Former Soldier Answers The Call to Preach

L. C. Crutchfield Delivered His Initial Sermon Last Thursday Night

L. C. Crutchfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Z. M. Crutchfield of the Plainview community, lately returned from San Benito, after receiving a permanent discharge from Uncle Sam's army located at that place. Cass, as he is familiarly known to his friends in this country, was clerk of his company located at the training camp. He was fitted for the job, but as he left a wife and farm duties to answer the call of the colors, on those grounds he was given an honorable discharge.

Now that Cass has returned home, he has decided to devote the remaining years of his life in service for the Lord. At the Plainview school house last Thursday night, at which place his uncle was conducting a Methodist meeting, Cass took his stand in the pulpit and announced to the audience that he had been called to preach. The writer was not present, but was informed by one who was, and whose word will bear repeating, that Cass' initial sermon was a good one. He told his audience that something like ten years ago, he felt it his duty to take his stand as a minister of the Gospel, but had fought the idea off until lately.

Friends of the young minister in this community have the utmost confidence in his ability to fulfill his mission as a messenger of the Gospel and entertain high hopes that some day he will be found away up yonder among the influential men of the ministerial field who are doing good work as recruiting officers for the Savior.

Where is the fellow who predicted there would be no cotton buyers in Odell this fall?

This is National Pay-up week. If you owe a debt, have the money, and possibly can, go pay it.

A prohibition election has been ordered for Tom Green County and the sentiment of its citizens is that the county will go dry. The prohibition victory in Dallas county seemingly decided the fate of John Barleycorn in Texas. The white badge members have got him on the run.

There was an unusually large crowd in town Saturday, and a number of the merchants report a big business. The time for fall trading is here and since the stores in Odell have the goods

that are marked at prices that will compete with stores at other places, you may look for a good crowd in town every Saturday from now on.

According to information given out by the tax officials of the county, the state taxes this year have been assessed at sixty cents on the hundred dollar valuation. County taxes 50 cents. In 1916 the state tax was 45 cents and the county tax 49 cents. In this county the J. C. Sumner estate is said to be the highest taxed property, its assessed valuation being \$76,745.

As result of the grand jury's complaint regarding the Sunday closing of business houses. The law along that line was observed to a letter in Odell Sunday. The grand jury in asking for an observance of the Sunday closing law, no doubt, was seeking to put a ban on the soft drink business more than anything else. And since Coco Cola, cold sodas and such, at no time are a vital necessity, but fulfill the wants of a certain class of young men who loiter on the streets on Sunday, all fair minded people who believe in a strict observance of the Sabbath, will stand by the officers in seeing that the Sunday law is observed.

Another road bond issue in Wilbarger county is forth coming. But this time the bond issue will be restricted to the East Vernon and Oklaunion boxes. In event the election carries, Wilbarger county will come in for a share of Federal and State money appropriated for road building. In these progressive days, where the auto has taken the place of the buggy and wagon as a way of conveyance in going to market, the driver at the steering wheel is clamoring for good roads to ride over. Good roads are a good thing for a county to be able to boast of. In fact, the time has come when they are a vital necessity to a community. But all times judgment and economy should be two of the main points to be observed in their construction. As public sentiment sometimes goes "hog wild" so to speak, over a proposition.

October 9th. has been named as "Fire Prevention Day" by Governor Hobby. On that day you will be expected to examine your stove flues and put them in a safe condition for winter use.

Remove all old trash and waste that has accumulated around your house and do such other things to guard against a fire loss. It is said that three fourths of the fires that originate could have been easily prevented. And since that is true, it becomes a duty of each and every one of us to be constantly on the guard against fire. Odell's business district so far has been exceedingly lucky in escaping fire, and

the Reporter believes its escape in a large measure is due to the thoughtfulness of the citizens here in eliminating every possible chance for a blaze to originate. But just because we have gone along this far without a fire loss, is no guarantee whatever that we will not encounter one in the future. So we should continue to be careful with our matches and warn others to be so.

Got Happy And Died

Aged Lady Shouted at Baptist Association and Expired as She Took Her Seat

Grandma Hill, aged 73, who has made her home with her son, Rev. Walter Hill, near Humphry, died suddenly during a session of the Baptist Association at Friendship Wednesday night of last week.

It was just about sundown, and a big supper was being prepared for the large crowd in attendance, others who had spent the day there having gone to Altus to see the soldier boys off. While waiting for supper an informal service was held and at the close of the sermon while the congregation was singing familiar songs Mrs. Hill shook hands with the preacher and others and shouted praises with the old time camp meeting fervor. As she took her seat she fell forward and expired before anyone could reach her. Heart trouble, to which she was said to be subject, was the cause of her death.

Grandma Hill had been a devoted member of the Baptist church for more than fifty years. She was the grandmother of Rev. Roy Hill, a Baptist minister well known in this part of the country.

The funeral was held Thursday, and burial was made at Francis cemetery.—Altus (Okla) Times-Democrat.

Took Husband For Burglar

And Mrs. C. D. Fears Fired Shot That Left Herself and Babe Bereft and Desolate

As he was entering his home at about 8:30 o'clock Thursday night of last week, C. D. Fears, a well known merchant of Duke, was accidentally shot by his wife, from the effects of which he died next morning at 5 o'clock.

Mr. Fears had been down town after supper, and when he returned, endeavored to get into the house without arousing the baby which Mrs. Fears was putting to sleep. Mrs. Fears, thinking that it was a burglar fired without warning through the door of the room just as Mr. Fears was in the act of opening the door, the bullet penetrating his liver, stomach and intestines. Dr. Mayes, a Duke physician, instantly called, who immediately summoned Dr. Garrett of this city and Dr. Border of Mangum, but nothing could be done to stop the patient's bleeding which was mostly internal. No operation was performed as the unfortunate man was considered too weak to survive anaesthetic. His father and mother were summoned from Olustee, and neighbors and friends did all in their power to comfort the heartbroken wife. One baby girl is left to be the mother's hope and stay in the unconsolable grief of the terrible accident.

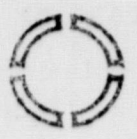

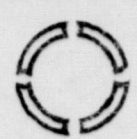
