Auto Runs Down Little Boy.

The only thing that occurred the day of the picnic to mar the complete rounding out of the day of pleasure, was the accidental running down of a nine or ten year-old boy by an automobile. The victim of the sad accident was Roy Bates, the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Bates, who live out on the divide northeast of Lorraine. He was crossing the street and running from one machine and stepped in front of another, which knocked him down and ran over him fracturing his leg below the knee.

Physicians were called and set the limb, after which he was taken to the Alamo Hotel, where he stayed until Sunday afternoon when he was taken home. The doctors say it is only a simple fracture and will soon heal.

It was almost a miracle that he was not killed. There soon was a rumor current among the crowd that several children had been killed, and by night the number had increased to eight. The Record wishes to say that this one accident was the only one, and for the size of the crowd, it was remarkable that only one casualty occurred. No drunken men were seen on the streets and not a single arrest was made during the day.

Ex-Ranger Gets in Trouble.

Mineral Wells, Tex., Aug. 8. — In a difficulty here this evening "Doc" Thomas, an ex-ranger, and until a few days ago a member of the local police force, was shot in the neck and slightly wounded by police officer Tobe Patton. Patton used a shotgun but shot high, most of the charge of buckshot going through Thomas' hat. The affair created intense excitement, half a dozen fist fights following in rapid succession, and for a time serious trouble seemed imminent. This was averted, however, by Sheriff Bob Peak, who, unarmed and unarmed, pushed his way through the mob of fighting, cursing men and arrested and disarmed the principals and half a dozen others.

COMMISSIONERS COURT NEWS.

The Court met on Monday morning in regular August term. All members of the Court were present; Judge Crockett presiding; Earl Morrison, Clerk.

The various county officers made their reports ending August 12th, 1907, all of which were approved.

Tax Collector Bird reported on occupation tax, etc.; Clerk Morrison on fines, jury fees, etc.; County Attorney Robertson on fines, judgments, etc.; county clerk report from finance ledger; J. P., E. N. Riden, Precinct No. 5; Fred Myer, precinct No. 1, reported on fines, judgments, etc. Samuel Gustine made his report as county treasurer. Erroneous assessment of B. D. Smith and J. H. Gregg was corrected.

H. W. Stoneham made oath and bond for county line surveys which was approved.

S. K. Gregory, J. E. Waldrop, R. B. Davis, et al, petition for road, which was granted; land to be donated, county furnish fence material, parties to build fence.

Permission granted J. I. Payne and Ben Hoan to change certain road.

A. J. Coe was granted the contract to repair and floor Morgan creek bridge.

The E. J. Hamnea road case vs the county, was compromised.

Ordered by the court that all persons buying anything for the county must have a written order from the county judge or some member of the court.

L. E. Lasseter granted permission to fix certain road near Westbrook.

The court granted the city council a certain room in court house to hold their meetings, provided it was satisfactory to the insurance companies.

G. F. Reeder was appointed Justice of the Peace in precinct 7 and time for holding his courts fixed at the 3rd Monday in each month at Cuthbert.

Accounts were allowed to the amount of \$2,752.20.

Court will adjourn Saturday.

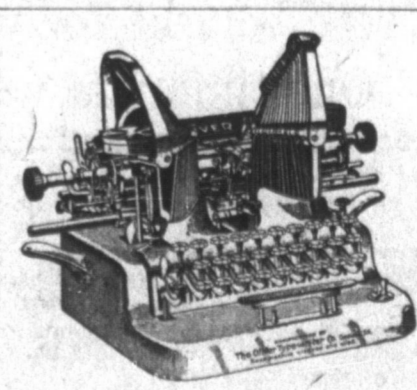

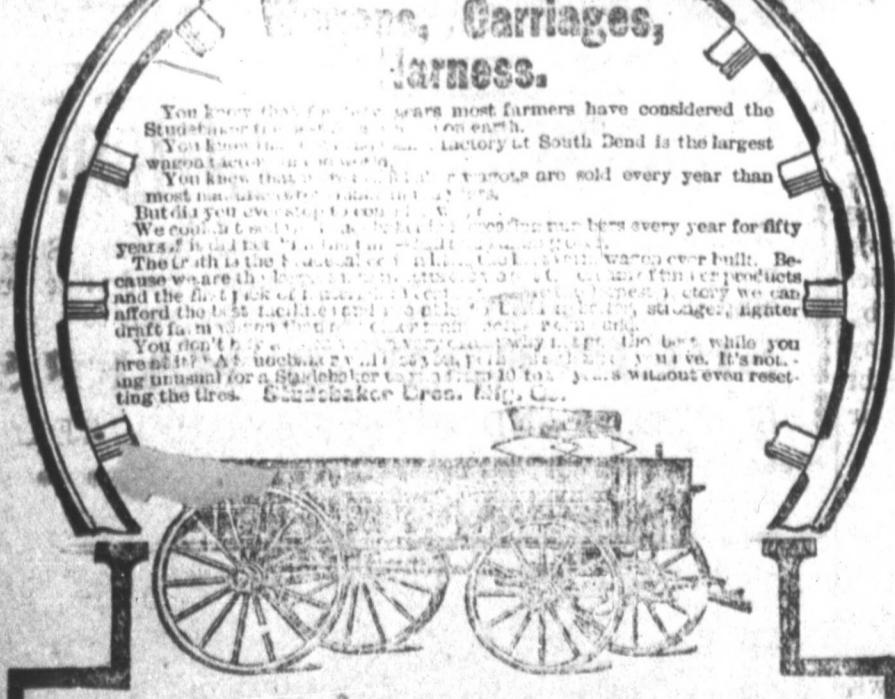
