Corn Marketed Reaches Thousands of Bushels

Orient Unable to Supply Cars For Shipment--Local Buyers Complain

That the corn market has opened up in full blast, is a statement that will be affirmed by those here the past week and witnessed the corn wagons arriving from all directions, lining up for a hundred yards or more waiting their turn at the public scales, which is a familiar fall scene to the people of this country, and this being an unusual good corn crop and Odell's established reputation for being a good market

for corn, as result, thousands of bushels have been unloaded on the ground every day here this week, there being as much as 3500 bushels sold and piled in ricks in one day, which would have otherwise been loaded on the cars for shipment, had the railroad been in position to furnish the necessary transportation, this shortage of cars which seems to be a general complaint everywhere, has put the local corn buyers in somewhat of bad circumstances, as they now have great ricks of corn reaching in length for a hundred yards or more that they want moved but cannot obtain sufficient transportation, the local buyers have been paying this week for all the corn bought, from fifty to fifty two cents, the latter price

being paid generally when it is loaded on the cars, and the price paid for corn sold here this week being some what better than is paid by other places near here, has been an inducement to some of the farmers to sell at Odell, who have not heretofore patronized this place.

Makes Land Deal

A real estate deal was transacted last week between W. T. Gibbins, one of our local merchants and R. J. Stowe, farmer a few miles east of Odell, the former selling the latter 160 acres of land located in the eastern part of the Round Timber ranch, of which Mr. Gibbins has charge. Mr. Stowe is now living on the W. M. Stalcup farm in a few miles of the land he has just purchased and we presume will move and locate on his new farm after this year.

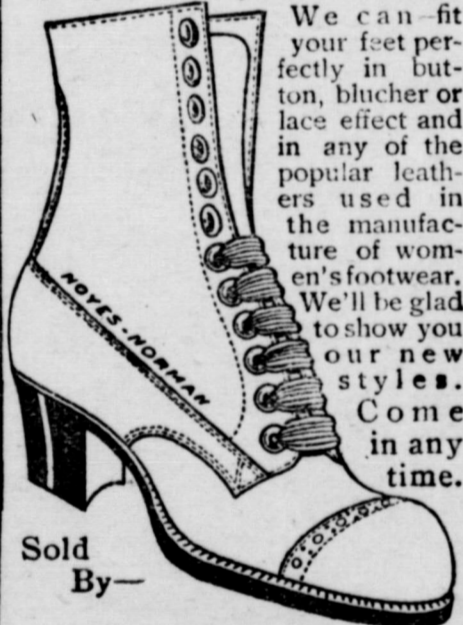

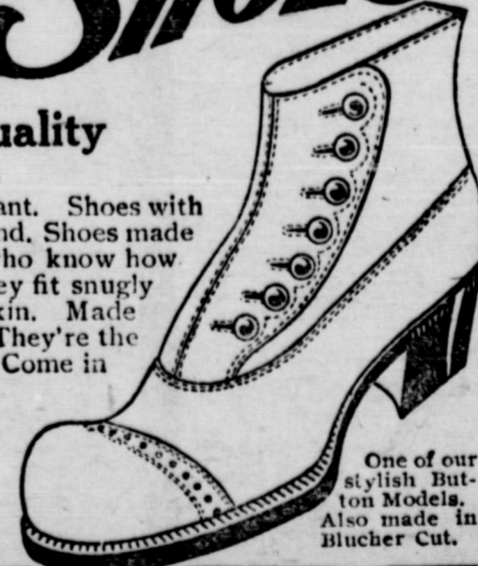

August Cotton Ginnings

Washington, D. C. Sept. 23.—The first cotton ginning report issued by the Federal Census Bureau for 1912 showed that on September 10, 729,926 bales of cotton had been ginned since the season opened. It is estimated that five per cent of the entire crop is already in. The report shows that round bales have not increased over last year. There have been 203 bales of sea island cotton ginned this season. Texas has furnished 673,935 bales of the crop already ginned. This is an increase for Texas of about one hundred thousand bales over last year.
