the productiveness of Wilbarger's dirt, knows with the proper cultivation and a sufficient amount of moisture it will grow the staff.

The pesky grass hopper who has been playing havoc with some of the fields of young cotton in the country, is said to be by the farmers to have about stopped their damage, and most everybody are now of the opinion that since the rain they will cease altogether doing any serious damage to the crops, as pastures will now green up and the grass become sadpy, they will now find the tender young grass more appetizing than cotton. The Reporter has learnt from talks with a number of the country, that the damage of this pesky visitor has been greater in some fields than others, and as a result of their attempts to destroy young cot-

ton, there are a few acres of cotton in some fields that had to be replanted, but after all, up to this time, the damage the hopper has done to cotton in general in this part of the country has not been as great as some predicted he would do, when he first made his appearance in this locality.

Such instances as the destructable sand storm that blew such strong gale here east Friday night and as result of from two to three hours of the wind fields of cotton, were wiped out by the blowing sand and some completely covered up; is a trying ordeal for the farmers to have to undergo, but always in their time of misfortune and when the prospects for a good crop seems gloomy, they have the assurance of knowing that their loss is not felt alone, as the towns with all its citizens join the grievance and feels the loss is equally theirs as each one upon the other is more or less dependable for support. But as discouragely and gloomy as the cotton prospects did seem last Saturday, when the various reports of the country were that the cotton had been greatly damaged during the night; all seems well again with everybody since the rain that fell on Saturday night. While some of the farmers made preparations and planted some of their cotton over this week, others believe the cotton that was injured will survive and grow off, and taking them all together none are damaged so much as was thought at first.
