While quite a manifestation of interest has been shown by the people of the country, in their desire to see and render all necessary aid in keeping the community's cemetery at Pleasant Valley in a respectable condition,

as they were prompted by reason of knowing that unless special attention were given the yard, in the way of keeping it clear of weeds and looking it in other ways, that its condition would soon be one of disgrace to the neighborhood. It was for this reason that a few of individual citizens of the country got together and organized what is known as the Pleasant Valley Cemetery association, setting aside an annual day on which to meet on the grounds and do whatever work was required at the time. And at the same time knowing, that each individual person of the country should be interested in the respectability of the neighborhood's cemetery the association was not restricted to no definite number, but a solicitation for the attendance and assistance of the surrounding country was given out. At the meeting of the association last Saturday at cemetery it was thought by some present, that the attendance was not as large as it should have been, as the meeting had been previously announced, and it being cooperative work too, that should interested the entire community. The Reporter hopes at the next meeting of the association, which will be a year from last Saturday, that the entire country will go and be on hand, as by their presence they will show a disposition to be interested, and ready to lend assistance in a grand and noble work which had its origin among a few of the country's citizens.

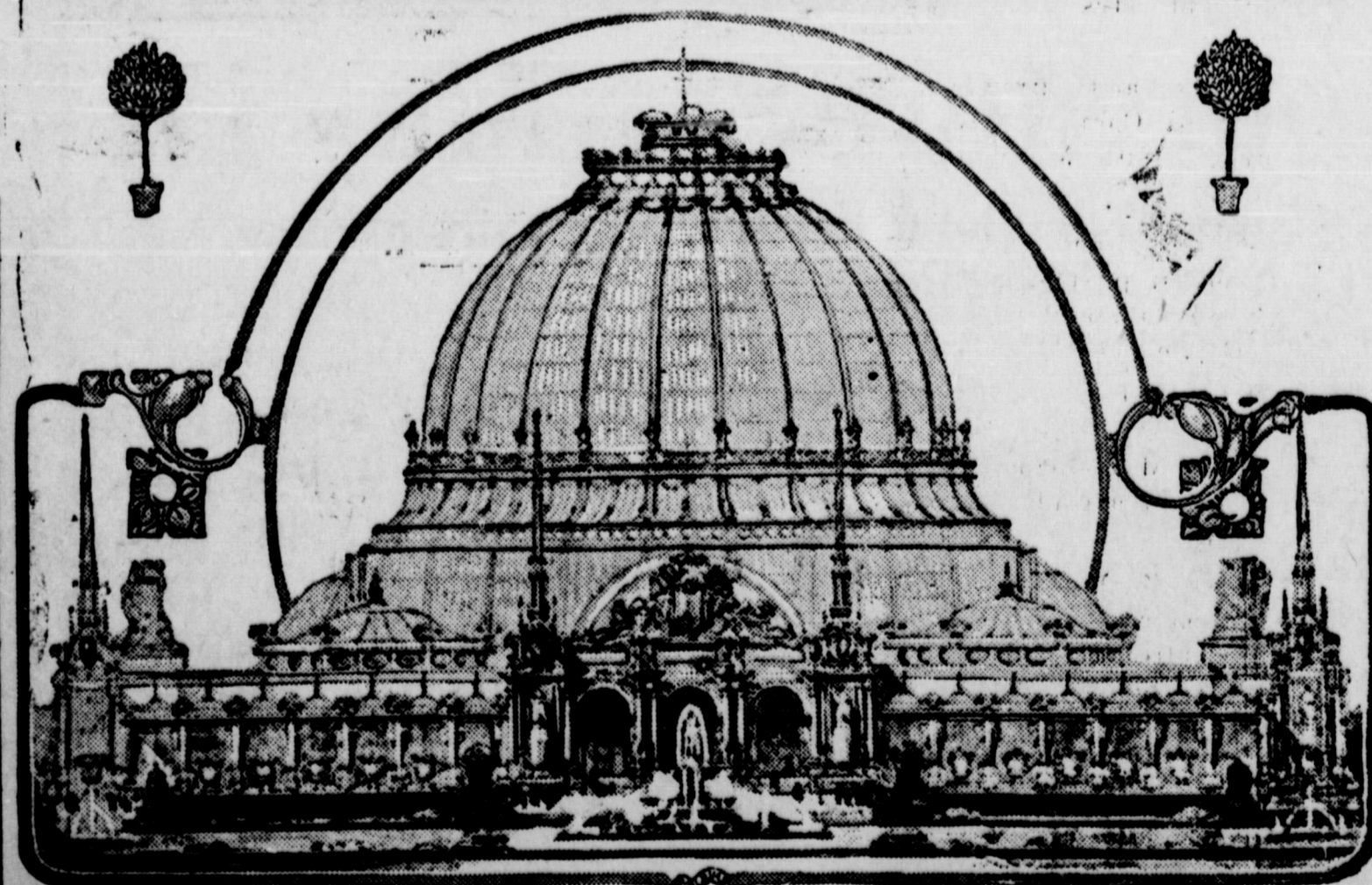
