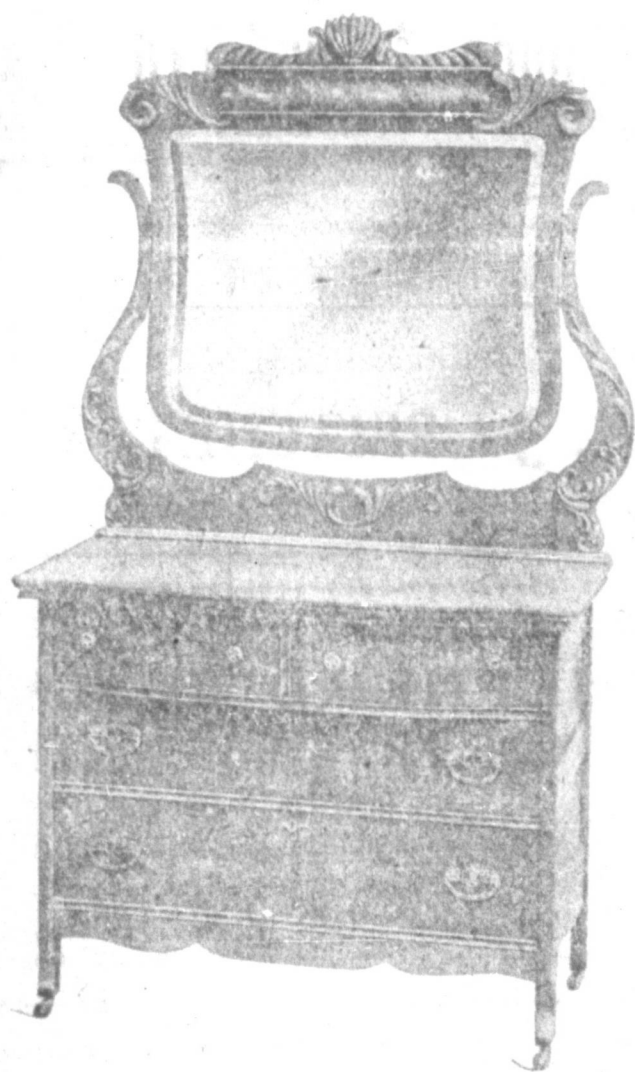

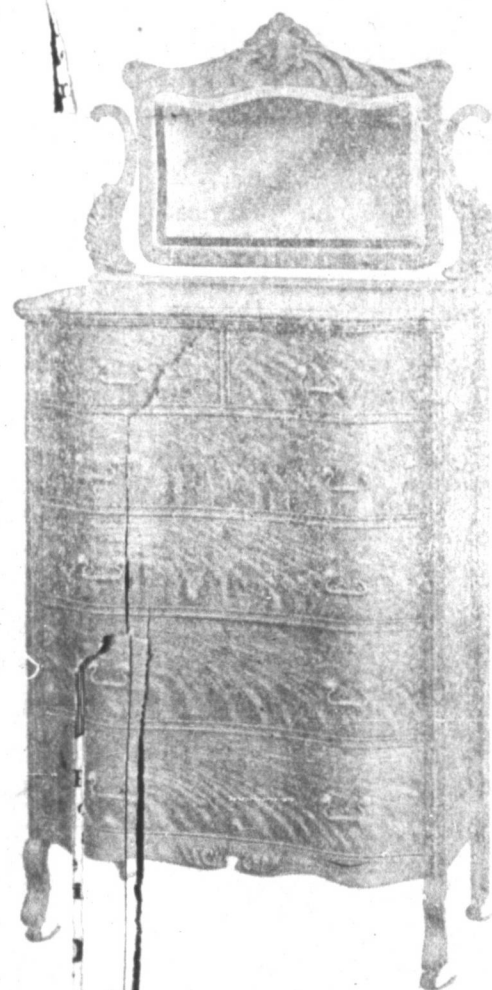

CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

The City Council met in regular session Tuesday night, July 9, 1907, Mayor Smith presiding and all the aldermen present except Johnson.

Mayor Smith called the Council's attention to a defect in the recent work of the city board of equalization, and stated that the defect should be remedied. The council thereupon amended the previous ordinance creating and fixing the time of meeting of said board, and in order to leave no doubt as to the legality of the work of the board, they will meet again on Monday, July 15th.

The following claims were allowed and warrants ordered issued for the amounts:

J. V. Clark, for unloading sewer pipe.....\$4.00
Bill of H. W. Stoneham for surveying and platting the city limits of Colorado, amounting to \$200, was referred to claims and accounts committee for adjustment.

Caim of P. M. Weston for guarding small-pox patients was refused, and claimant referred to the county.

Bill of Victor Dzedziuch for work on streets and culverts, was refused until contract is complied with.

Petition of John Hayes to erect awning in front of his barber shop, granted.

Council passed an order requiring city treasurer to register all warrants issued against the city and pay them in accordance with their number. That is to say that the first warrants registered be paid first. That is as soon as the treasury is replenished.
Moved, seconded and carried that city tax collector keep a registration book and register the name and place of business of every occupation tax payer.

Tax collector also authorized to purchase a seal to be used in issuing tax receipts.

Moved and seconded that the Progressive Club be granted permission to erect a public watering trough on east side of Pine Street and south of Second street was carried unanimously.

Council passed an ordinance prohibiting the throwing of any base ball on or across any public street or alley. This practice was getting to be a nuisance, and citizens were asking for relief.

The crowd began to arrive early and by 10 o'clock the church was running over and the crowd spreading out on the ground. The crowd was estimated at from 500 to 800, and the latter estimate would come nearer the number who were there than the former.

The singing continued from about 10 till 5, with an hour and a half intermission for dinner—and it was such a dinner as has made the good people of Cuthbert famous as cooks and prodigal providers.

An address was made by Prof. Horace Holly, pertinent to the occasion. It was a matter of regret that Prof. Jesse Bullock, who was to have responded to the address of welcome, could not be present, but Judge A. J. Coe made a happy substitute however. There was not a discord in the perfect harmony of the day, and everything was tinged with the spirit of fellowship and good will.

The next convention will meet at Union Chapel, and it is hoped as large crowd will be present as at Cuthbert last Sunday.

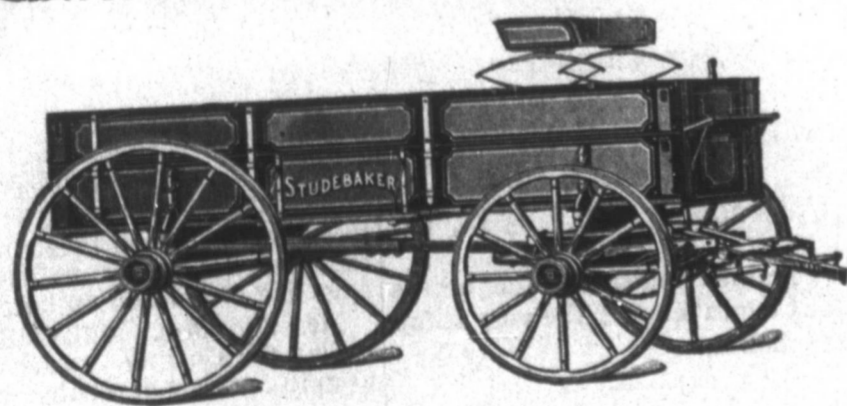
