The playhouse was built and donated to the fundraising effort by Jack Cecil of Westchester Custom Homes, according to a City of Rockwall news release.



Rockwall makes plans for municipal election

Informational candidate packets for residents who may be interested in learning more about running for the Rockwall City Council are available at City Hall, 385 S. Goliad, in the third floor city secretary's office and online on the city secretary's webpage at rockwall.com/ citysecretary.asp.

Applications for places on the May 6 ballot will be accepted between Wednesday, Jan. 18, and Friday, Feb. 17, according to a city news release.

Following the first of the year, the municipality is expected to call the May 6 election for the purpose of filling the mayoral and three city council terms. Open seats include those representing Places 1, 3 and 5, all two-year terms.

Three of the four incumbents are eligible to seek re-election, according to the release. They include Mayor Jim Pruitt and council members Kevin Fowler, Place 3, and Scott Milder, Place 5. Council member David White, Place 1, is "termed out" and ineligible to seek re-election.

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On God's Word

by Timothy W. Burnett The accounts of Jesus' conception ... Luke

The most detailed accounts surrounding Jesus' conception and birth came from a physician named Luke. Based on the continuation of thought and close devotion to serving with the apostle Paul, it is commonly believed that Luke also wrote Acts.

By his use of the pronoun "we," it is known that the writer of Acts stayed close to Paul even during the devastating storm and ship wreck experience while in en-route to Jerusalem with other prisoners,

In 2Timothy 4:11, Paul said, "Only Luke is with me."

Considering his service with Paul, it stands to reason Luke had opportunity to interact with many people who were witnesses to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

His details into the conception and birth of Jesus shows Luke had access to Mary and possibly some of the shepherds who saw and heard the angels, and saw Jesus as a newborn baby.

Luke began with, "Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us, Even as they delivered them unto us, which from the beginning were eyewitnesses, and ministers of the word; It seemed good to me also, having had perfect understanding of all things from the very first, to write unto thee in order, most excellent Theophilus, that you might know the certainty of those things, wherein you have been instructed" (Luke 1:1-4).

The word "Theophilus" was ancient Greek for "man of God." Luke does not give the name of the person being addressed, but considering the context, a good candidate might be the apostle Paul.

Luke's introduction is extremely revealing of the impact that Jesus had on many people who attempted to "take in hand to set forth in order a declaration."

E.W. Bullinger's notes in the King James Bible offers helpful translations of Luke's introduction. The phrase "Forasmuch as" was translated from the words, "Since, as is well known indeed."

It was "well known indeed" that many attempted to draw up a narrative concerning matters or facts which have been fully accomplished, and in fulfillment of prophetic announcements.

According to Bullinger, Luke used a number of different medical terms, and had a frame of mind to be scientifically precise and accurate. This is significant because he was probably used critical thinking skills while collecting accounts of eyewitnesses.

In other words, if there was any doubt about the authenticity and accuracy of the eyewitness accounts surrounding Jesus' conception, birth, life, death and resurrection, Luke would not have wasted his time by serving in the ministry with the apostle Paul. He definitely would not have endured with Paul's burdens as a prisoner. If there was any doubt in Luke's mind about the Lord Jesus, Paul would not have had occasion to tell Timothy, "only Luke is with me."

While with Paul, Luke would have also seen the power of God. Keep these things in mind while reading Luke's accounts of Jesus.

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"Let every thing that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord."

In my opinion, it is only in this interval or intermediate situation, goods from Great Britain and export specie money from France to pay between the acquisition of money and rise of prices, that the increasing quantity of gold and silver is favorable to industry . . . From the whole of this reasoning we may conclude that it is of no manner of consequence, with regard to the domestic happiness of a state, whether money be in a greater or less quantity.

But when all prices, finally, will have been affected and adjusted by the change in the quantity of money, Hume reasoned, all "real" relative price and production relationships will have more or less restored themselves.

Hume's Refutation of the Balance-of-Trade Argument

David Hume's most important contributions, undoubtedly in the history of economic ideas are in his reply to the Mercantilist policy views as found in his essay, "Of the Balance of Trade," in which he challenged the argument for government's fostering a permanent "positive" balance of trade.

David Hume constructed what has become known as the "specieflow" theory of the movement of money and goods between nations to an assure equilibrium among international prices and the distribution of specie (or commodity) money among countries that are trading with

Hume supposes two cases, that the amount of gold or silver money in Great Britain is either reduced or increased in quantity. In the first instance, prices would decrease in Great Britain, making it more attractive for, say, French buyers to take advantage of less expensive goods purchasable in Britain; in the other instance, the resulting high prices in Great Britain would make it attractive for British subjects to purchase less expensive French versions of products they previously had been buying at home. In the first case British exports to France would increase (and imports from France would decrease), and in the second case British imports from France would increase (and exports to France would decrease).

Again, in the first case, the lower and more attractive British prices would bring about an increase in gold and silver into Great Britain as the French buyers' means of paying for the increased amount of British exports into France. In the second case, the higher and less attractive British prices would bring about an outflow of gold and silver from Great Britain to pay for the increased amount of imported French

In both cases, this would be setting in motion counter-acting forces to restore an international price equilibrium between these two countries and their export-import trade. In the first instance, the inflow of gold and silver into Great Britain would bring about a rise in British prices, which would continue until prices had risen and French prices had fallen (due to the, now, the small quantity of gold and silver money in France) to eliminate the price and profit motives to import more

In the second instance, people in Britain would export a portion of their enlarged quantity of gold or silver money to France, to purchase less expensive goods from French manufacturers. The gold supply would increase in France and decrease in Great Britain. As a result, prices would begin to rise in France, and decrease in Britain. This would reverse the process until the price differential making French goods more attractive to those in Britain had been reversed, and restored the international price equilibrium.

Hume on the Specie-Flow Mechanism of **Coordinated Trade**

In David Hume's own words from "Of the Balance of Trade":

Suppose four-fifths of all the money in Great Britain to be annihilated in one night, and this nation reduced to the same condition with regard to specie, as in the reigns of Harrys and Edwards, what would be the

Must not the price of all labor and commodities sink in proportion and everything be sold as cheap as they were in those ages? What nation could then dispute with us in any foreign market, or pretend to navigate or to sell manufactures at the same price, which to us would afford sufficient profit?

In how little time, therefore, must this bring back the money which we have lost, and raise us to the level of all the neighboring nations? Where, after we have arrived, we immediately lose the advantage of the cheapness of labor and commodities; and the farther flowing in of money is stopped by our fullness and repletion.

Again, suppose, that the money of Great Britain were multiplied fivefold in a night, must not the contrary effect follow? Must not all labor and commodities rise to such an exorbitant height, that no neighboring nations could afford to buy from us; while their commodities, on the other hand, become comparatively so cheap, that, in spite of all the laws which could be formed, they would be run in upon us, and our money flow out; till we fall to a level with foreigners, and lose that great superiority of riches, which had laid us under such disadvantages? . . .

From these principles we may learn what judgment we ought to form of those numberless bars, obstructions, and imposts, which all nations of Europe, and none more than England, have put upon trade.

From an exorbitant desire of amassing money, which never will heap up beyond its level, while it circulates; or from an ill-grounded apprehension of losing their specie, which never will sink below it."

Could any thing scatter our riches, it would be such impolitic contrivances. But this general ill effect, however, results from them, that they deprive neighboring nations of that free communication and exchange which the Author of the world has intended, by given them soils, climates, and geniuses, so different from each other.

People and governments had no reason to fear that gold and silver money would continue to hemorrhage out of a country until that nation was penniless; nor should they think that there was no natural market check or response to a continuous increase of gold and silver money into a country. Both types of money flows brought with it their own price and profit responses to assure restored balance and coordination in the buying and selling of goods across borders, and a marketdetermined distribution of specie money between and within countries participating in such international trade.

David Hume's analysis has been considered the devastating critique of one of the fundamental assumptions underlying the Mercantilist system. The famous Austrian-born economist, Gottfried Haberler said in his Theory of International Trade (1933) that, "Mercantilism received its death-blow in 1752 when Hume published his Political Discourses."

And University of Chicago economist, Jacob Viner, who was recognized as one of the twentieth century's most knowledgeable experts on the doctrines and history of global trade, argued in his Studies in the Theory of International Trade (1937):

In so far as the classical theory of the mechanism of international trade had one definite originator, it was David Hume. His main objective in presenting his theory of the mechanism was to show that the national supply of money would take care of itself, without need of, or possibility of benefit from, governmental intervention of the mercantilist type . . .

The entire mechanism was kept in operation by the profit motive of individuals, 'a moral attraction, arising from the interests and passions of men,' acting under the stimulus of differences in prices. The mechanism, therefore, was according to Hume automatically selfequilibrating, was intranational as well as international, was bilateral, involving adjustments both at home and abroad, and consisted of such changes in the volume of exports and imports, resulting chiefly from changes in relative prices but also in minor degree from fluctuations in exchange rates, as would bring about or maintain an even balance of trade, so that no further specie need move to liquidate a balance.

Having disproved the Mercantilist theory of trade, David Hume, in his essay on "Of the Jealousy of Trade," argued for the wider benefits to all from international commerce and association. Through international trade each nation, he argued:

Learns new skills and technologies to improve their own productive potentials; widens the circle of goods and services a nation can have access to from countries possessing different resources and climates; stimulates innovation and creative change arising from the competition of foreign manufacturers and merchants; and increases the potentials for intensified division of labor and the higher productivity from more specialized production.

Hume concluded this essay on the jealousy of trade in words that have been famous ever since, in warning of dangers and absurdities resulting from government restrictions and controls on international trade, and on the benefits to all parties by leaving markets free to the peaceful and voluntary associations of trading partners, themselves:

Were our narrow and malignant politics to meet with success, we should reduce all our neighboring nations to the same state of sloth and ignorance that prevails in Morocco and the coast of Barbary. But what would be the consequences? They would send us no commodities; They could take none from us; Our domestic commerce itself would languish for want of emulation, example and instruction. And we ourselves should soon fall into the same abject condition, to which we had reduced them.

I shall therefore venture to acknowledge that, not only as a man, but as a British subject, I pray for the flourishing commerce of Germany, Spain, Italy, and even France itself. I am at least certain, that Great Britain, and all those nations would flourish more, did their sovereigns and ministers adopt such enlarged and benevolent sentiments towards

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Keeping pets warm during winter months

As the temperature outside drops, people begin wearing heavier coats. But how do pets prepare for cold weather? Animals rely on their owners to provide shelter, food, water, and warm blankets during the winter months. Dr. Sarah Griffin, lecturer at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences, explained how pet owners can keep both inside and outside pets warm this winter.

"Some pets handle the cold weather better than others," Griffin said. "Dog breeds such as Siberian Huskies or Saint Bernard's are bred to handle cold weather, while others like Chihuahuas or Greyhounds are not. Pet owners should watch for shivering, because it is a mechanism used to compensate for being cold. However, constant shivering may mean that the pet is uncomfortably cold."

Griffin said if a pet is sheltered out of the wind or cold, and still shivering, this may mean it is too cold for the pet to be outside. In this case, prepare a warm bed for the animal to stay inside until the temperature rises high enough for the animal to be comfortable outside again. If the pet cannot stay inside, Griffin recommended tips for creating a warm shelter outside.

"Shelters can be purchased from pet supply stores, online, or can even be homemade to protect outdoor pets from the weather," Griffin said. "A dog house should be big enough for the dog to stand up and turn around in, but not excessively big. The dog's own body heat is enough to heat a dog house to a comfortable temperature on a cold day. Cat houses can be made with the same concept of making it large enough for the cat to move around but small enough for the cat's body heat to keep the temperature comfortable."

Additionally, Griffin said she does not recommend heat lamps or heaters in pet shelters because they can be fire hazards. However, blankets can help your pet stay warm.

When preparing pets for cold weather, owners should also consider any health conditions their pet might have. Griffin said pets with underlying health conditions may be less adapted to changes in weather. As a result, pet owners should make changes in their pet's environment accordingly.

"In general, pets with health conditions are better as indoor pets so their health can be monitored closely," Griffin said. "Of course, pets with health conditions can go outside for short periods of supervised time during cold weather months. However, these pets may need sweaters or boots to keep them comfortable."

Additionally, pet owners should consider their pet's food and water intake during the winter months. Although Griffin said pets' basic calorie needs don't change when the weather changes, the animal may require more calories if they are more active in cooler weather. Remember that fresh water should be available at all times, Griffin said.

Because animals rely on their owners to keep them warm during the winter, it is important for pet owners to provide warm shelters for both inside and outside pets. If you have any concerns about how cooler weather could impact your pet's health, consult your veterinarian.
