Rockwall County property appraisals hit mail boxes, with 65% dropping in value

The Rockwall Central Appraisal District (RCAD) mailed Appraisal Value Notices to homeowners on May 15, according to Ray E. Helm, of that office. Most property values throughout Rockwall County went down by one half percent to one or two percent, he said. Approximately 65% of the property in the county went down in value, approximately 25% stayed the same and approximately 10% increased in value, mainly due to new construction, add-on and renovations.

Approximately fifteen thousand appraisal notices were sent to property owners that met the required criteria: new owners, all personal property, all owners that have an agent, all property that went up more than \$1,000 (market or assessed) and all owners that possibly could qualify for a homestead exemption but have not applied.

Also, all residents in the City of McLendon-Chisholm will receive a notice, as the City, which currently does not have an ad velorem tax, is considering levying a tax rate for 2009.

Helm said if a resident meets these qualifications but has not received an appraisal notice, they can go to the district web site at www. rockwallcad.com to access for proposed 2009 value. The information can be seen by entering the owner's name, street address or property ID number.

The appraisal district's job is to appraise all property in the County

at fair market value. The assessment date is January 1, 2009. Helm said property owners who feel their appraised values are higher than their property would sell for should contact the appraisal district at 972-771-2034 to discuss how the value was determined. Residents can also visit the appraisal district office at 841 Justine Road in

If, after an informal meeting with the RCAD staff an agreement is not reached, a property owner may file a written protest. The deadline to request a hearing before the Appraisal Review Board (ARB) is Monday, June 15, 2009.

If for some reason a property owner is unable to meet informally with a RCAD Appraiser, the Chief Appraiser recommends filing a written protest before the deadline to preserve the right to appeal.

The ARB is an administrative review arm of the property tax system. It is an independent board with responsibility to resolve disputes between property owners and the appraisal district, but is a separate entity from the appraisal office.

A property owner has the right to appeal ARB decisions through district court or binding arbitration.

Helm said a property owner may file an appeal with the district court within no more than 45 days after receiving the Order Determining


Protest. But, if a property owner seeks binding arbitration of an ARB order determining real property, the following criteria must be followed: 1) The appraised or market value, as applicable, of the property as determined by the order is \$1 million or less, 2) An appeal does not involve any matter in dispute other than the determination of the appraised or market value of the property.

The property owner must file this within 45 days of receiving the notice of determination from the ARB and include a \$500 deposit. If the arbitrator's value decision is closer to the value the property owner claims to be correct, \$450 of the deposit will be returned and the Appraisal District pays the arbitrator's fee. The Comptroller will retain \$50 to cover administrative costs.

Most protest and ARB actions concern market value, Helm said. The Tax Code defines market value as the price at which a property would transfer for cash or its equivalent under prevailing market conditions if: a) Exposed for sale in the open market with a reasonable time for the seller to find a purchase, b) Both the seller and purchaser know of all the uses and purposes to which the property is adapted and for which it is capable of being used and of the enforceable restriction on its use, c) both the seller and purchase seek to maximize their gains and neither is in a position to take advantage of the other.


Helm said residents should consider these facts if they are unsure if they should protest their assessment: 1) Is the proposed value of your property too high? (Fair Market Value), 2) Is your property valued unequally compared with other property in the area?

He said if there are any questions about the appraisal of a property to not hesitate to call the Rockwall Central Appraisal District.

Thank you for assistance following surgery

As an out-of-state visitor, I wish to make comments on a few persons and the roads around Rockwall and Forney.

In several short weeks, Mary Hodge of Rockwall Physical Therapy performed superb and professional sessions on me and my leg with repaired torn knee tendons.

focus on some simple principles that I hope you will continue to apply in your next phase of life. A few years ago, Robert Fulghum wrote "All I Ever Really Needed To Know I Learned In Kindergarten." In this book, he provided some basic philosophies. As simple as they are, I still find them to be relevant despite having to translate them to fit "my adult world." No matter how old you get or what path you choose, my hope is that you will always find value in the following basic beliefs:

Share everything. Play fair. Don't hit people.

Put things back where you found them.

Clean up your own mess. Don't take things that aren't

Say you're sorry when you hurt somebody.

Wash your hands before you

Flush.

Warm cookies and cold milk are good for you.

Live a balanced life - learn some and think some and draw and paint and sing and dance and play and work every day some.

Take a nap every afternoon. When you go out in the world, watch out for traffic, hold hands and stick together.

Beaware of wonder. Remember the little seed in the Styrofoam cup: the roots go down and the plant goes up and nobody really knows how or why, but we are all like that.

Goldfish and hamsters and white mice and even the little seed in the Styrofoam cup - they all die. So do we.

And then remember the Dickand-Jane books and the first word you learned - the biggest word of all - look.

Yes, these are simple (Katie Couric) concepts, but I did not say they are uncomplicated. I believe profound satisfaction can occur if we take time to follow them. Taking care of ourselves, others, and the world around us requires a lifetime of self discipline, yet we all learned the importance of kindness and compassion years ago. Hopefully, you will use the milestones throughout your life as benchmarks to check how you are doing with these straightforward tasks. I know I do that with the markers along my journey.

In addition to sharing the simple ideas outlined above, I want to offer heartfelt thanks for all the contributions you have made along your journey. Like all of us, your trek has been marked with times of adversity as well as victory. It is during the times of struggle that we learn some of our most important lessons – it is a time we learn about ourselves. And in the times of victory, we celebrate the strength that sustains us during hard times. As a graduate, you are the victor. Just remember, "No matter how old you are, when you go out in the world, it is best to hold hands and stick together" (Fulghum,

p.6). I do not know how many more milestones there will be along your pathway before you reach your destination. My hope is that once you reach that place, you will set out for another, then another, then another. My hope is that you discover a life where individuality is rewarded and appreciated. I know I appreciate this trait in you. I leave you with this final thought and this final challenge as you move toward your next milestone:

Be fearless. Have the courage to take risks. Go where there are no guarantees. Get out of your comfort zone, even if it means being uncomfortable. The road

less traveled is sometimes fraught with barricades, bumps, and uncharted terrain. But it is on that road where your character is truly tested. And have the courage to accept that you're not perfect, nothing is, and no one is - and that's OK.





Questions about the crucifixion of Jesus Christ ...

The Biblical accounts of Jesus Christ's scourging and crucifixion include certain events that are debated in Theological circles. During the next few weeks we will shine the light of God's word on the following questions:

1. How many people were crucified with Jesus?

2. Did Jesus carry the wooden cross designed for his crucifixion?

3. Did God forsake His beloved son?

It might be argued that the number people crucified with Jesus Christ would not have affected the ultimate outcome. So why make such a big issue about it? Why should we study the minute details to see exactly how many people were crucified with Jesus? Truth is, the integrity of God's word is at stake. There is no doubt that we love God very much. But it should be our desire to search the scriptures and align our personal beliefs with what God says about how many were crucified with Jesus.

For hundreds of years people have held the cross as a symbol of what Jesus Christ did for all of mankind. Sadly, many still carry Jesus hanging on the cross. Gladly, many more carry only the cross without Jesus on it. Jesus is alive and in heaven, no longer hanging on a cross. In our study of the cross that Jesus carried, we will examine the context of how the word "cross" was used in the different Gospel accounts.

The question of whether God forsook His beloved son drives in the underlying question of whether God followed through with His promise. According to the King James Bible, while hanging on the cross Jesus cried out, "My God, My God why have you forsaken me!" This is a highly charged subject that must be addressed. If God truly forsook His son, then He did not raise him from the dead. And if God never raised Jesus from the dead, then all of God's word in the Gospels, Epistles and the book of Revelation would be null and void.

As we take the time to shine the light of God's word on the above topics, we can learn to do the same in other areas of personal belief. We can let God's rightly divided word shine more light in our hearts toward increased understanding and growth in our spiritual walk.







Housing boom and bust

by Walter E. Williams

Hot off the press is my colleague Dr. Thomas Sowell's 43rd book, "The Housing Boom and Bust." The book is an eye-opener for anyone interested in the truth about the collapse of the housing market that played a major role in our financial market crisis.

The root of the problem lies in Washington. The Community Reinvestment Act of 1977, later given teeth during the Bush and Clinton administrations, forced financial institutions to make risky mortgage loans they otherwise would not have made. President Clinton's Attorney General Janet Reno threatened legal action against lenders whose racial statistics raised her suspicions. Bank loan qualification standards, in general, came under criticism as being too stringent regarding down payments, credit histories, and income. Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, two government-sponsored enterprises, by lowering their standards for the kinds of mortgage paper they would purchase from banks and other mortgage lenders, gave financial institutions further incentive to make risky loans.

In 2002, the George W. Bush administration urged Congress to enact the American Dream Down Payment Assistance Act, which subsidized down payments of homebuyers whose income was below a certain level. Bush also urged Congress to pass legislation requiring the Federal Housing Administration to make zero-down-payment loans at low-interest rates to low income Americans. Between 2005 and 2007, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac acquired an estimated trillion-dollar's worth of subprime loans and guaranteed more than \$2 trillion worth of mortgages. That, Sowell points out, is larger than the gross domestic product of all but four nations.

There were numerous warnings that went unheeded. In congressional hearings, U.S. Treasury Secretary John Snow said, regarding the risks assumed by Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, "The concern is, if something unravels, it could cause systemic risk to the whole financial system." Peter J. Wallison, American Enterprise Institute scholar, warned that if Congress did not reign in Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac, "there will be a massive default with huge losses to the taxpayers and systemic effects on the economy."

There were many other warnings of pending collapse but Congress and the White House in their push for politically popular "affordable housing" ignored them. Congressman Barney Frank, who is now chairman of the House Committee on Financial Services, said critics "exaggerate a threat of safety" and "conjure up the possibility of serious financial losses to the Treasury, which I do not see." Chairman Chris Dodd, of the Senate Banking Committee, called Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac "one of the great success stories of all time" and urged "caution" in restricting their activities, out of fear of "doing great damage to what has been one of the great engines of economic success in the last 30 or 40 years."

Sowell provides numerous examples of government actions at both the federal and state levels that created the housing boom and bust and its devastating impact on domestic and foreign financial markets, but here's what I don't get: What can be said about the intelligence of the news media and the American people who buy into to congressionally created lies that our problems were caused by Wall Street greed and Bush administration deregulation? In the words of Barney Frank, "We are in a worldwide crisis now because of excessive deregulation" and "mortgages made and sold in the unregulated sector led to the crisis." The fact of the matter is our financial sector is the most heavily regulated sector in our economy. In the banking and finance industries, regulatory spending between 1980 and 2007 almost tripled, rising from \$725 million to \$2.07 billion. I challenge anyone to come up with one thing banks can do that's not covered by a regulation.

For the Washington politicians to get away with spinning the financial crisis the way they have suggests that American people are either stupid or ignorant. I hope it's ignorance because "The Housing Boom and Bust" is the

Unchaining Cheney

The only thing missing from Dowd's column was holding Cheney responsible for swine flu.



Yellowjackets' varsity Orange team gives 'football clinic' with 42-7 win over White team

Adam Dingwell seemed ready and able Friday night to lead Rockwall as its quarterback again in his senior season.

Dingwell ran for three touchdowns and passed for a fourth as his Orange team rolled past the White squad 42-7 in the Yellowjackets' an-

RHS' coaching staff split the varsity to make the teams as even as possible, but the difference was Dingwell's play.

"Adam had a good night," said Rockwall head coach Scott Smith. "He functioned well. Alan Reed did some good things on the White team

"In the spring, we have 18 practices over 21 days. One of the most important things is how many players you can find. We feel now that we're more than one deep."

Reed's success was primarily in running the option and directing a running game that featured Del Myles. He led the White with 87 rushing yards (all statistics in this article are unofficial) and scored its only touchdown to pull the team within 21-7 with 17 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

Dingwell's skills, polish and leadership showed up best after that. On the first half's final play, he escaped the White pass rush and led running back Josh Broach with a deep pass that went for 40 yards. That put the ball on the White 18 yard line as time expired. With one more play, the Orange could have scored a field goal or possibly a touchdown.

It didn't appear to take long for the Orange to score in the second half. On the first play, Broach ran 70 yards for an apparent touchdown, but the play was called back. Undaunted, Dingwell took his team the 70 yards in 12 plays that chewed up most of the third quarter. His 5-yard touchdown pass to Luke Wardell and Travis Shinn's fourth of six extra points gave the Orange a 28-7 lead.

The White team had put itself in an early hole when Orange recovered

a bad snap at the White 23. On third and three, Broach burst through the middle for a 16-yard touchdown. He finished as the game's leading rusher with 15 carries for 106 yards.

After that, Dingwell took the Orange offense on two first-half drives that ended with his first two touchdowns. On the second of those, the big play was Ben Johnson's 49-yard run.

A methodical 13-play drive took the Orange to a fourth-quarter score, on Dingwell's 1-yard run.

With the score 35-7, Reed tried to put the White in position to throw. But his pass over the middle sailed high, and Spencer Edwards intercepted it. On the night's most electrifying play, Edwards ran to the left sideline, reversed fields and took the ball down the right sideline for a 63-yard touchdown.

Edwards had just one week of practice because he had been playing with the Jackets' baseball team.

"He's a competitor, a gym rat," Smith said of Edwards. "We had to be careful not to give him too much tonight."

Defense had dominated the junior varsity game earlier in the evening. It was scoreless until Orange quarterback Ryan Heiden hit tight end Grant Snyder with a 7-yard touchdown pass with just 41 seconds to play. The White team gained more yardage, 171 to 133, but fumbled the ball away at its 35 to set up the winning score.

Smith said of the scrimmages, "We saw a lot of good things. This is a fun group. They had a real good time. They enjoy playing. I saw us get better as the practices went along.

"It has been a good spring. Now they'll catch their breath and get ready for exams."

There will be some football involved as well. The Jackets will play in five 7-on-7 tournaments over the next five weekends, beginning with the Frisco Liberty tournament Saturday. Rockwall's goal will be to qualify

for the 64-team state Division I tournament.

Walker said of the club team, "Our goal is to help these swimmers achieve their athletic potential, whether that's swimming a AAA cut or training for a college scholarship. teams had a Friday night meeting and heard a talk about the future of Aerospace engineering. They learned that the majority of aerospace engineers working for NASA, the defense department and contractors are over 50 years old and will be retiring in the next few years, creating a great need for the students of America to enter into space science programs.

The next day, a color guard from the various branches of the

U.S. Military opened the contest. Thousands of spectators watched as the first round of rockets began lift off in the misty rain and cooler temperatures.

Rockwall-Heath had its first launch at 10:15 a.m. and landed

itself in third place. As the day wore on, the Rockwall-Heath team moved into seventh place overall, but still earning them a spot among the top twenty teams moving to the finals. Using their laptop computer, the boys entered information such as wind velocity, humidity and temperature to their equation to obtain the exact amount of weight necessary to

obtain the 750 feet height and the 45 second drop to the earth without breaking their raw egg

At the finals, the RHHS rocket had a mechanical problem, dropfinish overall.

The top ten teams split \$65,000 in prize money and the top 20 teams were invited to participate in a NASA high altitude rocket program. The first place team from Madison, WI. received a trip to Paris, France for the annual Paris Air show in mid-June as part of its prizes.

In attendance at the contest were the Secretary of the Air Force Michael B. Donley, Raytheon CEO William H. Swanson, Lockheed Martin CEO Robert J. Stevens, Aerospace Industries Association (AIA) President and CEO Marion Blakey.

During their week in Washington, D.C., the Heath boys took a tour of the National
