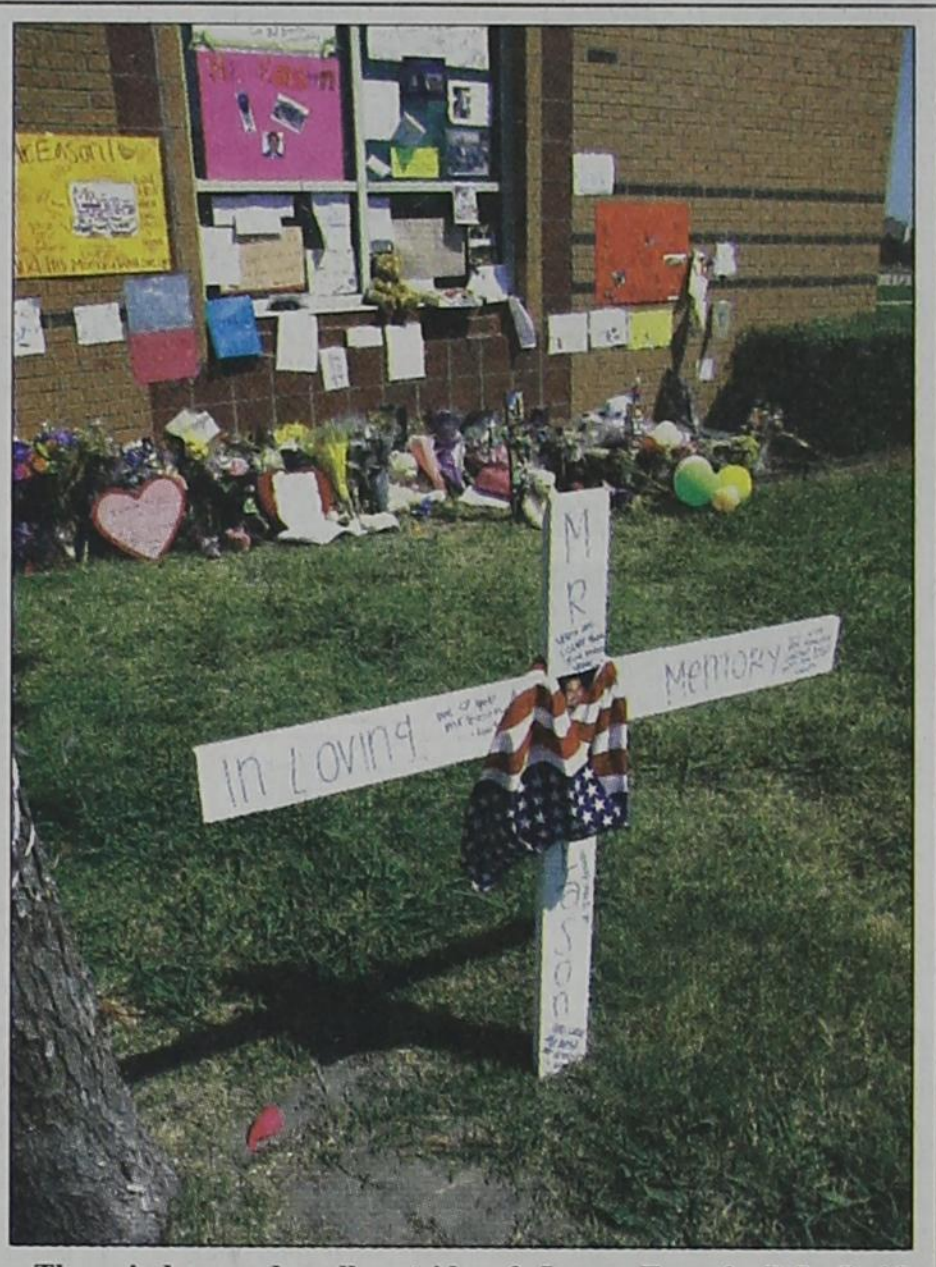

Rockwall mother prepares for deployment of 3 sons

Lisa Eason is awaiting the deployment of three of her four sons before the year's end. Her job nearby, Lisa is vivacious and upbeat. Originally from the United States, she and her family moved to Rockwall 11 years ago for her mother who had suffered a stroke. "I both got great peace from being with my mom 24/7," she said. After her mother had her stroke, she never spoke again and lost a big part of her life. It was one of the greatest challenges I've ever faced — having to be at her mom's bedside when she drew her last breath. Lisa said she got her faith through that experience, and her strong belief in God is supporting her now as she anticipates sending her children off to the military.

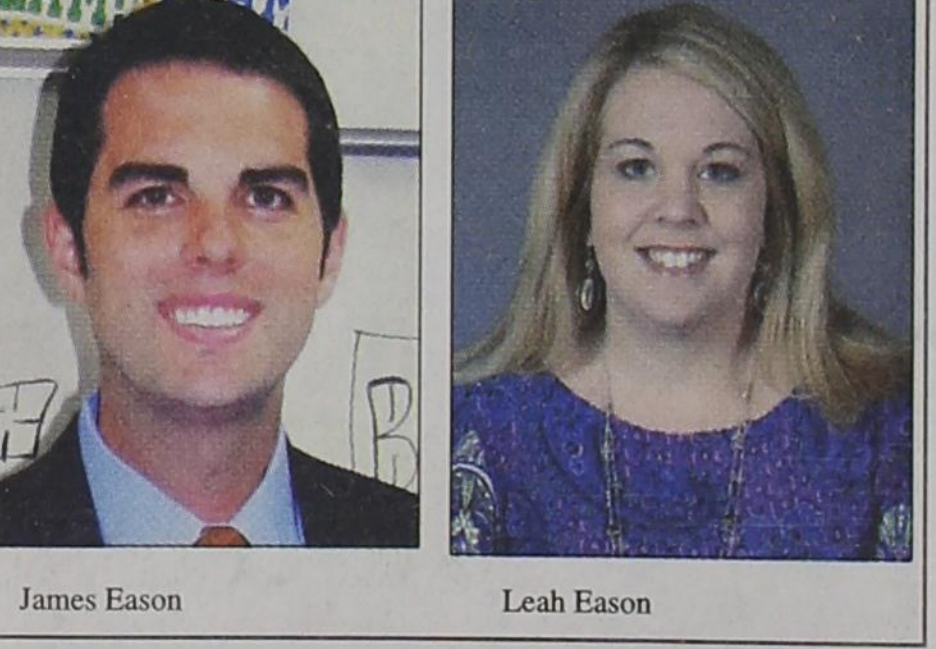
"They are proud of themselves and what they are doing," she said. All three enjoyed boot camp, and each chose a different branch of the Army. Two of her sons are identical twins, and this will be the first time they've been apart. "My son who enlisted in the Infantry is on cloud nine. He has wanted to be in the military since he was a little kid," Lisa said. Her second child, who had always been afraid of heights, surprised her by deciding to join the Airborne Division. "He already had a scary incident. He called me and said, 'Guess what! I almost died!'" Lisa said with a laugh. His chute had become entangled with another soldier's, but fortunately the situation was resolved before they reached the ground. Her third son is involved in combat engineering and will work on building bridges and clearing mines. Her eldest son, who has not chosen to enlist, reserves the right to change his mind, telling his mother, "If one of them gets hurt, I'm in. I'm going after them," she said. When people hear that she has three sons who are deploying soon, she gets mixed reactions. Most talk to her about being afraid for her sons' safety. "I can't live in that fear," Lisa said with conviction. "My middle son and I talk about that a lot. When my boys are overseas, I will put on the armor of God, and my faith will bring them back." She admits to having a weak moment when she learned that all three were going to be deployed at almost the same time. "I had to get a hold of myself," she said. "My boys lean on me. They know that their mom is praying for them, and that's a shield in itself." Lisa said she knows there will be times when she won't be able to communicate with her sons while they're overseas, but she looks forward to sharing the good news of the safe return of her boys.

Two communities impacted by tragic loss of Rockwall family

Mesquite and Rockwall residents are mourning together over the tragic loss of two educators and their infant son, all killed in an automobile accident near Texarkana Saturday night. Their 3-year-old son survived the crash involving an 18-wheeler. The adult victims both were employed by the Mesquite Independent School District and lived in Rockwall: Leah Compton Eason, an assistant principal at Florence Black Elementary, and her husband, James Eason, a fifth grade teacher at B.J. Smith Elementary, also in Mesquite. The family was traveling to East Texas to visit family when their 2009 Hyundai rear-ended a freightliner tractor-trailer that was pulled over on eastbound I-30. Leah Eason, 30, and their 1-year-old son, Luke, were pronounced dead at the scene, while James Eason, 30, died at Titus Regional Medical Center in Mount Pleasant. The couple's older son, Jace, was transported to Children's Medical Center where he is listed in good condition. The Mesquite ISD utilized its resources on Facebook to spread the word of the loss, characterized as a "a very sad day for the MISD family." Word spread rapidly by text message among James Eason's many former students, all of whom were shocked by such a sudden and horrifying loss. The window to his classroom was soon plastered with notes, drawings and posters, and candles, flowers and stuffed animals comprised a growing memorial along the outside of B.J. Smith Elementary, which is now closed for the summer. Dozens of children stopped to grieve and pay their respects, and many attended a candlelight vigil there on Monday. Florence Elementary School family and friends conducted a candlelight vigil at St. Stephen United Methodist Church on Tuesday night. Visitation for the Easons will be from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday at Lakepointe Church, Room A122, in Rockwall. A memorial service is set for 1 p.m. Friday at Lakepointe, followed by a private burial. A bank account has been established for Jace Eason, the family's lone survivor, at First State Bank in Mesquite, P.O. Box 850438.

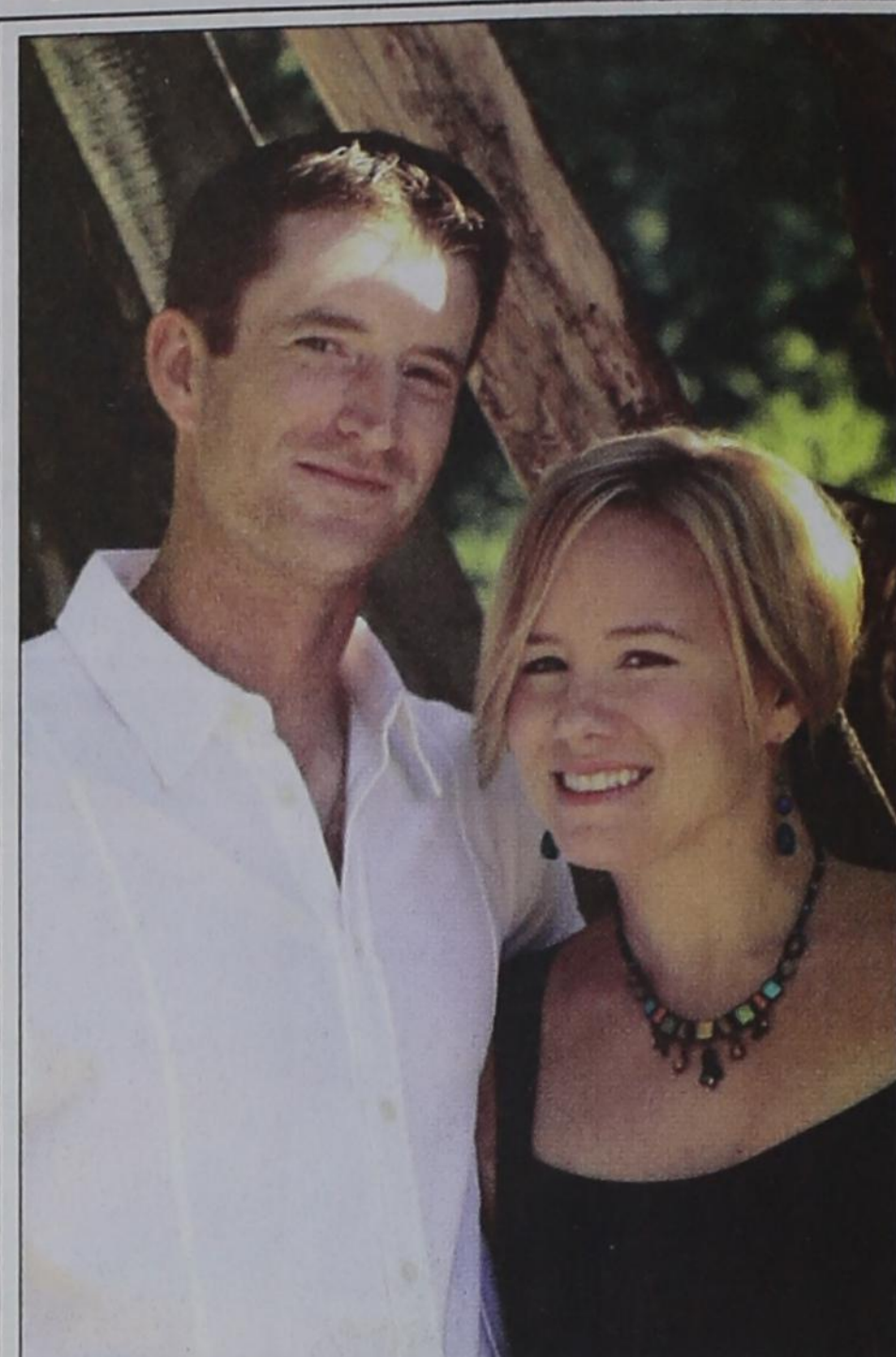

Rockwall council approves new Oncor

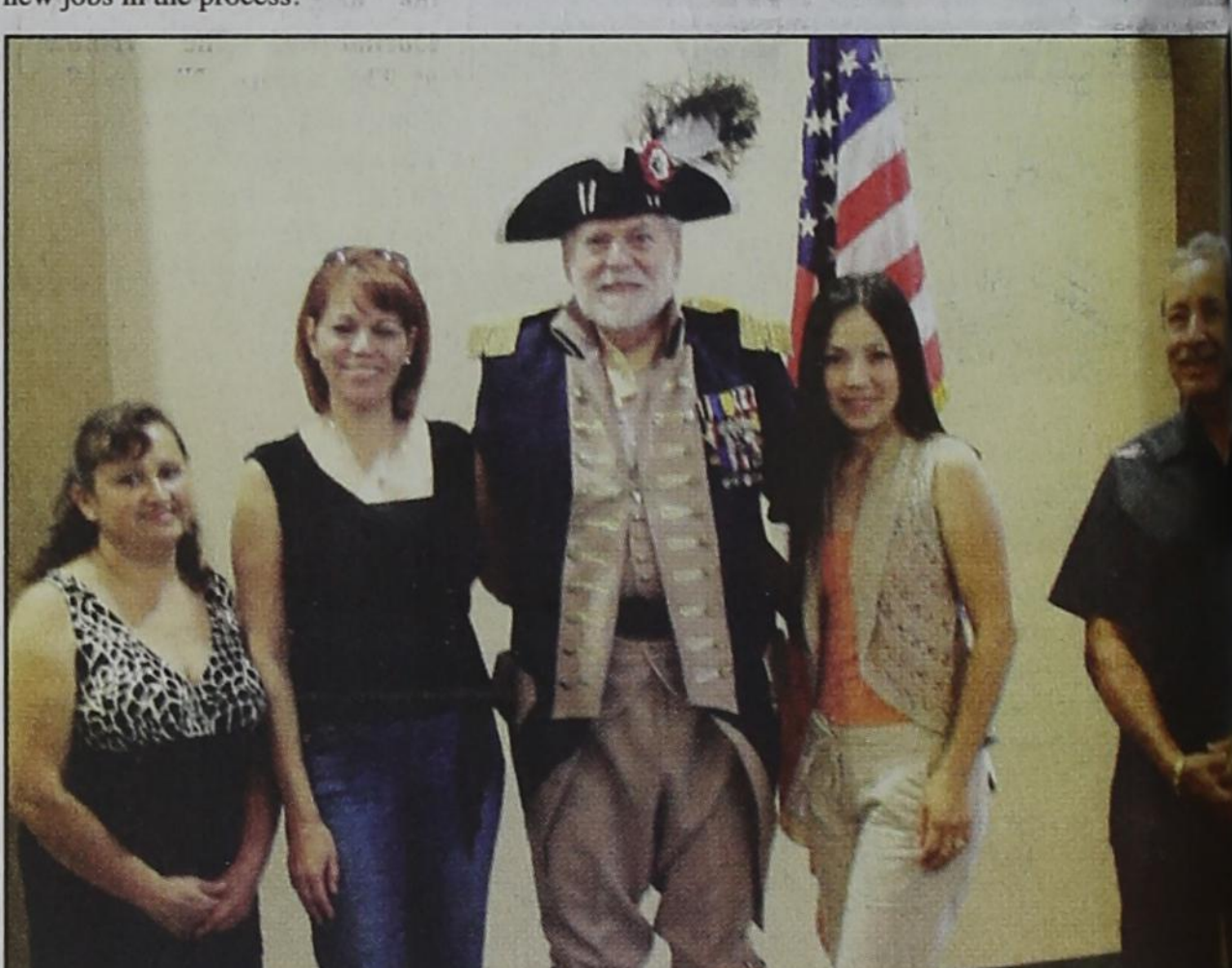
City of Rockwall council members recently agreed to adopt a negotiated increase in electricity rates from the Steering Committee of Cities Served by Oncor, a group comprised of approximately 160 cities. Pending final approval, the negotiated rate hike will cost the average residential customer \$2.35 a month, according to a news release from the city. It will be implemented in two phases – on July 1 and on July 15. Oncor had proposed a \$5 monthly increase. The committee worked with consultants and lawyers to resolve Oncor's requested \$353 million rate increase, reducing it by 60 percent to \$136.7 million.

Hall votes to pass bill to tie EPA hands on oil drilling

Last week Rep. Ralph Hall voted with a House majority to pass H.R. 2011, the Jobs and Energy Production Act of 2011, which would eliminate needless permitting delays that have stalled important energy production off the coast of Alaska. The bill passed, 253-166. "This bill, part of the American Energy Initiative, tears down permit-approval barriers created by the Protection Agency (EPA) and its Environmental Appeals Board," said Hall. "By simplifying and expediting the procedure for obtaining permits needed for exploration drilling, we can open access to untapped resources and create new jobs in the process."

Taylor, is proud of her congrega- tion's efforts.

"When Jean Jones, who is on staff with The Stewpot, showed me a mat one morning at The Bridge, I got excited," Taylor said. "But the most exciting thing is the love that our congregation has shown in their enthusiasm for this project, and for the people who will one day sleep on these mats. They are truly living into our church's motto: Feel the love. Be the love."

Enthusiasm for the project has been contagious, spreading from community-to-community and within different denominations. First Methodist Church of Heath, whose members serve alongside the Rockwall-based congregation at The Bridge, has begun their own

mat-making endeavor.

The Rev. Dr. Bruce Buchanan and a representative of The Bridge will visit First Presbyterian in August, when Buchanan will teach a class on ministry to the homeless during Sunday school. Both will be involved in a blessing of the mats during the worship service that morning.

Taylor laughs when she thinks about the piles of plastic that have filled the church being transformed into a symbol of love.

"I hope that the people who read this will use it as a spark to transform their own plastic bags into sleeping mats," she said.

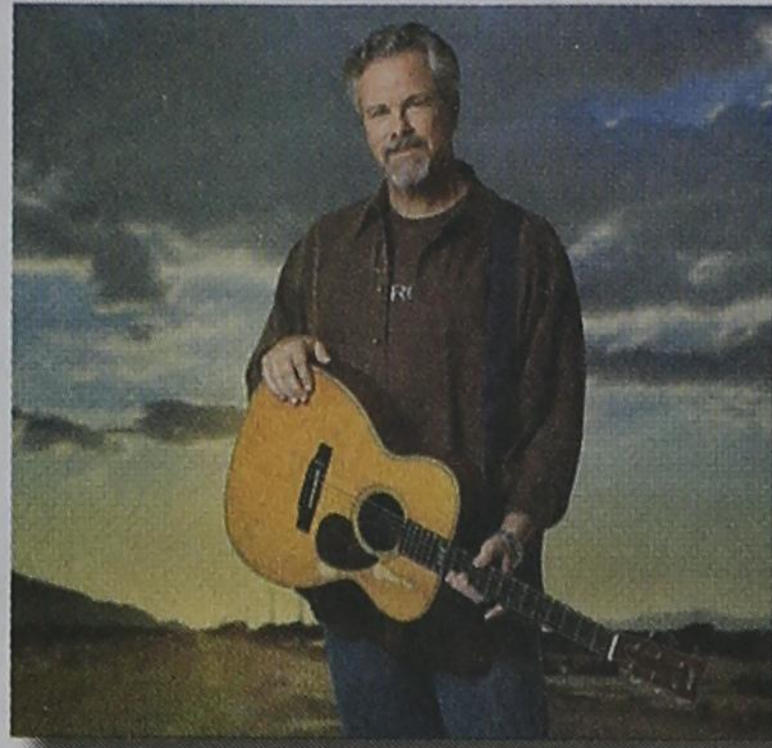
With a smile, she said the church has plenty of excess bags if people need some to get them started.

On God's Word

Speaking in tongues & prophecy...1Cor. chapter 14 Part 3

"Brethren, be not children in understanding; howbeit in malice be children, but in understanding be men. In the law it is written, 'With the men of other tongues and other lips will I speak unto this people. And yet for all that will they not hear me, says the Lord'" (1Corinthians 14:20-21). God wants us to handle and act on His word as grown men and women, rather than as children. Children become easily envious and angered. They are

quick to disobey commands from parents or easily tricked into doing so later.

Speaking in tongues was prophesied of during the Old Testament times (see Isaiah 28:11). The people who speak in tongues will hear the words coming from the mouth, but will not understand what is spoken. We saw this in 1Corinthians 14:2, "...for no man understands, howbeit in the spirit he speaks mysteries."

"Wherefore tongues are for a sign, not to them that believe, but to them that believe not. But prophesying serves not for them that believe not, but for them that believe" (1Corinthians 14:22). I do not completely understand what the above quote means. So I'll move on.

"If therefore the whole church comes together into one place and all speak with tongues, and there comes in those that are unlearned or unbelievers, will they not say that you are mad? But if all prophesy, and there comes in

one that believes not, or one unlearned, he is convinced of all. And thus the secrets of his heart are made man on his face he will worship God, and report that God" (1Corinthians 14:24-25). Once again, common sense a church gathering, if everyone is speaking in tongues an unbeliever will think they are nuts and not benefit time.

Please notice that the end result of prophecy is not others in their place. Instead, it is meant to help the new believers to see that God truly exists to the end that they ping Him in prayer (among other purposes). God is the hearts of all, and He is able to utilize a believer to spiritual growth. This does not mean that all prophecy the hearts of others. The verse is meant to emphasize the speaking in tongues and prophecy during church gatherings. "How is it then brethren? When you come together has a psalm, has a doctrine, has a tongue [language whigues], has a revelation, has an interpretation. Let all be edified (1Corinthians 14:26). When we prophesy it can be as revelation or giving the interpretation of tongues. Nana Pat's Kite

Not sure where this recipe came from, but honestly it delicious desserts, guaranteed to bring smiles to your family.

Delicious Dessert!!

Crust:

2 cups of flour
2 sticks of soft margarine
2 Tablespoons sugar (optional)
Mix together to a smooth ball. Press by hand into a 9" Shape to look smooth. Bake about 15 minutes at 350 degrees because it can burn easily! Cool completely.

First Layer:

8 oz. soft cream cheese
1 cup sifted powdered sugar
1/2 of 9 oz. Cool Whip (save the other half for second layer)
Cream together and mix with mixer until smooth. Spread crust. Chill until second layer is ready.

Second Layer:

1 large and 1 small instant vanilla pudding (be sure it is 5 cups of milk)
1/2 of 9 oz. Cool Whip
1/2 cup of toasted coconuts
1/2 cup chopped pecans
Mix pudding and milk in a mixer for about one minute, then mix for another one or two minutes. Spread onto the top with 1/2 cup of toasted coconut and the chopped pecans. Refrigerate. It's wise to make this dessert the day before if you can. Enjoy, and accept the praise from dessert lovers.



Comparing 2011 to 1776: government abuses very similar

Municipal courts operate as collection enforcers, not as fair and impartial administrators of justice, ignoring due process of law requirements.

The U.S. executive, legislative and judicial branches violate the limited authority of the constitution (too many examples to list here).

The question, as it was with our ancestors, is how shall we reclaim our liberty and the security of our individual rights in a peaceful and lawful manner?

On Tuesday evening, June 28, at 7:00pm in the Historic Courthouse, the Citizens committee of 120 volunteers presented the results of their Five Year Strategic Plan recommendations to the Commissioners Court. This group of citizens has been working since late March to develop a strategic plan for what they, the citizens, want our County to look like at the end of the next five years. Covering such areas as Land Use, Health Services, the Arts, Finance, Facilities, Customer Service, Education, and Law Enforcement, the group has laid out their approach to making our County one which represents their views and desires. Their work was facilitated by Dr. Joan Terry, a recognized expert in the field of strategic planning, who also volunteered her time and efforts to assist the citizens. I believe you will be very impressed with the recommendations which they presented. You can see their work very shortly on the County website at www.rockwallcountytxas.com.

Following this presentation was the second item of interest. As you probably have read, the State has been going through a process of redistricting the political boundaries for the State elected representatives as well as for our Congressional Texas districts. This requirement is mandatory every ten years after each new census is conducted. We here in the County are also required to redistrict the political boundaries of the four Commissioners on the Commissioners Court to insure they represent approximately equal number of citizens in the County.

The County has hired a specialized law firm out of Austin to assist in this process and for the last several months, the law firm, the Commissioners, and a volunteer Citizens Redistricting committee of fifteen citizens have been working to develop new precinct boundaries that are about equal in numbers of citizens represented as well as meeting other Federal requirements such as the "One person-One Vote" criteria.

Two alternative maps which have been developed during the redistricting process were presented to the public Tuesday evening for comment. After

the comments were received, the Commissioners Court was then informed by the law firm that another Public Hearing should be scheduled. During this next meeting the Court will vote on one of the alternatives and then the Citizens Committee will work with the Commissioners and the law firm to develop the actual voting precincts boundaries that fit within the new map.

As you may have read or heard in the last several weeks, some of the recommendations proposed by the County Judge in the preparation of the County budget for 2012, have not been accepted by some of the special interest groups with total acquiescence. Unfortunately the economic times we are now living in have caused a change from the normal way of doing business and that is the reason for the controversy.

We have just finished a five year financial forecast for the County. Our revenue for next year is flat compared to this year, and for the next several years, it is forecasted our revenues will not rise more than 1% per year. At the same time that revenue is not increasing, costs are rising and mandated requirements put on us by the State are increasing. To meet these challenges, in the last six months we have: reduced our County facilities by five buildings, voted to outsource the cleaning of all County buildings, voted to outsource the health care for our jail inmate population, asked each county department to reduce their expenses going into next year by at least 5%, worked with the library to reduce their budget by \$250,000, and are now debating other cost savings measures as we prepare the budget for next year. Because of some of the new requirements, we are forced to bring some new personnel into the County, but to prevent a rise in total number of personnel, for the first time, we will be laying off some people from the work force.

Contrary to what some might believe, the salary structure for County employees is not high; in fact it is much lower than municipal employees. Likewise, the retirement entitlements are modest for the County employees; certainly not outlandish as you may have read in the newspaper about other organizations. The Health Care program is good, but not any better than what you might find in most public corporations. And the County employees have not been awarded pay raises for the last several years, again contrary

to what you might have heard.

I understand the desires of special interest groups. I also understand the realities of today's environment. Comments like "You don't want to reduce the budget from someone else," or "You don't understand the importance of what we do," while interesting, do nothing to help solve the overall problem of reduced funding for government. Balanced budget is important.

We are still a rapidly growing County. The State has just awarded about \$62 million for new road construction with an additional \$25 million to be awarded the end of this year. This is a direct result of the Road Bond issue passed by the voters in 2008 and the support of the Commissioners Court, the Mayors and City Managers of our transportation consultant who has been working with us for the last several years. Special recognition needs to be given to David Magness who has been our representative on the Transportation Commission and the leader of our combined Transportation Consortium, and Commissioner Lorie Grinnan who organized and led the Road Bond Committee that helped encourage voters to support the Road Bond issue into place.

The 2nd Draft of the County Budget has been placed on the County website. You can see and examine it in detail at www.rockwallcountytxas.com. Please feel free to attend any Commissioners Court Work Session meeting on the budget or any other items of interest. Meetings are scheduled for Tuesday mornings at 9:00 am in the Historic Courthouse. If you can't attend, you can always listen to the audio streaming of the County website and clicking on the appropriate icon.

Government is important in our way of life and with our current economic system. Please learn as much as you can and participate as much as you can in this process in our County.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America

When in the Course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.— That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to secure their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. — Amongst the most palpable and grievous grievances, that now concur to the dissolution of the British Empire in America, are the following, viz. That the King has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good. He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Pleasure should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them. He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would assent to the proposal of new Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people and eat out their substance. He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures. He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power. He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our Constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation: For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us: For protecting them, by a mock Trial from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States: For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world: For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent: For depriving us in many Cases, of the benefit of Trial by Jury: For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences: For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing among us, a government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments: For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all instances whatsoever. He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us. He has plundered our seas, ravaged our coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people. He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation, and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & Perfidy scarcely ever in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation. He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the Warriors of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands. He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble Manner: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have we been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these supportings, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which has obliged us to declare our independence, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by the Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these united Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States, that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. — And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the Protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

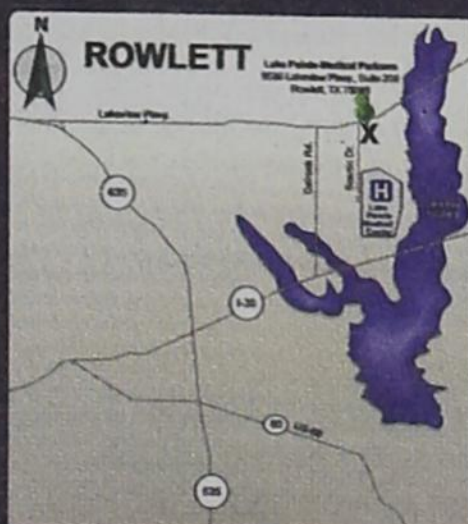

Dallas Race Week raises more than \$25,000 for charity

The biggest winners included Jeffrey Progelhof, Mike Jones and the Rockwall Yacht Club. There were even more winners as the Rockwall Breakfast raised more than \$25,000 to nine charitable organizations. This year's Dallas Race Week sailing event was a success. The Breakfast Rotary Club, "That's as much as we've ever

He attributed the increase to a greater fund-raising effort and to the large crowd gathered at The Harbor for the closing ceremony after the final race Friday, June 25.

Bricker said, "The event at The Harbor was up about 50 per cent in selling raffle tickets than what we had before. The Friday night event really got a lot of public interest. We had a band to try to get the public out."

That plan worked. Parking lots at The Harbor were jammed. The club presented checks to Reading for Adults, Meals on Wheels, Shoes for Kids, Lone Star CASA, Boys' & Girls' Club, YMCA, Pregnancy Resource Center, Before the Bridge and One Man's Treasure.

The racing on Lake Ray Hubbard was good, too. Progelhof — a member at Rush Creek, which was the presenting sponsor, was the overall winner in Fleet A, which had the fastest boats. Those had PHRF (Performance Handicap Racing Fleet) ratings of 120 or lower. The PHRF handicap measures how many seconds per mile each boat would be expected to finish behind a theoretical yacht with a rating of 0. Assuming that the boat has a clean bottom, new sails and an experienced crew, a boat with a 60 rating would finish a minute (60 seconds) per mile behind that theoretical yacht and a boat at 120 would finish 2 minutes per mile behind.

Dallas Race Week included one race each evening for six nights, Sunday through Friday. Each boat's four best races counted in the standings. Progelhof skipped "Senor Moment," a J-boat, to a score of 6 by winning the Monday and Friday races and finishing second in two others. Finishing second and third among the 10 boats in Fleet A were two Bay View Yacht Club sailors — Bryan Taylor, who won Tuesday and Thursday's races in "Rented Mule," and Marshall McKenzie, who won Wednesday in "Superman's Cape." They had 10 points each, with Taylor winning a tiebreaker.

The most dominating performance was by Bay View's Jones, whose "Wings" flew to first place in all six races in Fleet C. That fleet was for boats with PHRF ratings of 201 or higher. Finishing second was Keelan Manuel of Bay View in "Joint Venture." Christopher Gradisar, also from Bay View, was third in "Laree."

In Fleet B, Dan Malak of Chandlers Landing Yacht & Tennis Club rallied to win the final two races in "Orion" to edge Bay View's Jeff Greenwood in "August Blaze." He won the Monday and Wednesday races among the boats with PHRF ratings of 121-200. In third place was Bay View's Chris Hunke in "Swale," which won Tuesday's race.

The other four Dallas Race Week fleets were for specific types of boats. In the nine-boat Main Jib Fleet, David Lawson of Bay View was first in "Respite," which won the Sunday, Tuesday and Friday races. His club mate, Jack Wurster, won the other three races in "Mas Caliente," with Lawson winning a tiebreaker. Ken Gezella of Bitter End Yacht Club finished third in "Juliet."

The top three boats in the Melges 24 Fleet finished within a point of each other. Rush Creek's David Hoye and Mano Judd sailed "Rocket Science" to victory in the first three races, then held off two other Rush Creek sailors who finished with 7 points to Hoye and Judd's 6. Anna Williams placed first in the Thursday and Friday races in "Surfin Bird" and took a tiebreaker from Ryan Glaze and "Gringo," the Wednesday night winner.

The IC 24 Fleet winner was Rush Creek's Team Barefoot — which placed first Monday, Tuesday and Friday in "IC You." The second- and third-place boats also were from Rush Creek — "Ragtime," which Larry Seals sailed to first place Thursday, and "Reflection," which won Wednesday's race with Tom Bieger at the helm.

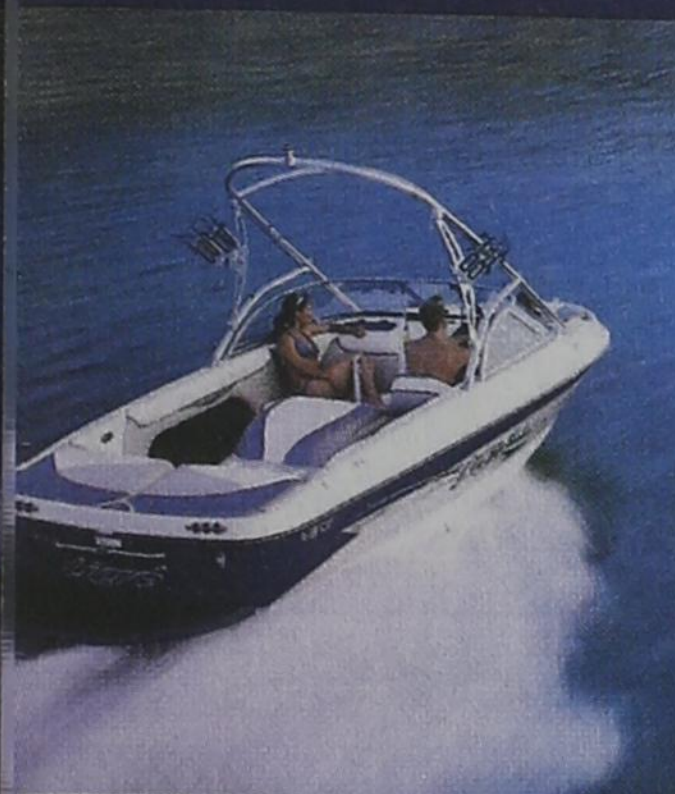

Rockwall takes 2 of 3 in its own 7-on-7 tournament

To prepare for the College Station trip, the Rockwall team will resume practice Thursday evening. Black's plan is to have four practices beginning at 6 p.m.

"We want them to really enjoy it and have fun. We don't want to burn them out," he said, and he could have been speaking literally.

"At these tournaments, when you play three games in 100-degree heat, you have to sub a lot to make sure the kids stay sharp."

Rockwall's team will leave Friday morning, July 15, with its first game scheduled for 1 p.m. that day.

A new lease agreement between the City of Rockwall and new owners of the Shores Golf Course, the Shores Country Club LLC, will allow the golf course to reopen once major renovations are completed.

Royse City to host 4th Fest

The new owners have experience with golf course management, maintenance and ownership.

According to the news release, the owners have agreed to initially invest more than \$1.3 million in renovations

including replacing all of the greens on the course, said Rockwall city manager Julie Couch.

"We are thrilled that the Shores Golf Course will be open once again and in much better condition than it has been in the past. The city looks forward to working with the Shores Country Club group as they bring the course back," said Couch.

City council members have worked for restoration of the Shores Golf Course for the past several years. Ongoing operational and maintenance issues with the golf course's previous owner resulted in the city's cancellation of its lease with the owner. Foreclosure by the lender and the owner's bankruptcy followed.

The previous owner closed the golf course last fall.

It was the city's goal to have a professional, well-operated and functional golf course at The Shores, Couch said last fall.

"It is exciting to see it now happening," she said in the news release.

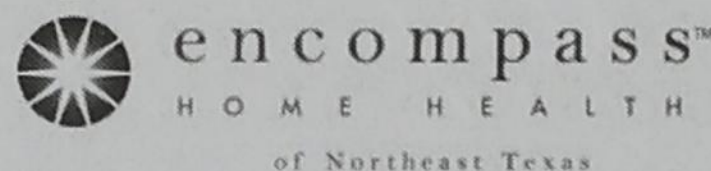

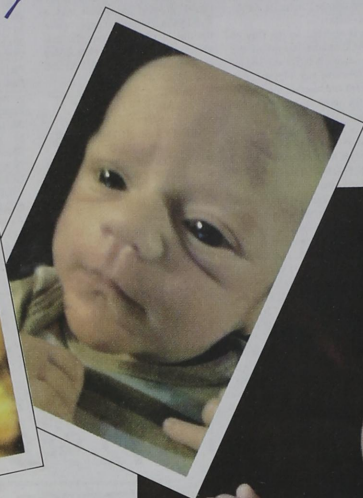
