THE DIABETES FACTOR

Diabetes has been associated with numerous wide-ranging health risks, and tooth loss may be one of them. When researchers reviewed data collected from more than 37,000 adults aged 25 years and older, they found that diabetics lost their teeth at twice the rate of non-diabetics. In addition, the study revealed that people with periodontal (gum) disease were more likely to have diabetes than people with healthy gums. While researchers could not pinpoint a specific causal link between diabetes and tooth loss, they emphasized that their findings were consistent with other chronic diseases (such as heart disease, respiratory disease, and cognitive diseases) that are also associated with poor oral health. Regular dental visits are as important as exams by other doctors.

Rockwall County aligns with state, nation for President

A total of 40,244 ballots were cast in Rockwall County on Nov. 8, as part of the 2016 general election, according to the Rockwall County Elections Department website. Of that total, 70,831 or 28,396 ballots, were cast for Donald Trump, the Republican candidate for U.S. president.

The Democratic Party candidate for president, Hillary Clinton, received 9,633 votes, or 24.03 percent of the ballots, while the Libertarian Party candidate, Gary Johnson, captured 1,293 votes, or 3.21 percent. Jill Stein, Green Party, 562 votes, or 1.40 percent. Candidates earned 562 votes, or 1.40 percent.

Overall voter turnout was 71.48 percent, according to the Rockwall County Elections Department website.

Straight-party voters totaled 24,736, with 77.13 percent total voting Republican. Democrats had 21.44 percent of the party votes, while the Libertarian Party pulled 284 and the Party, 70.

On God's Word

Know the basics ... rightly dividing

When cooks prepare tasty pizzas for customers, they divide the pizzas into slices. The process of cutting the slices perfectly describes the term "rightly dividing" used in Paul's letter to Timothy.

Writing to Timothy, Paul said, "Study to show yourself approved unto God, a workman that needs not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth" (2Timothy 2:15).

The word study meant to be diligent. This fits perfectly with the reference to a workman or laborer. Be diligent to show, or present yourself approved unto God. The word approved basically meant "approved," or to be tested.

A laborer that needs not to be ashamed is related to the truth that God will not cause shame by not backing His word. When people do not back their word or promise, the bring shame on themselves. People can be diligent laborers who will not be ashamed of God because He is able to back His word faithfully.

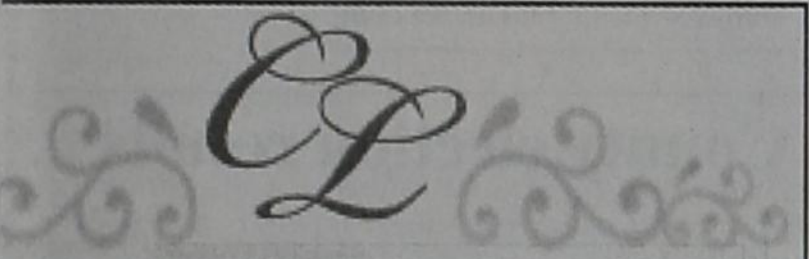

Honest examination of data in honor of President John F. Kennedy

On November 22, 1963, United States President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was assassinated at 12:30 p.m., while his motorcade was on the way toward the Triple underpass in Dallas, Texas.

It still rings in the hearts of multiple generations of Americans. The government attorney prosecuted a case for President Kennedy's murder. there are a number of books that follow the Warren Commission's conclusion. In the nearly 53 years since "they" killed our beloved President, it is fascinating to learn about the various individuals who are still on the trail of the assassins.

What can be learned from the Abraham Zapruder film?

It has clearly been tampered with, the Abraham Zapruder film provides a great deal of information. As the President's car passes behind the sign, Kennedy can be seen waving. Shortly thereafter he is seen with his arms and hands close to his neck, after which he is seen from behind the sign. The first shots that hit Kennedy occurred during that short period of time.

Kennedy is seen being pushed slightly forward and up, and possible shots into his back.

During the same time period, Governor John Connally was shot in the back. Mr. Connally recalled being hit by multiple bullets.

Connally turned toward Kennedy, and started taking shots. Kennedy's wife, Jackie, can be seen looking toward her husband while his hands were close to his neck, with his elbows tucked under each side. Jackie then placed her right arm under

her husband's left arm, and braced his left arm with her left hand. While continuing to hold her husband in an upright position, Jackie first leaned close to her husband as if to be saying something to him, then turned her face and eyes toward the front and to the right for a brief moment, then turned her face and eyes back toward her husband before he was struck in the head by the fatal shot.

It is interesting to note how the two first ladies handled their husbands. Ms. Connally immediately used herself to cover her husband while he was in her lap, while Ms. Kennedy supported her husband in an upright position.

After her husband was shot in the head, Jackie can be seen immediately climbing on to the trunk of the car while her husband is sinking down into the seat. One common theory is that Jackie was trying to pick up a piece of Kennedy's brain matter. But a close review of the film turns-up no hint of matter on the trunk of the car. Jackie appears to be attempting to move over the trunk and toward the back. After the President was shot in the head, the First Lady's Secret Service agent, Clint Hill, started running from the security car to the back of the President's car and drew her back into the seat. He then positioned himself over the seat for her protection.

Movement of the President's car

Another important piece of information revealed in the Zapruder film is the movement of the President's car during the shots.

The President's car was driven by Secret Service agent William Greer.

The Zapruder film reveals that Mr. Zapruder was panning with the general speed of the President's car. During the brief time period leading to the fatal head-shot, the panning speed slowed down significantly. In other words, all stationary things and people outside of the car appears to slow down while crossing from right to left in the frame. This is an indication that the President's car was decelerating during the time that shots were being fired into the car.

Another amateur film was taken by Marie Muchmore. Her film shows a good view from behind, and to the left of the President's car, during the time leading to the fatal head-shot. The Muchmore film shows the brake lights shining for a brief moment just before the shot to the President's head.

The Zapruder and Muchmore films are photographic evidence proving that the driver of the President's car engaged the brakes and slowed the car to a near stop just prior to the shot that hit the President's head.

It must be presumed that the President's Secret Service detail are highly trained and prepared to protect the President in a split second and without hesitation. This means the driver would have been well-trained to immediately accelerate when the first shots were fired. Thus, there would have been enough evidence to investigate and possibly prosecute Mr. Greer for accessory to the murder of President John F. Kennedy. Plus an investigator could have followed the trail of command to pinpoint the name of the person who initiated the order to slow the car down while bullets were flying in the car.

Secret Service pulled off the President's car

This investigation might include questioning the Secret Service agents who were seen in a newsreel being ordered off the President's car while leaving the airport for the parade.

The website jfk.lancer.com/LNE/limo.html includes quotes from President Kennedy's secret service agents, adamantly denying all allegations that the President ordered the agents off his car, and ordered the bubble-top to be removed. All the agents are quoted as agreeing that the President was always cooperative with them, and never ordered them to do or not do anything.

The Lancer website includes a long list of protocol violations by the secret service, leading to the President's murder. The website includes a description of the incident when agent Henry J. Rybka was ordered off the President's car by shift leader and commander Emory P. Roberts. The newsreel shows Rybka using body language that clearly indicates he was confused and did not agree to being pulled off the car.

How the President's head responded to the bullet

The Muchmore and Zapruder films show the President being shot in the head. Both films show the President's head being thrown backward and to the left. Both films also show something causing the front right side of his head to open up with matter blowing out in a frontal direction.

The doctors who examined the President at Parkland Hospital later spoke of seeing an entry wound in the front right side of Kennedy's head, and a large gaping exit wound in the backside of his head. One way to cause the frontal entry wound to be opened up wider could be with a frangible bullet that shatters into tiny pieces on impact. Otherwise, we must not rule out the possibility of significant editing of the film.

Origin of the head-shot

Any professional investigator should have been able to identify the general location of the shooter, by starting with a detailed examination of how Kennedy's head responded to the shot.

Considering the film footage and eye witness reports of a large number of people running up the grassy knoll toward the railroad yard after the head-shot; and considering the way Kennedy's head responded to the shot; it is reasonable to investigate the possibility of shots coming from the area of the grassy knoll and/or behind the picket fence in railroad yard.

Opened umbrella

The Zapruder film reveals a black umbrella opening up while the President's car was passing behind the sign. The "umbrella man" was standing on the other side of the sign from Mr. Zapruder's position.

The Malcomb Couch film includes a frontal view of the "umbrella man." With some brightness and contrast adjustments utilizing Adobe Photoshop, the man appears to be wearing a priestly robe, similar to the appearance of a Rabbi. The front right side of his hair can be seen below the umbrella, and appears to be combed back. The man's eyebrows appear to be thick and slightly silver in color. His nose seems to take on an aquiline shape as it extends out and down to a point.

In his book, "The Secret Team," Prouty emphasized that the security detail for all Presidential events and parades, are highly trained to make sure no one is opening an umbrella. He further explained that special black operations, at times, utilize umbrellas.

Altgens photo

Associated Press photographer, James Altgens, took a photo of the President's car during the time that Kennedy's hands were close to his neck, with his elbows out to each side. Kennedy can be seen through the front windshield. Ms. Kennedy's left hand is holding the midsection of her husband's outside forearm. Governor Connally can be seen turning his head and body around to his left side, and looking toward the back.

A great deal of attention has been focused on whether Lee Oswald

is shown at back on the steps of the School Book Depository. Yet little attention has been given to other important details.

The photo on display at the 6th Floor Museum, located in what was formerly the Depository building, does not include Vice President Johnson's security detail car in the background. The photo on display is cropped!

The uncropped image reveals the doors of Johnson's security car opening and someone is beginning to exit. This is important because it shows the fast response of Johnson's security detail, and it reveals they heard shots fired while inside the car.

Not cropped from the photo, is a person seen on the fire escape of the old Dal-Tex Building at back. In the Muchmore film, the person can be seen watching the motorcade while moving on Houston Street. In the Altgens photo, the person appears to be slumping or leaning over the outside railing with arms hanging down over the railing.

A close study of the darkly shadowed area inside one of the windows of the Dal-Tex building reveals something of interest.

The window in question is on the second floor, shown just below the "slumping man." The window is currently part of an office for the 6th Floor Museum.

With some editing of brightness, the scene inside the window reveals two men and a gun barrel attached to a barrel mount, all located in the area right of the middle window frame.

One young man can be seen close to his right side of the window, with his right elbow leaning close to the windowsill, and his right hand either covering his mouth or holding something like a single or double lens scope or binoculars. The windowsill blocks the view below his chest. The binoculars are shown slightly pushed away from his eyes, as he can be seen looking slightly toward the center of Dealey Plaza.

The same man appears to have clean-cut darkly grayish shade of hair in the black & white photo, with a piece of hair dropping down over the center of his forehead. The young man appeared to have a distinct callick on the left-front side of his hair. He appears to be wearing a grayish shade of lightweight jacket with a black T-shirt underneath.

Shown in the photo, to the right of the above-mentioned man, is a gun barrel sticking out over the windowsill. The barrel appears to be attached to a barrel mount. The legs of the mount are shown sitting on the windowsill. The barrel mount includes a rectangular and slightly rounded piece around the barrel. The mount legs are not straight, but are curved out and then down, with another curve out for the feet of the mount.

The barrel appears to be pointing slightly upward and generally turned in the direction of the space between the President's car and the front steps of the building, possibly indicating shots were already fired prior to the photo being taken.

Behind the barrel and mount, is the right arm and shoulder of a person standing approximately three feet back from the window. One of the vertical fire escape beams blocks the view of this person. Based on the bulked muscular appearance of the arm, the person may be a man. He does not appear to be in a shooting position, but standing slightly back from the rifle.

This particular Altgens photo is packed with information for a thorough investigation into the murder of President John F. Kennedy. Was the man with bulked muscles a "shooter?" Was the young man close to the window the "spotter" for the "shooter?"

This analysis utilized a digital photo taken of a print with a low-end digital camera. Imagine what might be learned with a high-resolution image of the original negative or a high quality print. What details might come out with the use of high-tech image editing software, compared to the Photoshop software used for this analysis?

Possible shooter behind picket fence atop grassy knoll

The Muchmore file shows the picket fence under the trees, in the background. Certain private researchers have analyzed the picket fence area and discovered the shape of a man holding a rifle over the fence, with a badge on his shirt. This man is commonly referred to as the "Badgeman." This raises some questions for additional research. If the researchers were correct that a shooter is standing behind the fence with a rifle; and if the shooter is wearing a badge; then was this man pretending to be a police officer in the crowd? Was he one of the police officers seen escorting the three "Tramps?"

Jerry Kroth's book, "Coup d'etat: The assassination of John F. Kennedy," details research into the three "Tramps." The researchers compared the photos of the Tramps with photos of the CIA agents involved in the Nixon Watergate scandal. They noted a striking similarity between two of the Tramps and CIA agents E. Howard Hunt and Frank Sturgis, both of whom were alleged to have been involved in military special operations and the training of Cuban rebels.

The "Tramps" were allegedly found in a railroad train car following the assassination.

Recall Prouty's book stating that a man shown passing the Tramps in the opposite direction may have been General Edward G. Lansdale, who ran many black operations around the world.

Surviving shooters or accomplices?

Given the possibility that the assassination of President Kennedy was a military operation, is it possible that the younger accomplices and shooters are still alive today?

Did the planners recruit young and talented military intelligence personnel?

Are they enjoying advancements to high-level positions in the federal government?

Is it possible they are the managers and supervisors for modern day special operations on American soil?

Maybe there is a whole new generation of operatives assigned to monitor and protect certain key high-profile individuals who are still alive today, and were associated in some way with the assassination.

Where did the shooters and accomplices hide after the 1963 job? Assuming they were paid lucratively, how did they invest their new-found wealth?

One possibility to consider is some of them may have moved to the least obvious place - next door in adjacent counties from Dallas; or even settled down in Dallas.

They could have used their wealth to invest in property and development, prompting a sudden increase in development and population growth. A good investigator could research the area counties to note sudden increases in development and growth during five to ten years after 1963.

The next article will examine later high profile incidents to ascertain if the military and CIA apparatus has continued, over the years, to run special operations on American soil. We will consider whether later incidents included the same signature left by the operatives involved in the Kennedy assassination.

Rockwall Yellowjackets takes Bi-District in 51-41 win over Montgomery

The Montgomery High School Bears traveled from their home state, just north of Houston, to ultimately face a 51-41 Bi-District round loss to the Rockwall Yellowjackets, Sat. Nov. 12, 2016, at Wilkerson-Sanders Stadium in Rockwall.

The Yellowjackets (Overall 6-5, District 11-6A 5-2), took the lead during the first drive of the game with a Cole Talley Field Goal from the 12 Yard Line.

The Bears stormed back with a 4-minute drive, resulting in a Touch Down from the 22 YL off a screen pass from Bears Quarter Back Jordan Hood to secondary QB Caleb Campbell, who then through the TD pass to Wide Receiver Trayveon Franklin.

The TD was set up by a Fake Punt in which Campbell took the ball to the 22 YL.

Rockwall answered with a 1-minute drive, ending with a Matt Jones (Sr) pass up the middle to Sam Crawford (Sr), putting the Jackets on top 10-7 with 2:35 left in the first quarter.

After the Yellowjackets defense forced a Bears punt from Montgomery's 40 YL, the Jackets followed-up with another TD drive the ended with a pass from Jones to Cameron Crayton (Jr) in the left side of the end zone for a 17-7 lead.

After Montgomery answered with a TD to push closer to a lead, the Jackets pushed back from their own 45 YL with a drive to the 12 YL, from where AJ Blacknall (Sr) evaded tacklers and followed

Rockwall blockers into the end zone, pushing the lead to 23-14.

The evenly matched Bears answered by taking advantage of a Yellowjackets Pass Interference penalty, by scoring off a Hood keeper from the 2 YL with :39 in the first half of play.

The Bears started the second half with a drive that could not resist the Rockwall defense, resulting in a punt from their own 41 YL. After the Yellowjackets were unable to answer with a TD, Montgomery pressed forward with about a 4-minute drive and a TD by the Bears Alex Nunn. The drive was helped by a Yellowjackets Face Mask penalty that landed the Bears on Rockwall's 19 YL.

Montgomery held the 23-28 into the fourth quarter, until Rockwall pushed ahead from the Bears 12 YL with a double pass play, resulting in a pass to Cole Talley for the TD with 9:48 left in the game.

Rockwall secured a stronger position with a successful outside kick, and a diving catch by their own Drew Gladney (Jr), setting up Rockwall from Montgomery's 47 YL.

The Yellowjackets capitalized on Gladney's catch by driving to the 1 YL, setting up a Blacknall TD, to increase the lead to 44-35 with 7:14 left in the game.

During the next drive, the Montgomery Head Coach John Bolfin experienced a break down in discipline by refusing to leave the field while protesting the referee. The 15-yard penalty forced the Bears to punt.

During the next drive, a personal foul penalty on Montgomery put Rockwall on the Bears 8 YL, and a TD pass from Jones to Rakow (Sr), for a 51-35 lead with about 2 minutes left on the clock.

The Bears answered with a quick drive resulting in a TD 2-point conversion with :48 left on the clock. The drive was due to the injury of Montgomery's Jody Miller, who was transported to a hospital by Rockwall County EMS. Miller was seen wearing a special brace on his left arm.

With the 51-41 win, the Yellowjackets advance to the UIL round of playoffs against Coppell (Overall 9-2, District 9-6A 1:00 p.m., Sat. Nov. 19, at Allen Eagle Stadium in Allen, Texas).

Coppell lost to Dallas Jesuit 41-10 in District play.

Head Coach Rodney Webb expressed pride in the Yellowjackets for their overall performance throughout the game. This is the consecutive year the team has advanced to the Area round of playoffs. He explained that scouts attended Coppell's 27-20 Bi-District game against Rowlett, and the team would spend the week studying preparing for the game against Coppell.
