Original Pumpkin Patch will be last in Rockwall

The final year for a Rockwall tradition. The original Rockwall's Original Pumpkin Patch will be the last year for the event. The Steering Committee voted to discontinue the event as the last year. Kathleen Broze, chair of this year's leadership committee, said she issued earlier this month. "I assure you it was not a hasty or in haste." Factors that contributed to the decision, including rising costs and floods on price and availability of produce.

"The work intensive nature of Pumpkin Patch, coupled with a 40 percent decrease in profits over the past several years, no longer makes the best use of our fundraising volunteers," she said. The final Pumpkin Patch event continues through Oct. 31 and will be open from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily. Rockwall OKs MOW contract

The City Council recently approved a contract with Rockwall Meals on Wheels to help fund the Meals on Wheels program and other services, including nutritional programs for the elderly in the city. The contract was issued by the city earlier this week. Mayor David Hall said Meals on Wheels is a vital service to the community. He said it is wonderful to know that our city can contribute to the work of this wonderful organization and be an advocate for their services. Meals are served at the Senior Center and delivered to homebound seniors due to physical or health

reasons. They also provide information and educational seminars for benefits counseling, prescription drugs and senior health information and caregiver support. The city contributed \$30,000 this year, a \$5,000 increase over last year, according to the news release. "Meals on Wheels is committed to the belief that seniors have the right to live independently in their own homes for as long as safely possible," said Margie VerHagen, executive director of the program. "The City of Rockwall provides funding, volunteers and advocacy to the organization to match federal and state grants to help grow and expand services to our elders."

Security, energy top topics at RCISD board meeting

The Roysce School Board met Oct. 14 with a full agenda. Board members heard a presentation by Instructional Technology Coordinator, Zach Snow. He showed the board and those present at the meeting the recent televised program on WFAA-TV by Sebastian Robertson.

The program began with "A small Texas town is embracing big city technology. A new pilot program is putting a tablet in the hands of 300 middle and high school students in Roysce City ISD." The station actually spent the day in the classroom and watched the students during their class. All subjects can be studied from this one device, and the students will have ownership of the tablet for 24 hours a day. The pilot program is for one year.

"The device the students are using is called the Amplified Tablet, and is an Android-based operating system," Snow said. "The money for the program came out of our local technology budget. The program cost about \$100,000, and the price covers insurance for the tablets in case the tablets are dropped and broken or damaged in any way."

The teachers who are participating in the pilot program are Shelli Holmes, an eighth grade science teacher, and Shiloh Starnes, a high school chemistry, anatomy and physiology teacher.

"This will eliminate paper, pencil and books," Snow told the board. "Six school districts in the nation are participating in the program."

Brad Sherman, director of the Energy Management Program, gave a power point presentation on the status of the schools energy conservation program.

"We're doing everything we can to save energy," Sherman told the board. He said that with the addition of three new buildings including the new cafeteria, the electric bill was \$4,000 less than the first month of school for last year.

A district security report given by associate superintendent Jeff Webb and district security coordinator Lloyd Blaine.

Webb showed a PowerPoint depicting how the security cameras in the schools work. By observing these different views from the cameras, personnel can determine if other cameras need to be put into place due to blind spots that might not be visible from just one camera in that particular room. He said that the Roysce City fire chief and safety experts have come into all the schools and talked to the principals, letting them know where the safest places would be for the students to go during a disaster.

Blaine covered the issues of weather, lock-down, communication, evacuation, bullying and harassment.

At the end of the meeting, the board members praised the teachers, principals and school staff for the work they are doing in making sure the district's students get the best education possible. All board members were present except Trustee Jerry Richardson.

Royse City teen attacked during morning run

A 17-year-old girl reported being attacked near the intersection of Peach Street and Orchid Boulevard in Roysce City on Oct. 12, according to a report by the Roysce City Police.

The teen was running at about 5:30 a.m. in the Woodland Creek subdivision near Fort Elementary when the incident occurred. Portions of this area are heavily wooded.

The only description the young woman could give to police was that the attacker was wearing dark clothing. The man came up behind her, according to reports, and put her in a choke hold before knocking her to the ground.

The young woman was able to fight off the man and return home safely.

"This is the first incident we have had of this nature," said Chief of Police Jeff Stapleton. "We have no clues in the case and would encourage

Two arrested for sexual assault in Rockwall

Two men were arrested following the Oct. 13 sexual assault of a female juvenile, according to a Rockwall Police news release.

At approximately 8:20 p.m. on Oct. 13, the Rockwall Police Department responded to the 400 block of Green Circle in reference to a sexual assault.

An investigation was conducted after a female juvenile reported she was sexually assaulted by two young adults. One suspect was located walking in the area and the other was found a shortly time later hiding nearby.

Based on the investigation, 18-year-old David A. Peoples of Rockwall and 25-year-old Justin K. Little of Garland were arrested and charged with sexual assault of a child. Each is being held at the Rockwall County Detention Center with a \$50,000 bond.

Since the victim is a juvenile, her name is being withheld, according to the news release.

The case remains under investigation by the Rockwall Police Department Criminal Investigation Division.

Military vs. civilian: How to show proper respect

Now that Veteran's Day is approaching, this is a good time to clarify a confusing issue.
Recently at a high school football game, the announcer simply said "Everyone stand for the national anthem."
Many people are confused about how and why they should salute the United States flag or if they should also salute while the national anthem is being sung or played.
The National Defense Authorization Act of 2008 took effect Jan. 28, 2008. This amendment allowed veterans and airmen who are not in uniform to render a military salute during the playing of the national anthem.
Veterans were recently authorized to render a salute through changes made in federal law in 2008, but only during the raising and lowering of the flag and did not address the national anthem. This provision was contained in the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008.
Usually, members of the nation's veterans' service organizations have rendered the hand-salute during the national anthem and at events involving the national flag while wearing their organization's official head-gear.

our nation's flag."
Sen. Jim Inhofe of Oklahoma, an Army veteran, spoke which authorized hand salutes during the national anthem and out-of uniform military service members. It was the Defense Authorization Act of 2009 signed by President Obama. With the new provision, veterans and airmen out of uniform of what they are wearing or what position they may hold can pay their respects to the national anthem and the nation's armed forces with a gesture that has been a since they've donned the uniform.
Announcers at ballgames, Fourth of July celebration Day celebrations and similar events should announce concerning the playing or singing of the national anthem would feel a great appreciation if the announcer were to explain the expectation for the anthem, something like the following:
"Ladies and gentlemen, boys and girls. Would you please use the civilian salute by placing your right hand over your heart and stand quietly at attention until the last note of the anthem is completed."

Hogan announces re-election

Jerry Hogan, Rockwall County judge, recently announced plans to seek re-election.

"I am proud to serve and represent the citizens of Rockwall County as their county judge," Hogan said. "In the last three years significant progress has been made in the way our county has planned. New financial forecasting methods are now in place, a five-year Citizen Strategic Plan was implemented and while there is a proposed less than one-cent addition for road construction citizens, there has been no increase in taxes."

The budget has been balanced each year, according to the release, with the county's reserve fund at \$16.5 million. An employee recognition and performance management system now in place, a software system is being implemented, a veteran service officer has been added and saving the sale of three buildings and the canceling of two leases on other buildings as new space is implemented.

All Commissioner Court meetings are streamed online, the county's website has been updated, Commissioner Court and town hall meetings have been conducted and a program of transparency since Hogan's tenure as judge began, according to the release.

When asked why he decided to seek re-election, Hogan said, "While I originally said I would not run for office, there is still more to be done and the fiscal conservative approach I have, along with the experience gained in office as the county judge, will help with these challenges."

Hogan discussed several examples of the efforts that are underway, including a program that will consolidate the county's dispatch center.

"We want to provide complete interoperability for all of the emergency management communications system in the county, and we need to keep the focus on expanding our transportation system with our state-elected representatives and TxDOT (Texas Department of Transportation)." Hogan said he also has a firm commitment to keeping the tax rate down while preparing for the growth to more than 200,000 people in the next 15 years.

"It is vital that during this period of growth we have an experienced leader who has a solid track record with other elected officials and city managers in the county," Hogan said. "Working together with the county and continue providing excellent services to the residents and businesses in Rockwall County."

James seeks return to Pct. 1 JP post

Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Jack James announced last week he has decided to seek re-election. James began serving Rockwall County residents in January 2011. Prior to his service as justice of the peace, he served 36 years as a firefighter with the City of Garland.

"My time as a firefighter helped me make a smooth transition into the role of justice of the peace," James said in a news release issued last week. "Both jobs - firefighter and judge - are similar in that they exist to serve the citizens."

When asked what his greatest achievement was in his first term, James said it was his ability to handle difficult times.

"Most people believe a judge's primary job is to sit on the bench and make decisions all day long. The position of justice of the peace encompasses much more than that. Many times in the last three years I have had the opportunity to minister to families that have lost a loved one or simply provide a word of encouragement."

James said he is proud of the progress made in working with the Rockwall Independent School District.

"We have seen many teens that were struggling for various reasons make positive steps to return to school and in many cases, receive their high school diploma."

James thanked Rockwall County residents who elected him to the position of JP three years ago and said that his only campaign promise then was that he would work for them.

"I believe that I have fulfilled my campaign promise and, with your support, look forward to serving the citizens of this great county," he said in the news release.

Magness seeks re-election as commissioner

Rockwall County Commissioner David Magness announced earlier this month he would seek a second term as Precinct 4 county commissioner.

Magness announced in an Oct. 7 news release that he would be a candidate in the March 2013 primary. First elected in 2002, Magness took office in January 2003 and is a senior member of the Commission. He currently serves as judge pro-tem.

"It has been an honor to represent the citizens of Rockwall County and it would be a privilege to continue to do so," Magness said in the news release. "During my time in office, the county has maintained a conservative approach, including a very strong reserve fund, initiated a major transportation improvement plan and developed cooperation between the county and its cities. It is my intention to continue these and similar initiatives."

Magness chairs the Rockwall County Transportation Consortium and points to the county's transportation plan as one of the areas he believes is critical to the county's future.

"No one likes to sit in traffic, and the county is taking the lead in transportation improvements," Magness said. "Transportation is a 'quality of life' issue. Our transportation plan has become the model for other counties because of our success in getting projects funded."

In conjunction with his transportation role, Magness serves as the Rockwall-Hunt County delegate to the Transportation Council, a 43-member board that oversees transportation projects in the DFW Metroplex on the executive committee of the Dallas Regional Mobility Coalition, as well as on the board of directors of a regional public transportation provider serving Rockwall County.

He formerly served on the board for the Rockwall County Emergency Services Corporation. Magness also served as an example of county-city cooperation.

"ESC started in 2003 and was the first cooperative effort between the county and cities," he said. "We have cooperated on such issues as a firing range, emergency management and transportation. This resulted in significant savings to the taxpayers of Rockwall County."

Magness said that while much has been accomplished, county officials cannot live in the past, but must plan for the future.

"Rockwall County remains one of the fastest-growing counties not only in Texas, but in the nation," Magness said in the news release. "It is imperative that we continue to build partnerships and to maintain our transportation, a strong financial foundation and other quality-of-life issues."
