## Heath Council hears merits, opposition of plan for Terry Park fixes

The Feb. 21 Heath City Council meeting spent most of its time considering whether to move forward with a services agreement for engineering analysis and preliminary design relating to the damage to the sea wall at Terry Park. The wall was originally built as part of the Terry Park upgrades in 2009.

City engineer Randel Dobbs gave a presentation about the proposed agreement with Freeman-Millican, Inc. engineering firm was chosen based on their qualifications, as required by state law. The law dictates that for services, bids may not be solicited, but rather engineering professionals are to be selected based on qualifications, and then the scope and estimated cost for services is discussed.

The council was considering the proposed agreement, which comes at a price tag of \$70,500 and would be completed by June 1. Additional costs would be incurred for the actual repair construction. The services agreement being considered at this meeting was for the engineering study portion of the project.

There are two areas of the sea wall that are in need of repair. Interim measures will be taken immediately for storm improvements. Full-scale repairs will not be completed until after an engineering study is complete, which is required by the City of Dallas before any work is performed on the sea wall, either private or public.

A discussion about possible legal recourse relating to the original failed wall could not be discussed outside of executive session with the city attorney. Speculation about liability and fault was discouraged from the public and reserved for executive session if council had chosen to do so.

Before council members were given their chance to ask questions and voice their concerns or opinions, Heath Council member John Ream stood up to address council. Even though the council meeting was a posted public meeting and a posted public hearing, Mayor John Ratcliffe allowed her to speak and address the council.

She stated that she built 325 feet of sea wall on her property, which is adjacent to Terry Park, and filed the necessary permits and the engineering study that was required, for which she only paid \$300.

As a taxpayer, I am appalled at a study that will cost us, out of the pocket, \$70,000," she says. She believes that the problem happened because of this past year's severe drought, and that she saw a similar problem developing at Terry Park, which she addressed immediately by her own means. "This is something that is coming at a bad time. City taxpayers can ill-afford to have this kind of \$70,000 study made... This is something that should have been avoided. It's not something that just happened."

The proposed study would evaluate the failure of the existing wall, survey the land, perform geotechnical testing, provide temporary repair recommendations, give options for permanent replacement, provide preliminary design options and associated costs and investigate future improvements to the boat ramp and courtesy docks.

Council member Lorne Liechty questioned Dobbs about the possibility of negotiating a lower price for the study. Dobbs indicated that he would work with Freeman-Millican Inc. to find areas in scope that might be scaled back.

"I'm a construction lawyer and in my experience it's always more expensive to rebuild something than it is to build it the first time," said council member Barry Brooks. "My comment is before we go out and say we can just someone to do it, I think that's what we did the first time. I have a lot of legal questions for executive session. My concern is that we would not do a study that we need to do and we go and try to build it again and we're back where we started."

The council voted unanimously to table the discussion for two weeks and met in executive session following the council meeting.

## McLendon-Chisholm Council sets election, announces Springfest

With a quorum in attendance, except for Patrick Short, the McLendon-Chisholm City Council met to consider the 2012 general election and concurrent special election for the adoption of an additional sales and use tax was unanimously approved by a 5-0 vote.

Mayor Gary Moody, mayor pro-tem Steve Hatfield and council member Jack Pullen are up for re-election. All three have filed as candidates and all will run unopposed. No other citizens have filed for candidacy, which closed on March 5. The election will be held May 12 and will only include the special election.

Also on the agenda for discussion and consideration was a vote for two candidates to be elected director to the RCH water utility board of directors. Pullen, who is one of the two candidates, excused himself from the room for the discussion and did not vote. All other council members voted in favor of selecting Pullen and Warren Hodges as candidates.

City administrator Dave Butler reported that the code enforcement issue in the Austin Corners neighborhood was being resolved. "The work has been completed," said Butler. "She will call us when the septic system is fixed and we will inspect and make sure all is in line. I have been out there and the fence is back up... The safety issue of the backyard being exposed to the public has been taken care of."

Butler also reported to council that he has been made aware that TxDOT has plans to re-do both of the bridges in downtown on 205. Plans and details are not yet available.

The council took a moment to review a draft informational document that is being created to send to citizens regarding the proposed sales tax increase up for vote in the May general election. Information provided by the city will be either for or against, and will serve simply to help voters understand the issue.

"It's not a new tax, it's a new rate," said Pullen.

We should state somewhere that the state has allowed us to collect this tax but we have not taken advantage of it," said council member Lee Nichols. "Everybody else around us has taken advantage of it."

Citizens can expect to receive the mailing sometime in mid-April.

Before wrapping up, Hatfield said that to be prepared, he would like to have a discussion about the possibilities of future alcohol sales.

Perhaps we need to think about how we want to handle the possibilities of alcohol sales in our city. I'm sure it will happen sooner or later," he said. "Maybe some education about what we can and cannot do... It won't be long before there are restaurants coming in."

## Royse City ISD names Worthy as lone superintendent finalist

Royse City ISD Board of Trustees named Kevin Worthy, superintendent of Gunter ISD, as the lone finalist for the RCISD superintendent position.

Current RCISD Superintendent Randy Hancock will retire effective June 30.

Hancock said the trustees will have a special meeting on March 27 to officially hire Worthy. A state mandated 21-day waiting period started on Tuesday allowing the board to continue to do its "due diligence" as it considers Worthy for the position, according to Hancock.

"We don't anticipate a problem with that at all," Hancock said, "but by law, we have to wait 21 days."

RCISD Board President Don Palmer said the board received 59 applications for the superintendent job.

# Brotherly love behind Macalik's Relay For Life focusing

"Lance Holland was my brother, not just my brother-in-law," Dana Macalik said emphatically. "He began dating my sister, Sandra, when they were just 13 years old. He was a fixture in my family from then on, because they weren't just high school sweethearts. They married when they were 20."

Dana and Lance were not only family; they worked together at Lance's company, Regal Realtors. In late summer of 2009, Dana was the first to notice that something was wrong with Lance.

"He was sitting across from me in a bright white shirt, and I saw that the whites of his eyes were yellow," Dana remembered.

It took several months to determine that Lance had pancreatic cancer. "No one in the family had ever had anyone close to us diagnosed with cancer. We all resolved that we were going to beat this thing," Dana said.

Lance endured more than six hours of chemotherapy treatments once a week for more than a year-and-a-half and participated in a blind drug study. "The hospital would give Lance a private room for his treatments, because there were so many friends and family members who wanted to sit with him during his sessions. Lance had a very positive attitude, which was infectious. He would say, 'Guys, give it to God. Trust and have faith.' That became our mantra," Dana said.

"We knew that we had to focus on how our family and close friends could support Lance and attack cancer. We each chose a role in fighting cancer. My role was to use my sales and marketing background to raise money. I believe wholeheartedly in the American Cancer Society," Dana said. "From the money Rockwall County raises at Relay For Life, only 3 percent goes toward administrative costs. The rest of the funds go directly to research and education."

Dana joined the Rockwall County Relay For Life executive board as the corporate sponsor chair in 2010 and began working to get the community involved. She was able to raise \$17,000 for the American Cancer Society through company donations. Then she and Justin Holland, Lance's son and Dana's nephew, formed a Regal Realtors Relay team and started fundraising.

"We decided we would get our arms around cancer, research treatments, and raise funds to find a cure," Dana said.

Last year, Dana wanted to raise money by thinking outside the box. That end, she recruited her childhood friend, Don Tarrant, who both his parents to cancer. Don organized the Fun Run Rally. The led motorcyclists on a 31-mile course that ended in a party with prizes and awards.

"Don had a group of women we called Don's Girls, who were about in town, collecting items for the silent and live auctions. The mainly things that bikers would bid on, but they also ended up with beauty items. We all laughed when a tough Harley-riding man would mani-pedi, but we raised over \$8,000," Dana said.

Dana's team also organized a spaghetti dinner and a pancake breakfast with the help of Applebee's. In addition, the Pat Grady Memorial Lakeside Chevrolet sponsored a barbecue lunch in the parking lot of American National Bank, with live music provided by local chiro Dr. Shem Ray and his friends.

This year Dana has added more people to her team: Kelli Wilson, & Christie Kirk, Lauri Hairston Trammell, Craig Musser, Gary at Barto, John Monk and Kay Talley to help her coordinate the fund dinner, breakfast and barbecue and they're adding a jewelry/book sale at The Harbor as well.

Another exciting way that Dana is thinking outside the box in generating awareness and enthusiasm for the 2012 Rockwall County Relay For Life is the creation of Paint the Town Purple Day. Dana's friend Haws Davis, has volunteered to chair the event. Their goal is to have the mayor of Rockwall issue a proclamation dedicating the day to awareness. School children and their teachers would don purple T-shirts the day, and local businesses would show their support for Relay For Life by announcing it on their marquees.

Lance Holland lost his battle with cancer in the fall of 2011 at the age of 48.

"My sister lost her best friend and confidant. She's experienced the tragedy of what cancer is," Dana said with tears in her blue eyes.

For this year's Rockwall County Relay For Life, which is set April 7-8 at Cain Middle School, Dana plans on being a member of two of the Relay For Life teams and the Rockwall Area Chamber of Commerce Chamber Crusaders.

"I am passionate about this. I will Relay until there's a cure, promised."






but Day responded by asking for a little information about the 88-year-old Hayes.

# On God's Word

## The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ...an introduction

The chronology of events surrounding the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ can be ascertained by allowing the four Gospels to harmonize and tell one complete story. Each Gospel was written according to the will of God and will not contradict any other record within the four Gospels. Any apparent contradictions can be cleared up by comparing the context of similar events, or by looking to the earlier known translations.

Some records may appear to be the same event, but a study of the context will show that they are actually different events. Likewise, two different records can be of the same event with different wording. Although the writers' wording may differ slightly, the essence of the meaning stays the same. As we launch into this study, we will see examples of both. Our readers are encouraged to set aside personal beliefs concerning the identity of Jesus Christ, and allow God's clearly revealed and recorded opinion to be the foundation. When Jesus was anointed with holy spirit by the prophet John, a voice came from the heavens above saying, "This is my beloved son, in whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:16-17).

Later, Jesus prayed to his Father while in great agony saying, "O my Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me. Nevertheless not as I will, but as you will" (Matthew 26:39). He always did the will of his Father. This is the meaning of the scripture where Jesus said, "I and my Father are one" (John 10:30).

Jesus and his Father were, and still are, one in purpose...which is the Father's purpose. Throughout the scriptures, Jesus Christ made very clear distinctions between the Father and the son. Given this strong distinction, it is best to approach the Gospels with the basic understanding that Jesus Christ was and still is, none other than, the son of God. We have God's word where it says, "Study to show yourself approved unto God, a workman that needs not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2Timothy 2:15). God approves the working of His word. He approves of us not cutting corners in the handling of His word, but instead rightly dividing it by letting His word interpret itself.

God's word does not leave people ashamed because God backs His word for all who believe with meekness and humility. Therefore, it is not shameful or inappropriate for anybody to dive into the minute details of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Next week we will track the events surrounding the last meal that Jesus shared with his disciples just prior to his arrest. During this meal he revealed who would betray him. He also taught them about serving each other. The disciples first learned about the symbolism of food and drink as related to his blood and his body.

Jesus Christ took great care to teach and prepare his disciples according to the will of his Father.



# Barn Cats offers feline assistance

Barn Cats, an all-volunteer, tax-exempt nonprofit organization, has sterilized and vaccinated cats that can take care of rodents that are eating feed, tacking wires.

They have tested negative for feline leukemia and rabies and have had their shots. They are "working" cats that need a job, according to a Barn Cats representative.

"We need is somewhere we can place a cage for a two-week relocation," she release states. "We bring out the cats, the cages and everything to the barn, including food and litter. All you have to do is maintain the cage at the end of two weeks, you release the cats and they take care of themselves in your barn, shed or warehouse."

They require places to hide out, water and a feeder, but that is all. Feral cats are un-neutered animals, not pets, and they don't want to go into residential areas around or be petted.

Barn Cats currently has 46 cats waiting for placement. The organization coordinates with counties that are a two-hour drive each direction from Dallas/Fort Worth.

Participants will be treated to a meal while they are raising money.







# This Week in Heath Heath woman co-chairs Relay for Life for fifth straight year

Twenty-year Heath resident Carla Brooks steps into her familiar role of co-chair of Rockwall's American Cancer Society Relay for Life event, coming up April 27-28 at Cain Middle School.

For the past five years Brooks has either chaired or co-chaired the community event, which aims to raise funds for cancer research, honor cancer survivors and memorialize those who have gone before us.

For Brooks the motivation to become involved with Relay for Life came from the tragedy of losing her husband Tommy Brooks to liver cancer in 2000.

"Within six weeks he was gone," she says. "He was 49 when he passed away on Father's Day."

She also lost her father to prostate cancer and has a close friend who is currently battling a rare form of leukemia.

"It's time to get rid of it," declares Brooks. "It's a disease that can affect any part of your body. It affects everybody's life in some way, form or fashion."

This year marks Rockwall's 15th year to hold a Relay for Life event, which got its start in Tacoma, Wash., 27 years ago.

"It's a community event that bring awareness for research, celebrating those lives that have been saved by that research, and bringing together more funds to help save more lives in the future," says Brooks.

The funds raised also help the American Cancer Society assist and provide treatment services to those in need.

There are many different charities that support cancer awareness and research, but Brooks choose Relay for Life because her best friend asked her to help and she quickly stepped in to the leadership role.

"You think it's an event that's over 12 hours and overnight, and you think you might be too old to do that, but there's so many events and activities going on to keep you up during that time, and it's such a worthwhile cause. You are there for the survivors, and it's worth it," she says.

Brooks is working with the cities of Heath and Rockwall and the school district to do a Paint the Town Purple event right before the Relay.

To support the efforts of Brooks and Rockwall's Relay for Life, there are several ways to get involved. Citizens can form a team or join an existing one, sponsorships are available starting at \$100, or simply attend the event to be a part of the experience. Information can be found at [www.relayforlife.org/rockwalltx](http://www.relayforlife.org/rockwalltx).

"We usually have at least a 1,000 attend the event itself, probably about 700 in the form of participants," says Brooks. "If anything just attend the event. All are welcome."

All cancer survivors are invited to walk in the special Survivors Lap, the first lap of the event, at 7 p.m. A lap for caregivers will also be taken to honor those who lovingly care for those with cancer.

"It goes across the entire county, across all individuals. It affects us all. It doesn't matter what color we are or what economic situation we're in. When cancer decides to hit you, it's there and we've got to get rid of it," she says.

## Royse City students participate in Enterprise City program

A group of fourth grade students from Miss May Vernon Elementary recently attended Enterprise City, an experience created by the Richardson Independent School District to allow students to spend a day in the business world.

Students learn how banks operate, how to open bank accounts and how to write checks and keep a checkbook. They also learn about buying and selling merchandise in a business setting. Police officers enforce rules and given tickets when rules are broken. There also are attorneys, bankers, a radio station, restaurants and a newspaper officer through which employees publish a newspaper at the end of the day. Retail shops are open for business, selling jewelry, sports gear and clothing.

Prior to the visit, students spent several weeks studying and preparing for the visit. They learned basic economic concepts and personal finance. Elections for mayor and judge were conducted. Students applied for jobs and learned about advertising, letter-writing and bank loans in preparation for the experience.

Chloe Lewis was elected mayor for Miss May Vernon's fourth grade class in preparation for its trip to Enterprise City.

When asked what the biggest challenge of elected office was, Lewis said, "I had to do the judge's job while he was on break and that was hard," she said after the students' Enterprise City experience. "I just did my best until my judge got back."

The mayor said the experience was "...really, really, really, really fun" and indicated it was an experience she would recommend to other students.

Enterprise City began in 1985 with funds raised through a combined effort in the Richardson business community and school district. The program operates as a "mini-city" with a fully developed curriculum. It is a required component for all sixth grade students in the Richardson ISD. Numerous other school districts in the area also take advantage of the program.



## No to AIPAC, No to Israel, and No to War

Those who hoped President Obama might bring a new approach to foreign policy have been repeatedly disappointed. On Sunday, Obama had a chance to partially redeem himself. He failed. Speaking at the conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC), he declared, "I have said that when it comes to preventing Iran from obtaining a nuclear weapon, I will take no options off the table, and I mean what I say. That includes all elements of American power."

All elements. That includes nuclear weapons. It is hardly an exaggeration to say this week's AIPAC conference in Washington, D.C., has but one agenda item: goading Obama into confronting Iran even more than he already has. The coalition comprising Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, the Israel lobby, and Congress's dominant pro-Israel caucus will pull out all the stops in this effort. The Republican presidential candidates (excepting Ron Paul) will add fuel to the fire while hoping that Obama leaves some room for them to out-warmonger him.

When I say all the stops will be pulled out, I mean it. Netanyahu said, "Seventy years after the Holocaust, many in the world are silent in the face of Iran's pledges to wipe Israel off the face of the earth. This is a day in which the leaders of the world must commit not to allow another genocide."

But American and Israeli intelligence agree that Iran has not decided to make a nuclear weapon. Twice U.S. intelligence has concluded that Iran scrapped its nascent program in 2003. It is a signer of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT), meaning inspectors of the International Atomic Energy Agency are on the scene. They have repeatedly certified that Iran has diverted no uranium, which it has enriched for energy and medical purposes, to weapons construction.

On the other hand, Israel possesses several hundred nuclear warheads, some submarine-based, and is not a signatory of the NPT. It submits to no

inspections. It rejects calls for a nuclear-free Middle East. Of course, the U.S. government has thousands of nukes, and surrounds Iran with ground and naval forces.

Thus the idea that Iran - even if it managed to build a warhead - represents an "existential threat" to Israel or the United States is laughable. Israeli officials admit as much.

The most hawkish American foreign-policy thinkers don't believe Israel is at risk. Danielle Pletka, vice-president of foreign and defense policy studies at the neoconservative American Enterprise Institute, says,

The biggest problem for the United States is not Iran getting a nuclear weapon and testing it, it's Iran getting a nuclear weapon and not using it. Because the second that they have one and they don't do anything bad, all of the naysayers are going to come back and say, "See, we told you Iran is a responsible power."

The demonization of Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad is particularly absurd. Hoover Institution foreign-affairs expert Bruce Bueno de Mesquita says Ahmadinejad is the 18th-most-powerful politician in Iran. As president he has nothing to say about Iran's military. His faction was dealt a big political setback in last week's parliamentary elections - at the hands of Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, who condemns nuclear weapons per se. Moreover, Ahmadinejad never threatened to "wipe Israel off the face of the earth."

Netanyahu thus is shamefully using the Holocaust card as a license to launch an aggressive war against the Iranian people. But there's no way he can succeed in his plan without involving the United States. Hence, the mounting pressure on Obama.

This is why Obama needed to stand up to Netanyahu, AIPAC, the congressional war chorus, and his Republican critics, and refuse to be a party to their war agenda. An attack on Iran, regardless of whether Israel

# Update on county's road construction spending

Over the past six years or so, Rockwall County has been able to accomplish a great deal in the transportation area.

Current highway projects that are either under construction or are funded and ready to start construction are:

- John King Boulevard -- \$19.6 million
- FM 740 North (Ridge Road) -- \$12.2 million
- I-30 (Erby Campbell in Royse City) -- \$19.5 million

The following projects have been funded and will be scheduled for construction shortly:

- I-30/FM 3549 (pass-through financing) -- \$32 million
- FM 740 South (including right-of-way) -- \$18 million
- I-30/FM 551 Interchange -- \$19 million

Total funding to date: \$120.3 million.

Of the money that has been committed for road construction in our county, \$91.3 million, or 76 percent, has been provided by the state. The other \$29 million has been provided by county road bonds, which the citizens approved in 2004 and 2008. This represents a 300 percent leveraging of county dollars.

In addition to these projects that are already scheduled for construction, the county is currently working on the engineering and ROW (right-of-way) acquisition for the following projects:

- FM 552 -- from SH 205 to SH 66
- SH 66 -- from SH 205 to FM 1777

- FM 3549 -- from I-30 to SH 66
- FM 549 South -- from SH 276 to SH 205
- SH 276 -- SH 205 to FM 549

The total estimated construction cost for these additional projects is \$275 million, part to be funded by the county and part to be funded by the state.

So where has the bond money gone that was approved in 2004 and 2008?

In 2004 a \$17 million road bond program was approved by the voters of the county. That money has now all been spent or allocated to be spent. Usually it takes about 10 years for a road bond program to be fully implemented; our county did it in eight years and that is almost unheard of for speed of implementation.

Projects that were included in these expenditures were John King, Erby Campbell, FM 3549 Interchange, FM 551 Interchange and FM 740 North.

Then in 2008 the voters approved a \$100 million road bond program. About \$12 million of that has been spent and just this last month we sold a little more than \$16 million in bonds to fund upcoming projects. (Because of the county AA bond rating, we sold these bonds at an interest rate a little more than 3 percent.) We are forecasting another sale of about \$25 million this fall to be applied to the pass-through financing for I-30/FM 549.

Pass-through financing is a rather new and innovative way of achieving funding for new road construction. Because of the shortfall in total funds needed at the state level, this program was started several years ago. In essence, if a project is approved for this method of financing, rather than the

state funding the majority of the cost, an agreement is reached where the county will fund the project up front and then be reimbursed by the State for the costs over a period of time, usually 10 years. It allows projects to be built that would probably not receive funding for several more years because of the large demand for new road construction here in the State of Texas.

In addition to the projects already discussed, a Rockwall County Bike Plan is in the engineering phase now with the objective of interconnecting all of the cities in the county with a viable bike and trail path.

The success of the transportation planning and implementation in Rockwall County is a direct result of decisions made several years ago where the county and all of the cities in the county banded together and created a Transportation Consortium. This group agreed to establish a Master Transportation Plan for the county and then prioritize the implementation of projects based upon the overall needs of the area rather than each city trying to outdo the other in why "their" project should be implemented first. As new projects are added to the plan, they too are prioritized. This has resulted in a successful plan and implementation, which is directly due to the agreement for putting the needs of the majority over the desires of the individual.

## Lady Yellowjackets defeat East Victoria 48-35 in State Semi-final, fall to Mansfield Summit for Championship

For most of Saturday's 4A State Final, the Rockwall girls' basketball team played Mansfield Summit at least even.

But those pesky first and last few minutes of the game proved to be RHS' undoing. The Lady Jaguars' 6-0 start and 9-4 finish led to a 45-42 victory and the state championship.

The Lady Jackets (34-8) came away from the University of Texas' Frank Erwin Center with their second loss in three state finals. They had lost the 2006 5A final to Plano West, but took the 5A title the next year over Cy-Fair.

Rockwall started Saturday's game with a case of jitters or bad hands or something. RHS turned the ball over on each of its first four possessions, and took only four shots from the field in a first quarter that ended with Summit leading 12-8.

The Lady Jackets did settle down after that. Head coach Jill McDill said, "We only turned it over 11 times in the whole game, and our goal is 12 (or less)."

The second quarter wasn't much better for RHS. The Lady Jaguars' Maya Hawkins made a shot 2 seconds before halftime for a 22-15 Mansfield lead.

At halftime, McDill said, "We talked about how we needed to come out and fight because it was going to be our last 16 minutes together."

The first 8 of those minutes, the third quarter, were about as good as any the Lady Jackets played this season.

The first half had been almost all about senior Alyssa Lang, who scored 11 of Rockwall's first 15 points. After the Lady Jackets buzzed out of their locker room, freshman Sara Williamson scored six points and senior Paige Turner drove for a basket for an 8-0 run. Barely 2 1/2 minutes into the second half, RHS had its first lead at 23-22.

Then the game settled into a back-and-forth street brawl. The lead changed hands 10 more times before the Lady Jackets took their first two-point lead at 38-36 with 5 minutes, 24 seconds remaining.

That also became RHS' last lead. Hawkins put Summit (37-3) ahead 39-38 with a 3-point shot. Over the final 5 minutes, the Lady Jaguars made six of nine free throws and the Lady Jackets missed both of theirs. The deficit grew to 45-40 before Rockwall senior Kayla Smith put in a layup in the closing second.

The work of that glorious third quarter came undone. During that time, RHS made 9 of 14 shots and had no turnovers. Lang scored 10 more points on the way to a game-high 25 and to having two Summit players foul out trying to guard her.

However, the Lady Jackets were just 2-for-4 from the foul line in that quarter and 12-for-23 for the game. Lang herself shot 13 free throws, the same number as MSHS. She made seven of hers; the Lady Jaguars connected on 10.

Smith tried to explain the difference. "This is an atmosphere none of us had been in. They were more mentally tough. We had all the chances we

wanted; they didn't go our way."

Rockwall had reached the final by defeating Victoria East 48-35 in the semifinals Thursday, March 1.

Lang also started fast in that game, scoring eight points on the way to a 10-6 lead after one quarter. The Lady Titans (40-3) also played a physical game against her, but that night it was Lang who fouled out, with 4:28 to play and Rockwall clinging to a 40-34 lead.

She managed only one point after the first quarter, but Turner came to the rescue. She scored 10 second-quarter points, helping the Lady Jackets to a 25-17 halftime lead, and finished with a game-high 18.

Even though Rockwall never trailed in the game, the lead wasn't comfortable, especially with Lang out of the game. After she left, though, RHS made all eight of its free throws while holding Victoria East to one point.

Much of that was because of Turner's defensive effort. She took on Danielle Franklin, who had scored 20 points in East's 48-42 victory over the Lady Jackets in December. In the semifinal, Franklin had just two points.

Turner's next assignment was to contain Mansfield Summit's Ashley Eli. She scored just seven points, but teammate Hawkins hurt Rockwall with 18 on 8-for-13 shooting.

McDill said, "Paige is our defensive specialist. I didn't think I could move her to 3 (Hawkins) because then I didn't know who'd catch up to 10 (Eli)."

The coach didn't take any players with her to the postgame media conference because she said they were emotional about the game. Smith and Lang then arrived. Lang, a four-year starter, said, "This has been the most amazing experience. I've been very blessed being able to play here and to be with Coach McDill and Kayla. They made me a better player and a stronger person. It has been a privilege to be a part of this program."

The Lady Jackets are losing three senior starters plus Mary Hinton, a 3-point shooter who was injured most of her final two seasons. That doesn't mean the cupboard is bare.

Returning in 2012-13 will be Hannah Hughes, the Dallas Metroplex Newcomer of the Year as a sophomore who played only in her junior year before suffering a knee injury. Junior point guard Day and Williamson, who like Lang can become a four-year starter, from the starting lineup. In addition, reinforcements will be on junior varsity and Freshman A teams that matched the varsity's 14A championship.

The Tarleton State women's basketball team last weekend added its first Lone Star Conference tournament championship to its first regular-season conference title.

After the TexAnns' 48-44 over Incarnate Word in Sunday's final at the Allen Event Center, former Rockwall three-time first-team All-State player Peyton Adamson was named the tournament Most Valuable Player. Joining her on the All-Tournament team was another Tarleton sophomore, Rockwall-Heath graduate Shanae Lowrance.

Adamson led Tarleton against Incarnate Word with 15 points. Lowrance followed up her season-high 22 points in the semifinals with 14 in the final. The dual conference championships helped the TexAnns (23-8) advance

Another former Rockwall first-team All-State player, Sarah Stanley, now


is making news as a coach. In her first season as the head coach at Denton, Stanley was voted by her peers as the District 13-4A Coach of the Year.
