yse City Council spurns tax increase

Toyse City Council put the brakes on a city property tax hike when members met in a budget workshop and declined to de effective rate voted in during the Aug. 10 council meet-

Aug. 10 vote was the record vote required by law, which sets or ceiling rate for local property taxes. The city anticipates offering online payment services and of the year, Shipp said.

Also in the Aug. 10 meeting, the council accepted a transfer of approximately one acre of land for a new water tower from One Verandah LP. When the company developed the Verandah subdivision in the northeast portion of the city, it promised land to the city for the tower. Royse City council members will likely award a bid for the tower at the Sept. 14 council meeting, and construction on the new facility will probably begin in November.

Shipp said, "Because of its elevation and location, the new site will provide the most efficient service for the entire city."

Replacement of air conditioning and heating in the city library, senior center and city hall will begin soon, resulting from the council's award of a bid for those services to Johnson Controls, Inc. of Irving. The project is funded by a grant from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

A grant will also fund a bid the council awarded Aug. 10 to North America Fire Equipment Company for personal protective equipment for Royse City firefighters.

Rockwall City Council tables Harbor expansion discussion

Planned development of the Harbor district expansion stalled Monday night when council member disagreement over multi-family housing in that area caused the city council to table the item until the Tues., Sept. 7 meeting.

The ordinance rezoning the hilltop acreage bounded by I-30, the Harbor, and Horizon Rd. was having a first reading pursuant to adoption by the city. Zoning changes are a required step in what has been a three-year process of setting development standards for the promi-

Although the code for the high end, mixed-use development has been under the supervision of the city council during that time, conflicting, apparently unresolved views about the inclusion of multifamily units surfaced during the meeting.

Opposing multi-family units

Council member Cliff Sevier stated his longstanding opposition to multi-family housing in the city, and received some support in that stance from Council member David Sweet. Mark Russo expressed concern that the effects of high density housing in the district have not been fully explored. In a tense exchange with Russo, council member Matt Scott conveyed some surprise that Russo concerns over the project's elements had not been adequately answered during three years of oversight with the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The land is probably the most expensive property in the city, according to P&Z director Robert LaCroix. Scott indicated that all efforts to date had been with the goal of ensuring the "highest and best use of the property" and to "complement and enhance the viability of the Harbor and increase land value in the area.'

Questions about definitions

LaCroix was called upon to give definitions of condominium, zero lot line homes and townhomes. The office-retail-residential master plan calls for maximum 1161 urban residential units (including a townhome element), and 49 zero-lot line single family homes in residential subdistricts.

"I appreciate the concerns about multi-family units. But we're not talking about rows and rows of apartments," Scott said. "We're talking about high end retail and residential similar to Dallas' Uptown areas such as West Village-multi-family in the highest, classic

Council discussion gravitated to consideration of condo units in the Harbor area that have become rental units, and Chief of Police Mark Moeller was asked about calls for service in those areas. He replied that parking issues are the typical problem.

Identifying specific "struggles"

Acknowledging the right of council members to change their minds about aspects of the project under development, Council member Sweet asked members opposing multi-family provisions to "identify [their] specific struggles". He expressed satisfaction with the changes that had been made to the original code setting out housing standards, but said that "some aspects of the multi-family provisions make me nervous, too. I'm not going to support it tonight. I want to make sure I have a deep understanding and can answer these questions next time and stand by my vote on the second reading."

Sevier responded "I just think 1210 units for housing in that area is a lot. It's too much, whether you call them apartments or townhouses or whatever. Once the newness wears off, I don't see them bringing any value to the area."

Expressing concerns for density and traffic, Russo said, "We can talk on paper about how great it's going to be, but none of us has a crystal ball."

Scott replied that "we can't govern from fear. We all agree that what the Harbor needs for longterm viability is more foot traffic, more people."

Sweet emphasized the importance of unanimity on the council as much as possible. "I've been the lone vote against on some things. But this is one of the most important properties for the future of our city. We also know the impact it's going to have on the Harbor. We need to have a deep understanding of what's at stake here."

The council voted 6-0 to postpone thematter until until September 7 regular meeting. Council member Glen Farris was absent from the meeting.

What happens now?

When Sweet asked city staff what would happen if the ordinance were not approved at this reading, city manager Julie Couch replied, "We've been working on this for three years. We'd be looking for direction about where you want to go with this."

The council voted to table the item to the Tues., Sept. 7 meeting. In other business, the council approved for acquisition two parcels of land related to the expansion of Airport Road and FM 549. It also recognized three graduates of Rockwall University Leadership Program (see related story).

Miracle in Rockwall: Missing dog returns after five weeks

How many times have we read a story or seen on the news about a beloved family pet gone missing that turns up at home after weeks or months on the run?

A Rockwall family recently received that miracle when their 11-year old Lab mix dog, Bud, showed up after having gone missing over the July 4 weekend.

Steven Harvey, Bud's owner,

said while his family was at a family reunion, his dog and his parents' dog were left in his backyard with access to food, water and shelter in the garage. When the family returned home, the gate leading into the yard had been opened and both dogs were gone.

Harvey said his father found his dog as they were searching the neighborhood for their pets, but Bud wasn't found. Harvey's

"Everybody said they would watch for him. They all take in strays into their yards and watch for the lost pet posters to go up," Harvey said. "Lost pet signs work in this neighborhood."

After their lost pet signs went up, the Harvey family received a phone call that broke their hearts. A neighbor, Baye Cheek, said she saw Bud get hit by a car on Lake

Shore Drive the Saturday of July 4 weekend. She told Harvey a teen driver was speeding through the neighborhood and never slowed down when Bud wandered into the street.

"She said she made eye contact with the driver and looked at him like, 'Why aren't you slowing down?" Harvey said. "She put her arms out like she was trying to slow him down."

Cheek said a part of the car's grill broke off when Bud was hit, and she gave it to Harvey in case the driver came forward.

The Harvey family, which includes Steven's wife, Amy, and children, Jacob and Paige, decided that, despite their heartbreak over apparently losing Bud, they needed a dog in their lives and adopted Bee, whom Harvey described as a "shelter mutt. Both the dogs were rescue animals," he said.

Fast forward five weeks to Aug. 9 when the Harvey's miracle happened.

Debbie Drake, Amy Harvey's mother who lives two blocks from her daughter's family, hit the button on her garage door opener and received a shocking surprise. Sitting outside her garage, wagging his tail, dirty, hungry and 15 pounds lighter, was a very much alive Bud.

Because Harvey's mother-inlaw does not have a fence around her yard, Bud had never been to Drake's house, Harvey said, so

fire code requirements to Jerry Archer for his car care business at 306 E. Washington. Archer told the council he has faced difficulties meeting the previously agreed-upon requirements because of relocation, downtown street work, and the downturn in the economy. Inadequate city water supply to his business has made installation of the required sprinkler system exorbitant in cost, he said.

The council declined to act on a request from James Russell Wylie to allow his property to become part of the McLendon-Chisholm extra-territorial jurisdiction on which it borders, and in doing so, remove it from consideration for annexation by the

city of Rockwall. Council members also heard from other property owners who unanimously oppose city annexation of their land as part of 824.91 acres near the boundary line of McLendon-Chisholm. The four families represented stated that they have all the ser-

vices needed, or that deed restrictions for their property are already in place to prevent unsightly development. All are eligible for three-year agricultural exemptions under what is known as a 212 non-development agree-

On God's Word

In Acts, chapter 10, we learn about a man named Cornelius who was a "centurion of the band called the Italian." He was not in a marching band, but instead he served in Caesarea as a captain over one hundred men. (See E.W. Bullinger's notes in KJV Companion Bible, p. 1601). According to verse 2, Cornelius was a devout man that reverenced God with his entire household. Verse 22 reveals that Cornelius got a good report card from the Jews in his area.

A very important thing to know about Cornelius is that he was a Gentile. In Acts 10:3-7 he saw an angel of God come to him. This angel instructed him to send men to a nearby town called Joppa and ask for a man named Simon Peter. According to verse 8, Cornelius did as he was told. In verses 9-20 Peter was on the roof meditating and praying to God. He was given a vision of a sheet with all kinds of meats being drawn down from the sky, and heard a voice say, "rise, Peter; kill and eat." (verse 13). Peter debated the matter and said that he had never eaten anything common or unclean. After this interaction occurred three times, the sheet rose back up to the sky. Peter was perplexed by this vision. While he thought about it, the spirit of God told him that three men were looking for him. And that he must stand up and go with them, without any doubt. Peter meekly did as he was told.

In verses 21-33, Peter met the men and the next morning traveled with them back to Cornelius' place. He found that all of Cornelius' family, servants and many friends were together to hear what God had to say through Peter. Both Cornelius and Peter shared their stories that lead to the meeting. The record of Peter's teaching is found in verses 34-43. In essence, he taught about Jesus who was anointed by God with holy spirit and authority. He shared about Jesus the Lord who did many good deeds by the power of God, who the Jewish leaders slew and hung on a tree. He also taught about Jesus the Christ whom God raised up on the third day, and showed him openly to those witnesses chosen by God.

We come to verse 43, "To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believes in him shall receive remission of sins." Does this sound familiar? To have remission of sins is simply to be filled with

We have a lovely home and have spent thousands making our backyard look beautiful with landscaping and a swimming pool. We arrived home from vacation on Sunday evening to find a 200-foot radio pole erected in our back yard.


We understood that the city was there to serve the people – last time we looked it is our tax dollars that pay their wages.
