Attention Public.

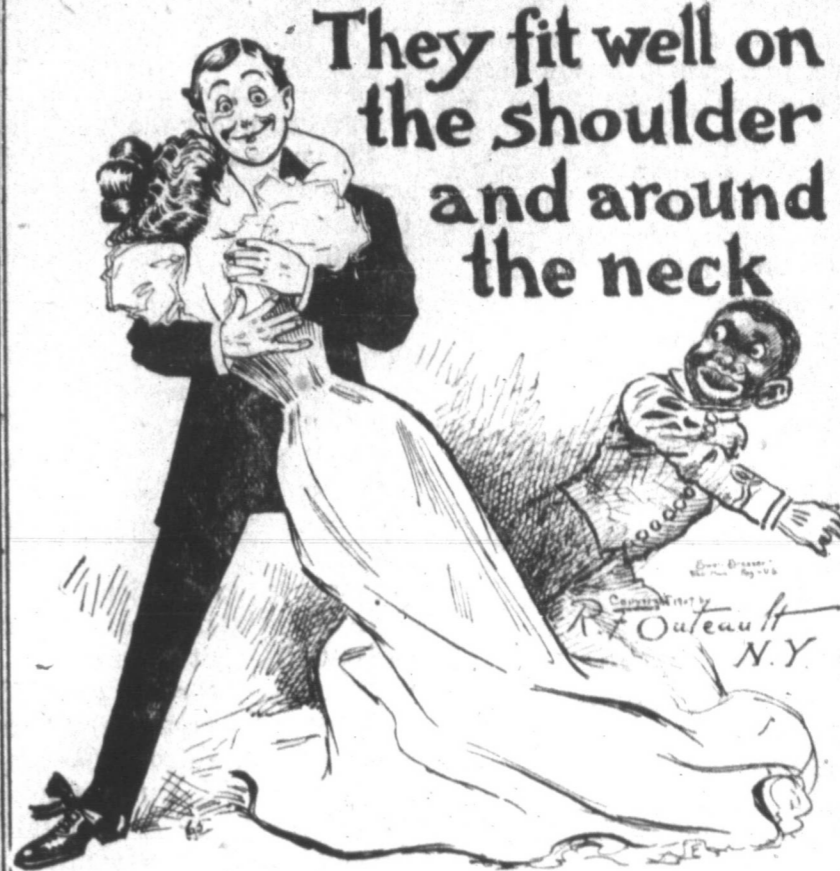

Waterworks for Sweetwater.

The citizens of Sweetwater have organized a home waterworks company with a capital of \$50,000, \$25,000 of which has been taken by home people. Tests have been made on Sweetwater Creek, three miles south of town, to find the underflow or percolated water which originates in the mountains from numerous springs at the head of the stream, and sinks in the gravel and flows underneath the bed of the creek. Work has already begun on the plant.

STATE TAX RATE MUCH LOWER.

Board of Education Fixes Per Capita School Apportionment at Six Dollars, largest ever made

Austin, Aug. 21.—The state board today fixed the ad valorem tax rate for the new year at 12 1/2 cents on the \$100 valuation. The rate last year was 20 cents on the \$100 valuation, and the last legislature under the provisions of the automatic tax board bill, provided that said board in fixing the tax rate, should not exceed 16 2-3 cents on the \$100 valuation.

The total assessment valuation of the state is approximately 25 per cent more than last year, while the reduction in the rate of taxation is approximately 40 per cent. The school tax, has been increased approximately 2 per cent, and therefore the approximate reduction in the state school and ad valorem tax, amounts to about 9 per cent.

The state board of education today declared an apportionment of \$6 per capita from the state available school funds for the next scholastic year, the total of the apportionment amounting to \$5,360,646.

Only three times in the history of the state has the per capita apportionment exceeded \$5. In 1886 it was \$5.20, in 1905 it was \$5, and for the scholastic year beginning September 1st it will be \$6 for each pupil.

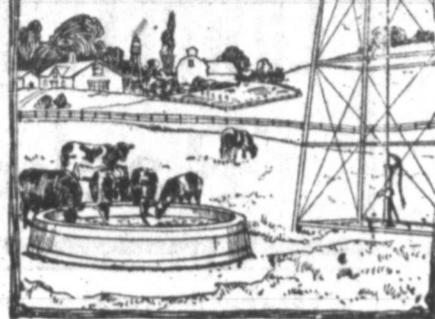

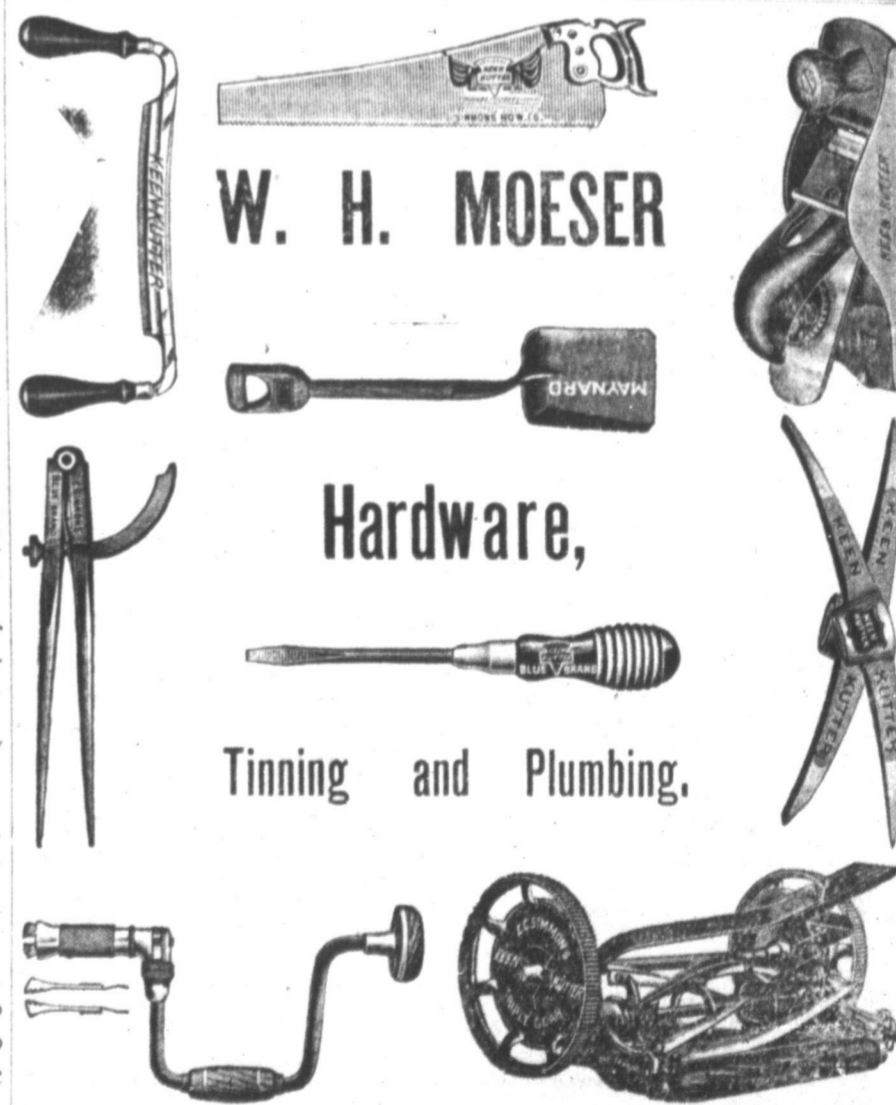

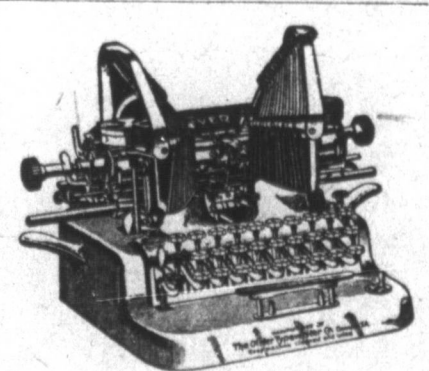

WILL WE DO OUR PART?

A meeting of the Central West Texas Association of Commercial Clubs was held last week at Haskel. Secretary Thomas of the Mitchell County Progressive Club, has received the following self-explanatory letter:

Dear Sir:—At the last meeting of the Central West Texas Association of Commercial Clubs it was the unanimous sentiment of those present that a county and district exhibit from this section of Texas should be put on display at the Dallas Fair, Oct. 19 to Nov. 3rd. Yourself, Col. S. T. Shropshire and T. O. Cowan of Lorraine, were named as members of the committee from Mitchell county, and it is therefore, important that you get together at once and make arrangements to have specimens of the farm, garden and orchard products, as well as the mineral resources of this section gathered and placed in such shape that it will be ready to go in the general exhibit. You should have cards printed showing the country from which these different specimens come, so that when the general display is arranged at Dallas one can look through and see samples of the products of each of our counties in Central West Texas.

Kindly acknowledge receipt of this communication, and advise me what steps you will take looking to the carrying out of this proposition.

GIVE 'EM A HOG'S CHANCE.

The man who just feeds his children and turns them out, stands a fine chance some day to have the state turn them in and feed them.—Roscoe Times.

The fact is not that children are so bad, but that parents are so negligent; many of whom display more common sense in raising fine hogs and "pinter pups" than in rearing their own flesh and blood. They spend money for books and subscribe for papers devoted to horses, cattle or poultry, but do not spend a cent to learn how to bring up under the best conditions, the most valuable of all animals—a boy or girl. They build fine barns to keep their thoroughbreds from scrub association, but will let their children run wild over the town and herd with the vicious and weak, regardless of the contaminating influence. A fine horse or blooded cow is an asset, whereas a boy or girl is only an expense. Is it any great wonder that so many boys and girls want to leave home as soon as they are able to shift for themselves, when they feel that they are creatures of less concern than the blooded cattle and pedigree hogs?

Several farmers have reported selling from \$100 to \$125 worth of watermelons from one acre of Mitchell county land. And this has not been our best watermelon year by any means.

Now is the time for Colorado to move out and do something in the way of advertising. The citizens are willing to put up the money. All it needs is for some one to take hold and act. The Club has had no meeting for some time and there are questions of importance that need attention.

Twenty-five years ago, the man who would have declared that a bare living could be made on any five sections of West Texas land, would have been held as a hopeless fool or prodigious liar. Today, the most profitable farming is done on the 80-acre farms. The man who buys only as much land as he can cultivate, rarely fails to pay for the land with what he raises on it. But when he buys 640 acres and tries to pay it out with the product of 80 acres, usually has a hard road for stumps. Buying more land than one can pay for, hoping its appreciation will do the rest, gets left about as often as he gets rich. The farmer who pays for the land he buys, makes himself safe against loss of his home and fortifies himself against the hardships of crop failure. The small farmer is the one making the most money.

Every day brightens the crop prospects in Mitchell county.

TEMPERANCE AND RACE PROBLEM.

The remarkable growth in temperance sentiment throughout the South has been variously explained, but what is evidently the true explanation must take into account considerations outside the realm of morals alone. This immense movement is not the result entirely of a sudden desire to be temperate. The South has not been wedded to its cups any more than any other section of the Union, but it has been noted for generations for its hospitality, and hospitality goes hand in hand with conviviality. Something of a moral revolution, not to say regeneration, must have occurred, if the reform has been purely a moral one.

But there are not lacking evidences that back of this reform has been an economic condition which made temperance an economic necessity, and economics has won battles which morals lost. The South cannot get along without the negro, and it cannot get along with the negro under a liquor regime. The South needs the negro at least six days in the week, and it could use him occasionally on Sunday. But when the negro of the South can get liquor, the South cannot get him to work more than half time. Hence temperance is the South's own way of solving the negro problem along economic lines, and that is the only plane on which the South will consider the negro helpful. There is noticed as a result of these Southern experiments a decided betterment of conditions in the prohibition communities, for not only has the negro been deprived of the opportunity of yielding to a weakness to which he is prone, but the beneficial effects upon the whites have been equally pronounced. The sober negro is working six days in the week, and is saving his money, which formerly went for gin and whiskey.

The economic and the political phases of the negro problem touch at this point and sobriety and industry are slowly spelling the solution of the whole vexed question, for the development of these qualities means a steady approach toward filling all the requirements of suffrage eligibility which the states may impose within the restrictions of the constitution. And the states have carefully refrained from actually contravening the provisions of the constitution in their disfranchising legislation. The educational and property qualifications have been adroit, but they have been constitutional. The sober and industrious negro is becoming intelligent and a property owner to an ever increasing extent. All of this is in line with the best thought of both races, which has preached ever since the war the doctrine that the negro has his destiny in his own hands, and that race prejudice and injustice cannot eventually triumph against his attainment of the fundamentals of all progress.—Kansas City Journal.

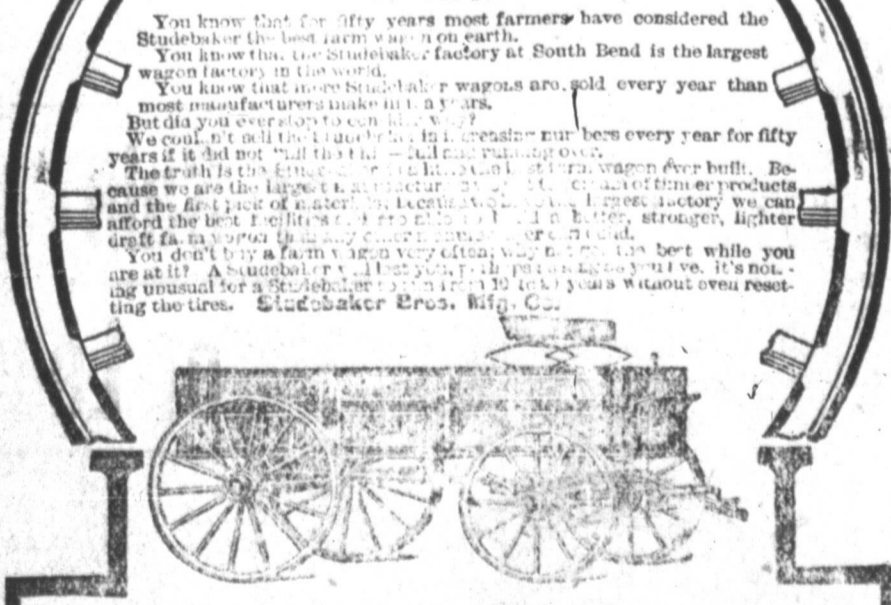

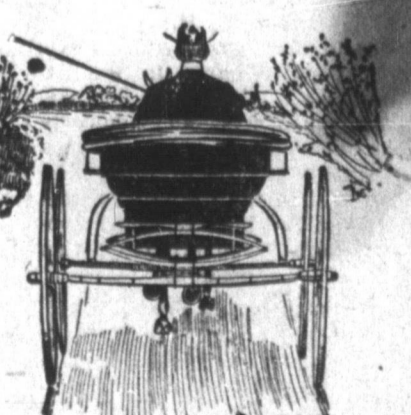
