The chief city and county seat of Mitchell county is Colorado City, which is located on the Colorado river, upon the east bank of that stream in a fertile and productive valley. This little city having been the abode and headquarters for many years of the cow men of west Texas, the business portion was naturally well built, and today Colorado City has an almost solid business quarter of red brick. The houses were well and tastefully built, and would be an ornament to any town of much larger proportions.

It is incorporated and has a population of 4,000. It is claimed for it that it has more industries and resources than any other county seat in west Texas. It is on the Texas & Pacific railroad at its crossing of the Colorado river, and draws trade for a radius of at least 100 miles, and is the distributing point for ten counties. Among the industries may be mentioned a Commercial Club that is constantly looking after the welfare of the city and for new industries that may add to the prosperity of the inhabitants.—Cor. Fort Worth Telegram.

The number of tents used last year was trebled. More students are put into a room than formerly. Still every train bore applicants who had failed to secure rooms in advance. When 600 had been received into the college, President Harrington called a halt.

The men who live in them do not realize that, in thus uncomplainingly submitting to hardships in order to obtain an education, they are playing the parts of heroes. The tents however, are surprisingly comfortable.

This is an attraction that merits the hearty support of the people of Colorado. The equity in the receipts above actual expenses, will be used in defraying the expenses of the free Kindergarten.



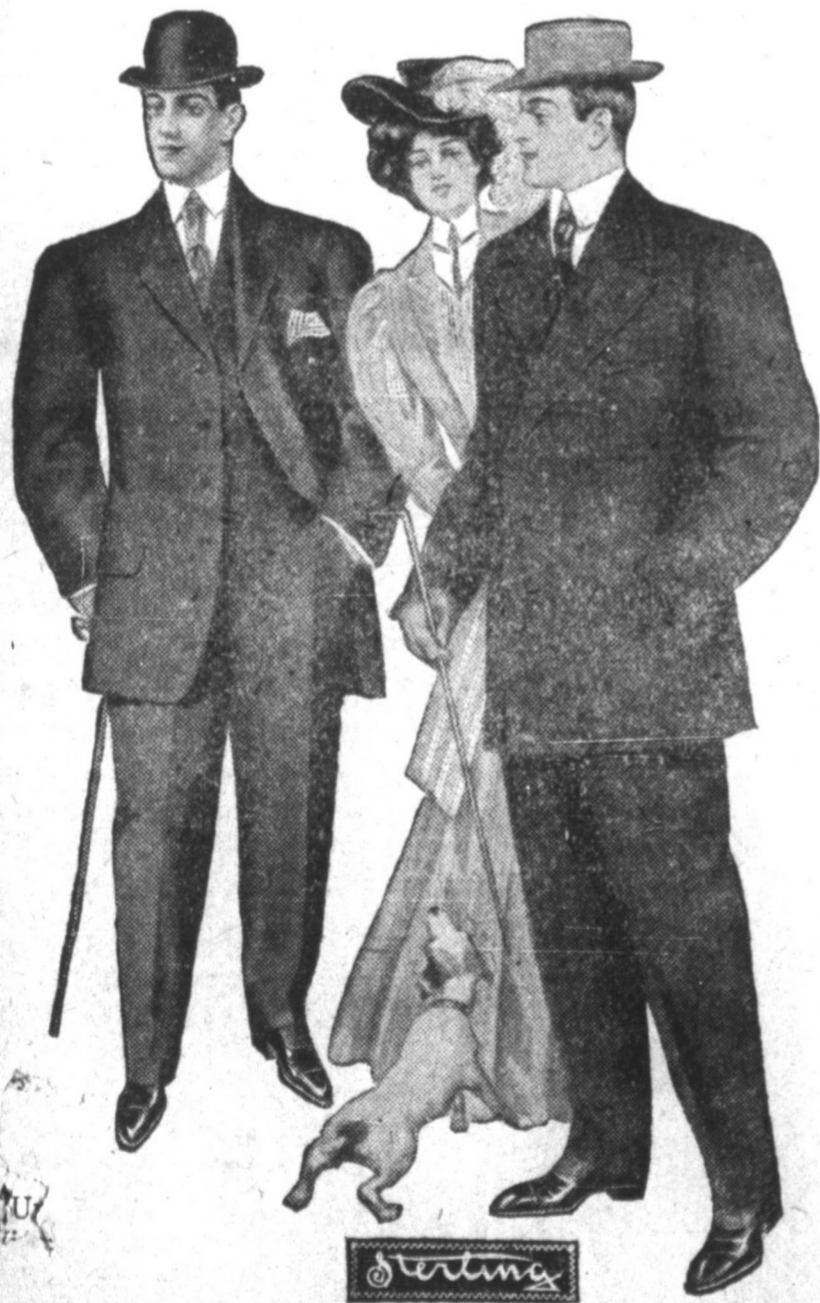

LET TEXAS MONEY BUILD TEXAS RAILROADS

Hundreds of communities in the big state of Texas are crying for railways and expressing surprise that capital does not hasten in to build them. There is good reason for the cry. Capital from without, "foreign capital," already has built about 13,000 miles of railways in this state, and yet nearly 70 of the 240 counties in Texas remain untouched by a railway track, and many others are barely reached by, or just about crossed at one corner, by a single road. Many county seats, some of considerable importance, still are 30, 40 or 50 miles from the nearest railway. In an eastern section of the state north and south railways jostle each other and compete eagerly for business at the principal points, and a few long lines stretch across the state from east to west. But the greater portion of the 266,000 square miles of Texas territory lies far from sight or sound of the locomotive. In spite of the overcrowding of lines in certain sections the railways average only about 4.6 miles to each 100 square miles, compared with over 21 miles in Illinois. There is room for 60,000 miles, where the total now is less than 13,000.

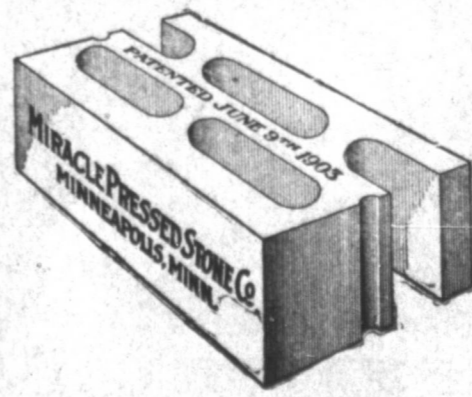

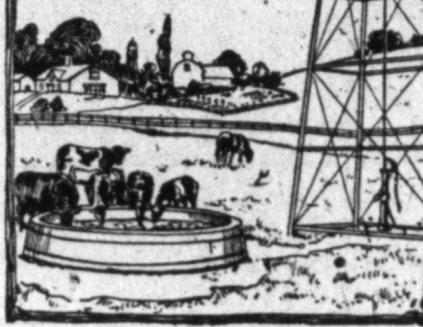

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado:

That Article 2 of the Ordinances of the City of Colorado passed and approved March 4th A. D. 1907, be amended to hereafter read as follows: The fire limits of the City of Colorado are hereby established and defined as follows: Beginning at the southwest corner of Block Forty-two (42) at the intersection of Pine Street and Main Street, thence north along the east line of Pine Street to the north-west corner of Block Thirty-one (31); thence east along the south line of Third Street to the north-east corner of Block Thirty-three (33); thence south along the west line of Elm Street one hundred and fifty (150) feet; thence east across Elm Street to the north-west corner of Lot (9) Block Thirty-four (34) thence east along the north line of Lot nine (9), Block Thirty-four (34) one hundred and forty (140) feet to the north-east corner of said Lot nine (9); thence south one hundred and fifty (150) feet to the south-east corner of Lot Seven (7) Block Thirty-four (34); thence south eighty (80) feet across Second street to the north-east corner of Lot eighteen (18) Block Thirty-nine (39); thence east one hundred and sixty (160) feet to the north-east corner of Lot One (1) Block Thirty-nine (39); thence south along the west line of Chestnut Street to the south-east corner of Block Thirty-nine (39); thence west along the north line of Main Street 1440 feet to the place of beginning; all of which said lots blocks and streets are laid down and designated in the official map of the City of Colorado as the same appears of record in the deed records of Mitchell county, Texas, and as same appears in Vol. 1, minutes of the City Council of the City of Colorado on page 84 thereof. Takes effect from and after its passage and publication.

JUST WHY IT WAS DONE

The banks of Taylor county
ave "put on the lid" and it may
be that some of their depositors
do not fully appreciate their
reasons for so doing.

To use plain language, the
reason may be given as follows:
At this season of the year these
banks have to keep large amounts
of money in the banks in Dallas
and other points nearer the com-
mercial centers, against which
they may draw drafts to pay for
the hundreds of thousands of
dollars worth of cotton bought
by the buyers in this county.
The banks in Dallas and Fort
Worth, in their turn, have had
to deposit millions of dollars in
New York banks, against which
they draw drafts, especially for
cotton which is shipped to for-
eign ports. When the scare
came in New York the banks
there locked up their vaults
against the Texas and other
southern banks and refused to
send out currency, or allow the
southern banks to withdraw their
deposits, hence the southern
banks had to refuse to allow the
local banks to withdraw their de-
posits and the local banks had
nothing left then but to follow
the same course. The result of
this policy will be that the local
banks will be able to pay out the
deposits in a few weeks instead
of closing their doors and turn-
ing their assets over to the
comptroller at Washington who
would hold up all payments six
months or a year, and which
process would cost many thou-
sands of dollars besides. In other
words the way in which to insure
the depositors their money in a
few weeks instead of a year or
more was to take the course they
did take.—Abilene Reporter.

WILL PLANT PEANUTS

A. S. Corbell, who lives seven
miles north of Loraine, came in
last Saturday and placed an ad
in The Record for seed peanuts.
Mr. Corbell says this year he had
2 acres in Tennessee red and
Jumbo nuts that yielded 65 bush-
els per acre and sold at \$1.75 per
bushel, giving him an income of
\$113.75 per acre. He had in 30
acres of the Spanish nuts that
yielded 40 bushels per acre, and
sold at 85 to 90 cents per bushel.
Mr. Corbell has threshed 700
bushels for his neighbors, and
says he will plant 100 acres in
nuts next year. He told us of a
renter in his neighborhood who
had 10 acres planted in nuts and
after paying rent and all ex-
penses, allowing himself good
wages, he had cleared \$20 per
acre.

Peanut hay is worth \$10 a ton,
and there is a big demand for the
nuts all the time. The oil ex-
pressed from the nuts is a val-
uable product, and there is a
good demand for the cake for
cattle feed. Colorado would be
a good factory point, and the
shiny land is ideal for peanut
culture. The crop enriches the
ground and requires compara-
tively little attention.

The Anson Reporter says:
"The peanut industry of Jones
county is being discussed in va-
rious sections, and the eyes of
the public are on this great crop,
which we might term an experi-
mental crop, yet it is proving a
blessed success, and another year
will find the farmers tributary
to Anson planting more peanuts
and less cotton.

"This year there were 3,000
acres planted in peanuts in the
Anson trade territory, and they
are yielding from 50 to 100 bush-
els per acre, and the prices paid
for what have been marketed so
far are from 85 cents to \$1.10
per bushel. In addition to this,
the vines make a very fine hay
and will sell readily at a good
price.

"In Sunday's edition of the
Fort Worth Telegram there was
a nice write-up of Jones county
peanuts, and also in Wednesday's
edition of last week, so you see
the little Spanish peanut, which
is destined to make the shiny
lands of Jones county both fam-
ous and valuable, are being heard
of everywhere in Texas, and we
fully expect another year to de-
velop greater things in this line.

"One man can cultivate and
harvest a much larger acreage
of peanuts than of cotton, and it
is an evident fact that the profit
is greater."

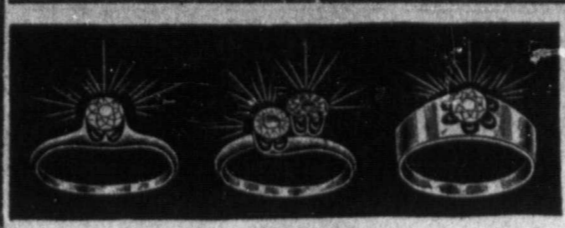

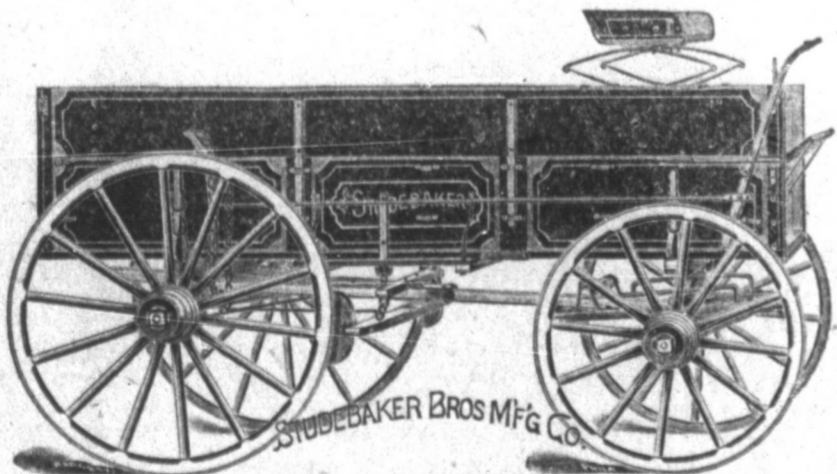

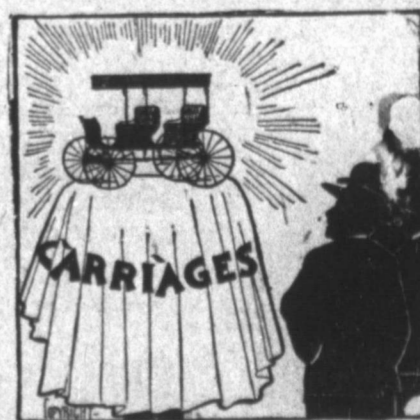
