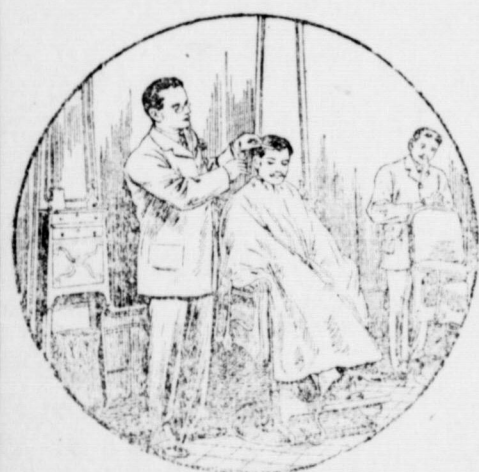

The Webb Bill which was recently vetoed by President Taft, was passed on by the Senate. The bill has practically the same provision as the Kenyon senate bill, it forbids the shipment of liquor to dealers in any dry state, also giving the state authorities the right to investigate the intent of the shipper of every consignment of liquor into a prohibition state.

The Reporter calls your attention to its new correspondence from the Fargo and Haulk neighborhoods, with the assistance of the writers from these vicinities, and the two others who are regular correspondents to the Reporter, it puts the paper in position to give all the news of the immediate country to its subscribers.

Capt. B. B. Paddock and Hon. R. R. Williams, of Cumby, made an extensive investigation into conditions at the Confederate Home at Austin last week and report conditions deplorable. They will recommend to the Legislature that immediate steps be taken to improve conditions and that funds be appropriated for making the necessary improvements.

TAX INVESTIGATION DEVELOPS STARTLING INEQUALITIES.

Welfare Commission Recommends Remedial Legislation.

Tyler, Texas.—The report of S. A. Lindsey, of the Texas Welfare Commission, is now off the press and ready for distribution. The investigation developed startling inequalities in assessment of property. Real estate was found to be under-assessed from 10 to 80 per cent and not more than 2 1-2 per cent of the intangible personal property goes on the payroll. The intangible property of railroads amounting to \$111,345,044 is of course assessed by the state tax board at full value.

In discussing the effect of our tax system upon railroad securities, Mr. R. S. Lovett, executive head of the Harriman lines, said:

"It is almost universally true that no property is assessed for taxation at its full value and of course railroad owners know that fact. Railroad investors know of excessive and unreasonable assessments against railroads wherever they occur. It is their business to keep posted about such things. The financial world knows that the railroads of Texas are assessed for the purpose of taxation at about twice what they are valued by the Railroad Commission of Texas. It does not stop to see whether they are under-valued for the purpose of taxation. But the idea that the state of Texas will assess the railroads for twice what it values it at for rate-making and stock and bond purposes is so utterly unreasonable that nothing more is needed to foreclose almost any discussion of Texas railroad securities in an eastern financial center."

Mr. Frank Trumbull, head of the Katy system, said:

"My general attitude on the matter of taxation has always been that we are not only willing, but we want to pay our just share of supporting the government. We are, however, very reluctant to pay other peoples' taxes, and if the basis of assessing us is higher than it is to a man who owns real estate, we are paying a part of his taxes and so far as we are concerned we are too proud to ask anybody to pay a part of our taxes."

The commission recommends remedial legislation and urges the Thirty-third Legislature to appoint a capable and non-partisan Special Tax Commission.

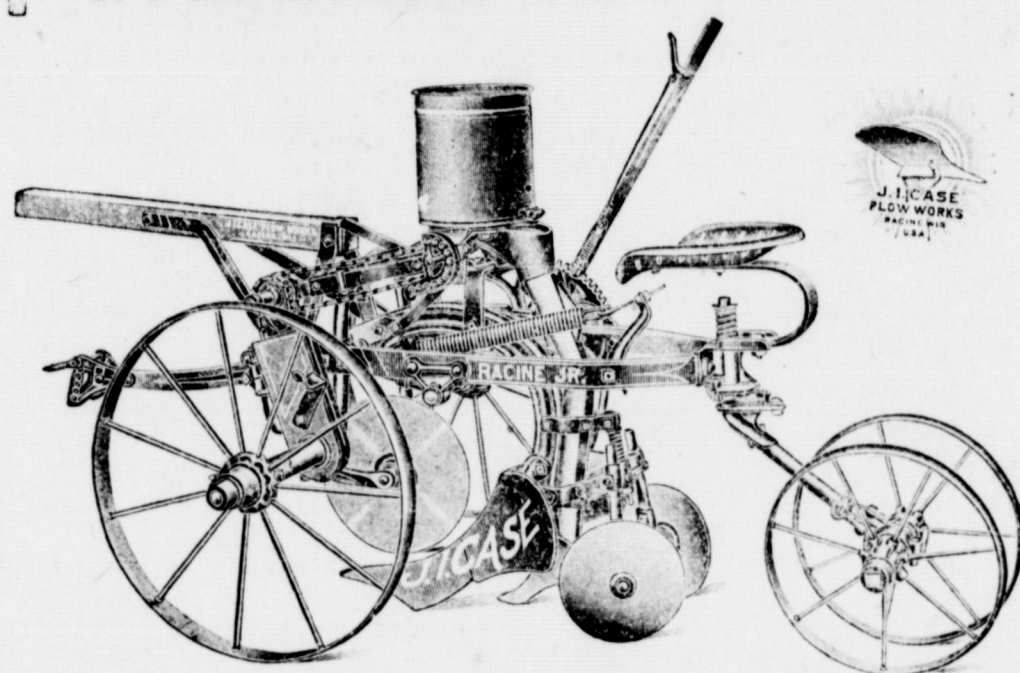

Charlie R. Daniel Writes From The Philippine Island

Former Local Citizen Gives Experience of Soldiers In The Hills After Natives

(Continued from week before last issue)

When this wounded man came in hearing distance of the camp a crowd went to his assistance and carried him in, and received the news, so a detachment was sent out right away to capture the natives that done the deed and to pick up the dead. Of course we were all mad, and had orders to kill any native that would not halt. Our first orders was to halt and then shoot, but we always took the shot first and then you could bet the native halted, if he was not dead. When we arrived where he was halted we would finish him with the butt end of a revolver or a rifle. We did not know whether we got the right one or not, but there was several that suffered for it. The man that got wounded is able to walk about, but is still in the hospital, the dead man has been shipped back to the states for burial.

We were gone about three weeks, and you ought to have seen us, it certainly was a dirty bunch, we had scarcely any clothes with us to speak of, and no water, only just enough to drink, so what few that did not have their clothes torn off by the brush was so dirty you couldn't hardly tell the original color of them.

What a happy bunch it was when we got back to headquarters and got under a good shower bath, and put on clean clothes. The rest of the day we sat around and told the rest of the boys what we had seen and experienced. We sure had lots of fun and plenty of sport, but it was a miserable trip, we had to carry our own guns, bedding, rifles, revolvers and ammunition.

Year to Revive Orient

Unless Bondholders Are Able To Raise \$15,000,000 Receiver Davidson Says It Will Sell at Auction

From Wichita (Kans.) Eagle.

Will the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient bondholders be able to raise fifteen million dollars to pay off their indebtedness within the next year or will the road be sold to the Southern Pacific? This question is causing Orient officials much worry and precitions of railroad men are about evenly divided.

J. O. Davidson, 935 North Lawrence avenue, Kansas receiver for the road, returned Friday from Kansas City, where he met the other receivers. He stated Friday evening that he believed the bondholders would raise the fifteen millions.

"The bondholders are busy in England securing the money. The Balkan war has caused the financial world to hold tight to their money, but I believe the money will be raised within six months or a year."

Mr. Davidson further stated that if the bondholders are not able to raise the money within the time set by the court, that in all probability the Southern Pacific would bid and purchase the road at foreclosure sale. The Orient, combined with the Southern Pacific, would make one of the best roads in United States. It would make a highly acceptable line for Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas products to California and vice versa.

Within the next thirty days

the extension of the Orient from Fort Stockton, Tex., to Alpine, Tex., a distance of sixty-three miles, will be completed. The Orient will join the Union Pacific at Alpine. Orient officials are planning to establish a through sleeper service from Kansas City to California via Rock Island and Southern Pacific. As the through sleeper between Kansas City and Ft. 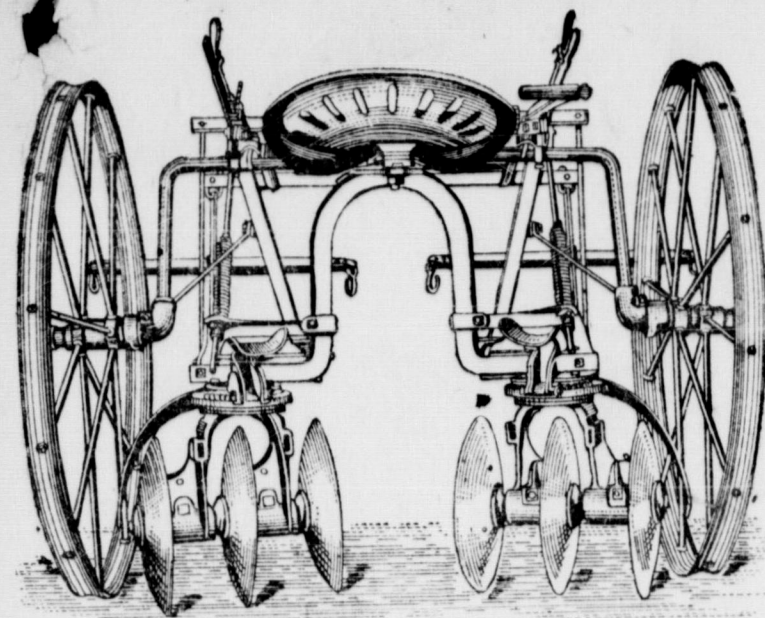
