Pumpkin Patch to kick of 21st year October 21st

Organizational efforts behind the 21st annual Rockwall Pumpkin Patch are well under way. The grand opening for the event, which is a Rockwall tradition, is Oct. 3.

The patch will offer hundreds of pumpkins for lawn art, carving, as well as fall mums and traditional Pumpkin Patch items: pumpkins of all shapes and sizes, ornamental squashes, hay, corn stalks and corn. Also available will be deli items such as jalapeño pickled cucumbers, pickled pickles, candy jalapeños and pumpkin butter.

Special children's activities will be offered on Saturdays, and Story-Telling Time will be conducted by Doreen Miller, the library's librarian.

The patch will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily throughout the month of October.

The Pumpkin Patch is a joint fundraiser benefiting the Friends of the Rockwall County Library and the Council of Catholic Women of Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church. The library uses funding raised through the patch to offer numerous library programs. The women's group uses their share of funds raised to conduct a wide variety of charitable programs.

The event is run entirely by volunteers and is organized by a steering committee.

The Pumpkin Patch is located in the grassy area of the Ridge Road Shopping Center in Rockwall, 1019A Ridge Road, in front of the Rockwallshire's parking lot.

Heath approves budget, fee increases for new tax year

City of Heath residents will see a slight increase in their water and garbage collection bills as part of a \$11 million budget the city council approved Tuesday, Sept. 15.

The council voted unanimously to approve fee changes, a steady

tax rate and new budget, for the 2009-2010 fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

Water fees will increase about 7 percent for both the usage and flat rates at all meter sizes and usage levels. For most residents, trash collection fees will increase 52 cents each month.

Those planning to use the city's community room and park pavilions for gatherings will also take note of fee changes.

Rental of the community room will now be \$75 for five hours or less and \$125 for more than five hours. Renting only half the room will no longer be an option.

Likewise, park pavilion reservations will be offered in three-hour blocks at \$25 for Towne Center Park and \$50 for Terry Park. At Terry Park non-Heath or Dallas residents will pay a \$100 fee per three-hour period.

The city tax rate will remain the same at about 34 cents per \$100 of property valuation. The rate has remained steady for the past 18 years, bringing in more revenue as property values have increased.

Homeowner's tax bills vary by the value of their homes. While

some will pay more and some less, on average, Heath residents will pay about \$19 more this year.

Before approving the budget for the new fiscal year, council members approved changes to the 2008-2009 budget to reflect adjustments necessary because of a \$254,500 shortfall in expenditures.

In the last fiscal year, the city collected \$135,000 more in permits than expected as well as \$69,000 less in lease and \$33,000 less than expected from interest payments. The city failed to realize \$20,000 in fees expected from new developments.

To balance the budget, the city put off some street repairs and improvements, reduced payroll by not filling one position and eliminating another and reduced its contribution to its neighboring communities among other reductions to more than 40 line-items.

In the coming fiscal year, the city expects about \$670,000 in revenue than last year, with an increase of \$94,000 coming from additional property tax revenue, largely from new construction.

City manager Ed Thatcher credits current economic conditions for expected reductions in other revenue including a 6.2-

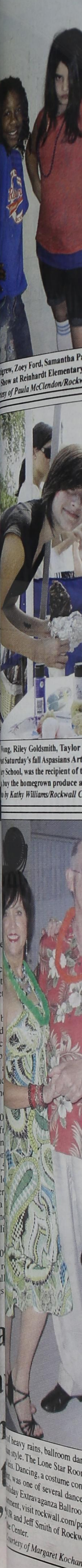

Life distracted Vicki Hoarty from painting shortly after high school by life, but she has rediscovered her talents six years ago with help from an art teacher.

Two years after lessons and guidance from art gallery owner and teacher Betty Foster, Hoarty was selling her works, entering shows and critiques and she had gained a new friend in Foster.

Now the talented Heath resident is sharing her work with Rockwall County Helping Hands by donating small paintings in a series to the agency's Boutique at the Rockwall Thrift Store.

"I started painting in high school," Hoarty said, "but I gave it up for 30 years to go to work and to raise a family. Now Betty has renewed the gift and my confidence. I became totally uninhibited with a paint brush."

Helping Hands Thrift Stores manager Melody East said the agency said she is excited by Hoarty's donation, noting that the artist's paintings have been featured at the Bella Harbor Hilton.

"Vicki is a wonderful lady and a talented artist," said Melody. "We are so excited and grateful that she is doing this for our agency, and we know our customers will be lining up for her paintings."

Hoarty's relationship with Helping Hands started when she learned that the non-profit critical agency provided Rockwall County residents in crisis with food, assistance with shelter and utility bills, health care and necessary home items.

Hoarty said she and her husband, Tim, live by the scripture Isaiah 58, following its directive to offer the hungry food and to shelter and clothe the afflicted.

"Helping Hands does all that," she said. "When I saw all that they do, I had to get involved."

Strong believers in tithing, the Hoartys give to Helping Hands because, she said, "they are doing work that needs to be done."

And instead of conducting garage sales for their unwanted "stuff," the couple gives it to Helping Hands to sell in their Thrift Stores, a major revenue source for the agency.

The Hoartys are parents of Dylan, who recently finished his practical at Le Cordon Bleu Institute of Culinary Arts in Dallas and has started his externship at Blue Canyon Kitchen, Tavern and Wine Bar restaurant at The Harbor in Rockwall. Vicki Hoarty admitted her son's cooking has caused her stretch denims to "stretch a little too much sometimes."

Jackets, Broach blast Royse City 42-21

 A three-dimensional offense is no problem for a football team that needs two dimensions.
 Rockwall Friday night, one player almost seemed to be enough

"I don't know what the breakdown was on runs and passes, but we gave (the ball) to number 34 a few times," RHS head coach Scott Smith said after the Yellowjackets won at Royse City 42-21.

Number 34, Josh Broach, accounted for 243 yards on 21 carries. He scored three touchdowns.

Broach came on the game's first possession. Royse City took the opening kickoff, gained only one yard and punted, the Jackets gave Broach the ball for five yards.

Playing better not good enough for Bulldogs in loss to Rockwall

Royse City's football team continued to improve Friday night, but not enough to come within 21 points of Rockwall.

Before a nearly full house for Homecoming at Royse City ISD Stadium, the Bulldogs fell to 0-4 overall and 0-1 in District 10-4A with their 42-21 loss to the Yellowjackets.

"We're improving, I promise you," said RC head coach Greg Strahm. "Three weeks ago, if you'd say we could face a stout team like Rockwall, that would have been great. In the first half, we took their best."

The 'Dawgs trailed 21-7 with four minutes remaining in the second quarter, when they went on an 11-play drive to the Jackets' 21 yard line. Sophomore quarterback Taylor Corbin threw a pass into the end zone, but RHS sophomore Spencer Edwards picked off the ball to end the threat.

Rockwall received the second-half kickoff and needed just four plays to go 65 yards to a 28-7 lead. It took a trick play to put the ball in the end zone. The Bulldogs went toward the right of the Jackets' formation to stop Josh Broach, but the ball came back to the left on an end around to wide receiver Will Beasley. He went 48 yards for a touchdown the only time he touched the ball in the game.

Rockwall's lead grew from 28-7 to 42-7 before Royse City scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns.

Corbin drove the Bulldogs 82 yards in 12 plays for their second touchdown, making a risky but successful play for the score. From the Jackets' 25 yard line, Corbin ran to his left on an option. While being tackled at the 15, he pitched the ball to Lewis Mapps, who carried the ball to the end zone.

The game's final score came at the end of a seven-play, 70-yard drive. Corbin completed all five of his passes to set up his own 1-yard touchdown run.

"Taylor has gotten better every week," Strahm said. "He missed a couple of reads, but that's expected."

Corbin passed for 175 yards, but was intercepted three times. In addition to Edwards' drive-ending pick, an interception and return by Justin Boss set up Rockwall's final touchdown.

The Bulldogs' most impressive drive was their second of the game, when they tied the score 7-7 on Corbin's 29-yard fourth-down pass to Kristofer Smith. He was Royse City's leading receiver with eight catches for 51 yards. Mapps led RC with 102 rushing yards in 18 carries, but Strahm said the running game could have been even better if Ryan Fedric hadn't left after only one carry.

"Ryan has had an ankle sprain. He did everything he could do to try to get in the game - all the drills and exercise, but when he got out there, he couldn't really push against it."

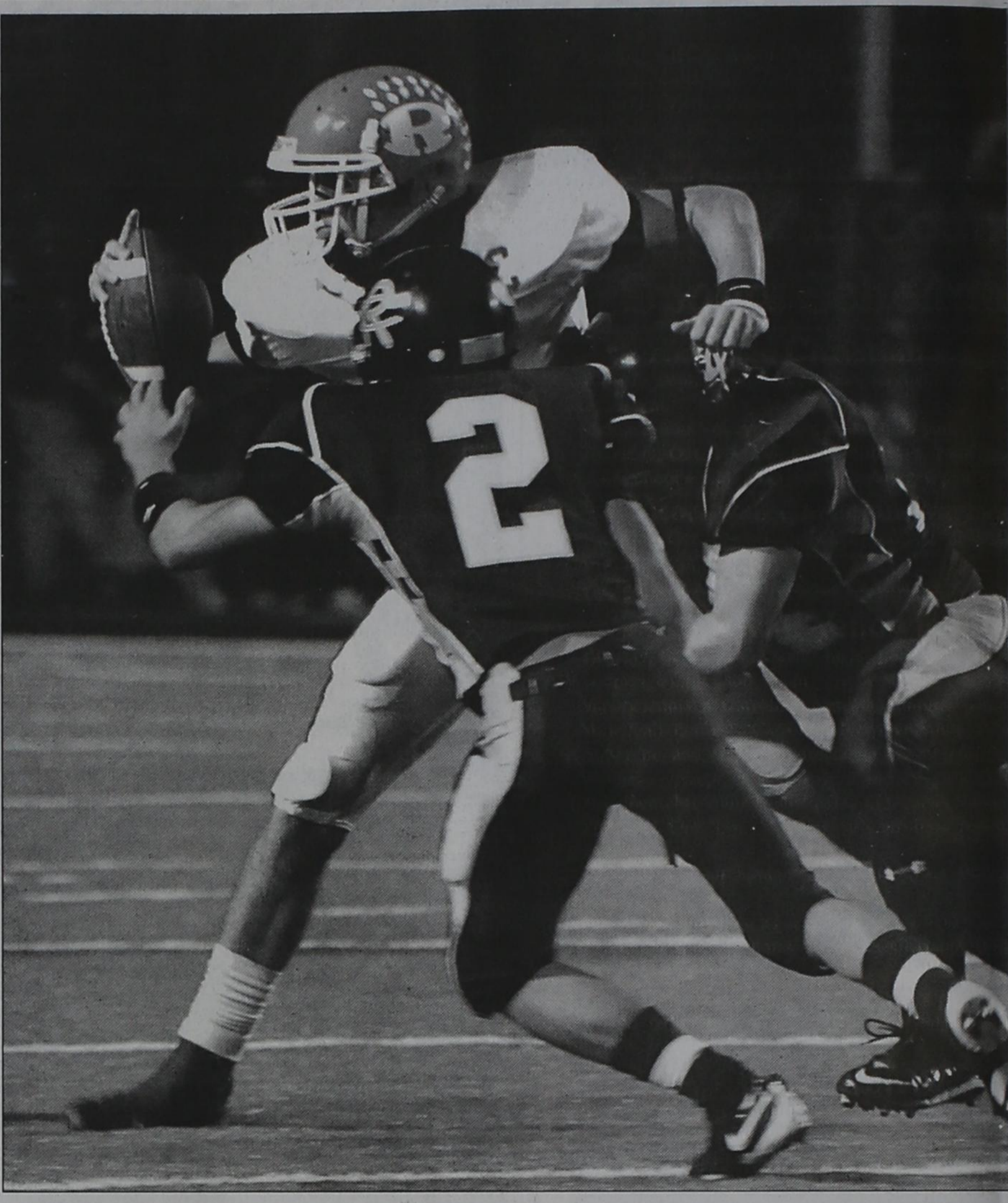
Even with Fedric, the Bulldogs' running game probably wouldn't have matched Rockwall and Josh Broach, who ran for 243 yards and three touchdowns.

The Jackets' first possession was all Broach, all the time. During that five-play drive, he carried five times for 48 yards and his first TD. He barely slowed down before leaving the game late in the third quarter.

Strahm said, "We felt like they would play their strength. Josh Broach is a very explosive back. It didn't matter what kind of blocking scheme they used, he could burst through for faster runs. He gave us a lot of fits."

"He didn't play much against us last year (in Royse City's 32-20 victory). After our game, he played more and they got better offensively. He was the offensive Sophomore of the Year in the district."

The Bulldogs' victory last year was at Rockwall's Homecoming game, and the Jackets returned the favor this year. Their victory evened the all-time series at 12-12-3.

Defense comes to life as Hawks district opener 38-12

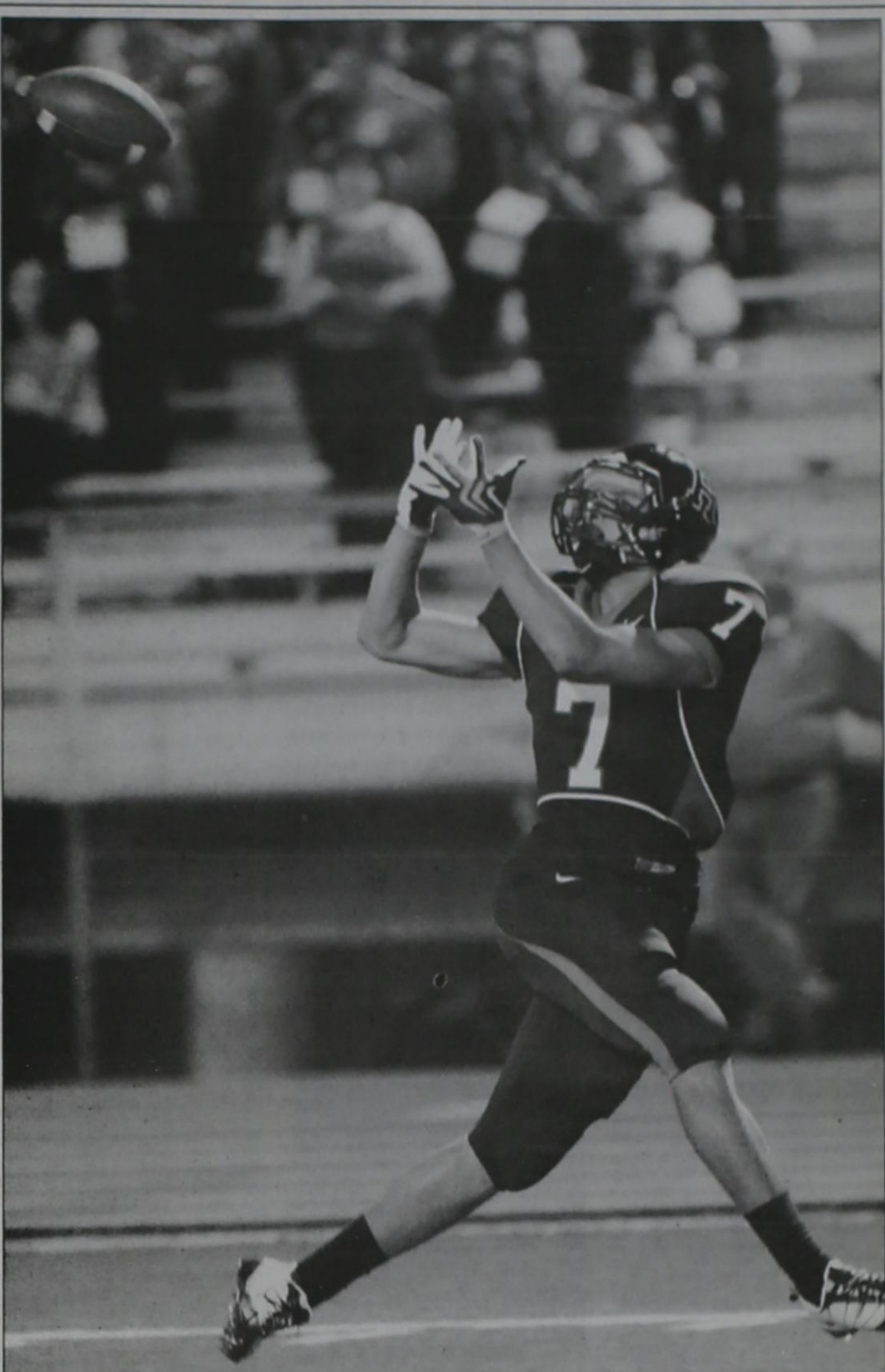

Carroll Patrick Stuart

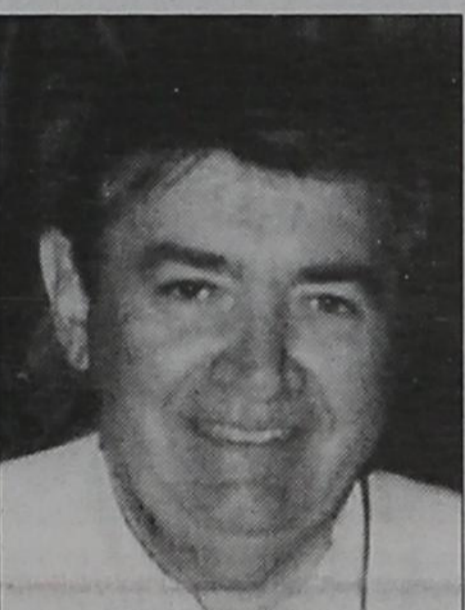
