City of Rockwall initiates new recycling program, services and fees change

Rockwall will step up its commitment to citywide recycling with the use f wheeled, 96-gallon curbside recycling carts as the result of a 5-1-1 city ouncil vote Monday night.

A newly-proposed waste agreement with Republic Services calls for resitential garbage pickup to drop from twice weekly to once weekly, for recyling pickup every other week and for the sanitation service rate to increase 1.36 per month.

Commercial and industrial sanitation rates will increase 5 percent under he plan.

One lidded recycle cart will be provided per household. If requested, a secind recycle cart will be delivered. No sorting of recyclables is required for the single stream" carts, which hold all allowed recyclables together. The carts eplace current smaller bins that residents carry to curb or alley.

The City of Rockwall also will provide each household with one 96-gallon olling cart for garbage. Additional garbage carts may be requested at a cost of \$7 per month.

The dissenting vote on the council came from David Sweet, who saw the nove as "an increase in rates and a decrease in service," he said.

Although encouraged to see survey results showing that 63 percent of resilents recycle, he said, "There's no room at my house to store one cart, let lone two."

Councilmember Mark Russo, who was absent during Republic's presentaion to council, abstained from voting. He and Glen Farris serve on the coun-

cil's Green Subcommittee and have had several meetings with Republic about changes to recycling services.

"There is no question that recycling is important for now and for the future," Farris said. "I think it's the right thing to do."

He made the motion to direct city staff to develop a plan of action to implement the new recycling program.

Councilmember Matthew Scott said although he doesn't currently recycle, he is willing for his household to do so. With recyclables out of the garbage volume, he said, a 96-gallon container picked up once per week should be sufficient for his family of five.

The cost of the carts will be paid by the \$1.36 monthly rate increase, although the more than 1,000 customers now renting carts from the city for \$3.50 per month actually will realize a savings.

The proposed recycling is not mandatory, but Republic requested the city deliver each household a recycle cart and ask residents to try the program for 120 days.

The current timetable calls for May delivery of the carts to Rockwall residents.

Brenda Lalonde, municipal marketing manager for Republic, told council they have recorded "at least a 50 percent increase in recycling in every city" where they have utilized the single-stream carts. That increase was without the incentives offered through RecycleBank, she said.

By registering and participating in the RecycleBank program, Rockwall residents may earn points to spend at local and national retailers or to donate to local schools, explained Reid Donaldson, who made the presentation to city council. A household can earn up to \$20 per month, according to Republic's studies.

Based on results from other cities, he said, "A single household can donate \$150 per year to the school of their choice by doing nothing more than setting out their recyclables each week."

Donaldson explained that RFID chips in the handles of the carts track recycling participation by address. The city has not yet committed to whether RecycleBank total tonnage points will be distributed to residents by pickup route or citywide.

Registered residents are awarded points, which can be viewed and awarded by phone or computer. The website also shows other ways to earn RecycleBank points and provides a cost-free means to recycle "e-waste" such as cell phones and other electronics. The site also enables registrants to "track their environmental footprint," Donaldson said.

He noted to council that use of the carts prevents trash and recyclables from

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Mark Poindexter recognized by Heath for military service

U.S. Coast Guard Reservist Petty Officer 2nd Class Mark "Andrew" Poindexter II was welcomed home from active military duty Dec. 21 by members of the Heath City Council.

Poindexter is an officer with the Heath Department of Public Safety and son of Rockwall Fire Chief Mark Poindexter, a former Heath police officer. He recently completed his nine-month deployment to JFT Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

During his tour of duty, Poindexter received multiple awards, including a Commandant's Letter of Commendation, Coast Guard Presidential Unit Citation, Coast Guard Unit Commendation Award, Coast Guard Reserve Good Conduct, National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expedentiary Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, Humanitarian Service Medal, Coast Guard Overseas Ribbon w/Mobilization Device, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Coast Guard Rifle Expert Medal and Coast Guard Pistol Expert Medal.

After accepting the city's recognition, Poindexter presented numerous awards to the council and staff. These awards came from the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve. The City of Heath, council members, City Manager Ed Thatcher and Heath DPS Chief Terry Garrett and his officers all received the ESGR's Patriot Award, which recognizes employers who support a strong National Guard and Reserve force. Garrett and the DPS also received the Above and Beyond Award, given to employers whose support exceeds legal requirements in granting leave and providing support for military duty by employees.

"I am privileged to work for the City of Heath and thankful for the friends and family in my life," Poindexter said in a news release issued by the city. "All the steps different people took to help out while I was away made climbing the mountain of being deployed that much easier."

Poindexter said Garrett was supportive prior to his deployment, and fellow DPS officers covered his shifts while he was away and helped take care of

"I never imagined that so many things could break while I was away," Poindexter said, "but the guys took care of everything."

Council members amended staffing policies that secured Poindexter's position and salary while he was away. These policies remain in place should other employees face military deployment.

Fime to rein in federal spending

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The debate in Congress over the extension of the Bush tax cuts has cured the issue of government spending. After all, it is because mbers of Congress love to spend money that isn't theirs that we ed" an income tax to begin with.

Government spending is out of control. The federal budget is fast proaching \$4 trillion. The budget deficit is over a trillion dollars. The ional debt will soon top \$14 trillion, as it rises by billions of dollars h day.

This crisis is not just because the Democrats are in power. Under Bush presidency for eight years and a mostly Republican Congress six of those years a \$150 billion surplus in 2001 turned into a \$1 lion deficit in 2008. The federal budget increased by over \$1 trillion. e national debt doubled. And during the last six years of the Clinton sidency, it was the Republicans that controlled both the House and Senate.

ng The fact that the Republicans recently regained control of the ork is to be regress won't mean anything when it comes to reining in government to the provide ending since in their "Pledge to America" the Republicans promise 43rd Legis "protect our entitlement programs for seniors and future generations" as and subset 1 only call for a reduction in government spending to the level it was erning the ring the Bush presidency.

The only way to rein in government spending is by the wholesale elimination of departments, agencies, commissions, administrations, corporations, councils, boards, and bureaus with all of their programs and personnel.

Of the sixteen executive branch Cabinet-level departments, a limited Constitutional case could be made only for the departments of State, Treasury, Justice, and Defense. Any legitimate operations of the Departments of Homeland Security and Veterans Affairs could be subsumed under the Department of Defense. This means that the functions and bureaucracies of the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Education, Energy, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Interior, Labor, and Transportation should be eliminated in their entirety. The original four departments (Justice, State, Treasury, and War) might conceivably serve some useful purpose - but only if they were scaled down considerably, and especially the Defense Department, which spends most of its budget on empire and offense.

Next to go would have to be the alphabet soup of government agencies like the SEC, DEA, FEMA, FTC, FCC, OSHA, EPA, BATF, NASA, FDA, EEOC, LSC, TVA, NEA, FHA, NEH, CPB, SBA, NIH, NLRB, USAID, and NTSB.

This means no more funding for income redistribution schemes like Medicare, Medicaid, Social Security, SCHIP, food stamps, WIC, TANF, housing subsidies, foreign aid, refundable tax credits, Head Start, the National School Lunch Program, unemployment benefits, and farm subsidizes.

When Congress appropriated \$15,000 to assist some French refugees Congressman Madison objected, saying: "I cannot undertake to lay my finger on that article of the Constitution which granted a right to Congress of expending, on objects of benevolence, the money of their constituents."

President Cleveland vetoed a bill passed by Congress to provide financial assistance to farmers suffering from a drought. In his veto message Cleveland stated:

I can find no warrant for such an appropriation in the Constitution, and I do not believe that the power and duty of the general government ought to be extended to the relief of individual suffering which is in no manner properly related to the public service or benefit. A prevalent tendency to disregard the limited mission of this power and duty should, I think, be steadfastly resisted, to the end that the lesson should be constantly enforced that, though the people support the government, the government should not support the people.

And Congressman Crockett responded to a congressional attempt to help the widow of a naval officer:

I will not go into an argument to prove that Congress has no power to appropriate this money as an act of charity. Every member upon this floor knows it. We have the right, as individuals, to give away as much of our own money as we please in charity; but as members of Congress we have no right so to appropriate a dollar of the public money.

Just a cursory reading of article I, section 8, of the Constitution, where

This also means no more funding for science, education, medical research, or climate change.

Oh, and there should be no office of surgeon general or drug czar, AIDS czar, or faith-based czar.

In other words, strictly limit government spending to only what is constitutionally authorized - just like James Madison, Grover Cleveland, and Davy Crockett believed.

the powers of Congress are enumerated, is enough to see that Madison. Cleveland, and Crockett hold the solution to the problem and every member of Congress that defends the welfare/warfare state - that is. every member of Congress except Ron Paul - is part of the problem.

Government spending must be reined in, by dismantling the illegitimate functions of the federal government. It is possible, it is necessary, and it is time.

far too many Americans truly believe that tax cuts represent a ernment giveaway, indistinguishable from an outright subsidy or itlement payment. To combat this mindset, we need to be clear with language.

A subsidy, properly understood, occurs when government takes tax dollars and gives them to favored individuals, companies, or industries. A tax cut, by contrast, simply means government takes less from an individual, company, or industry. When government takes less from you, it has not given you anything; it merely has harmed you less. This is the critical distinction that has been lost in the endless, tired debate about tax policy.

Of course the bill passed last week did contain some actual spending, mostly in the form of an extension of unemployment benefits for another 13 months. The total spending in the bill amounted to about \$60 billion. But the tax savings in the bill, meaning the amount of money that will remain in the hands of taxpayers rather than being sent to Washington, is approximately \$850 billion. So while a clean tax bill certainly would have been preferable, the tax relief it contains is significant. It means \$850 billion will be spent, saved, or invested by American citizens rather than being sent into the black hole known as the federal treasury.

As always, they could not distinguish between government giving and government taking away. The American people already pay plenty in federal taxes; the deficit is the result of a spending problem, not a revenue problem

Had the bill not passed, millions of Americans would have seen their paychecks shrink in January due to increased tax withholding. That is the plain and simple truth, and that is why I voted for the bill.



Go around the Metroplex during the week between Christmas and New Year's Day and you can find a number of venues, small high school gyms and arenas seating thousands, with basketballs bouncing almost from daybreak to well into the evening.

Go to the airport and you can see teams that have flown in from other states - even other countries - for the competition here.

It's not a come-lately thing either. The Dallas ISD Coca-Cola Invitational Tournament, which this year included the Rockwall-Heath girls among its 64 teams, is in its 71st year. Duncanville's Sandra Meadows Classic - where Rockwall joined girls' teams from across Texas as well as Arkansas, Maryland and Alaska - has been going on for more than half a century.

Seven Rockwall County teams took part in these holiday festivities. In addition to the RHHS and RHS girls, Royse City's girls took part in a quaint setting at the Kaufman Tournament.

The Royse City boys were part of Plano's Avery Air Invitational, whose field included a team from Australia. Other Rockwall County boys' teams in action were Rockwall, at the Pirate/Wrangler Classic in Mesquite; Rockwall-Heath, at the Tommy Thomas Cougar Classic in The Colony, and Rockwall Christian, at the Arlington Oakridge Invitational.

The first players among the seven local teams to take the court were the Rockwall-Heath girls. Their 10:30 a.m. matchup Monday was against powerful Dallas Lincoln, and it earned the Lady Hawks a quick trip to the consolation bracket for another game that afternoon.

Both of those games were at Cobb Field House at Fair Park. It's an aging, dimly lit arena with wooden-bench seating, which gives it an air of history and a feel of being lived in. A hard-core group of parents and friends waited out the time between the two games to support the Lady Hawks.

Over at Mesquite Poteet's more modern gym, Rockwall and West Mesquite's boys tipped off a few minutes before the scheduled noon start. The game literally went down to the wire. Despite one of their best efforts this season, the Yellowjackets lost on a last-second basket. They were supported by a cheering section at least as big as that for the hometown team.

Between that game and the Lady Hawks' 3 p.m. start, you would have had time to slip over to Ellis Davis Field House - a much larger, much newer and fancier DISD facility - to see some of the boys' bracket in the Coca-Cola Tournament

You would have seen two of that tournament's less glamorous teams, Dallas Conrad and El Paso Austin, but you would have seen some of the big players the tournament always seems to draw. Conrad featured the 6-foot-6 Damion Clemens and 6-5 Kadavion Henderson, and Austin had 6-6 sophomore Oliver Guerrero.

Four years ago at Ellis Davis Field House, Rockwall held its own for half of its game against Mesquite Horn and 6-7 Quincy Acy, who's now starring for nationally ranked Baylor.

Part of these tournaments' allure is that you don't really know what you might see. For example, while waiting in the stands for the Rockwall-Heath boys' 7 p.m. second game Monday at The Colony, you could have seen the preceding game end with a shot from midcourt for a one-point victory.

Just four of our county's teams played Monday. They were all back in action Tuesday, along with the Rockwall and Royse City girls and RCA boys, for more excitement and more memories.

Do yourself a favor. Save this column for next year as a reminder to get yourse out to some of these tournament games.


However, there have been constants in RC's game.
