Rockwall High Robotics Team headed to world contest

The all Metal Jackets, Rockwall High School's Robotics Team FRC 2468 and its alliance to victory at the FIRST Robotics Competition World Championship in St. Louis, Missouri.

"This is a big deal for us," said Bruce Charbonneau, the team's head teacher. "This is the first time in team history that we have been so dominate at a regional."

The robot seeded first in the qualification rounds and went on to draft an alliance, which included FRC 2468, Team Appreciate, from Austin and FRC 2415, the WiredCats, from Atlanta, Georgia. This alliance finished top in each elimination round and went undefeated in finals.

"I am so happy with where we are right now; the students are communicating more effectively and proposing great design ideas," said Douglas Gault, another engineering mentor and original student. "We have been working for years on raising the competitive level of the team. Those efforts are finally starting to pay off. We are performing in the top 1 percent of teams that are participating this year."

Every year on the first Saturday in January, FIRST hosts a kickoff day where teams across the globe are introduced to a new competitive challenge. The teams then have six weeks to build a 120-pound robot that can perform the tasks outlined by the challenge. At the end of the build season teams compete in tournaments to try and win their way into the FIRST World Championship. There, the best teams compete for the honor of being world champions.

The team previously competed at the Dallas regional, where it was eliminated in the semi-finals and won the Woodie Flowers Finalist Award for its lead mentor, Keith Buchanan. Named after Dr. Woodie Flowers, the MIT professor who co-founded FIRST, the award recognizes mentors who lead, inspire and empower students using communication skills. Buchanan, employed by team sponsor the PTR Group, has been a mentor for the team since it started in 2004.

The team later competed at the Oklahoma City regional, where they earned finalist ranking after losing in three matches during a close final. The team also won its second Excellence in Engineering Award at the OKC regional.

Jake and Elwood Blues, the name of the team's split robot, is constructed largely from VexPro parts provided by Innovation First International, one of the team's sponsors.

"We built two robots this year," said Michael Bricker, the team's student president. "One robot to stack the totes, and another to score them. This effectively doubles the time in the match for us, since we can have one robot putting together a scoring stack while the other is placing a stack."

The robots also have custom sheet-metal work provided by Special Products & Manufacturing, a local fabrication company.

"Our sponsors are central to our success," said Gault. "Even though the cost of building a competitive FRC robot is slowly falling, we always find ourselves scraping by after building a robot that can withstand the rigors of multiple regionals. Without support from companies like Servengy, Park Place, Exxon Mobil and our incredible staff at Rockwall High School, I have no clue how we could do half of what we do."

The team will compete at the world event April 23-25. A link to the live streams of these events can be found on the team's Facebook page at facebook.com/1296fullmetaljackets.

FIRST is a global nonprofit organization that provides education and hands-on engineering time to students through robotics competitions with a focus on "cooperation" and gracious professionalism. FIRST competitions are broken up by grade level, starting with Jr. FLL for young elementary students, going up through FLL, FTC and ending with FRC, which is aimed directly at high school students.

Local observations mark National Library Week

A Rockwall County Commissioners Court proclamation and a check for more than a quarter million dollars marked the county's observation of National Library Week.

At the April 14 regular meeting, Judge David Sweet and the Commissioners Court issued a proclamation designating April 12-18 as National Library Week. The proclamation was accepted by volunteer representatives Pat Calhoun and Kathleen Broze, recipients of the 2014 Hays and Hartman Awards given to outstanding volunteers.

Sweet called the Rockwall County Library an asset to the county and commended librarian Marcine McCulley for her leadership. He said that Friends of the Rockwall County Library is not just an organization, but friends of the library and friends of Rockwall County.

Debbie Daniels, president of Friends, presented the court a check facsimile for \$236,910.30, representing the value of 10,506 hours of volunteer services performed at the library during fiscal year 2014. Volunteers shelve books, maintain the Book Alcove and perform light clerical duties that help keep the library running smoothly. Student volunteers work in the children's area and assist during the Summer Reading Program.

Daniels told the court that 65 tutors work with the library's Adult Literacy Program, Reading for Adults. These volunteers teach 494 adults who are in the English as a Second Language (ESL) program, up from a total of 285 last year. They also work with 206 students who are studying for the GED test, tutor people who have never learned to read and conduct citizenship classes for 39 students. During this past fiscal year 1,172 classes were conducted. Six students learned to read and write, 31 adults have earned GED certificates, three were accepted to college, 99 advanced a class level and seven became citizens, according to information reported at the meeting.

FM 551 interchange begins with April 10 groundbreaking

City and county officials, representatives of the Texas Department of Transportation and local residents gathered April 10 to mark the beginning of construction on the FM 551 interchange at I-30.

The project is one of four interchange projects along I-30: John King, M 39, Erby Campbell and FM 551.

The FM 551 interchange was part of both Rockwall County bond programs and is a \$31 million project, according to a Rockwall County press release.

"In less than seven years, Rockwall County, in partnership with TxDOT, the North Central Texas Council of Governments and our cities, has managed to begin construction on these vital interchanges totaling more than \$100 million for these four projects," Rockwall County Commissioner David Magness said in the release. "That is an impressive feat for the smallest county in the State of Texas. This was made possible because of the common vision that was created using the Rockwall County Transportation Consortium."

Kevin Selman, the TxDOT Dallas District engineer, applauded the collaborative efforts of the county and local governments with TxDOT. Over the years, TxDOT's partnership with Rockwall County and

local communities has benefited motorists from throughout the region," he said. "The department values relationships such as this in getting projects done that improve safety and enhance the quality of life for area residents."

When completed, the interchange will allow for an at-grade, four-way intersection with the FM 551 bridge crossing above, according to the release. The design allows for commercial development on the four corners.

"The unity of purpose shown by the consortium and the trust given to us by the voters of this county over the span of two bond programs has enabled Rockwall County to go from being on the sidelines watching other projects in other areas being built to a leadership role in the region," Rockwall County Judge David Sweet said.

"By taking control of our own destiny with the passage of the 2004 and 2008 bond packages, Rockwall County is putting transportation infrastructure on the ground that not only enhances mobility, but improves the quality of life for our citizens," Magness said.

The project is estimated to be completed by August 2016 and will include aesthetic enhancements with City of Fate logos on the bridge columns and the flying F on the bent caps. These costs were shared by both TxDOT and the City of Fate, according to the release.

Liam Wright's DI team found for global contest

Liam Wright, 9-year-old grandson of Roysie City resident Lori Wright, is on a team that won first place in the Elementary Division of the California Destination Imagination State Tournament in Riverside, California, on March 28.

Students Ryan Arlett, Chris Liebe, Sabastion Lieb, Chris Yo Liang and Wright formed the team Time Out and have been building and practicing since September.

Destination Imagination, or DI, is an international program that seeks to build participants' creativity, problem-solving abilities, and teamwork. The teams compete in two types of challenges.

Instant Challenges are surprise tasks that require the teams to solve a problem or create a performance lasting several minutes with only minutes to plan and execute it.

Team Challenges are much more complex and involve the teams creating a story and performances to a particular theme, along with building the props and costumes. The themes are chosen by the Central Texas Region and focus on one or more of the following areas: Technical/Mechanical Design, Scientific, Structural/Architectural Design, Health/Literary/Fine Arts Elements, Improvisational Techniques, and Service Learning.

Time Out competed in the Creative Feature Category with the story of a group of time traveling humans -- octopus hybrids -- that come to earth to save their ancestors from the sinking of the Titanic, the loss of the Space Shuttle Challenger and the tragedy of Sept. 11, 2001. The team created props and complex stories over many months, meeting after school and on weekends.

Having won the regional competitions in February and the state-level contest in March, the team now will compete at the Destination Imagination Global Finals in Knoxville, Tennessee, on May 20-23.

Impact of government on people ... Part 2

Statutory violations = unlawful conduct

In the united States of America and Texas, the relationship between government and the people is highly volatile with vulnerability on both sides.

This relationship is a critical and defining part of society and the people within.

By "people within," we mean all people, including the elected and appointed government people.

In most nations around the world, the government people are largely the controllers of other people. The control mechanisms rely heavily upon access and use of weapons that are more powerful than what is available to the controlled people, and influential control of the judicial and economic systems.

After the American revolutionary war, the people established a uniquely different political system based on the principle that the free people are the controllers of the government people.

They set up a unique judicial system to serve as a check and balance in this new political system. In essence, after independence was won, the war for freedom continued to rage on from within the judicial system.

The founders of this new republic were well aware of the destructive nature of government. They understood the spiritual truth that spiritually corrupt and evil people would seek to control the people and destroy the new political system. They understood that there is nothing new under the sun, and that people throughout the ages have enslaved and subordinated

the masses of other people through military might and judicial/economic advantage.

The founders of this country were also well aware of the destructive political results from close relationships between governments and private businesses, as well as controlling religious systems.

The Republic of Texas was also established upon similar political and spiritual principles. To this date, Texas is officially recognized as a "common law" state, and has quietly retained its status as a Republic.

An important aspect of this new political system involves the people's right to be at liberty. Thomas Jefferson rightly described three basic categories that encompass the pursuit of happiness; life, liberty, and property. Life and liberty cover most areas of people's overall lives. Property covers the right of the people to obtain and control the use of property.

It's important to understand that the new republic of the united States of America, and of Texas were established with a governmental system designed to protect the people's right to life, liberty, and property, which are unto the pursuit of happiness.

In order to secure this system, it was necessary to elect representatives who would institute instructions to control the government and prevent it from infringing and impairing the right of the people to life, liberty, and property. This system of instructions include foundational spiritual principles of free-will, and liberty in Christ Jesus; then there's the man-

made principles under common law of the land, the constitution, public laws, and annotated codes (or statutes).

The basic spiritual principles sit at the top, and serve as the underlying foundation for the others. The common law was passed down from English and Roman common law. The Great Magna Carta of King John set a new precedence that incorporated basic common law principles pressed upon the King under threat of punishment by the Barons.

The constitution was written to annotate certain basic instructions and restraints on the governments. The statutes exist to regulate and define punishments upon government people who impair and infringe the right of the people in violation of the constitution and statutes. Texas Penal Code Chapter 39 includes Abuse of Official Capacity and Official Oppression.

The whole political system rests on the underlying necessity for elected and appointed government people to exercise restraint from impairing and infringing the right of the people to life, liberty, and property.

This article briefly summarizes why it is important to not only select representatives who will not vote to impair and infringe the right of the people to life, liberty, and property; but who will appoint people to serve in the same manner.

When the elected and appointed government people violate the constitution and controlling statutes while impairing the right of the people, they have in essence engaged in unlawful conduct.

Royse City baseball, softball teams near playoffs

Royse City continued to play excellent baseball last week, stretching its District 12-5A winning streak to four games.

Since a 17-3 loss at district leader Rockwall-Heath, ranked first in the state, RC has outscored its district opponents 27-2.

After consecutive shutouts, the Bulldogs allowed single runs in road victories at North Forney 3-1 on Wednesday, April 15, and at South Garland 11-1 on Friday.

Carlos Carrillo pitched a no-hitter to defeat North Forney. Royse City's nine hits included a double by Aaron East. At South Garland, Dillon Carter scattered six hits and received support from an errorless defense.

The Dawgs (11-5 overall, 7-3) lost a non-district game 3-1 to Crandall on Saturday.

They faced a challenge at home Tuesday from Mesquite Poteet and are scheduled to travel to Terrell for a 7:30 p.m. game on Friday.

Entering Tuesday's game, RC was third in the district, 3 1/2 games behind Rockwall-Heath. Those teams are scheduled to meet at 7:30 Tuesday at Royse City.

SOFTBALL: The Lady Bulldogs' fate could have been decided Tuesday, when they were scheduled to host Rockwall-Heath.

With two District 12-5A games remaining, the two teams were tied for third place, a game behind second-place Mesquite Poteet and only a game ahead of Forney in fifth place.

Tuesday's winner was almost guaranteed a playoff berth, but the loser faced the possibility of dropping out of the playoffs.

Two factors weigh in RC's favor. The Lady Dawgs (14-9, 8-4) have lost three games by one run or in extra innings, including a 6-5 decision at R-H. Forney could have to defeat the district's top two teams, North Forney and Poteet, to gain a playoff spot.

Also, Royse City has been playing well. On April 14, the Lady Bulldogs lost at home to Poteet, but the Lady Pirates needed Mya Stevenson's three-run home run in the eighth inning to win. RC's seven hits included homers by Mattie Atkins, Karis Hessert, Maddie Sisk and Lexi Ruff.

TRACK AND FIELD: Barrett Anderson was Royse City's only event winner last week when they hosted the District 12-5A championships. Anderson placed first in the 400-meter dash in 49.74 seconds. The Bulldogs' 4X400-meter relay team, second in 3 minutes, 27.05 seconds, was the only other boys' qualifier for Thursday's Area 11-12-5A Championships at Dallas' Jesse Owens Complex. The RC boys placed sixth with 43 points.

O'Kaira Otis qualified for the Area meet in three individual events as the Lady Bulldogs finished fifth with 54 points. She was second in both the high jump (5 feet) and 300-meter hurdles (46.81), and fourth in the 100 hurdles (16.06). Sheridan Trette qualified in fourth place in the 200-meter dash (26.23). The girls' 4X200 relay team also qualified with a second-place finish (1:46.62).

Rockwall trailed Trophy Club Byron Nelson through much of the game at the Campbell Complex, but rallied for an 11-5 victory. Peon Mills hit a grand slam and a double to back winning pitcher Vandergriff. Shelbi Court also homered for RHS.

The Lady Jackets had defeated Sachse 14-4 on Tuesday, April 14, and 13-1 on Friday to clinch the first District 11-6A championship. With two regular-season games remaining, RHS is 19-0-1 overall and 10-0 in the district. They were scheduled to host Tyler Lee for Tuesday's game at Tillery Field on Friday.

Rockwall still is ranked No. 1 in 6A by the Texas Girls Coaches Association, and No. 8 in maxpreps.com's national Xcellent 25. Kaitlyn Sauter hit two home runs and drove in five runs against Sachse. She went 7 for 9 and drove in 10 runs in last week's three games. Emily Vandergriff was the winning pitcher.

Court, Alyssa Henry, Hayley Baker and Dani Greenlee each hit a home run against the Lady Mustangs. Henry went 4 for 4 and drove in two runs. Greenlee had three runs batted in.

Henry and Bailey Wallace each went 4 for 5 when the Lady Jackets defeated the Mustangs. Sauter was 3 for 4 with two doubles and two runs.

Rockwall-Heath's baseball team can clinch the District 12-5A championship on Friday, after winning three games in eight days.

The Hawks edged Terrell 3-2 on Tuesday, April 14, scored a 10-1 win at North Forney three days later and outthit West Mesquite for a 4-0 win at Tillery Field on Tuesday.

After Tuesday's game, RHHS (19-3 overall, 11-0 in the district) had a 2 1/2 game lead over Forney. A victory at home on Friday over the Yellowjackets would clinch the title with two games remaining.

Rockwall-Heath, ranked No. 1 in 5A by the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association, has clinched a playoff berth and can finish no worse than third in the district.

The home game against Terrell was tied 2-2 until the bottom of the sixth inning, when Clayton Rasbeary's single drove in Matt Wood with a two-run home run.

Winning pitcher Tyler Pinkston made the lead hold up. He allowed only one earned run, four hits and no walks while striking out seven in a complete game.

Rasbeary also drove in RHHS' second run with a fourth-inning double. He also earned another double for the Hawks.

A North Forney, Texas A&M signee Tyler Ivey continued his home run streak. He allowed just three hits to improve his record to 7-0 with 100 earned run average, 80 strikeouts and 10 walks. Pinkston hit his 100th career home run.

RHS outthit West Mesquite 12-8 to keep their district record unbeaten.

Gymnastics: Senior Morgan Hines placed third all-around to lead the balanced Lady Hawks to their second consecutive Region championship. Their score of 224.20 edged runner-up Rockwall's 233.10.

RHS advanced to the State Championships May 1 and 2 at Saginaw High School in Texas.

At the Regional meet at Rockwall, Hines totaled 75.40 - third place at 3.7 on the uneven bars, fourth with 19.30 in the floor exercise, fifth at 19.00 in the vault and eighth with 18.35 on the balance beam.

Junior Darion Mellorn was ninth all-around at 72.75. She placed eighth in both the vault (18.75) and floor (18.70).

Other Lady Hawks placing in events were junior Madeline Lundell, eighth on the beam (18.80), sixth on the floor (19.00) and ninth in the vault (18.80); senior Ali Johnson, fourth in the vault (19.20); junior Rebekah Hanes, sixth on the beam (18.50) and seventh on the bars (17.70); and junior Haneen Abusaad, ninth on the beam (18.30).

Rockwall-Heath boys placed second in the region behind Terrell.

Softball: The Lady Hawks (11-8, 8-4) won twice to move into a third place with two regular-season games remaining.

They faced a showdown Tuesday at Royce City. The Lady Bulldogs outthit RHHS in the standings. The winner of that game was expected to finish the season Friday in third place or higher. The loser faced the possibility of dropping to fifth place and missing the playoffs.

Rockwall-Heath's Cami Duffey pitched a two-hitter with seven strikeouts on April 14 against Mesquite Poteet. Katie Webster, who was named MVP; Macy Wilson, and Ally Brandvold each hit a triple.

Duffey pitched a four-hit shutout, and the Lady Hawks played errorless baseball on Friday. In the 4-0 win, RHHS' six hits included a double by Emily Clark.

Track and Field: Maia Zeno won the discus at 107 feet, 7 inches, and shot put at 35-2 to help RHHS place second with 135 points, barely behind champion Forney's 141, in the District 12-5A championships at Royce City.

Other Rockwall-Heath district champions were Lawrence Johnson in the boys' triple jump (46-3) and long jump (21-9 3/4), Will Herrscher in the boys' pole vault (14-0) and the girls' 4X100-meter (48.15) and 4X400-meter relays (4 minutes, 1.86 seconds).

The Hawks had a chance to win the championship entering the final of the 4X400 relay, but finished third in that event and in the meet with 111 points.

HCA (8-0 in TAPPS District 2-3A) needed just three innings in each game to sweep Irving The Highlands School 15-0 and 22-4 on the outdoor field at Rockwall Indoor Sports Expo.

The Lady Eagles had spotted Trinity Christian Academy-Cedar Hill a four-run lead in the first inning on Friday, but a 16-run fourth inning ended the game.

Heritage Christian started fast against The Highlands with 11 runs in the first inning of the doubleheader. Katy McEvoy singled home a first-inning run and doubled for two more in a four-run second inning.

Winning pitcher Conally Webb struck out seven and walked only one.

In the second game, Webb again struck out seven, but walked two and gave up four hits and four runs.

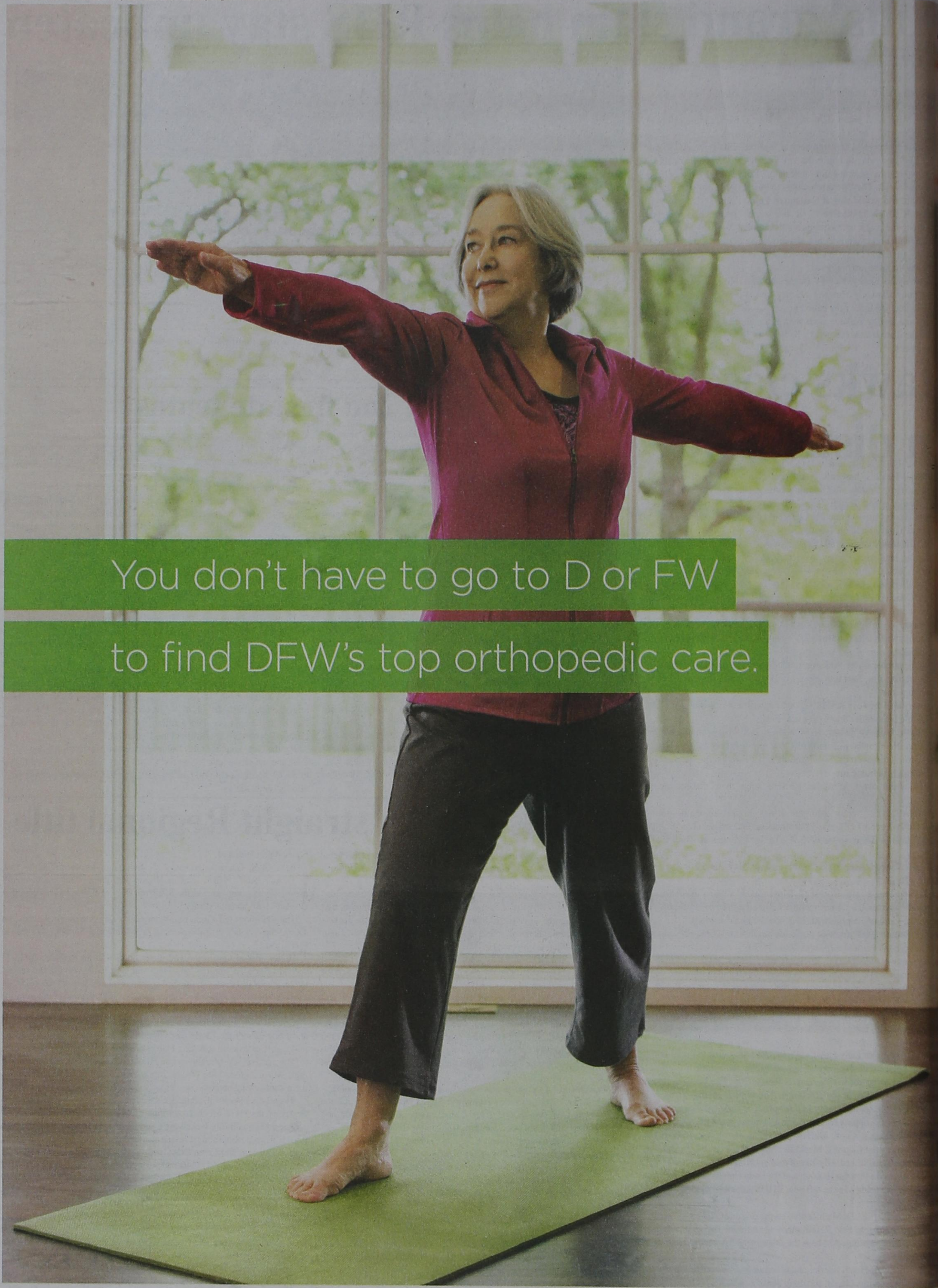
