Austin Texan, Lauds Lober Snow in His Civil Engineering Work

A number of the readers of the Reporter will be interested to learn of Lober Snow and the progress he has made in civil engineering. He at one time assisted his father in teaching the Pleasant Valley school and has a number of acquaintances in that part of the country.

The Austin Texan has the following to say about him:

"Lober Snow, a senior civil engineering student, will soon complete the addition to the storage coal bins of the power plant. Mr. Snow's connection with this work is unique. He designed the addition, purchased the material, and made the

contracts for it. He hires the men, and besides supervising the construction, bosses the laborers and keeps their time. Most of the laborers, of whom he has on some days as many as seven, are Mexicans, the others being American stone masons. Mr. Snow speaks the language of the Mexicans and successfully manages them."

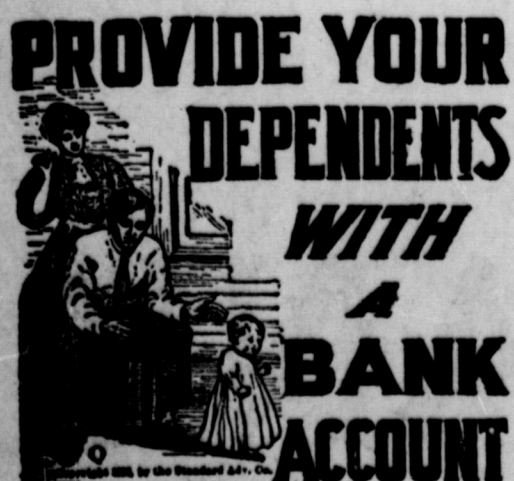

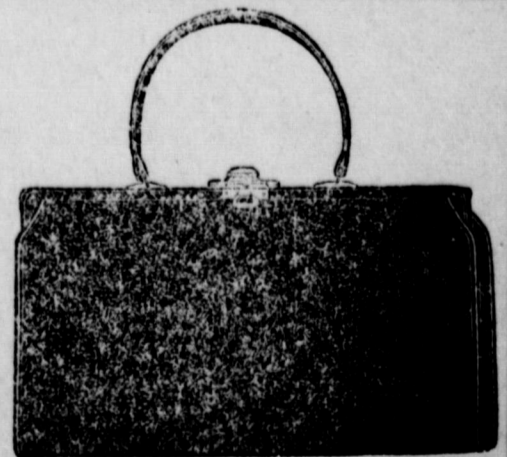
