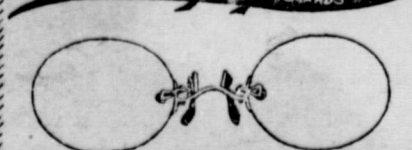

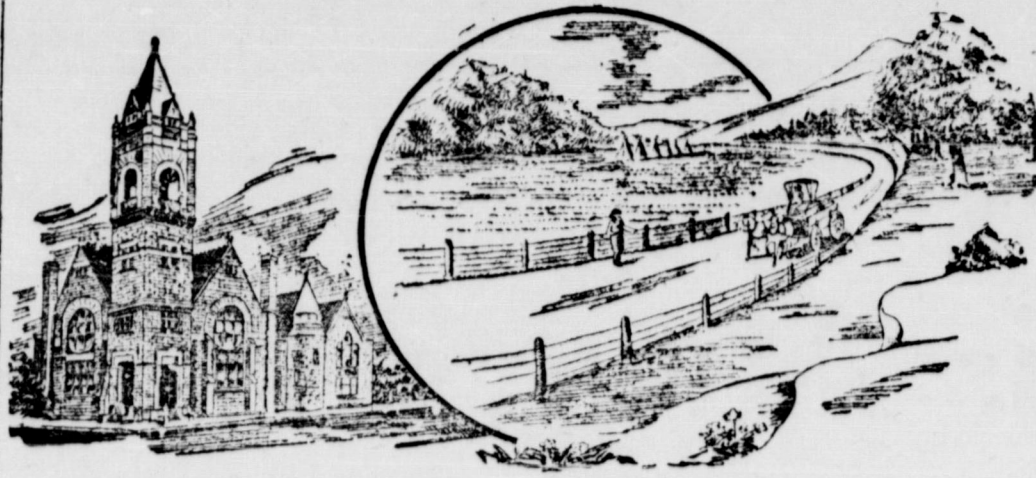
Nearly all difficulties that arise

The truth is, Randell's bill ought to be a law, and it would be a law if there were not so many paid representatives of the special interest in both houses of congress.—Houston Chronicle.

The Randell bill will some day be a law, even if the people are compelled to adopt the initiative and referendum, and initiate the bill themselves and have it referred to them for passage.—Farmersville Times.

During the early part of the campaign the report was industriously peddled all over Texas that Randell would not remain in the race. It seems now that he is not only in it but is making a record that threatens to defeat both of his opponents in July primary. I never saw Randell in my life, but I can say truthfully that he has talked more old-fashion pure democracy than both his opponents combined. Wolters and Sheppard are able men, but they are each swinging to Joe Bailey's coat tail with both hands and the election of either would be a victory for the friend of "My Dear Pearce." They both endorse Bailey in everything he advocates. They oppose the initiative and referendum, believe in placing a high protective tariff on raw materials, and thus forcing the working man to pay double price for everything he eats or wears. It makes me tired all over to see a man throw his wool hat in the air applauding a tariff that forced him to pay a double price for it.—Harpoon.

Oil at Agatite

C. H. Newby sent the T-C. man an invitation to come and see his oil well last Friday, and we went.

In the boiler room of the American cement mill is a dug well about thirty feet deep. A charge of dynamite had been set off in it, and a strong flow of oil made its appearance immediately afterwards, and something like three hundred barrels of oil had been taken from the well.

While we were present the pumps did not seem to be able to keep up with the flow of oil coming into the well, and it was undoubtedly the same kind of crude oil like we had seen coming out of the wells at Electra. We learned that the test showed the oil to be similar to the Electra oil.

J. B. Green of Goodlett, who served his apprenticeship in the Pennsylvania oil fields, stated that it is doubtless oil that never has been refined before, containing plenty of petroleum and gasoline.

If correct, this would do away with any possibility of the oil being the same that was lost at Acme several years ago, when the bottom fell out of an immense earthen oil tank, and 11,000 barrels of Beaumont oil were a total loss. The American mill is over one mile away from where this accident happened.

This week Mr. Newby has found it necessary to install a larger pump and the flow of oil continues undiminished.

Mr. Newby intends to drill two deep holes on his section near Goodlett, and will organize a company for that purpose.—*Quanah Tribune-Chief.*

East Las Vegas, N. M. June 22.—After consultation with leading citizens here, Governor Mc Donald last night said he will issue a public statement regarding the Johnson-Flynn boxing contest not later than 6 p. m. Monday. The governor would not say that he would stop the match.
