Council unveils new logo for Fate

After several months, and numerous design changes, the City of Fate unveiled a new city logo at the Aug. 6 City Council meeting.

At a June Council meeting, Billy Quinton of Rockwall-based QBall Design presented several ideas for the city logo to council members. At that meeting, Quinton shared that he previously met with Fate Mayor Bill Broderick and City Manager Philip Rodriguez to discuss the vision for the city. Members of the council and staff offered feedback on what they wanted to see in a new city logo.

The logo will play a role in a larger branding effort by the city and by the Fate Development Corporation, which is the economic development arm of the city.

The final logo design capitalizes on the heritage of Fate while focusing on its future. The top of the logo is a letter F wrapped in the colors and theme of the Texas flag, while the blue in the center surrounding the word Fate is the same blue once used by the former Fate High School Cubs.

"The City of Fate is in an excellent position to begin showcasing what nearly 9,000 people have already discovered – that Fate is a wonderful place to live," said Rodriguez. "By focusing our branding efforts, we will now be able to show investors and developers why it's also a great place to do business. Mayor Broderick set the goal earlier this year for the city to begin marketing our city with a clear identity, and I'm excited for us to carry that forward. The new logo gives us a shared identity that we haven't had previously."

Over the next several weeks, city staff members will work with QBall to begin implementing the branding that will include website updates, stationary, business cards, marketing materials and more.

Rockwall councilman Mark Russo announces resignation

Rockwall City Council member Mark Russo has tendered his resignation from the council effective Sept. 18. Russo was recently elected to the newly created Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace position for Rockwall County and said he needs to spend time preparing to take office on Jan. 1, 2013.

Russo said he chose Sept. 18 as his last day in office so he can attend the Sept. 17 city council meeting and put his vote on the FY 2013 budget.

"We've been working hard and I want to be a part of this budget," he said.

He also wanted to give Mayor David Sweet and the city council adequate to

He also wanted to give Mayor David Sweet and the city council adequate time to select his replacement so they can attend several conferences and meetings planned for later in the fall.

"I thought it was important for the new person to be at those meetings and my timing allows the council to start the

process of finding my replacement," Russo said.

As for leaving his council position in the middle of a term, Russo said this wasn't

how he envisioned leaving office but added, "it has been an honor to serve the City of Rockwall and I think we have accomplished great things. I think this is the right thing for the city."

In looking forward to his new position, Russo said he has several ideas for his

new post and will begin working towards ways to implement them during this time of transition.

"I'll be starting from scratch but I have some plans and ideas to get going," he

said.

Before his January start date, he said he will need to hire and train his clerks, go

to his own JP training, and put together his office in preparation for their first day on the job.

Rockwall city budget is the Part he Pa

The Rockwall City Council has scheduled a public hearing as part of its Fiscal Year 2013 budget hearing will take place at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 4, at Rockwall City Hall.

The proposed budget can be viewed on the City's web site at www.rockwall.com.

The proposed ad valorem tax (property tax) rate for FY 2013 is 50.26 cents per \$100 valuation. In .0006 cents less than the current FY 2012 amount of 50.31 cents per \$100 valuation.

According to information provided in the proposed budget by City staff, the total taxable assessed City for FY 2013 is \$3,161,088,138, a 0.52 percent increase over last year's value of \$3,144,806,280. City's total property values increased slightly, the rate of growth continues to be slow. The increase is primarily attributed to new retail areas and multi-family development. Existing values dropped 18.

The City's revenues are budgeted at \$54,636,300 for FY 2013, with expenditures budgeted at \$54.7 The City is anticipating a slight increase in Service Charges, which includes pool and recreation inspections and reviews, and various permit fees. Although the projected FY 2013 amount is up from amount still represents a reduction from past years due to slowing construction resulting in fewer residuplements issued and construction fees collected.

Included in the FY 2013 budget are six new positions: 2 Firefighter/Drivers (funded mid-year); 1 Per 1 Personnel Sergeant; and 2 Patrol Officers. Five positions were eliminated as a result of the Ari privatization, thus the net increase to General Fund staffing is one position.

Downtown Improvements

In other business, the council voted to authorize City Manager Rick Crowley to execute contrate rous or; Zation Wilkinson Construction Group and La Terra Studio Landscape Architects for the Downtown Rockwil founder project approved by voters in the May 12 bond election.

Voters approved by a narrow margin the \$8.625 million downtown improvement package, which street reconstruction for San Jacinto Street from Houston to Olive, Kaufman Street from Goliad to Interurban Street from Alamo to Fannin; Reconstruct the "core downtown" sidewalks and construction sidewalks within the project; Construction of parking lots and additional street parking; Construction Jacinto Court pedestrian mall; Install street landscaping, street and parking lot lighting, signage and for Street enhancements for Washington Street from Goliad to Fannin.

West Nile virus confirmed in Rockwall County, prevention measures urged

A joint press release issued this week from Rockwall County and the Cities of Rockwall, Heath, McLendon-Chisholm, Fate, and Royse City verified that there are confirmed cases of West Nile virus in Rockwall County.

Dr. Gary Bonacquisti, Rockwall County Health Authority, said that epidemiological tests are being run to determine an accurate number of cases. He emphasized that residents should continue with personal protection measures to reduce their exposure to the virus.

Dr. David Lensch, Health Officer for the City of Rockwall, and Dr. Bonacquisti are working together to assist the respective entities. Dr. Lensch advised that prevention through the recommended precautions is of greatest importance, adding that those with viral symptoms, including fever and headache, should consider testing.

To reduce exposure to West Nile virus, it is suggested residents do the following:

* Use an approved insect repellent every time you go outside and follow the instructions on the label. Approved repellents are those that contain DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.

* Regularly drain standing water, including water that collects in empty cans, tires, buckets, clogged rain gutters and saucers under potted plants. Mosquitoes breed in stagnant water.

* Wear long sleeves and pants at dawn and dusk when mosquitoes are most

* Use air conditioning or make sure there are screens on all doors and windows to keep mosquitoes from entering the home.

It would also help alleviate congestion caused by morning and afternoon school traffic at four separate schools along the roadway and it would take traffic pressure off of FM 740 North.



The cross that Jesus Christ carried...

In our brief study on the cross that Jesus Christ carried, we intend to examine some of the uses of the word "cross" in all the Gospel records in order to understand better what "cross" he carried.

It is popularly believed that Jesus dragged the actual stake he was hung on. This study is designed to return to the records found in the Gospels and ascertain the truth about whether or not this happened.

The accounts of Matthew, Mark and Luke give the same information about what happened as Jesus was lead to the location of his crucifixion. Matthew's account says, "And as they came out, they found a man of Cyrene, Simon by name. It was him they compelled to bear his cross" (Matthew 27:32). According to the above scripture, as Jesus was lead out, the soldiers compelled another man to carry the instrument of crucifixion for Jesus.

God's word gives detailed information about the man who carried Jesus' cross. His name was Simon and was from a place called Cyrene. According to Mark 15:21 Simon was passing through, and he was the father of Alexander and Rufus. The record in Luke 23:26 does not provide any new information. The Rufus of Romans 16:13, and the Alexander of Acts 19:33 may have been

the same men. God's word does not provide any new details about them, but He has a reason for honoring them with their father, Simon.

Let's turn to John's record of the cross that Jesus carried "And he bearing his cross went forth into a place called, 'the place of a skull,' which is called in the Hebrew, 'Golgotha.'" (John 19:17).

Three of the Gospel records clearly refer to another man carrying Jesus' cross behind him as he walked toward Golgotha. Yet John's record has Jesus bearing a cross. Moreover, the other three Gospel accounts say nothing about Jesus even starting out carrying the cross. Why the apparent contradiction with the Gospel of John which refers to Jesus "bearing his cross?" It's also significant to note that John does not mention Simon carrying a cross for Jesus.

The word "cross" comes from the Biblical Greek word "stauros" which meant an upright stake, especially a pointed one. The use of this word in the first three Gospel records must be understood literally. They clearly refer to Simon carrying a pointed stake on behalf of Jesus. Go to Colossians 1:20 where it says, "And having made peace through the blood of his cross, by him to reconcile all things unto himself,.." and again in Colossians 2:14 it says, "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that were against us, which were contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross."

According to an old eastern tradition, when any person carried a debt that could not be paid, the elders would post his name with the names of the creditors and the amount of the debt, on the city's entrance gate. If another person passed by and decided to pay the debt, the posted debt was doubled or folded up so it could not be seen, and nailed to the gate. This meant the debt was paid in full and the person was free from the debt.

Jesus paid the full price for the debts of sin. And in so doing, the law that was against mankind was symbolically folded up and nailed to his cross. We were freed from the bondage of the letter of the law.

By harmonizing all the Gospel records, we can see that Jesus did not physically carry the instrument of crucifixion chosen for him. This task was forcibly given to Simon of Cyrene. And according to John, our Lord Jesus willfully bore "his cross" by giving himself to be the purchased price for all of mankind and the final Passover Lamb.

lesus paid the highest debt of mankind. That debt was doubled and folded not to be seen again, and was figuratively nailed to the

cross. This was the symbolic cross that Jesus bore for Simon of Cyrene involuntarily carried the literal cross. Jes the symbolic cross on behalf of mankind according to the







Rockwall ISD offers tuitionbased enrollment

Beginning this fall, the Rockwall Independent School District will welcome a limited number of students from outside of its current boundary lines through its first Tuition-Based Enrollment Program.

The new program allows students to apply for enrollment regardless of their home address, according to a district news release.

Students in all grade levels can apply for admission. Only students who meet the required criteria will be considered for admission. Areas assessed include recent grades, attendance records, disciplinary records and TAKS/STAAR performance. Applicants will be able to list their preferred campus, but enrollment figures for each campus and grade level will determine where open spots are available.

Tuition-Based Enrollment in the RISD will have no impact on district costs, but increases projected state funding revenue. Upon acceptance, a \$5,000 annual tuition will extend the RISD education to a student who resides outside of district

The plan will have no effect on transportation costs as accepted students will be asked to provide their own transportation to and from school. Prospective students will only be admitted to schools that have adequate space. Additionally, the increase in enrollment will boost the revenue brought into the district from the state government.

"This open enrollment initiative finally offers an opportunity for students just outside of our boundaries a chance to get a Rockwall ISD education," said Sara Bonser, the school district's assistant superintendent. "The program ultimately serves as a great option for students who previously had no chance of attending our campuses."

A number of districts around the state are implementing tuition-based enrollment options. Several participating north Texas districts include Royse City, Carrollton, Forney and Birdville.

Jamie Richards, the artist behind the Number 1 single "Drive," will appear at Southern Junction Nightclub and Steakhouse on Sept. 1.


This will mark Richards' first appearance at the local venue.

chance of penetrating body armor, because it travels at about 1,300 feet per second, than does a .45 caliber round, which travels at about 850 feet per second. That's one reason the military went from the .45 caliber to the 9mm: they exchanged stopping power for penetration (and magazine capacity). Even if the 9mm round didn't penetrate, the impact would either knock the person off his feet or off balance, or break a rib, bruise a bone or muscle, or even cause unconsciousness. If the concealed-carry holder had a pistol firing a .357 magnum or .44 magnum cartridge at close range, there is little doubt that it would have penetrated the armor. (Both calibers will penetrate the engine block of an automobile.)

There are also cartridges made specifically to penetrate body armor. However, the gun-control crowd has lobbied long, hard, and successfully against such "cop killer bullets," so they are difficult, if not impossible, for

Holmes apparently wore a Kevlar helmet. Bullets, again depending on caliber and distance, can penetrate a steel or Kevlar helmet. (Helmets are designed to protect the wearer from falling debris, not to stop bullets.) Even if a round didn't penetrate the helmet, a strike to the helmet could have rendered him unconscious or at least disorientated him with one big

The fact that the shooter was wearing so much body armor and yet surrendered to two police officers with inferior weapons immediately upon contact instead of fighting it out indicates that he feared for his life.

Therefore, a determined counterattack with any caliber handgun most probably would have caused him to stop his attack and retreat. Returning fire, even without hitting an attacker, more often than not causes even trained personnel to run for cover or retreat. In addition, Holmes's semi-automatic rifle malfunctioned. It took time for him to switch to another weapon - a shotgun or pistol - affording anyone with a handgun an opportunity to attack him. In a theater of a couple of hundred or more patrons - in the absence of laws or regulations to the contrary - one could normally expect a dozen or so people to be armed. Even if we allow for one or more of those armed to be killed or injured in the initial attack, there would still be plenty of firepower to handle a lone gunman, especially if it came from different directions.

Regardless of which side of the gun-control debate you are on, the people of Colorado and the nation have spoken. Within days of the shooting, the Denver Post reported that background checks for people wanting to buy guns in the state had jumped in excess of 41 percent, and nationwide from 10 percent (California) to 300 percent (Georgia), a rational response.

In the end, possession of a gun doesn't guarantee survival; it only improves your chances. The question is, If you meet an armed assailant, would you

certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. - That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government.

It has become increasingly clear that the U.S. government, especially the executive and judicial branches, have forsaken the rule of law and abandoned the principles defined in the American Declaration of Independence. The evidence is seen at all levels of government. The question many Texans are asking: "What do we do? How do we get back our liberty and bring government back to its original purpose?"

Of courdse the natural answer is to elect people to public office who have passion, wisdom and fearlessness to stand firmly for the very sound principle ... that government is instituted to secure the rights of individuals. The problem we face is identifying political candidates who share that belief and will not be deterred from the goal of saying "No" to legislation and regulation which controls our individual rights, rathter than securing them.

Perhaps a new start will be required ... and Texas is uniquely authorized by the U.S. Supreme Court to a peaceful separation from the depravity of the federal government. Perhaps it's time for Texans to demand that option.






