"There weren't any cars in that lane at the time," Shanks said. At the intersection just north of Ridge Rd. the two accused men continued north bound on Goliad.

Shanks said he saw a Rockwall Police Department cruiser coming toward him (south bound on Goliad). "I stopped my car and began waving furiously," Shanks said, "about that time the car behind me slammed into the rear of my car."

Trooper Gonzales said the Rockwall police stopped the men a few minutes later. "With pepper spray in their eyes, they must have had a tough time negotiating the heavy traffic," he explained.



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

Karina Traxler of Rockwall won the 12-and-under singles championship and teamed with Maria Smith of Houston to take first place in doubles as well at the Texas Grand Slam Tennis Championship June 12-19 in College Station.

In singles, Traxler was seeded second and lost only one set while winning six matches. In the final, she upset top-seeded Marina Cozac of Plano 6-1, 6-2. Traxler and Smith were seeded third, but defeated the No. 1 and No. 2 teams on their way to the title.

In the final, they knocked off first-seeded Elizabeth Porter and Margo Taylor of Dallas 6-1, 7-6 (7-4). As one of 16 Sectional champions, the 11-year-old Traxler will advance with her doubles partner to the Nike national championships in September at Stanford University.

"It was the best hosted tournament that I have ever played. They treat us like stars. This year I will have a much better chance to win the tournament. Last year, I was only 10 and had to compete against 12-year-olds," she said.

Traxler will be competing in other national tournaments in Florida and Georgia before the Nike-

Said Karina's father, Dan Traxler, "In order to continue her improvement she must compete with players that can push her, and that is the reason we travel extensively around the country. Coming from a small town like Rockwall there is very little opportunity." He said that in Texas she has won 14-andunder and 16-and-under tournaments.

Even with another year remaining in the age group, Traxler will be ranked among the top 15 in the nation among 12-and-under players.

She attends Spring Creek Academy, a private school in Plano that specializes in allowing athletes time to travel and compete. Karina can train there 3-4 hours daily. Among the students there has been Olympic gold medal-winning gymnast Nastia Liukin.


On Dec. 27, 1979, she mar-

She was survived by a host of nieces, nephews and many friends.



The national bird was spotted in a tree on Stevens Street, next door to Heath residents Rodney and Loyce Wheeler. Rodney Wheeler said his family was returning from a brief vacation and as he returned to his car, he noticed the large bird in the neighbor's tree. At first thinking it was a buzzard, a second look confirmed that it was indeed a bald eagle.

Wheeler immediately went for his camera, which had dead batteries. After a quick recharge, he went back outside to see the bird still perched in the tree. He was able to get several photos before it took off. His neighbors, Jeff and Paige Swiney, on whose tree the eagle was perched, watched from inside their house to avoid scaring the bird away.

Wheeler said his family has only lived in the area for about eight weeks, moving to rural Heath from a larger city. Upon seeing such a rare and magnificent animal literally in his backyard, Wheeler said, "It just floored me. Moving from the city to the country - that's a big piece of the country staring at

He was also moved that the bird appeared a week before the

Captain Garry Collins of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Garland said the bald eagle sighting is very unusual in this part of the state during this time of year. He said a nesting pair of bald eagles was found near the Lake Ray Hubbard dam about four years ago and another nesting pair was reported at Lake Fork a year ago. Bald eagles have also been reported at Chandler's Landing and north of Hwy. 66, but he said it is still "very uncommon" for the birds to make Rockwall County their reports due to an

home this late in the season. According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife website, bald eagles nest in Texas from October to July and breed mainly in the eastern half of the state. They winter in the Panhandle as well as in

Central and East Texas.

Bald eagles mate for life and use the same nest year after year. They may live up to 30 years in the wild and have been known to live 36 years in captivity. Their main food source is fish, but they will also eat birds, small mammals, turtles and carrion.

dle and high school levels provide a unique array of learning choices. RISD students attend summer school for a variety of reasons. Some students are attending programs for remediation in order to improve necessary skills. A few summer learners are enrolled in credit-recovery courses so they can remain on track for graduation. Several eager scholars are attending to free up time in their future schedules, and many of them are attending for enrichment opportunities.

At the elementary level, Rockwall Academy of Creative Exploration (RACE) is hosting "A Summer with the Stars," a tuition-based program providing exploration classes to engage learners. The courses have been designed to challenge students both physically and mentally while helping to stretch their imaginations. Music, sports, culinary arts, crafts, dance and art are just some of the topics featured during this summer enrichment program.

"Taking Flight" is Rockwall ISD's secondary summer enrichment program. Like the elementary program, this tuition-based program offers many engaging opportunities. Specifically, broadcasting, robotics, art, culinary arts, and theatre are part of the curricular roster. In addition, courses designed to help pre-plan the college experience, provide Pre-AP and AP readiness, and enhance the use of Facebook complete this summer experience for students.

Students are not the only ones busy during the summer months. Teachers and staff members throughout the district are attending professional development sessions offered at the district's Administration/Education Center. Instructional staff members from all three levels - elementary, middle and secondary - have opportunities to work together as a professional learning community to hone their skills regarding student engagement and a variety of other topics.

RISD administrators have options to experience the same professional development offerings as teachers. Additionally, many of the district's leaders will attend two district-sponsored administrative conferences: RISD's Leadership Academy and Summit of the Minds. The offerings of June, July and August definitely have evolved since the time when summer months were usually equated with sabbaticals from school. Yes, many students, teachers, principals, and other staff members experience vacations during these traditional times, yet many of them also use some of their out-of-school time taking advantage of learning opportunities. In Rockwall ISD, the summer activities continue to reflect our beliefs:

In Rockwall ISD, in order for us to be a model learning organization, we do believe students are the center of all our decisions, that instruction is meaningful and engaging, that expectations lead to high levels of success, that success is dependent on the strength of our relationships, that sustained success comes from our community's shared leadership and continuous improvement, and that families and the community participate as partners.

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What is Ultrasound?

Ultrasound is an imaging technique that uses high-frequency sound waves, generated by a handheld device called a transducer. The transducer is placed on the skin where it uses the echoes created by the sound waves to create images of the internal organs. Ultrasound does not involve radiation, which is one of the reasons that it is routinely used to examine fetuses in utero. There are many other applications for ultrasound, such as evaluating abdominal and pelvic organs, assessing blood vessels for clots or atherosclerotic plaque, examining the superficial structures of the neck and extremities, and providing guidance for biopsies or for draining fluid collections.

The events following Jesus' crucifixion

Following the death of Jesus Christ a series of amazing and phenomenal events occurred that captured the attention of the Roman soldiers and others who were gathered for the crucifixion. They are recorded in Matthew 27:51-54, Mark 15:38-39 and Luke 23:47. It is possible the braking of their legs as recorded in John 19:31-37 occurred prior to the above mentioned events.

After Jesus bowed his head and died, the Jewish leaders were itching to finish the job because a special sabbath day was fast approaching. It was against Jewish policy for the bodies to remain on the stakes during that day. It should be noted that the Jewish calendar day began every 24 hour period at sunset. This means that Jesus died near the time of sunset. The special day was the Passover. How ironic...the same Jewish leaders who were so fervent about keeping the ordinance about letting dead bodies stay on the stakes, were the same ones who killed God's beloved son.

The Jewish leaders requested to speed up the death of the condemned men by braking their legs. This would have kept them from being able to hold them selves up by their legs, and sped up the suffocation process because all their weight hung by their nailed hands.

The soldiers came and broke the legs of the first man, and then the other who was crucified with Jesus. In other words, the soldiers broke the legs of one of the robbers, and then did the same to one of the malefactors who were led in with Jesus. By the time they came to Jesus, they found him dead and his legs were spared.

Next, one of the soldiers pierced Jesus' side only to see blood and other fluids come out. We might wonder why it is so important to mention the blood and the fluids. This was proof positive that he was truly a man of flesh and blood. It also emphasized the spilling of Jesus' incorruptible blood as the perfect Passover sacrifice. Remember that according to Mosaic law, an important part of the Passover sacrifice was the blood. This may sound grotesque, but a closer study of the Old Testament law related to Passover sacrifices will help to understand the significance of Jesus' blood.

Jesus' unbroken leg and pierced side fulfilled the scripture in Psalms 34:20 and Zechariah 12:10.

Some time during or after the braking of the legs and piercing of Jesus' side, the veil of the Temple ripped from top to bottom, the land began to quake, the graves appeared to open and many bodies of the saints which were dead appeared to many people in the city of Jerusalem. After all this was done, one of the Roman centurions and all who watched Jesus became extremely afraid and said, "Truly this was the son of God." Wow! God sure knows how to get people's

Next week we will study the record of the saints rising from the graves after Jesus' resurrection, and appearing to many in the holy city. Our underlying research question will address whether or not this event was a literal resurrection of the saints, or a vision given to many people in the holy city meant to symbolize the true resurrection, which has not yet occurred.

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

Rockwall County **Book Review**

'Yankee Chick's Survival Guide to Texas,' by Sophia Dembling

I am proud to say that I am a native Texan, born and raised in Dallas and college-educated in Houston. But in my young 20s, I moved to New England for five years and felt I had moved to another country.

About the same time, Sophia Dembling was making the same transition, only in reverse, moving from New York to Texas. In 2001 she wrote the insightful and funny book, "The Yankee Chick's Survival Guide to Texas."

The Friends of the Library hosted Ms. Dembling for a talk a few

years back. This book is very funny if you are not above looking in the mirror and laughing at yourself. A few of our customs that she tries to understand are the obsession with pickup trucks, the cult of football and cheerleaders, the reverence for the Alamo, and our love of the shape of Texas and the Texas flag. Here's a hint that the book will show at least a little respect for the state: it's published by Republic of Texas Press.

I like her assessment of the major Texas cities. Austin is hip and cool and "where most Texans would live if whatever they do wasn't keeping them where they are." Dallas is the "epicenter of conspicuous consumption" yet has an inferiority complex. Houston is "grown up, with a sophisticated arts scene and municipal self-confidence that makes Dallas look needy and Austin look like a frat boy." Her notes on the college scene around Texas are right on the mark, too.

This book reads like a very long Texas Monthly article. She has traveled all over the state and has her own stories to tell, plus lots of Yankee friends to quote. Her total conversion to Mexican cuisine and barbecue makes me smile, with some recipes in the back of the book that I want to give a try. I learned the difference between a "bubba" and a "good ol' boy" and was enlightened by her take on the phrase "bless your heart." Next time you're "fixin' to" go to the library, check it out!

Control Fourth fireworks to avoid wildfires

Fireworks and outdoor activities are commonly linked to Fourth of July celebrations, but Texas Forest Service warns that carelessness with fireworks and other outdoor activities can lead to a wildfire.

With summer in full swing, grass, shrubs and trees are starting to dry out. These dry "fuels" and an errant spark from fireworks or a grill is all that is needed to start a devastating wildfire.

"Many Texans use fireworks to celebrate the Fourth of July," TFS Fire Operations Chief Mark Stanford said. "TFS encourages Texans to use fireworks safely. Citizens should be diligent in protecting themselves and

their property from accidental wildfires." Sandra Taylor, TFS fire prevention specialist I, says citizens should keep fireworks away from homes and structures, which can be accidentally ignited. She says there are a few tips you should adhere to when using fireworks.

"Fireworks should only be used under close adult supervision and in safe areas, away from grass and brush," said Taylor. "A water hose, bucket of water and wet towels should be kept nearby in case they are needed to stop small fires. Used fireworks should be disposed of in a bucket of water."

Other outdoor activities also can lead to dangerous wildfires if you are not careful. Here are a few tips to keep you and the outdoors safe when grilling and camping.

· Build campfires in open, level spots away from trees and overhanging branches; preferably in designated fire rings or fire receptacles.

· Never leave a campfire or cooking fire unattended and extinguish your fire completely before leaving it.

· When dry, windy conditions occur while dead grass, weeds and/or leaves are present, consider using a propane stove or barbecue grill instead of an open fire for cooking. Your fire is not safe to leave until it is cool enough to touch.

• Put barbecue grills over bare dirt or other fire resistant surfaces – well away from dead grass and weeds. Completely extinguish coals and ashes with water. Never transport a barbecue pit or grill with live coals.

As always, check with your local government officials or fire departments to make sure fireworks and campfires are allowed in your county. Be sure to comply with all fireworks restrictions - they are in place to help prevent wildfires.

Under Texas law, the authority to restrict fireworks and implement burn bans is left up to county government officials. TFS does not make decisions regarding restrictions on fireworks or outdoor burning bans. The state agency does, however, provide drought condition information

Rockwall High School's Robotics team, called the Full Metal Jackets, advanced to the finals of the Dallas Regional competition this year, capping off a strong 2009 run. The Full Metal Jackets, among the best in the nation last year when they advanced to the 2008 Nationals in Atlanta, GA., now look to continue their success into next year and beyond.

The House voted last week largely along partisan lines on the House Democrats' cap-and-trade energy bill that Rep. Ralph Hall (TX-4) opposed, believing that this bill will increase costs for taxpayers on gaso-

Ralph Hall votes to strengthen border patrols

Rep. Ralph Hall (TX-4) joined a majority of House Members last week in approving the homeland security appropriations bill for fiscal year 2010 that garnered large bipartisan support. The vote was 389-37.

"This is one of the few measures so far this year on which both parties could reach some agreement," Hall said. "I'm pleased that we maintained strong support of our Border Patrol Agents who are helping to keep our borders secure. We also established Congressional intent that some of the funds be used to remove lookout posts used by drug smugglers and Mexican drug cartels along the U.S.-Mexico border."

Since 2000, the Bush Administration and Congress have doubled the number of Border Patrol Agents, and since 2006 Congress has appropriated \$3.5 billion for border security fencing, infrastructure and technology activities, resulting in 624 miles in pedestrian and vehicle fencing. These measures have resulted in a record number of drug seizures and a decline in the number of illegal immigrants entering the U.S., according to a news release issued by Hall's office.

"This bill also prevents funds from being used to employ any undocumented illegal workers and extends the E-Verify program, which employers use to check the immigration status of employees," Hall said.

The bill requires the Department of Homeland Security to place Guantanamo prisoners on "no fly" lists and denies them immigration benefits.
