Pullen Elementary teacher Laci Betterton and husband killed in Sunday car accident

Students and faculty are mourning the deaths of two area school teachers, led Sunday night in a two-car accident near Caddo Mills.

Laci Betterton, 25, was a music teacher at Rockwall's Dorothy Smith Pullen ementary School. Her husband, James, 23, was a music teacher at Freeman ementary School in Garland.

He had been hired to work for the district at mid-term this school year and d been at Freeman for just one week before the winter break.

According to the Department of Public Safety, the couple was travelling est on State Highway 66 near Caddo Mills when their Dodge Neon was hit an eastbound Dodge Dakota.

The driver of the Dodge Dakota was not injured.

DPS spokespersons said there was slush and snow on the road and vestigators are still working to determine if the road conditions played a le in the accident.

"The district is so saddened by the death of music teacher Laci Betterton and r husband. She touched the life of every student at Dorothy Smith Pullen ementary School and her absence will be greatly felt on that campus and roughout the district as a whole," Fowler said in a written statement.

'On Monday, the district provided multiple counselors to talk with students d with staff members as they struggled with the news of Mrs. Betterton's ath. Counselors will remain on call for as long as the campus needs support. ne district's foremost concern is for the well-being of the students and

Ona Fowler also said the Pullen Elementary family has received an outpouring support from the Rockwall community. Both Kroger and CiCi's Pizza nated food for the staff and parents and community members have offered provide any support or services needed.

"We are so grateful to be a part of such a caring community - a community at never hesitates to reach out and offer comfort and support," Fowler said. Reavis Wortham, Director of Communications for Garland ISD said similar support has been set up for the students and staff at Freeman Elementary. A letter was sent home Monday to all families at Freeman notifying them of

the death of Mr. Betterman. "We covered the events of Sunday night in a very light way to notify parents

of the death of a staff member and suggested this was the perfect opportunity for them to talk to their students about what happened," Wortham said.

"Although he only worked at the school for a short time, Mr. Betterman had already made an impact on his students. Our prayers go out to the families of the Bettermans."

Wortham also said extra counselors were on the Freeman campus Monday to support the staff and students. He said that although the school has an onsite counselor, other counselors would be on-call in the coming days if more support is needed.

A joint funeral for the Betterton's was conducted on Thursday, Jan. 13 in Kilgore. Burial followed at the Danville Cemetery.

James graduated from high school in Kilgore and received his degree in Music Education from Texas A&M Commerce in 2009.

Laci attended school in Harmony and received her degree in Music Education from Texas A&M Commerce in 2008.

The Bettertons were music ministers at Westview United Methodist Church

James is survived by his parents, Danny and Susan Richter of Kilgore; grandparents, Don and Lorraine Hahne of Hemphill; aunts and uncles, David and Renate Cruce of Gilmer, Anthony and Tasha Richter of Midland; aunts, Sharl Douglas of Midland, Sharon Franklin of Kilgore. He was preceded in death by his grandparents, Billy and Kay Richter and James T. Cruce.

Laci is survived by her parents, J.W. and Judy Strickland of Mineola; a brother, Jimmy Strickland of Granbury; a sister, Dianna Daniel of Henderson; nephews, James Michael Strickland of Granbury and Lance Daniel of Henderson; aunts and uncles, Donna and Hugh Fraser of Houston, Tommy and Sharon Vardeman of Holly Lake. County Commissioners, new judge discuss future improvements

Incoming County Judge Jerry Hogan began his term with the Court at a workshop meeting discussing procedures and responsibilities with the four

Each commissioner outlined their duties and responsibilities, as well as special projects they are involved in, for the Judge.

As for having the discussions in a workshop as opposed to meeting individually with each commissioner to learn more about their work, Hogan explained that the Open Meetings Act states that "no more than two commissioners/ judges can talk about anything without it being open to the public. So when we discuss things like this with the whole commissioner's court discussing it, it must be open to the public. We advertised it beforehand and that's why you are sitting through this now."

Hogan encouraged the commissioners, all four of whom have sat on the court for several terms, to let him know if there is something he should be

doing that past judges have done or not done. Also on the agenda were the following items:

Hogan also said he would like to begin conducting Town Hall meetings beginning as early as late February. He said the first would be held at the Rockwall Downtown Historic Courthouse, with the date and time to be announced. Hogan has talked to the mayors of other cities within the county and he said they have agreed to provide space for Town Hall meetings for their residents.

The commissioners discussed ways to televise or live-stream their meetings to better reach the public with information. The county's IT Director, Brian Crenshaw, introduced one option for a televised meeting with an initial cost of \$4,180 per year, including upgraded cameras, software, computers, monitors, licenses and other necessary equipment. Commissioners agreed to start with first investigating live-streaming audio only through the computer to see what the response from residents would be. Hogan said broadcasting the meetings would "satisfy a lot of citizen's requests for the ability to view the commissioner's court without the commissioner's court meeting at night which is what many citizens are asking the court to do so they can attend the meetings and they can see what is going on." Crenshaw also suggested putting the recordings of the commissioner court meetings on line for residents to access at their convenience. The Court also discussed whether workshop meetings would be included in the broadcasts. "All the good stuff happens at workshop," Hogan said. "If you're not here, you miss all the fun."

The Court discussed the pros and cons of developing a 10-year Strategic Plan for the county. Hogan suggested that "the fastest growing county in Texas needs a plan. In all my experience with planning, you spend lots of time and lots of energy developing a plan but generally the plan is never executed the way it's planned. But it gives you a background and a groundwork to work from. Whereas it you don't have some plan, you're just winging it." The Court agreed to give the idea more thought and continue discusses at future

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Church assists in building water wells in Zimbabwe

In the fall of 2009, an international peacemaker visited First Presbyterian Church of Rockwall and shared a story people in his native Zimbabwe and their lack of clean water.

This peacemaker, Lamiel Phiri, told the church about children unable to attend school because they spent their da traveling to fetid streams, carrying filthy water back to their villages. The building of water wells had the power. said, to significantly change lives.

This month, the church responded by sending a check for \$3,200 - the cost of building one water well - to ti Synod of Harare, the administrative body of the Presbyterian Church in Zimbabwe. The money was raised through memorial gifts, an anonymous donation and, most importantly, through the giving of the children of the church, wi have been bringing their change to worship on Sundays and placing it in a model well, built by church member Robe Schlumpf.

"We are blessed to be able to be in mission with our brothers and sisters in Zimbabwe," said Pastor Cheryl Taylo "And we look at this well as the first of many that we hope to be able to underwrite."

Church elder, Andrea Vanderpool, who coordinated Phiri's visit and the well donations, said, "Our mission symbolic and the well donations, said, "Our mission symbolic and the well donations, said," izes social justice for the children of Zimbabwe, particularly allowing little girls to learn rather than haul water. Th opportunity will hopefully bring about a new direction to the lives of many."



would still be left with the health-care crisis that is rooted in Medicare and Medicaid. That crisis wouldn't disappear with the repeal of Obamacare. The mainstream press would be (and already is) screaming to Republicans, "Where is your plan to fix and improve our health care system?" And since Republicans believe in Medicare and Medicaid, they would be left with coming up with some sort of interventionist fix-it reform that would simply be a variation of Obamacare and that would make the situation worse than ever.

The fundamental problem is that Republicans (conservatives), like Democrats (liberals), honestly believe that the legitimate role of the federal government is to take care of people through a welfare state. That's what Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, education grants, foreign aid, FDIC, bank bailouts, and other welfare-state programs are all about -- taking care of people. Republicans are not about to challenge the moral legitimacy of that paradigm or its programs.

Yet, it is these programs -- that is, it's the welfare state itself (and the warfare state) -- that is at the root of America's economic woes. Thus, the only solution is to rid our nation of the welfare-state paradigm itself (and the warfare-state paradigm).

That's what makes us libertarians so different from conservatives and liberals and other statists. We want to ditch the welfare-warfare paradigm in favor of one based on individual liberty, free markets, and a constitutional republic. That necessarily means repeal and dismantling, not reform and improvement.

Consider the title of this editorial from Tuesday's Los Angeles

Times:"Their Job is to Create Jobs." That's the mainstream mindset. It's the mindset of conservatives, liberals, and other statists. These types of people honestly believe that it's the job of the federal government to manage the economy, create jobs, and take care of people. That's the problem.

Do you see how different we libertarians are from statists? We don't believe that government has any more business managing the economy and creating jobs than it does managing religion and stimulating interest in God. The root of America's economic woes lies in the fact that the federal government is charged with the power to do such things as manage the economy, create jobs, fight poverty, take care of people, and dominate and control the world.

The solution to America's economic woes lies in removing the power of the government to manage the economy, create jobs, fight poverty, and police the world. Prosperity lies in the freedom of people to engage in enterprise freely with people all over the world (i.e., without government interference), accumulate unlimited amounts of wealth (i.e., no more federal income tax and IRS), and decide for themselves what to do with their own money (i.e., no more Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, welfare, etcetera). The solution to America's woes lies with libertarian principles. Too bad House Republicans (with the exception of Ron Paul) are still so committed to statism.

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ast week, the 112th Congress was sworn in. I am pleased that I will nairing the Monetary Policy Subcommittee of the Financial Services mittee which has oversight of the Federal Reserve. Obviously, this tion will facilitate my efforts to ensure the Fed provides the American prole with more information about what they have been doing with and

ot surprisingly, since my chairmanship was announced, apologists the Fed have been recycling the old canard about how increased sparency threatens the Fed's so-called political independence. By ependence' they are referring to the Fed's ability to greatly impact economy with virtually no meaningful oversight. We only recently ned that the bankers at the Fed were able to use the latest financial s to bail out Wall Street cronies and foreign central banks with ons of dollars that were created and wasted instead of appropriated voted on by representatives of the people. The Fed and its supporters ne Congress vehemently fought even this small bit of transparency

and without this one-time provision in the Financial Reform Act forcing disclosure we would still not have this information.

Indeed, we are in the dark on so much of what the Fed has done. This is extremely dangerous for our country, yet this power and secrecy is defended as some kind of public good, which is patently ridiculous. Our government is based on a system of checks and balances. With no check on the Fed, it is no surprise it has thrown the economy wildly offbalance. The solution is not to reinflate the bubbles the Fed created or to continue to devalue the currency or to throw billions at failing banks and corporations. The solution is to return sanity and freedom to monetary policy. Forcing the entire country to use a medium of exchange that is subject to the whims of elite bankers and their cronies on Wall Street is not sanity. Hoping that an unchecked all-powerful behemoth banking cartel will solve any economic problem is not sanity.

The problems the Fed was originally created to solve now look minuscule compared to the problems it has created. If political independence erodes the purchasing power of the currency by 98%, destabilizes the economy

with radical booms and busts, all while increasing unemployment and tipping us ever closer to hyperinflation, perhaps it is time to try a little transparency and accountability instead. Better still, we should try giving the people true economic freedom.

Make no mistake, the Fed is not truly independent of political pressure. Its chair is appointed by the president and it is a creature of Congress. Congress has a duty, albeit a neglected one, to exercise oversight of the Fed. However, even if it was politically independent, it is not independent of the influence of Wall Street. One only has to look at the revolving door between the Fed and the big banks to know that. Disclosure of TARF funds confirm this. It is nothing short of cruel and criminal for Congress to stand idly by while the life savings of Americans are inflated away to nothing. It is high time Congress insists on getting complete information on what the Fed has been doing and for whom.

My hope is that exposing the truth will demonstrate the insanity of the status quo and more people will call for sensible changes, such as legalizing competing currencies.

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

Baker said the winding road, which stretches from FM 549 to Hwy. 66 into Rockwall resident Kenneth Baker the city of Fate, is the site of vandal-

Baker owns property bordering Ben Payne road and leases land bordering North Country Lane.

"It is a hazard to the public," he said. "The road doesn't serve any other pur-

Baker said the properties that border the road are accessible from other directions and there are no occupied houses in the area. He said there is one abandoned house in the vicinity. He also said the dirt road becomes

a favorite spot for "mudding" after it rains. He said cars have slid off the road and into fences, allowing livestock to wander out of pastureland and cause a "public hazard."

Baker also addressed the illegal dumping that takes place along the

"Last week, we found three dead hogs. It's a dumping ground for mattress and garbage," he said.

Lastly, he said people gather at the abandoned house at night for bonfires and other possibly illegal activities.

"I have gone up there and found burning logs and bonfires and drug paraphernalia," Baker said. Baker asked the Court to consider

temporarily barricading the stretch of road for further discussion.

"I'm not asking for it to be permanently blocked but temporarily until further notice. You may never be able to prevent all of it but you can make it harder to get cars up there," he said.

Judge Hogan took Baker's phone number for future discussions and the meeting was adjourned in less than 15 minutes.



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

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
Meet Dr. Jason Medina






