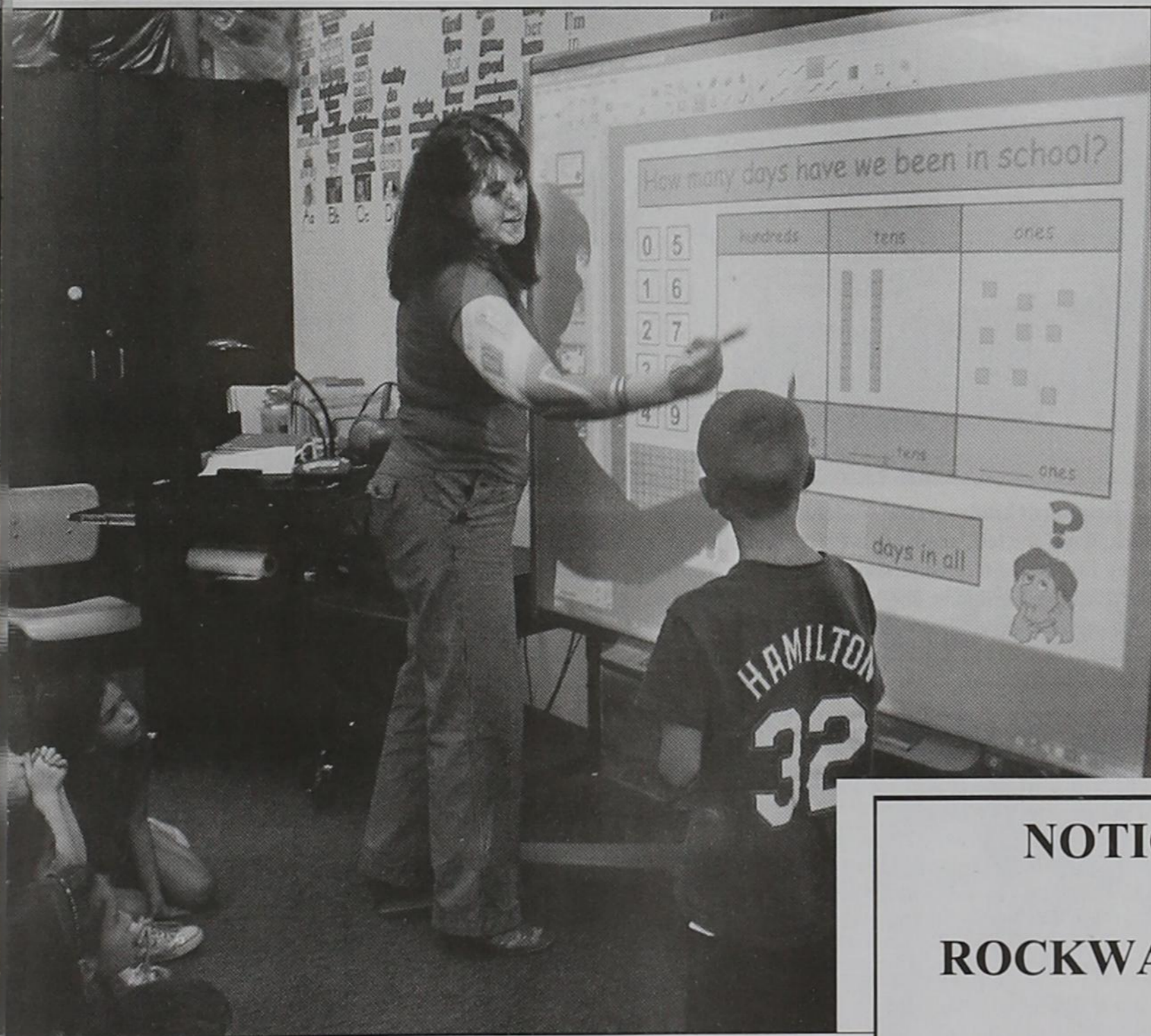

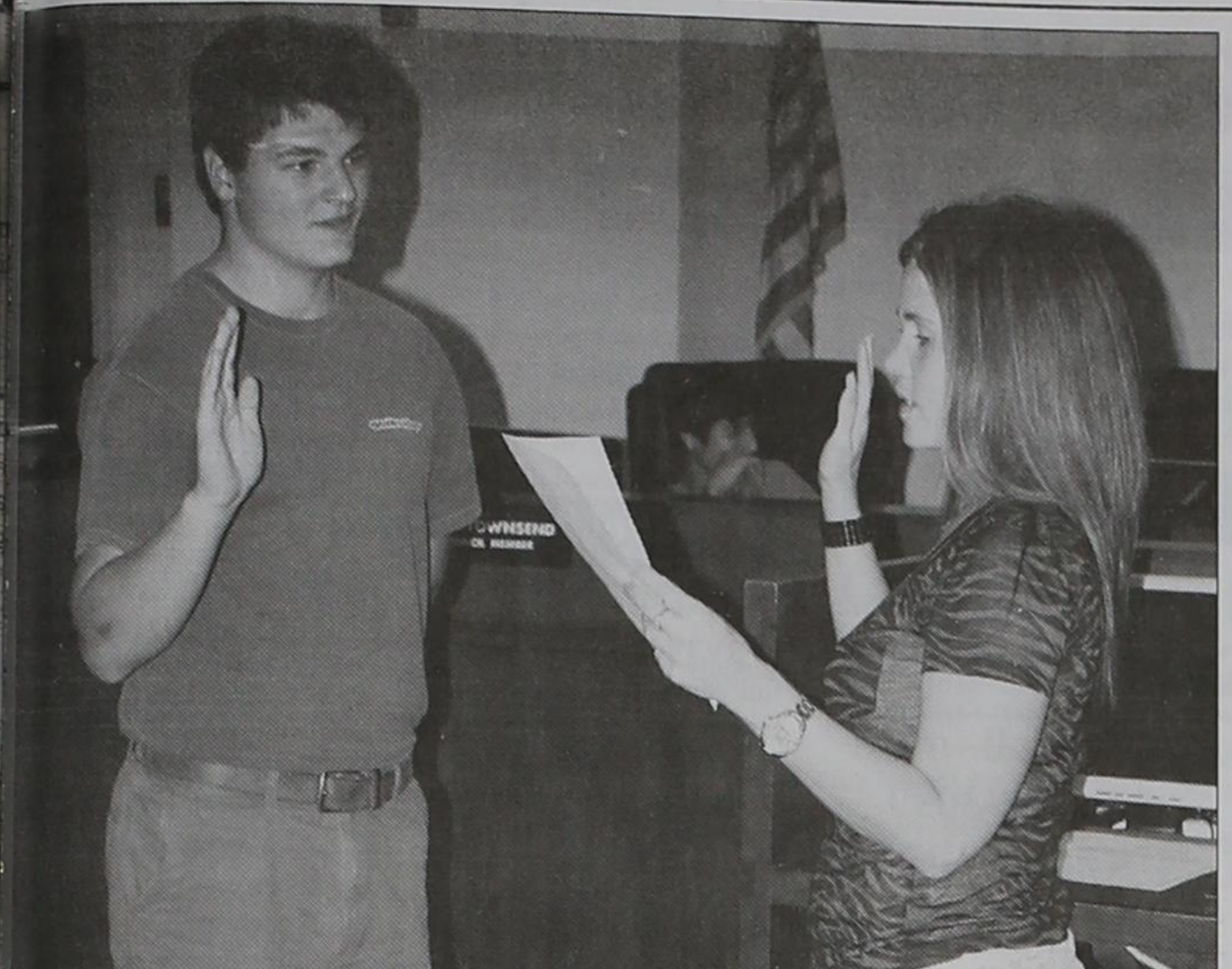

Rockwall Council outlines 2013 legislative agenda

The Rockwall City Council recently approved a legislative agenda of issues to track and work to either support or defeat legislation that impacts Rockwall residents. Passage of legislation that will allow the City of Rockwall the right to acquire and serve the Lake Rockwall Estates neighborhood is the top priority of the city in the 83rd Session of the Texas Legislature. Assistant city manager Brad Griggs said passage of the bill would allow the city to better serve Lake Rockwall Estates with water and sewer service at a much lower cost than what they pay now. The issues approved by the Council involve, but are not limited to: funds for public safety, annexation and development, local park grants, graffiti abatement, and funding for roadways and transportation. The 83rd Session of the Texas Legislature will begin in January. According to a City of Rockwall news release, in addition to the issues mentioned above, there likely will be more issues that come to the forefront as the session approaches. The press release stated that the city will work with state officials on the issues that are important to Rockwall.

Rockwall Council approves new budget, adopts tax rate

The Rockwall City Council recently approved a \$26.2 million budget for fiscal year 2012-2013, which begins on Oct. 1. The spending plan includes the addition of four police officers and two firefighters as well as an additional \$150,000 for street maintenance and repairs. Assistant city manager and finance director Mary Smith told the Council the budget will include more total revenue than last year's budget due to new property added to the tax roll over the previous year. As part of the approval process, the Council also adopted a property tax rate of 50.25 cents per \$100 valuation, a slight reduction from last year's rate of 50.31 cents. "I'm pleased with the budget the City Council adopted" Mayor David Sweet said. "The budget addresses the needs of the city to serve its customers and reinforces the Council's core commitment to public safety. The Council also included additional funds to maintain city streets, an investment that positively impacts those that live, work and play in Rockwall."

McLendon-Chisholm granted light from TxDOT

McLendon-Chisholm mayor Gary Moody confirms that TxDOT has recently granted the city a new stop light at the intersection of FM 550 and FM 205. The city had ordered a study of the area in May and the project was approved in September. "We've had a lot of interest and this had been requested by several citizens," says Moody. "I had asked the Rockwall County Road Consortium to start looking at widening 205 from Rockwall out to the Kaufman County line. There is a real need." There is no set date for the installation of the light, but the city expects it to be put in sometime in 2013. In other news, city counsel announced the decision of the contracted city planner position, for which the selection process had taken place over the last few months. Michael Coker and Associates will provide part-time city planning services for McLendon-Chisholm as the city considers the possibility of several future projects.

Security of the electoral system ... Part 3

The vote

oting in the November 6, 2012 election is a few weeks away, with voting beginning October 22. To qualify for the vote, Texans must be officially registered to vote.

one are the days that Texas voters were required to demonstrate basic knowledge about our constitution and the inalienable rights guaranteed by document. Today almost anyone 18 years or older and not a convicted felon may qualify and register. Here's the state law on the qualifications in Election Code:

(1) be a qualified voter as defined by Section 11.002 on the day the person offers to vote; (2) be a resident of the territory covered by the election for the office or measure on which the person desires to vote; (3) satisfy all other requirements for voting prescribed by law for the particular election.

A qualified voter is 18 years of age or older; is a United States citizen; is a resident of this state; and is a registered voter. (For details see Section 11.002 of the Election Code, available online, keyword Texas Election Code.)

According to the Rockwall County Elections Administrator website, "You will need to complete a Voter Registration Application and turn it in to our office. We can mail you the form or you may come by our office for one." Mail to Elections Administrator, 107 E. Kaufman, Rockwall, TX 75087.

To vote by mail, you must request a ballot for each election. To be eligible to vote by mail in Texas, you must: Be 65 years or older; Be disabled; Be out of the county on election day and during the period for Early Voting by personal appearance; or Be confined in jail, but otherwise eligible.

Last day to register for November 6 general election is October 9, 2012.

The last day to apply for ballot by mail (received, not postmarked) is October 30.

The last day for early voting is November 2.

As of July 2, 2012, there are a reported 46,427 registered voters in Rockwall County.

We remind voters that although computerized voting is an option, only the paper ballot is considered as part of the official count.

We strongly encourage voters to become well acquainted with the rules and procedures of voting statutes and bring to the attention of the election judge any irregularities or violations as they are observed. There is no security in enforcement of the code ... the security of the vote is left to power of the people casting ballots. With the stated refusal by the district attorney and the Texas attorney general to ignore election code violations, there is simply no security in the vote ... unless the people insist upon it.

The reality is simple: it's up to each individual voter to protect the security of the vote. Know the law, insist it be upheld.

President is responsible for ambassador's murder

The recent murder of four U.S. State Department personnel serving in Syria, including Ambassador Chris Stevens, is a dereliction of duty by the President of the United States. The chain of command goes directly to the President.

The consulate where those Americans served was totally unprepared to defend the staff. Establishing adequate security provisions is a responsibility of the president.

It is true that the Secretary of State must also bear the burden of the murderous attack by American enemies, she is the appointee of the president and he can not shrug his shoulders and behave as if he is immune in such matters.

Thankfully the president blames others when things go wrong, but is quick to wear his "Commander-in-Chief" badge when his subordinates accomplish successful missions.

Too bad he didn't learn what many of us were taught (by example) serving in the U.S. armed services: "When things go wrong, it's the commander's fault ... when things go right, the credit goes to the troops." I was fortunate to have learned this lesson by serving with 1947 West Point graduate and decorated Air Force Ret. Lt. Gen. Ranald Adams while was fighter wing commander at Kingsley Field, Oregon.

The safety of U.S. government staff is a primary responsibility of the president and Americans should hold him personally accountable when our American public servants are left defenseless to torture and murder in foreign countries.

Congress has an obligation to hold the president accountable. We've heard not a single member of congress expressing outrage at the gross negligence of the president. Impeachment apparently has been banned from the approved congressional language control manual.

Hoy hurls 6 TD passes as Hawks soar 45-0 for Homecoming

Jordan Hoy was right at home on Homecoming. A sophomore making his first start as Rockwall-Heath's quarterback, Hoy threw six touchdown passes to lead the Hawks (3-1) to a surprisingly easy 45-0 victory over Rowlett Friday, Sept. 21. It was each team's second game at Wilkerson-Sanders Memorial Stadium, where Rowlett gave up two touchdowns – by another sophomore, Rockwall's Chris Warren – while losing 41-37 Sept. 7. RHHS' aerial assault also was a surprise. Hoy had completed 11 of 17 passes, but for just 85 yards, a victory when Richland upset the Hawks 24-21. Even then, Hoy knew where to throw the ball – to senior Shyon Motlagh, who added a 13-yard reception at Richland to his three TDs from Chase Schultz a week earlier against South Garland. In the Homecoming game, Hoy threw three touchdown passes to Motlagh, all in the first half for a 21-0 lead. The second half offered no relief. Hoy threw scoring passes to Rico Henderson and R.J. Williams quarter for a 35-0 bulge. After Hoy connected with Jo'Korean Swanson for a fourth-quarter TD, Williams quarterback. He took a broken play for a 55-yard run that set up Ethan Smith's field goal that was more important. Smith had plenty of practice, because he also kicked points after all six touchdowns.

Almost as surprising as Hoy's performance was the Hawks' suffocating defense. It held Rowlett to 198 yards. RHHS stifled the Eagles' top two runners, Jalen Rhodes and Derrick Imade, who totaled 49 yards in 19 carries. Rockwall-Heath also intercepted a pass and recovered two fumbles.

The Hawks are considered a strong defensive team. The defense apparently responded to the coaches' challenge during the week by correcting some problems that helped lead to defeat at Richland.

RHHS' shutout was just the third in the program's history, and the first since a 65-0 rout of Fort Worth Diamond Hill-Jarvis Sept. 14, 2007.

Rockwall-Heath didn't really need a defensive performance that strong, because Hoy and the offense were piling up 476 yards, 276 through the air and 200 on the ground. The quarterback's output led to his being nominated for two Metroplex weekly awards: the TXA21 and Children's Hospital of the Week and the Dallas Morning News' SportsDayHSHero. Now that was a good start.

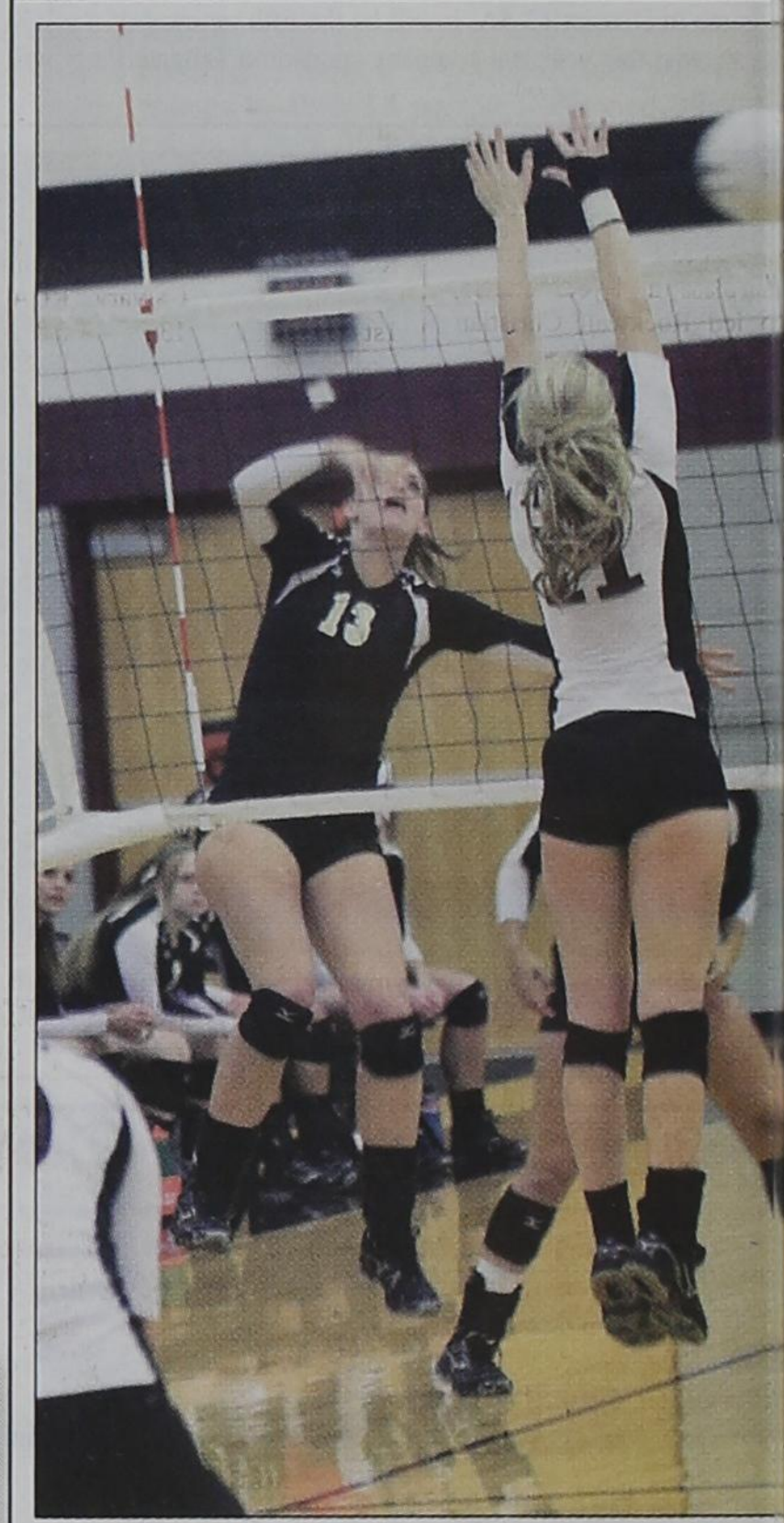

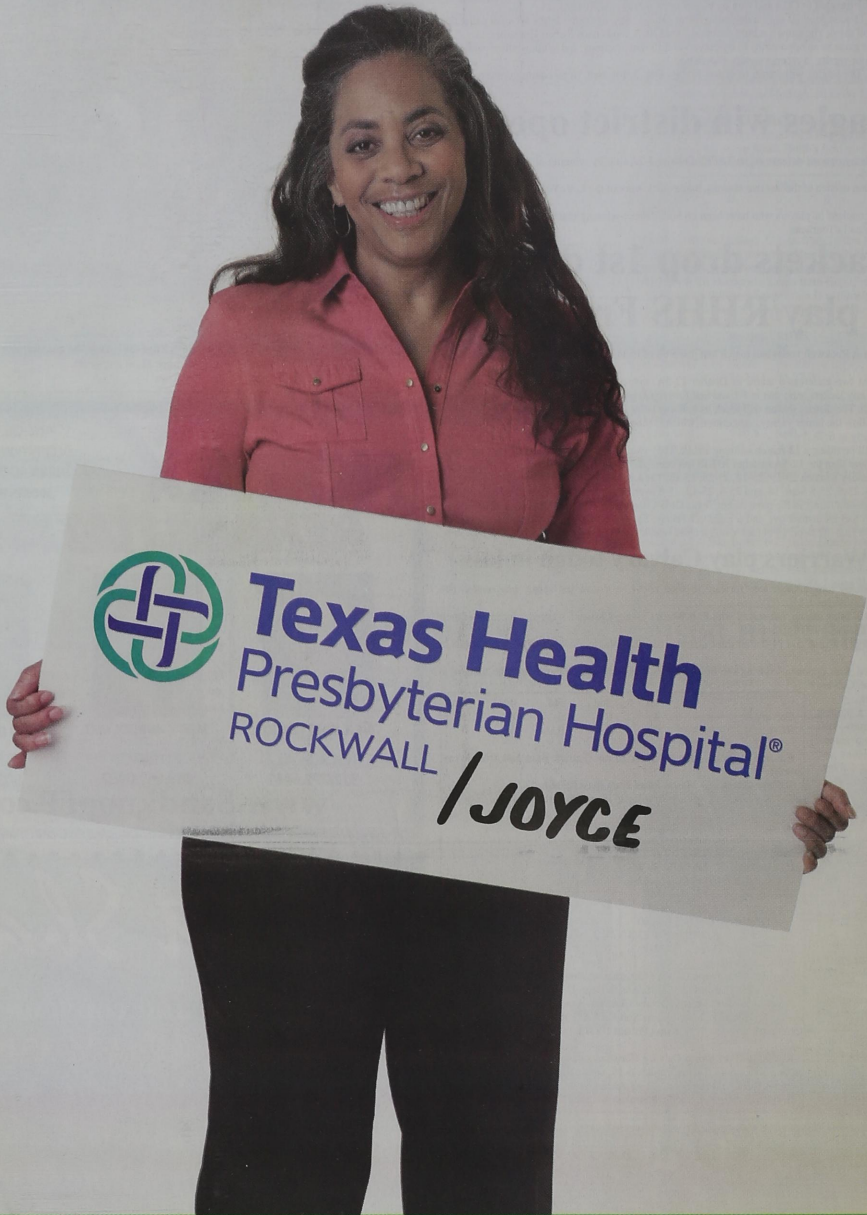
