



The following obituary clipped from the Dawson Herald, a newspaper published in Navarro county, gives an account of the death and burial of Mrs. W. G. Huie, the mother of our townsman J R. Huie, who was with her at Galveston, when she submitted to death's grasp, now, near two weeks ago:

"Our town was saddened last Thursday when the news was received that Mrs. W. G. Huie, formerly of this place, but who moved from here to Galveston several months ago, was dead. 


