Discussions rarely convince anyone; they serve only to make both sides more ingenious in the invention of new arguments.

The sudden hot weather during the past week, is supposed to have gotten its color from the inflamed tone of the discussion of the Frosty question.

The consensus of reports from east Texas is that the fruit crop was not injured by the recent cold snap. In many sections the corn is up and doing nicely.

Yes, it takes money to build side walks. But the property owner makes another good investment for his town and his property when he puts a walk down. If he is a good business man he will make the improvement.

The legislature should meet every ten years. As it is, it meets every two years for the purpose of terrifying the commercial interests and affrighting capital.—From speech by G. N. Aldridge, Chairman of Safe and Sane Legislation Convention.

"Home Trading Clubs" are the latest to offset the inroads made by the mail order houses upon the local trade. Each member obligates himself to buy nothing from the mail order houses, and the home merchant obligates himself to sell the same quality of goods as cheap as the mail order houses.

In the settling up of a new country, a large per cent of the money spent by the incoming farmers, goes out of the country never to return. Most of the land is owned by non-residents, who never re-invest their money in the country after once getting it out. The money spent for work stock, wagons, farm implements, and much of what the farmer consumes, goes out of the state never to return.

It is an abiding marvel how people who consent to be just a trifle less than saints, know so much about law breaking in general, and gambling, scarlet women and "boot-legging" in particular, when by their own declaration the only people who can know of these things are "those who are addicted" to them. The only hypothesis on which we can reconcile it is, that their preternatural scent for these things is but the outward expression of innate depravity. A different expression of the proverb, "Evil to him who evil thinks."

**BETTER KEEP HIM THERE**

There was but one weather bureau building authorized for Texas by Uncle Sam as the result of congressman Smith's work, and as usual, central west Texas 'copped' the prize. It is to cost \$15,000 and will be located at Abilene, 17 miles east of Merkel.—Merkel Mail.

Congressman Smith, like many others among the delegation from Texas, is ever looking out for the material interests of his constituents. He has been in the harness long enough to be worth far more to his district than he was as a new member, and this fact should be well considered. Anson is large enough to be eligible to a \$15,000 federal building; in fact Anson is eligible to receive anything good, and she will do so if she will pull.—Western Reporter.

And sure, Mike, that's the gospel truth. All else equal, a congressman's efficiency in serving his constituents, and particularly in securing federal aid for his district, is in direct ratio to the length of his time of service. A new man sent to Washington, knows but few, if any of his fellow-members; knows none of the committees; nothing of the "ropes" or short cuts of legislation, nor is any member under any sort of obligation to him for his help in putting through some local appropriation. In short, he is not an essential cog in the complex machinery of federal legislation—he is not on the inside, and no matter what his ability may be, he is practically impotent in getting aid for district.

But after he has been in congress a few terms, he knows all the ropes, all the short cuts to the "pork barrel," and is an essential cog in the 'appropriating' machine; while there is scarcely a member of the house who is not under obligation to him for his vote in securing an appropriation of a hundred or so thousand for a building, river improvement, or what not, all over the country. So it is, when our "old-timer" in congress wants a court house, post office or weather bureau building in his district, he calls on the others to reciprocate in kind, if not in degree.

Mr. Smith has now reached the flood-tide of his power for service and height of his influence in congress. No new man could possibly do as much for the district as he is doing. Then where is the sense or the policy in turning him down and sending even an experienced man in his stead; while to put a new and untried one in his place, were to our own mind, the sheerest folly. Smith is the man to keep in congress.

As a rule those who are "addicted" to the use of either hard or soft drinks, know infinitely less about the sale of it than the self-righteous ilk who never go about such places." They know it until it comes to a show-down, when all their inside information dissipates into thin air.

**NEW BAPTIST ASSOCIATION**

From the Western Light, we see that the Baptists of Scurry county are to meet in Snyder on Thursday before the fifth Sunday in this month for the purpose of organizing a new association. 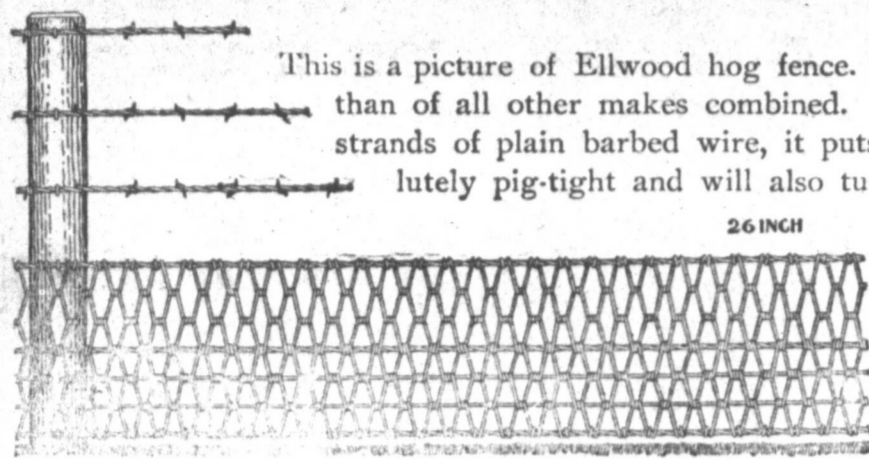

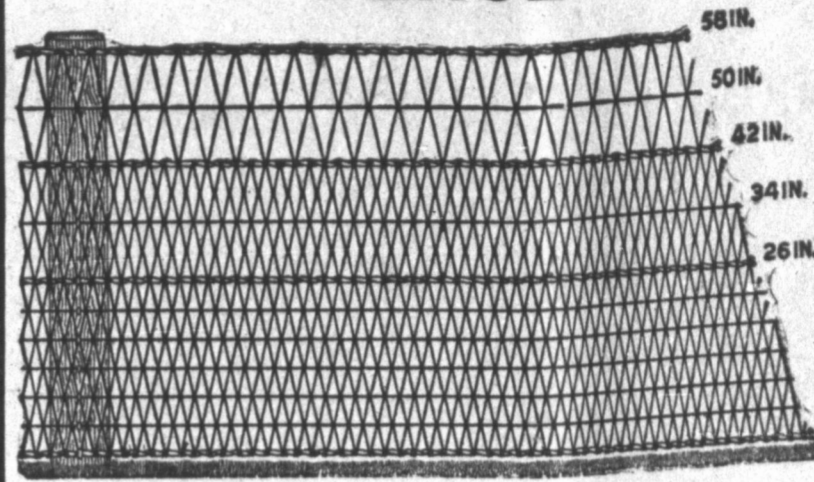

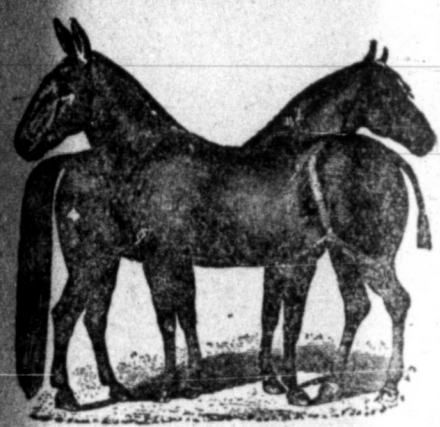

#### MONDAY NIGHT MEETING

#### TOUR OF INSPECTION

On last Tuesday afternoon, a special, having aboard Railroad Commissioner, Allison Mayfield, Chief Engineer Wathen, Division Supt. Ward and other T. & P. officials, went west after making a thirty-minute stop here. A delegation consisting of aldermen Moeser, Johnson and Knott and number of citizens, met the visitors and welcomed them to the town. All the property of the Railroad was gone over and the improvements now under way were thoroughly inspected.

Engineer Wathen stated that when the new depot was opened to the public, it would be an ornament and a credit to the town.
