## Rockwall requires permits for alarms

The Rockwall City Council Monday approved two motions Monday involving fire and burglar alarm systems within the
city The council voted to adopt city. The council voted to adopt
an amendment to the City Code of Ordinances establishing alarm permit requirements for businesses and residences.
Starting Jan. 1, 2009, home and business owners in the City of
Rockwall will need Rockwall will need to apply for a permit for fire and burglar alarms.
The ordinance will include existThe ordinance will include exise
ing alarm systems in place prior ing alarm systems in place prior
to Jan. 1, and new systems to be installed after that date.
The permit fees are $\$ 30$ per system for a residence and $\$ 50$ per system for a business. Julie Couch, Rockwall City Manager, said most businesses, and possi-
bly a few homes, have both fire and burglar alarms. Each separate system will require a permit and payment of the fee.
The Council also awarded a contract to PMAM Corporation for fire and police alarm tracking and billing. Couch said the company be in touch with alarm holders to help reduce the incidence of false alarms. The City currently has penalties in place for excessive false alarms. It is hoped the monitoring will bring these numbers down and ease the burden on fire and police personnel from responding to unnecessary calls.

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Rockwall County, Texas (the "County"), hereby finds and determines that it is necessary and advisable to call and hold a bond election in he County for the purpose of submitting certain propositions pertaining to the issuance of bonds for the purposes hereinafter set forth; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court finds and declares that the meeting at which this Order is considered is open to the public as required by law, and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by Chapter 551, Texas Government Code, as amended; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF ROCKWALL COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1
Election Ordered. A bond election (the "Election") shall be held in and hroughout Rockwall County, Texas, on Tuesday, November 4, 2008, a uniform election date, at which Election the following proposition (the "Proposition") shall be submitted in accordance with law:

## PROPOSITION NO.

"Shall the Commissioners Court of the County of Rockwall, exas, be authorized to issue bonds of the County under the authority of Article III, Section 52, of the Texas Constitution, in $\$ 100,000,000$ for the purpose of providing funds for permanent public improvements, to-wit: construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, throughout the County, including participating in the cost of joint projects with various state, city and regional council of government entities; said bonds of each series or issue, respectively, to mature serially over a period of not to exceed thirty (30) years from their date, the maximum allowable under State law, and to be sold at such price or prices and to bear interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Commissioners Court at the time of issuance; and to provide for he payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds by property within the County in an amount sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay said bonds as they become due?"

## Section 3. Conduct of Election

(a) The Election shall be conducted in accordance with the Code and other applicable law by the Rockwall County Elections Administrator (the "Administrator")
(b) Voting on Election Day shall be conducted at the polling locations for the precincts designated on Exhibit A hereto. The Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to make such changes in polling locations as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Election. Each polling place shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Election Day

Section 4. Voting Systems. Voting at the Election, and early voting by personal pearance, shall be by the use of lawfully approved voting systems and ballots, as determined by the Administrator.

Section 5. Official Ballot. The Proposition shall be set forth on the ballots substantially in the following form, so as to permit the voters to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the Proposition
