Civilization's Largest Factor

A late copy of the Magazine has been received by a Kansas banker who has the following to say in the Wichita (Kansas) Eagle, with reference to the character and actions of the generous hearted promoter who was swindled of the Orient road: "Stillwell has a heart of gold. He was much misunderstood by the public who imagined he gained a great fortune from his railroad operations. When he left the United States for Paris, he was about as poor as when he started in life. He is now 54 years old and although he has benefited thousands in the country where his railroad opened the way to markets, personally he is not gainer except as he gratifies his natural desire to serve humanity. This new work is but another phase of his magnanimous character."

Saturday is the day set for voters of this county to decide whether or not they want the county to issue bonds to the amount of fifty thousand dollars to build a county hospital to be located at Vernon. And since there is always a certain class of voters, both old and young, at every place, who are not particularly interested in elections of any kind, every taxpayer in Wilbarger county who desires to see the hospital question defeated Saturday, should make a special effort to see that the non-interested voter goes to the polls and votes against the bond issue. It will require very little talk to convince the non-interested man that the county has not yet reached a stage in its growth where it needs a hospital and that this institution they want to build at Vernon at the County's expense, is a few physicians scheme for more practice and a fat job. We are sure these same

physicians and others over the county who are "tearing their shirts" for the hospital, are cherishing a hope that the bond issue will go through on the ground of a light vote. They are no doubt afraid of the sentiment of the entire voting strength of the county on the question, but are confident that every man in the boundry who really believes that the hospital is a county necessity will go to the polls Saturday and vote for it. So as we have already said, every taxpayer in county who desires this hospital question defeated should take it upon himself to see that the fellow who would vote against the issue, but is not particularly interested, votes Saturday—otherwise the bond issue may go through.

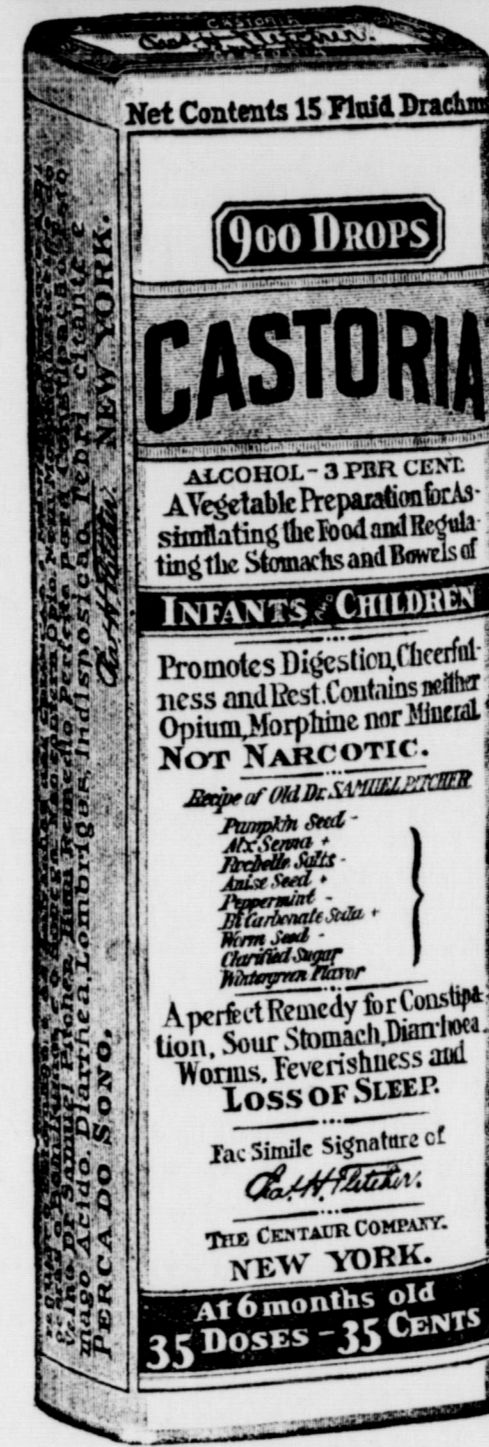
Hospital Law Explained

To the voters of Wilbarger Co:
In view of the fact that there will be an election held throughout the County on the 24th. day of June, on the issuance of \$50,000 in hospital bonds, the Commissioners Court has instructed me to prepare a review of the law relative to the erection and maintenance of the hospital.
Omitting introductory clause which relates to the manner of holding the election and acquiring a site therefor the law is substantially as follows:

Sec. 2—When commissioners Court have acquired a site for such hospital and have awarded contracts for the necessary buildings and improvements thereon, it shall appoint five citizens of the county of whom at least two shall be practicing physicians and one a woman, who shall constitute a board of managers of said hospital. The term of office of each board of managers shall be two years. The managers shall receive no compensation for their service, but shall be allowed their actual and necessary traveling and other expenses within the state, to be audited and paid by the Commissioners Court in the same manner as other expenses of the hospital.

Sec. 3—The Board of Managers shall elect from among its members a president and one or more vice presidents, a secretary and a treasurer. It shall appoint a superintendent of the hospital who shall hold office at the pleasure of the board. Said Superintendent shall not be a member of the board of managers, and shall be a qualified practitioner of medicine, physician or other person specially trained for work of such character.

The board of managers shall also appoint a board of visiting

shall provide for their payment in the same manner as other charges against the County are paid.

Sec. 9. Any resident of the County, desiring treatment in such hospital, may apply in person to the Superintendent or to any reputable physician for an examination; and such physician, if he find such person suffering from any illness, disease or injury, may apply to the Superintendent of the hospital for admission. If upon personal examination of such patient, the Superintendent is satisfied that such person is suffering from illness, disease or injury he shall admit him to the hospital as a patient.

Sec. 10. When a patient has been admitted from the county in which said hospital is situated the Superintendent shall cause inquiry to be made as to his circumstances. If he finds that such patient or relative are liable for his care and treatment in whole or in part, an order shall be made directing such patient or relatives to pay to the treasurer of such hospital for the support of such patient a specified sum per week, in proportion to their financial ability, but such sum shall not exceed per capita cost of maintenance. If the Superintendent finds that such patient or relatives are not able to pay in whole or in part for his care and treatment, the same shall become a charge upon the county. Should there be a dispute as to their ability to pay, or doubt in the mind of the Superintendent, the County Court shall hear and determine the same, after calling witnesses, and shall make such order as may be proper, from which there shall be no appeal.

The above is the most essential parts of the law. Any one wishing to read the law in full will find it at my office, or for 35c they can get the acts of the Regular Session of the 33rd Legislature, from the Secretary of State, Austin, Texas, which contains the law in full.

of, and make such rules and regulations as may seem to them necessary for carrying out the purposes of such hospital. They shall maintain an effective inspection of said hospital and keep themselves informed of the affairs and management thereof; shall meet at the hospital at least once in every month, and at such other times as may be prescribed by the bylaws; and shall hold an annual meeting at least three weeks prior to the meeting of the Commissioners Court at which appropriations for the ensuing year are considered.

Sec. 7. The board of managers shall keep in a book provided for that purpose a proper record of its proceedings, which shall be opened at all times to its members, to the members of the Commissioners Court and to any citizen of the County.

The board of Managers shall certify all bills and accounts, including salaries and wages, and transmit them to the Commissioners Court of the County, who

**COMFORTS OF HOME
ENJOYED BY WOMEN
AT CONFEDERATE HOME**

FORT WORTH, Texas.—A movement for acquainting the people of Texas with the public institutions of the State has been started by the Texas Economic League, and the heads of the different State institutions have been invited to contribute articles defining the scope, character and benefits of their particular work. The first discussion of this character has been contributed by Miss Katie Daffan, superintendent of the Texas Confederate Woman's Home at Austin. Miss Daffan's article says in part:

"The Texas Confederate Woman's Home, which is rapidly becoming one of the most attractive, picturesque spots around Austin, a city already beautiful by nature, by the plastic hand of art, and by industry, has an interesting individual history. This institution is a gift to the State of Texas from the Texas Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, an organization composed of the widows, wives and daughters of Confederate soldiers. This fact is unique, and it speaks the splendid patriotism and unselfishness of these noble women. Few States or commonwealths have received such a gift from women. The women of fewer States or commonwealths have set themselves the enormous task of erecting and maintaining an abiding place for the infirm and the aged. Such endeavor is heroic, calling unto itself the rare virtues of patience and persistency attended by many difficulties. Originated and founded by the Texas Division, United Daughters of the Confederacy, and now maintained by a patriotic State, the Texas Confederate Woman's Home is the Texas monument to the noble women of the Confederacy. The original Confederate Woman's Home at Austin was opened by the Daughters of the Confederacy to occupants on President Davis' birthday, June 3rd, 1908. From that date until October, 1911, it was entirely maintained by the Daughters of the Confederacy. The State Constitution having been amended, which amendment provided that the State should maintain the wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors, the Daughters of the Confederacy, by action of their State convention in Houston December 7th, 1911, gave the home to the State of Texas." 48-c

physicians who shall serve without pay from the county, and who shall visit and treat hospital patients at the request of either the managers or the Superintendent.

Said Board of Managers shall fix the salaries of the Superintendent and other officers and employees within limits of the appropriation made by the Commissioners Court, and such salary shall be compensation in full for all services rendered. The board of managers shall determine the amount of time required to be spent at the hospital by said Superintendent in the discharge of his duties. The Board of Managers shall have the general superintendency, management and control of said hospital, of the grounds, buildings, officers and employees thereof, of the inmates therein, and of all matters relating to the government, discipline, contracts and fiscal concerns there-
