## May Enter The Ministerial Field Again Feb. 1st.

Rev. Robeson is now in a sanitarium at McKinney for treatment, but has notified Presiding Elder M. Phelan of this district, that if he still wants him to accept the Kirkland charge, if his health permits, he will probably do so about the first of February.

For two years, Rev. Robeson was pastor of the church here, giving up active ministerial work two years ago, on account of a throat trouble. While acting as pastor of the church at this place and since, he has made many friends over the county who have nothing but good words for him. And should he decide to take up the work again as a gospel messenger, the people here are ready to reconmend him to the church at Kirkland.

Residence of C. D. Hart and Wife Burned Saturday Night--No Insurance

A fire of unknown origin, burned down the house of Cord Hart and wife, in the outer edge of Odell last Saturday night. Everything in the house was burned up, except a feather bed and a few quilts, which were carried out by some who reached the scene of the blaze first.

Mr. and Mrs. Hart were not home when the blaze was discovered, being at the home of the latter's parents, which is only a short distance away.

Just how the fire originated, Mr. Hart says he is at a loss to know, as he and his wife left only a little fire in the heating stove when they left the house.

The residence was a story and half structure and belonged to S. L. West, Mrs. Hart's father. No insurance was carried. Just whether a residence will be placed back on the site, the Reporter is unable to state at this time.

## Former Odell Lady Dies At Tulsa, Okla.

Mrs. Kate Carroll Who Died Friday Shipped Here For Interment

Mrs. Kate Carroll, wife of Ott Carroll, who with her husband and family, a few years ago, made Odell their home, died last Friday at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and was shipped here for burial.

The body came in Saturday night over the Orient road and was carried to the home of Mrs. J. H. Gobbell, a sister of deceased. Funeral services were conducted at the Baptist church, Rev. H. C. Mason directing the service. Burial Sunday evening at the Pleasant Valley Cemetery.

Deceased would have been 28 years old this coming April and leaves a husband and three small children, one boy and two girls. A mother, three brothers, and two sisters also survive her, which include, her mother, Mrs. J. A. Pressley, Down and Warren Nave and Mrs. J. H. Gobbell, all of Odell, and Arch Nave of Clarendon and Mrs. Laura Nichols of Altus, Oklahoma. All the near relatives being present at the funeral, with the exception of the brother at Clarendon.

Mrs. Carroll was a member of the Baptist church and was well known to a great many Odell people.

The Reporter extends its deepest sympathy to the grief stricken husband, children and all relatives.

Since the snow of this week, which put some moisture in the ground, our hopes for a good crop the coming season is some brighter. Do not grumble about the weather, old citizens who have been here a long time, tell us, it takes plenty of cold damp weather through the winter time if a good crop follows.

Harry K. Thaw seems determined not to let the American people forget him. Just about the time we all lose an interest in him and where he is located, he bobs up in public print as the central figure of some sensational happening. His latest move to warrant him a little space in the news papers was to make an attack on a 19 year old boy in Kansas City and then afterwards attempted to take his own life.

It looks like the Legislature of Oklahoma have set in to force some of its citizens, who haven't the will power to overcome bad habits, break loose and be clean fellows anyway. A law was recently introduced in the lower house, to prevent the smoking of cigarettes. So with no smoking or drinking allowed in Oklahoma if its lawmakers will take some steps to get rid of its thieves and bank robbers, they will have a pretty clean place to live.

Frank Fuller, the new speaker of the House of Representatives, is said to be a very courageous sort of a fellow, characterized as one who is able to take care of himself and ready if occasion demands it, "to fight his weight in wildcats." We reckon it is well enough that he who holds the gavel, is able to hold his ground, as at this time the prohibition question is not yet settled at Austin and it looks like both Anti and Pro fur might fly before it is.

J. A. Kemp and Frank Kell, two of Wichita Falls influential citizens, who have done more to build her up than any two men

within her boundry, have each agreed to donate monthly \$100 apiece to the city chamber of commerce. When a town is fortunate enough to secure such men as Messrs. Kemp and Kell who have the financial means and whose influence is state-wide, you can't hold her down. Wichita Falls is a good town, but she is going to be a better one, Kemp and Kell have willed it so.

A new citizen of the town is in favor of making an attempt to revive an interest in the local commercial club. While he is a new asset to our citizenship and has not yet found out disposition of Odell people when it comes to sticking together and pulling the same way; yet he has been here long enough to know there is no good reason why every business man of the town and citizen too, should not become a member and work harmoniously together for the betterment of Odell and community. It's a business proposition gentlemen.

It is poll tax time again. If you fail to pay your poll tax you deprive yourself the right of suffrage throughout the year, no matter what political emergency might arise or what might come up that you would be sacrificing your every manhood by not being able to vote. Secure your sacred rights of suffrage while you yet have an opportunity for the time will be up before you realize that that the limit has passed, and you will be out in the cold so far as your special privileges as a voter are concerned

The Reporter trusts that different automobile drivers of the community, read and will observe the little notice that appeared in last week's issue of the Reporter, regarding the speed limit in Odell, which notice appeared over the signature of our local constable. If those at the steering wheel of cars, will keep in mind the law, it will not likely come to pass, that someone will be run over and killed here some day. The lives of those who are accidentally knocked down and run over by some fool driver, in most cases are dearer to their people than all your automobiles. The law that says to the chauffeur, you must hold down your speed on public highways, is a good one, and citizens of Odell or

any town, should stand by their officers in helping them to enforce it.

Col. J. M. Rutherford was up from San Angelo this week visiting in the home of Guy Mc-Neeley. The Colonel owns a very desirable piece of resident property here, and may return to make this his home when the Orient makes Chillicothe a division point.—Chillicothe News.

The Chillicothe News seems slow to give up the idea, but what some day the Orient machine shops will be moved from Altus, Oklahoma to Chillicothe. Five years ago when the K. C. M & O. was considering a removal of their machine shops from Altus, Odell was given more consideration at the time as a division point on the road than Chillicothe. Yet Odell has long since given up all hopes of capturing the prize. As far as accomplishing anything by boosting, from the Reporter's viewpoint, the News will come just as near landing for Chilli the new A & M College, that is going to be located in West Texas, or the State's additional insane asylum, as it will the machine shops now. If we are allowed to draw any conclusion from statements made concerning the Orient's financial condition, she will have about all she can do for years to come to move her cars, much less a division point on the road. And if reports we hear are reliable, the machine shops are now doing very well at Altus, and neither Odell nor Chillicothe need to look for them anyways soon.

**OUR PUBLIC FORUM**

J. S. Cullinan  
 ON TEXAS ECONOMIC LEAGUE.



In assisting in the organization of the Texas Economic League, my motive was to help form an association that could voice the sentiment and promote the interests of those engaged in producing and distributing the products of the earth. Having belonged to this class all my life and having occupied various positions in business from laborer to manager and owner, I have come in personal contact with most of the hardships encountered by those engaged in productive pursuits and I feel that much of the suffering we undergo is preventable and that improved conditions can be easily brought about through a more active and intelligent citizenship. I have resided in Texas for eighteen years and during that time have been actively identified with many lines of business, and in direct touch with industrial conditions of the state. It has been my aim to influence capital to Texas, to give employment to labor and to see Texas institutions spread over the globe.

I have faith in the people and in the future of the State and I want those who feel likewise and have a permanent interest in the State's welfare to join me in this work. The only qualification is that Citizenship, Federal, State and Community in the order named, be placed above class interest, and a more diligent study of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States be pursued.

The men engaged in productive pursuits should manage civilization. Much of the incompetency and inefficiency in our public affairs is the result of indifference and impatience of the producing classes in dealing with important public problems, leaving their solution to the non-producing classes, who should take orders from, and not give orders to, society. If business men, farmers, laborers and all factors in productive industry would discharge more fully the responsibilities of citizenship, many of the fundamental evils from which we suffer would automatically disappear, revealing a more capable and efficient commonwealth. I have unbounded faith in our system of government and believe that the serious difficulties which we encounter are due to incompetency and degeneracy of important branches of government and society over which the citizenship, as a whole, has neglected to exercise a proper supervision and has failed to demand a high order of efficiency and integrity.

We should look to the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States for guidance and apply their principles to the problems of the day. As citizens we enter into a contract with government as the "party of the first part" and unless we perform the services agreed, we have no right to share the benefits of government and certainly no cause for complaint against organized society for evils which the performance of our duty as citizens would easily correct. We want to invite the people of Texas to study and discuss citizenship, determining our rights and privileges under government with a view of enjoying more fully the life, liberty and pursuit of happiness set forth in the Declaration of Independence and guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States.
