The bus driver, whose name has not been released, was extracted from the bus with the assistance of emergency personnel and transported to Baylor Medical Center in Dallas. He was treated and released the same day.

"The students showed great maturity and concern for the well being of others as they helped each other off the bus," Trammell said. He credited the students for remaining calm as they evacuated and waited for help to arrive.

Sheri Fowler, RISD director of communications and marketing, said some students experienced headaches and other aches and pains later that day and the next day and visited the hospital to be check out. All were released after they were found to be injury free. "It's a normal thing to have bumps, bruises and headaches following any type of motor vehicle wreck," she said.

Fowler said the school district has utilized an outside entity to assist in its investigation of the accident. She said that is a normal procedure to avoid any personal insight or bias following an incident. The investigators are currently interviewing eyewitnesses and students on the bus, researching any paperwork involved and looking into all aspects of the accident. She said the investigation should continue through this week, with a report to come shortly after its conclusion. Fowler added that when the bus was pulled from the water, upon first glance, there were no immediately obvious mechanical problems, such as a blown tire or other non-accident related damage.

The bus was not equipped with an on-board camera that could have assisted in the investigation. Fowler said of the district's 118 school

buses, 75 are equipped with cameras. She said since this particular bus was being used as a sports shuttle and not considered a "high risk" run, there was no need to have a camera on board.

Sally Miller, who owns the home where the accident occurred, said she did not hear anything unusual that would have alerted her to the accident. She said they normally hear road noise and loud bangs from autos hitting the pits and divots on the narrow two-lane road. She said when she heard the sirens, she looked out to see the bus in her pond.

Miller said she grabbed towels to wrap around the wet students and assisted the police getting names and phone numbers to contact parents. She said most of the students had cell phones are were already calling their families. She said it was obvious some students were injured, with one girl looking like she had a broken finger, but none looked serious and all the students were conscious and calm.

"I was so amazed at how well they were doing," she said. There was some crying, but Miller said she heard some students saying they were going to go home, change clothes and then go back to school. "I'm surprised they didn't use this as an excuse to stay home," she said. "They all just seemed pretty calm."

In a press release from Rockwall ISD, school officials praised all involved in the rescue efforts for their care of the students. "As the safety of our students is our utmost concern, the district is grateful for the area neighbors that offered assistance as well as to the City of Heath's emergency personnel for their quick response time."

Divers from the Rockwall Fire Department assisted at the scene connecting the submerged bus to ropes to be pulled from the water.

The cause of the accident is still under investigation by the Heath DPS.





Bobcat believed to be killer of family dog

Rockwall Animal Services was called to a home Monday, Sept. 21 to investigate what was initially feared to be the torture and mutilation of a family dog. Animal Services Supervisor Chris Valentine said the dog has been examined and it appears that a bobcat killed the dog.

The incident occurred at 840 Nash Street, just north of SH 66. Valentine said the injuries to the dog are consistent with damage seen when bobcats attack other animals. The 8-year old beagle named Brandy, owned by Brian Alsobrook, had been gutted with the skin peeled away from the body. Valentine said bobcats "go for the gut" when they attack and peel the skin back.

Alsobrook said he last saw the dog alive at 7 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 20 when he filled her water dish for the night. He said he did not see Brandy Monday morning when he left for work, which was unusual, but he did not look for her.

Alsobrook said when the dog did not greet him at the gate on his return home from work Monday evening, which she did "like clockwork," he searched for the dog and found her in the backyard near the fence.

Rockwall police were summoned to the scene and have assisted Rockwall Animal Services in the investigation. Valentine said if any evidence were found to indicate a person actually killed the dog. criminal charges could be filed with Rockwall police and the criminal district attorney's office.

Valentine said bobcats are not rare in this area. She said with their hunting grounds getting smaller and smaller because of construction of all types, the bobcats are coming to town looking for food. "They are opportunists and they are here," she said.

The predators are finding ample food sources in town in trash left out over night and in pets and their food bowls being left out overnight. Valentine said the best advice is for residents to not leave pets outdoors at night or even in the daytime if it's possible.

"They mostly come out at night, but it's not unusual to see a bobcat trotting down the street with a cat in its mouth."


Rockwall-Heath High School Wind Ensemble receives national honor

On God's Word

by Timothy W. Burnett For archives of On God's Word visit The resurrected Jesus teaches his chosen 12 disciples...

Continuing with the first day of the week, sometime after Jesus walked with two of his disciples to Emmaus, we will cover the different times he showed himself to his 12 chosen disciples. The records are found in Mark 16:14-18; Luke 24:33 and John 20:19-29.

Luke's Gospel shows that the two men returned from Emmaus to Jerusalem, found eleven of the 12 chosen disciples along with others. Immediately the disciples told the two about how the Lord had risen and that he appeared to Simon Peter. Next the two men told what happened while on the way to Emmaus, and how they suddenly knew the Lord when he broke bread.

While they talked Jesus suddenly stood in the midst of them and told them to be peaceful because they were terrified and frightened thinking they had seen a spirit. It's possible that the two men from Emmaus were the first to see Jesus vanish out of sight. This time they saw him arrive in the room in the same way. In order to help them feel better he showed them his hands and feet and allowed them to touch him so they could see that he was not a spirit. Because they still didn't believe him, he ate a broiled fish and some honey.

Next he started teaching them out of the scriptures like he did for the two from Emmaus. He showed them how the scriptures spoke of his sufferings and how he would be raised from the dead on the third day. He also exhorted them to preach in his name, among all the nations, about repentence and remission of sins. He told them he would send the promise of his Father to them, and to wait in Jerusalem until they would be endued with power from on high.

The record of John tells a similar story in which Jesus popped in to see his disciples. It's difficult to determine if this is the same as, or similar to the above event in Luke. John's record shows that eleven of the 12 chosen disciples were present in the room. Jesus arrived and stood in their midst and told them to be peaceful. He also showed them his wounded hands and side.

John 20:24 reveals the missing disciple was Thomas. Later, the disciples explained to Thomas that Jesus had visited them, but he didn't believe their story. Just like the others, he would not believe until he touched Jesus' hands and side. Eight days later Jesus arrived again and let Thomas touch his hands and side. Alas, Thomas also believed and Jesus said, "because you have seen me, you believed. Blessed are they who have not seen and have believed (John 20:29). John tells us that Jesus did many more signs in his disciples' presence which are not written in his Gospel. The record in Mark contains added information about Jesus' time with his disciples. Verse 17 says, "And these signs shall follow them that believe. In my name shall they cast out devils. They shall speak with new tongues. They shall take up serpents. And if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them. They shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover."

Not only did Jesus teach them out of the Old Testament prophecies about him, but he prepared them for the future teaching about the power that all believers would be endued with from on high. This is fantastic information for all Christian believers even today!





Instead of President Obama addressing school students across the nation, he might have accomplished more by focusing his attention on the educational rot in schools in the nation's capital. The American Legislative Exchange Council recently came out with their 15th edition of "Report Card on American Education: A State-by-State Analysis." Academic achievement in no state is much to write home about but in Washington, D.C., by any measure, it approaches criminal fraud. Let's look at the numbers.

Only 14 percent of Washington's fourth-graders score at or above proficiency in the reading and math portions of the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) test. Their national rank of 51 makes them the nation's worst. Eighth-graders are even further behind with only 12 percent scoring at or above proficiency in reading and 8 percent in math and again the worst performance in the nation. One shouldn't be surprised by Washington student performance on college admissions tests. They have an average composite SAT score of 925 and ACT score of 19.1, compared to the national average respectively of 1017 and 21.1. In terms of national ranking, their SAT and ACT rankings are identical to their fourthand eighth-grade rankings -- dead last.

Washington's political and education establishment might excuse these outcomes by arguing that because most students are black, the schools are underfunded and overcrowded. Let's look at such a claim. During the 2006-07 academic year, expenditures per pupil averaged \$13,848 compared to a national average of \$9,389. That made Washington's per pupil expenditures the third highest in the nation coming in behind New Jersey (\$14,998) and New York (\$14,747). Washington's teacher-student ratio is 13.9 compared with the national average of 15.3 students per teacher, ranking 18th in the nation. What about teacher salaries? Washington's teachers are the highest paid in the nation, having an average annual salary of \$61,195 compared with the nation's average \$46,593. Despite the academic performance of Washington's students, they have a graduation rate of 61 percent compared to the national average of 70 percent. That suggests the issuance of fraudulent high school diplomas.

Currently, Washington, D.C. has an Opportunity Scholarship Program, which allows qualified low-income families to claim up to \$7,500 per student toward a private education of their choice.

Obama's Democratic Congress, acting on the behalf of the education establishment, has killed the program and there's the possibility that the 1,700 students currently enrolled will have to return to D.C. public schools.

The staunchest opponents of school choice are hypocrites. They want, demand and can afford school choice for themselves but for others not so affluent school choice it is a different matter. President and Mrs. Barack Obama enrolled their two daughters in Washington's most prestigious Sidwell Friends School, forking over \$28,000 a year for each girl. Whilst senator from Illinois, the Obama's enrolled their girls in the University of Chicago's Laboratory School, a private school in Chicago charging almost \$20,000 for each girl. A Heritage Foundation survey found that 37 percent of the members of the House of Representatives and 45 percent of senators in the 110th Congress sent their children to private schools. Public school teachers enroll their own children in nonpublic schools to a much greater extent than the general public, in some cases four and five times greater. In Cincinnati, about 41 percent of public school teachers send their children to nonpublic schools. In Chicago it is 38 percent, Los Angeles 24 percent, New York 32 percent, and Philadelphia 44 percent. The behavior of public school teachers is quite suggestive. It's like my offering to take you to a restaurant and you find out that neither the chef nor the waiters eat there. That suggests they have some inside information from which you might benefit.

For people in power to tolerate the Washington, D.C. school system is despicable. For a black president to do so might qualify as betrayal.



As a result, Rockwall missed the playoffs after reaching the postseason two consecutive years.

This will be the second consecutive game when the Jackets have been a Homecoming opponent. That sometimes is merely how the game and the Homecoming date land on the calendar. At other times, it means that the home team has scheduled a team it feels it can beat, to show a better side to returning alumni.

When informed that his team would be playing in Royse City's Homecoming game, seemed more amused than annoyed.

Regardless, Rockwall thus far has surprised outside observers by defeating 5A opponents Midland and Rowlett. Any bandwagon support lagged on Sept. 11, when the Yellowjackets lost 38-10 at Allen. But remember, that was Allen, the defending 5A Division II state champion.



The Angel League plays at 6:30 p.m. each Monday night during the season at Tuttle Field in Rockwall.







