Wilbarger Coun-
ty Gives Culberson Majority Vote Odell Gives Colquitt The Defeated Candidate a Majoritv Both Elections
Considerable interest was manfested here in the Senatorial Primary held over the State last Saturday, in which election O. B Colquitt and Charles A. Culber. on were candidates for United Senate
While the total votes polled or the Senatorial candidates was not as heavy here as in the first Primary, yet there was much en thusiasm expressed in Odell as ver the entire County.
Out of 136 votes polled here, Colquitt received 83 aud Culberson 53. In the first Primary elec uon, at which time there were six candidates in the field for the Senatorial toga, Colauitt received 79 votes and Culberson 6, Odell box giving Colquitt a majerity vote in both elections. In Wilbarger County there were 1262 votes polled Saturday for the Senatorial candidates. Of the amount, Culberson received 742 vote and Colquitt 520, the County giving Culberson a majority of 222 votes.
