## COPP'S IRRIGATED

 GARDEN FARM.A visit to Copp's irrigated gar year would prove an eye opene to many, in regard to the resources of La Salle county. those who regard this section of country, it would indeed prove interesting to view, under a single management over one hundred acrestof land devoted entirely to truck farmin $\_$, and that too a successful experiment. Mr. Copp's
farm is situated about one mile South cast of town, and extends back to the river where the pump and engine is stationed The land than thousands of acres adjoining it being composed of the common red sand balls with the intervening
valleys between. The work heretofore, and is yet to a certain extent, an experiment. Entering knowledge of irrigation and with no experienced man to manag has demonstrated the feasibility of raising for early northern markets nearly all the vegetables known to the gardener.
The onjon has been his main crop for shipment, with each sea pounds shipped, this season he has to date delivered four cars o 20,000 lbs each together with inumerable smaller orders, ag gregating several thousand

When the harvest season is on employment is given to about
twenty men, it requiring that number to properly handle the large crop. Besides onions raised on the farm, he plants raised on the farm, he plant fact everything for which there is a demand. He has this year devoted to grape culture, abou three fourths of an acre of land the vines are all in excellent condition each bearing a profusion
of fruit. It has beon said by those who are supposed to know from experience, that the grape
will not live and bear in La Salle Cuunty longer than two or three years at most. Mr. Copp has arefully computed the expens that it will pay him to cultivate them if he can only get two crops His work in this line is on!y an ted in the coming few years Bordering the water trenches, available for other purposes, h has planted fruit and shade tree this climate, thus preparing his add greater and more lating sou add greater and more lasting so the years to come. A visit to the farm at the time of day when he is watering the fields is worth traveling a good distance to see. The engine pumps the water in a strong stream from the river to it is from there conducted by the aid of trenches, culverts, ete, and or to any part in need of water The flow from the hill is at al times under complete controll of
the men and can be wholly changed or checked at a moments notice A walk through the fields at any time during the busy season, and a talk with the proprietor
