To The Voters of The Forty-Sixth Judicial District

Fellow Citizens: I am a candidate for Judge of the 46th Judicial District. For the benefit of those who do not know me, I will trespass on your time and patience by giving some account of myself; that you may the better judge whether or not I am suitable material for that position.

I am a graduate of the law department of the University of Mississippi and practiced law in Taylor County, Texas, several years before coming to Wilbarger County; two years as County Attorney of said Taylor County. I qualified as County Judge of Wilbarger County, Nov. 16, 1900, and have served as such since that time.

I have finally disposed of 337 civil cases. Of these; two have been reversed on appeal, and three new trials have been granted. I have finally disposed of 1016 criminal cases. Of these; four have been reversed on appeal, two of them however, because the law was unconstitutional. Of these State cases, however, about half were dismissed and about half the balance were pleas of guilty. Some of the civil cases were also dismissed and there were some judgments by default. In all, I have actually tried about 500 cases,

civil and criminal, and have been reversed six times. Of the cases tried by me, civil and criminal, about sixty were appealed.

The moral of the above story is: I am competent. The same principles of law, pleading and practice obtain in the district as in the county court. I have had exactly the experience best calculated to fit me to perform the duties of a district judge. I need the office and you need me in the office. It's a good thing for both of us. Let us get together and make my election as near unanimous as possible.

It may be that none of the names of the candidates for District Judge will be on the ticket. If my name isn't there, please take the time and trouble to write it; J. A. Nabers; in the appropriate place; that is to say under the sentence, "For Judge of the 46th Judicial District," and on whichever ticket you vote.

Fully realizing, that there is no honor in the mere holding of any office; but that it is as a man may acquit himself in measuring up to the responsibilities of the duties he undertakes, I promise you, if elected, the best effort I am capable of, to justify your confidence in me and so I close by commending myself to your most favorable consideration.

DEMONSTRATION.

A. and M. Extension Bureau
 Exhibit at State Fair.

GIRLS CANNING CLUBS.

This Will be a New Feature of the Display—Boys' Corn Club Show—Silos Demonstrations Will Be of Much Interest.

One of the features of the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, October 12 to October 27, will be an exhibition of the extension work of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. This exhibit will be more complete than it was last year and several new demonstration features will be added. Professor C. M. Evans, superintendent of the bureau of extension work of the college and Prof. H. H. Williamson, in charge of boys' and girls' corn club work in the state, will be in charge.

Superintendent Evans announces that the exhibit will include demonstration of home canning outfits, lectures and demonstrations in judging dairy cattle and testing milk, demonstration and lectures on silo work, on fertilizer mixing, on budding and grafting soft shell pecans on hickory and native pecan stock, seed testing and cotton classing. "A new feature of our club work this year will be the girls' canning club display," says Mr. Evans. "In the state we now have about 2500 members of the Girls' Canning Clubs. This year each of these girls has grown one-tenth of an acre of tomatoes and other truck crops under our direction and have already canned more than 300,000 cans of fruits and vegetables. These products are being collected at the various county fairs and the best of these will be sent on to Dallas. We have sixteen lady county agents in the Girls' Club work. They are superintending the collection of these exhibits and they will be present to give canning demonstrations.

"In the Boys' Corn Club work we have this year about fourteen thousand members. Some remarkable yields are going to be made, and it is intended that the exhibits of these high yields will be accompanied by boys producing them. The Boys' Corn Club exhibit this year will be larger than ever for the reason that there are more club members and crop conditions are much better than they were last year.

"A large number of the corn club members are also members of the cotton clubs. Exhibits of this sort will consist of a stalk of cotton with not less than twenty bolls and a sample of the ginned cotton along with the written history of how the crop was produced. A special feature of this work is the record keeping. Records of the production of all crops will be on hand and open to inspection along with the exhibits.

"Silo demonstration work at the Fair is certain to attract a great deal of attention. I recently inspected the same crop now being grown at the State Fair grounds for this work and found it very excellent. Last year there were more than seventy-five silos in the state. This year approximately two thousand more have been put up. One ranchman is putting up fourteen ranging in capacity from one hundred to one thousand tons each. These will be used in the feed for beef production. Experiments carried on by the bureau of animal husbandry of the A. and M. College this year have shown that silage made from either corn, sorghum, Kaffir corn or milo maize can be used profitably in beef production. Last year there were enough corn stalks wasted in Texas to have paid for several thousand silos. This condition occurs from year to year, as we are always pretty certain to have a dry spell which cuts off some of the corn crop. If a silo was available these stalks could be made into silage, yielding from four to ten tons per acre, worth three to four dollars per ton. As silage the average crop of corn stalks would be worth \$10 to \$30 per acre and without silage they are practically a loss."
