USE OF HASHEESH.

It Is Said to Be the Cause of Much Insanity Among the Natives of India.

The reports of the asylum at Cairo, Egypt, as to the native patients there exhibiting the nature of the mental disturbance associated with the excessive use of hasheesh are said to show some remarkable facts, it appearing that in 41 per cent, of all the male patients hasheesh alone, or in combination with alcohol, caused the mental symptoms, while this was the case with only seven per cent, of the females. As to whether there is a special recognizable form of mental disturbance produced by hasheesh, authorities conclude that in a considerable number of cases in Egypt the hasheesh is the chief if not the only cause of such mental dis-The usual types of the disease are hasheesh intoxication—that is, an elated and reckless swaggering state, with optical delusions and hallucina-Acute mania is another form of hasheesh insanity, incoherence and exhaustion; again, there is exhibited a weak-mindedness, the patients, though
