Contract To Be Let On Highway 36 Gap

Contract for paving was to be let September 23 and 24 on 14.2 miles of gap in Highway 36 between Rising Star and Comanche, according to a release last week from the Texas Highway Department.

When completed, the new pavement will join already paved sections at what is known as Crossroads, some 15 miles West of Comanche.

This portion of Highway 36 was designated several years ago and completion has been expected since highway work was resumed following World War II. The highway which extends from Abilene to Freeport, will be paved, except for short graveled stretches in the Southeast portion of the state.

Home Making Hints

Bread Show

The Callahan County Home Demonstration Council held the Bewley Mills Bread Show Monday, September 8 at 10 a.m. Thirty three women from six clubs entered seventy-four exhibits of yeast breads, consisting of rolls—plain, cloverleaf, paper-house, fan-tan, and braided, loaf bread, kolaces, cinnamon rolls, raised doughnuts, coffee cake and tea rings.

The breads were left to be judged at 10 a.m. and the ladies returned to learn the results of the judging at 3:15 p.m. The breads were scored for appearance, color, moisture

content, texture, lightness and flavor by Miss Myra Tankersley, Taylor County Home Demonstration Agent, and Miss Loreta Allen, Jones County Home Demonstration Agent.

Scores ranging from 90-100 were awarded blue ribbons, 85-90 red ribbons, and 80-84 white ribbons. All women who made entries in the show were given an award each according to their scores. Blue ribbon scorers were given the choice of a mixing bowl set or cookie sheet; red ribbon scorers, paring knife or pastry blenders; white ribbon scorers, glass measuring cup, loaf pan or pastry canvas. Those not receiving ribbons were given entry awards which were a wooden spoon, spiral slicer, measuring spoon set, or spiral egg beater.

When the women assembled at 3:15 the agent, Miss Evelyn Wieland, announced the results and presented the awards. Six red ribbon awards, five blue ribbon awards, and 12 white ribbon awards and ten entry awards. All of the awards were contributed by Bewley Mills and the council was given a check for \$25 for having the show in the interest of Bewley Mills.

Choosing and Buying Your Washing Machine.

Buying a washing machine is a major problem with home makers

these days with so many makes and models from which to choose. The problem is to find the one washer that will suit the needs of the family.

For instance, buying an automatic washer would save time and trouble, and a good many other pieces of equipment, but unless a good supply of hot and cold water, with plenty of pressure, is available, the automatic washer would not be satisfactory enough to justify the expense. So the question to consider is whether the investment is worth while, depending on how big a part of the work washing is, and how much the saving of time and labor would mean.

If a nonautomatic or standard type of washer is chosen, the next choice is between a machine with a wringer and one with a spinner, and depends largely on what the homemaker wants. Wringers and

spinners can do equally good jobs. A spinner takes care of a whole tubful of clothes at once; with a wringer the clothes are fed in piece by piece.

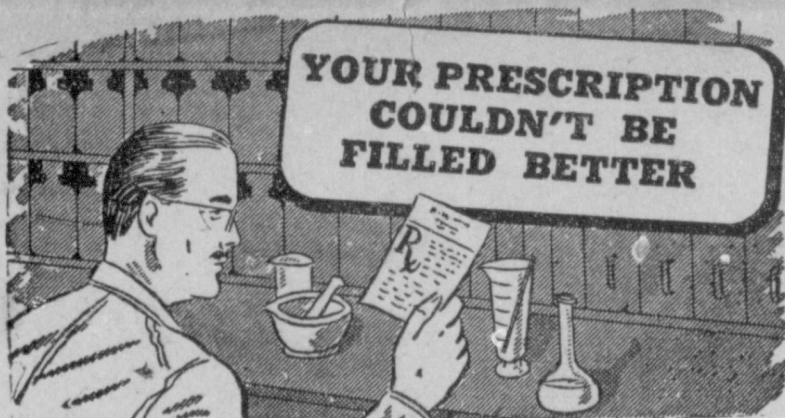

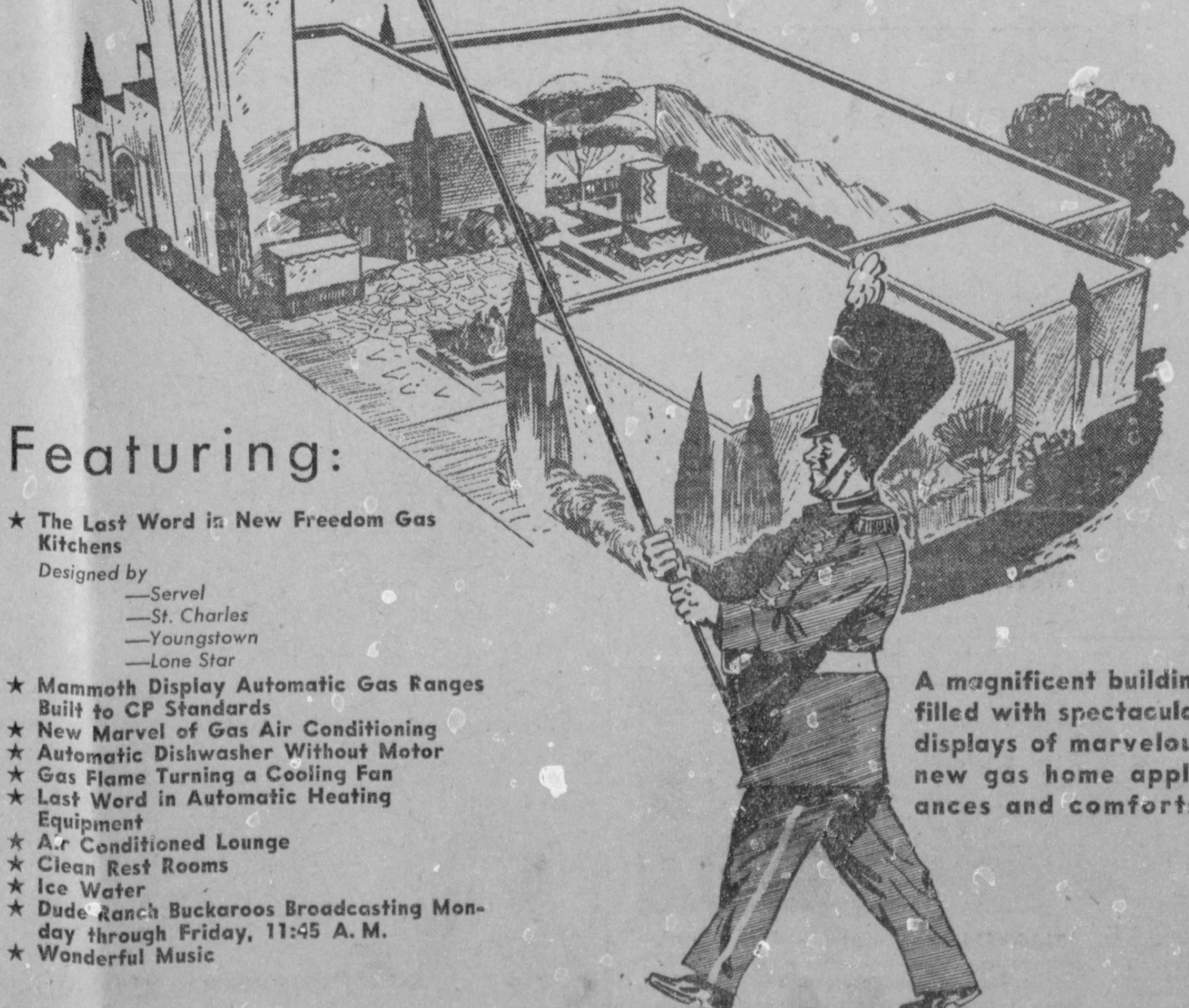
