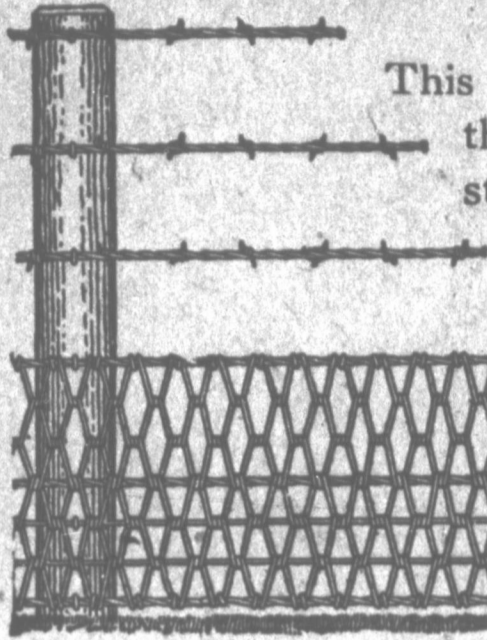

Such letters might be anonymous, if we hesitate to reveal our religious needs and queries, and we doubt not our ministers

would be glad to have them, and that they would give due attention to such as appear to have been prompted by good faith and not by idle curiosity.

Exceeding the Limit of Reason.

Look over Texas, from the Red river to the gulf. Picture the millions of fertile acres of farms and ranches. Observe the great seaport at Galveston, so near at hand. Nature has provided every blessing for our commerce. See the big cotton crop awaiting shipment to the sea.

But stop. The Texas Railroad Commission says you cannot go there, that you can ship to Houston, 50 miles inland, but if you go to deep water, you shall be charged another rate—that it will cost you heavily.

We are neither hitting at Houston, nor taking sides with Galveston in this matter. We are not considering either of those cities.

The Commission makes a rate of 49c on cotton for over 160 miles, except south of Houston. From there to Galveston they add a differential of 6c per 100 pounds.

Farmers always have to stand the rate on cotton to the seaport out of what they receive. They paid out for this unfair differential the startling sum of \$750,000 last season, which was a dead loss. They are the losers by an immense amount during past years on account of it.

There seems absolutely no justification for this differential. Let us explain briefly. Take Mexia for instance:

Mexia to Houston, 180 miles, rate 49c.
 Mexia to Galveston, 229 miles, rate 55c.
 Dallas to Houston, 261 miles, rate 49c.

This plainly shows that Mexia to Galveston is 35 miles shorter than from Dallas to Houston, and farmers have to pay 30c a bale more for a less haul to Galveston, which is absurd. Or take Mexia to San Antonio 230 miles, rate 49c. What is the sense in making a 6c differential higher rate to Galveston for same distance. Again compare:

Seguin to Houston, 179 miles, rate 49c.
 there to Galveston, 204 miles, rate 55c.
 Beaumont, 258 miles, rate 49c.
 Dallas, 296 miles, rate 49c.

Seguin to Texarkana, 418 miles, rate 49c.

Just look at that excessive rate to Galveston. Is it reasonable? Again examine Temple to Houston via Santa Fe 213 miles, rate 49c.

Temple to Galveston via Santa Fe 218.3 miles, rate 55c.

Galveston is practically the same distance in this case, but farmers are made to pay 6c differential higher. The same gross injury is done to farmers all along the Santa Fe line in Texas.

Similar astonishing comparisons can be made from all other points like Ennis, Hillsboro, Corsicana, etc., which are burdened with arbitrary higher rates to Galveston. These figures divulge an apparent outrageous abuse of rate making power by the Commission in favor of railroads, which should not be submitted to much longer by deluded and damaged farmers of the State.—State Herald.

The Wreck.

Some fifty or more of Colorado people, among the number was the Record publisher, who were on the T. & P. excursion train bound for Dallas Friday night which was wrecked about sixteen miles west of Ft. Worth, and all, like the hundreds of other passengers, were badly frightened. The wreck was a frightful thing to behold, with the two engines, box car, baggage, express and first chair car torn up, and many passengers receiving minor injuries, but witnessing the poor, suffering trainmen being removed scalded, bruised and in an almost dying condition was terrible.

It was a most frightful occurrence which will be long remembered by all on board, and in which the fireman, who was buried under his engine, and the freight conductor and engineer who came to the relief of the stalled train were sent into eternity. Our people all feel for the management of the T. & P. road who had put on a very low rate and every effort to make the trip a pleasant one, and in this accident, besides the great financial loss the wreck entails, they should lose three of their valued employes. They were even then thoughtful of all passengers and extended tickets to cover the delay.

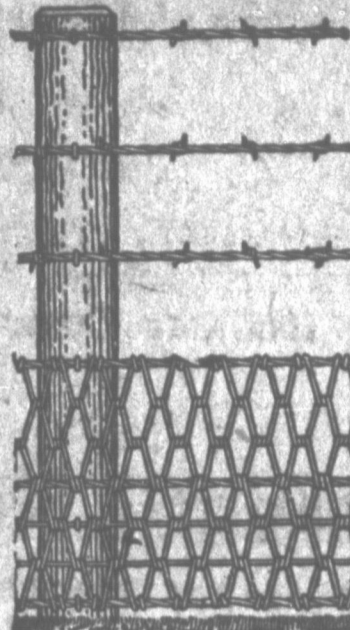

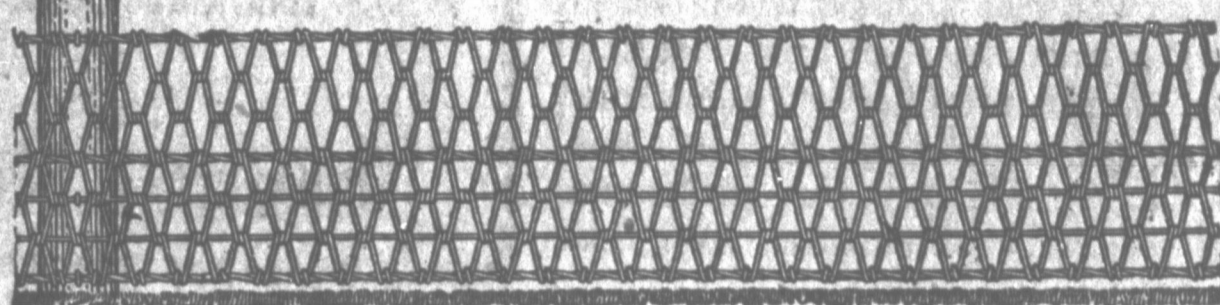
