

August Cotton Ginnings Washington, D. C. Sept. 23. -The first cotton ginning report issued by the Federal Census Bureau for 1912 showed that on September 10, 729,926 bales of cotton had been ginned since the season opened. It is estimated that five per cent of the entire crop is already in. The report shows that round bales have not increased over last year. There have been 203 bales of sea island cotton ginned this season. Texas has furnished 673,935 bales of the crop already ginned. This is an increase for Texas of about one hundred thousand bales over last year.






Socialist Lectures
