## RISD board eyes impending state funding cuts

On Monday, the Board of Trustees of the Rockwall Independent School District met in special session.

President Dr. David Loftis called the meeting to order, then immediately adjourned to open meeting to reconvene the board in executive session to meet with the district's attorney concerning legal matters.

The issue at hand related to a lease agreement and potential amendments to a lease agreement between the Rockwall ISD and Rockwall County Extension Agent for property located at 875 Riding Club Road. This area is more commonly known as Rockwall ISD's Agriculture Complex.

No action was taken following the executive session. Open session resumed at 7:12 p.m.

Jeff Bailey, superintendent of schools, conducted a budget work session for the 2011-2012 school year. He discussed the impact of the 82nd Legislature, emphasizing that 49 days remain in the 2011 legislative session and restating the board's goal to prepare a budget based on estimated funding with the least amount of impact on classroom instruction.

Mike Singleton, CFO, presented a district (10-year comparison) on staff positions in the district. The staff positions included teachers, professional support, campus administration, central administration education aides and auxiliary staff. A graph presented for the 2010-2011 school year indicated staff salaries for the District, as follows:

• Teachers, 62 percent -- \$54,198,000

Auxiliary staff, 15 percent -- \$13,034,302

• Professional support, 12 percent -- \$10,477,875

 Campus administration, 4 percent -- \$3,878,118 Central administration, 4 percent -- \$3,139,015

Educational aides, 3 percent -- \$2,226,005

Singleton discussed revenue additions, expenditure reductions, equity transfers, staffing reductions and employee benefits.

Bailey stated school districts all around the state are fervently searching for ways to meet their students' needs with less funding. In the RISD, administrators have been working since September to identify potential areas for revenue generation, operating efficiencies and expenditure reductions. At this point, the district has identified \$6.4 million in spending cuts and

Comprising these cuts and additional income sources are line items involving administrative staffing, administration budgets and campus budgets. While no plan has been yet been passed by the Legislature, the passage of House Bill 1 calls for \$19.5 million in cuts for the RISD for the coming school year.

The board agreed these reductions would negatively impact the district and make it difficult to maintain current programs at current levels.

House Bill 1 already has been passed by the House and now is being

considered by the Senate. Bailey encouraged everyone to continue to communicate to elected officials "that we understand the need for cuts, but devastating the classrooms of Texas is not the

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
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## On God's Word

The one body of Christ...1Corinthians 12:12-14



After 1Corinthians 12:7-11, the subject changes to the one body of Christ. Verses 12-14 say, "For as the body is one and has many members.

And all the members of that one body, being many, are one body, so also is Christ. For by one spirit are we all baptized into one body, whether we are Jews or Gentiles, whether we are bound or free. And have been all made to drink into one spirit. For the body is not one member, but many."

There is truly one body of Christ made up of many members. First it is important to understand that this is not about Jesus during his ministry on earth. It's about Jesus Christ who Godraised from the dead, and who is a live and in heaven.It is made up of people who have been filled with holy spirit because they believed with their hearts that God raised Jesus from the dead. Jesus Christ is

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alive and in heaven sitting on the right hand of God's highest authority. Jesus is the head of the body. In the name of Jesus Christ, God's saints have the capacity to walk by the same holy spirit. This is the same spirit which profits each individual saint in the nine ways described in 1Corinthians 12:7-10. Notice how the word "one" is used so many times in verses 12-14. There is only one body of Christ made up of many members that have been baptized into the body by one spirit. Let's compare this with our local communities. Every town that I've visited has a number of different churches. At first glance I would be happy about it because people desire to find others to fellowship with. Yet, the word "one" in the scripture shines light on a major problem. That being the church of God is greatly divided. The reason there are different churches in a town or city is because there is division among the Christians. The church is divided over doctrinal and practical beliefs and practices.

Please keep in mind that all the churches' membership would include some who are filled with holy spirit, and part of the body of Christ. The reference to divided church is related to whether there is a unity of faith within the body of Christ as a whole.

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



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
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## planned by Rockwall **Summer Musicals**



## Can we trust the veracity of the Presiden

The document clearly shows missing text that was apparently erased using an image editing program. One particularly interesting change from this black and white layer is the Department of Health stamped number at the top right ... "61 1064" ... in the White House released PDF, over the green colored background image, the number reads "61 10641" ... an obvious editing of the number from that scanned birth certificate image. That kind of editing begs the question: why the editing if it's an original?

## Forget reform of socialist program

Reforming federal programs that have bestowed upon Americans a multitude of problems would seem to be a good idea, but it's not. The problem is not only that the programs will never work no matter how much they are reformed, but also that what the programs do falls outside the legitimate functions of government. The programs need to be abolished, not reformed.

"Reform" has been the clarion call of politicians who have claimed some affinity for "small government" for decades. The reason is simple — such rhetoric gets votes. I suppose there are some in Washington who sincerely believe that the proper role of government is limited to protecting the country from invasion, punishing those who commit violent crimes, and providing a judicial forum in which people can resolve disputes, but it seems they are few. Politicians today call for smaller government and reforming government programs simply because it will help get them elected. But when it comes time to actually take action to shrink government, there are few yeas for cutting budgets, and actually eliminating programs never even gets to a vote.

It is much easier and more popular to cut taxes. Cutting taxes is an easy way to claim that you have shrunk the size of government. At the end of the day, however, the direct tax burden is only one factor to consider. Of equal importance is how much money government spends, because that's the amount that government must ultimately collect by taxation, borrowing, or printing the money (i.e., inflation). Each of those methods has adverse consequences and affects people in different ways, but they all share the common trait of taking money from those who have earned it so that it can be spent by those who have not. Using the state to take money from people to whom it belongs in order to give it to people to whom it does not belong violates fundamental principles of individual freedom, private property, and justice.

There are also pragmatic reasons for abolishing socialist programs, agencies, and departments, such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Department of Education, Amtrak, NASA, and on and on: They simply will not and cannot work.

Central planning, which such programs involve, has been tried and it has failed. The Soviet Union was a socialist monstrosity that kept its citizens in squalor and destitution. North Korea, another socialist paradise, is dimly lit at night because the state cannot afford to provide sufficient electricity for its citizens. China has been progressing away from socialism because it has recognized the economic disaster that central planning produces.

The reason is that central planning is inherently defective. No group of government officials, no matter how intelligent and well-meaning, can possibly plan a complex economic activity involving multitudes of people. They simply cannot accumulate, process, and apply all the information that the market conveys instantaneously through the price system. Because of that, socialist programs are doomed to fail, no matter how much they are reformed. Even worse, central planning inevitably leads a nation down the road to despotism and servitude — the "road to serfdom," the title of Nobel Prize- winning economist Friedrich Hayek's famous 1944 book on the subject.

The clarion call

There is something else to consider: the infighting, favoritism, and back-

stabbing that are associated with politics are an inevitable of the transfer society. What other way is there to divvy up Politicians are rewarded for bringing home the biggest slice of the slimiest politicians oftentimes get the biggest slices.

Abolish them! Repeal them. End them. Dismantle them, along the departments and agencies that administer them. End them and attended to the debt, and inflation that pay for them.

Abolish Social Security. Repeal Medicare and Medicaid NASA, the Department of Education, the Drug Enforcement & Department of Homeland Security, and Amtrak. Terminate Family Freddie Mac. End the Federal Reserve. Get rid of them all.

The clarion call for the small-government type should be all!" Clear the decks and leave peaceful enterprise entirely to sector and the free market. Each person's money belongs to his right to do with it as he pleases. Moreover, freedom and free unlike socialism, actually work.

But the Court also noted that in other areas,

such discrimination could not stand. That was what lawyers call comments that are not really part of the issues.






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
