

S OF THE REGULAR SESSION OF THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE OF TEXAS

A Session of Unusual and Arduous Labor.

The Most Important Platform Promises Are Enacted Into Laws.

Austin, Texas, April 13.-From January 8 till 2 p. m. yesterday the Thirtieth Legislature of Texas made laws and made history, and a resume of the work done shows much admirable questionable expedience.

There were 730 bills introduced in of liquor in local option districts. the House and 316 in the Senate, branches. Of this number there were month. about 500 local measures, which left something over 500 general bills to be considered, and out of this number approximately 135 were passed in both branches. These figures do not include the local bills, there being probably have passed at this session. Of all these bills passed by the Legislature labor measures. the Governor has so far approved only about one-third of them, not including the local measures.

The Governor had vetoed only one bill up to the time of adjournment of the Legislature. He will approve or veto the many measures which are now pending before him as fast as possible.

Of the eighteen platform demands eleven were passed finally and seven are still on the calendar. Among the platform demands which failed of passage were the famous Hogg amendments to the Constitution, one of which seeks to define insolvent cor-

The hardest fight made on any one measure was the Santa Fe merger act. The Governor had all along indicated that he would veto any consolidation bills which were passed at the present session of the Legislature, and he kept his word. He acted fairly, however, with the Legislature by unless such confession leads to evisending in his veto message in plenty of time for the law-makers to take action on it. The Legislature acted and, after a hard fought battle, the Industrial Arts. bill was passed in both branches over the executive veto by a margin of three votes in the House and just enough votes in the Senate.
