STATE TAX RATEMUCH LOWER.

School Apportionment at Six Dollars, largest ever made

Austin, Aug. 21.-The state board today fixed the ad valorem tax rate for the new year at 12½ cents on the \$100 valuation The rate last year was 20 cents on the \$100 valuation, and the last legislature under the provisions of the automatic tax board bill, provided that said board in flxing the tax rate, should not exceed 16 2-3 cents on the \$100 valua-

The total assessment valuation of the state is approximately 25 per cent more than last year, while the reduction in the rate of taxation is approximately 40 per cent. The school tax, has been increased approximately 2 per cent, and therefore the approximate reduction in the state school and ad valorem tax, amounts to about 9 per cent.

The state board of education today declared an apportionment of \$6 per capita from the state available school funds for the next scholastic year. the total of the apportionment amounting to \$5,360,646.

Only three times in the history of the state has the per capita apportionment exceeded \$5. In 1886 it was \$5,20, in 1905 it was \$5. and for the scholastic year beginning September 1st it will be \$6 for each pupil.






