Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has warned of a post-war increase in the number of diphtheria cases in Texas. More than 1100 cases have been reported in Texas alone and Dr. Cox seems to believe the increase may be due to a slowing-up of diphtheria immunization during recent years.

The increase, he says, also seems to be nation wide.

EXPANDED LIST OF MAYO MEDICAL DISPLAYS WILL BE SHOWN AT THE DALLAS STATE FAIR

An expanded list of medical displays, including new exhibits received from Mayo Foundation Museum of Health and Hygiene; Cleveland Health Museum, and the Scott and White Hospital, Temple, will headline the program of the Dallas State Fair of Texas, October 5-20, officials of the Dallas Academy of Medicine, sponsors of the local health institute, have announced.

Dr. Horace Babin, director of the Mayo Museum, which is located in Rochester, Minn., will accompany his institution's display to Dallas and will remain here throughout the Fair program.

The Mayo exhibit will consist of three phases. One, using a life-size wax model, will demonstrate the procedure a doctor follows in an

appendicitis operation, revealing each structure encountered in the human body in the course of such an operation. The second will present a large model of the structure of the human ear, and the third will reveal the structure of the human eye.

The Cleveland (Ohio) Health Museum will have 20 individual exhibits in its overall display, referring to various phases of medicine, while the Scott and White exhibit will be comprised of sketches and medical paintings of tumors by Kenneth Phillips, staff medical artist.

These displays will be presented in addition to the numerous detailed exhibits usually seen in the local health museum, Fair officials reported.

Dr. Cox Advises On Winter Disease And Its Prevention

Young children may suffer as much from winter illnesses as they do from those commonly known as "summer complaints," in the opinion of Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, and his advice to parents is to guard babies and young children against these winter health hazards.

Influenza, tonsillitis, pneumonia, bronchitis, and asthma are included among those disease which may be dangerous winter illnesses among young children since they affect the respiratory or breathing system. Such disease as pneumonia may develop from a neglected cold, they may follow as an after effect of measles or whooping cough, or they may occur suddenly and with very little warning. These diseases of the respiratory system are more prevalent in winter than in summer and are much more difficult to combat than digestive ailments such as summer complaint.

"These winter diseases are particularly dangerous to babies and young children," Dr. Cox stated. "Nearly all of them are spread through the secretions from the nose and mouth. Children not in vigorous health are naturally more susceptible to these complaints and the first line of defense," Dr. Cox cautioned, "is to strengthen the powers of resistance against disease; the second is to keep them under medical supervision and the third is to make sure they avoid contact with others who have colds, coughs or fevers."

Strike Palo Pinto Lime In Oil Test Of Rowden Area

Oil activity in the Rowden community became sharper this week with possible opening of a new Palo Pinto pay area one mile north for the Martin Properties No. 1 W. N. Foster, 330 feet from the North and West lines of lot 7, block 337, Victoria county school survey. The Palo Pinto lime is a new oil strata test in this section as distinguished from the Strawn sand series, both reached at approximately the same depth.

Operators have set pipe on a Palo Pinto show at 2,323 feet after drilling to 2,500 feet. Acidizing is reported to have been completed this week. Royalty purchases on surrounding tracts are reported brisk.

C. D. Lane of this city and L. M. White of Ft. Worth have encountered one million feet of gas at a depth of 600 feet on the Buster George place, three miles north of the Octane bulk

station between Baird and Putnam. Operators will drill to 700 feet where they expect to reach the lower Tannehill production, which is the same production encountered around Albany. Lane and White spudded in two weeks ago and have been running only daylight hours.

Drilling was begun last week on two new wildcats in the county, the Ted H. Ivey and H. F. Burton No. 1. J. Gorsuch et ux, 1,650 foot cable tool test five miles north of Clyde and the Hedrick Oil Co. No. 1 R. D. Williams, 2,150 foot cable tool test eight miles northeast of Baird.

The Boyd Gillespie No. 3 Tom Windham six miles southeast of Baird has been abandoned dry with no commercial shows to depth of 1,162 feet.

No reports have been available on a wildcat well drilling on the Fomby tract near Cross Cut, except that operators have contacted the Ellenburger lime.

Had you ever thought that money is only a medium of exchange and the citizen has no way of getting money except by selling his labor or something produced by labor? Then in all our trading with each other, it is practically an exchange of labor. The farmer will produce farm products and sell it to the consumer and to the industrial worker. He will say the average farm labor based on an eight hour day is about \$4.00. The industrial worker's wage average is about \$1.25 per hour or would run \$10.00 on an eight hour basis. Then when the farmer goes to purchase an automobile he is exchanging his labor on a basis of two and one half days for one. And all industrial goods are made on about the same wage scale. Does anyone think this is a healthy situation where one class of labor is forced to give two and one half days in exchange for one day's labor. Would you exchange with your neighbor on that base.

Concerns which happen to be able to charge an abnormally high price are being restrained by the effect of the abnormal high price itself.

That sort of price draws competitors into the business, and those expand the total manufacturing capacity far beyond the demand available at that or even a considerable lower rate.

In the long run, the combination of low price, moderate profit margin and growing volume is more profitable than temporary large profits and higher price level.

Producers do not put effort and resources into new products, or improving old products, or increasing output unless the expected price is high enough to do two things: 1. cover all the cost of at least the more efficient producers; 2. provide enough return on their investment to make it possible for them to secure additional capital funds in connection with other potential users of such funds.

If the price is too low to provide a certain minimum net return, the tendency is to withhold capital from reinvestment in such lines and to withdraw existing resources where possible.

This leads to reduced production through inadequate replacement, failure of less successful concerns and diversions of resources to profitable activities.

Garland Loper, 46, died at his home in Clyde early Monday morning following an illness of about three years.

Funeral services were held at the Clyde Church of Christ with Henry E. Johnson, minister of the church officiating.

Burial was in the Clyde cemetery under the direction of the Patterson Funeral Home.

Mr. Loper was born May 17, 1901 at Athens, Texas and married the former Leona Appleton on October 20, 1925.

Survivors are the widow, of Clyde, Lura May Loper, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Loper of Athens, J. T. Loper at Baird, Roy N. Loper of Beaumont, Joe Loper of Malakoff and Dale Loper of Port Arthur; and three sisters, Mrs. E. C. Appleton of Clyde, Mrs. J. A. Moon of Malakoff and Mrs. F. R. Blair of Dallas.

EGG MARKET CO. CLOSES SEPT 21

Market Poultry and Egg Company, 303 Locust St., closed their business Monday as a result of an announcement the NLRB in Ft. Worth had been asked to conduct an election among two Abilene produce concerns on the question of naming an American Federation of Labor Union as bargaining agent for employees. Hudson Saturday instructed his 21 employees on the companies payroll in Abilene not to report for work on Monday. His equipment utilities are for sale announces Hudson.

Mr. Hudson said, "we have nothing against the union, only that we don't feel that we can run under union domination." He said, profits, in our estimation will not stand what union operation would amount to in our plant." The company has three other houses in Anson, Haskell and Stamford, which are not affected by the shutdown.

Hudson reported that the company had paid to farmers in Taylor county and surrounding counties an estimated \$12,000,000 since beginning operation in Abilene. As high as a hundred or more persons were employed by the company, engaged in the handling of poultry and eggs and cream during the peak months of January through July.

SELLERS HOLDS LIQUOR ADS LEGAL

Attorney General Grover Sellers stated Tuesday that newspapers in a dry territory can lawfully carry advertising of alcoholic beverages. The question had been requested by W. J. Townsend, county attorney of Agelena County, and former chairman of the State Liquor Board.

As chairman of the liquor board several years ago, Townsend led a successful campaign to bar the use of fat girls as car hops at taverns. At that time there was great rivalry to see who could get the heftiest girls.

Jefferson county was advised that its county commissioners may employ an expert to advise the court on values of industrial properties. He could not fix the tax assessments but might advise the court along with the tax assessor.

TEXAN IN BOX CAR FOR FIVE DAYS

A Texan locked five days in a freight car before being released. According to a story of Robert Bragg, climbed into a box car at Baird, thinking it was going to El Paso, but instead of going to El Paso, the car was destined to Muleshoe. Shortly after entering the car someone slammed the door, locked and sealed it. It is a Federal offense to open a car that has been sealed unless it is opened by authority. The car made several stops but the car in which Bragg was riding was not opened.

Five days later the car pulled into Muleshoe. At this point the tile which was loaded in the car was to be taken off. As workmen open the heavy door they found Bragg on the floor completely exhausted.

He was rushed to a hospital where he was soon on his way to recovery.

T & P PURCHASES DIESELS FOR YARDS

The Texas and Pacific Railway has placed an order for seven 1,000 H.P. Diesel electric switching locomotives, six of which are for complete dieselization of its Dallas, Texas yard and industry switching. This makes nine of these Diesel electric switchers purchased to date, the other two being scheduled for delivery in October of this year. All of these nine switching locomotives are being built by the Electro-Motive Division of General Motors Corporation, at LaGrange, Illinois. Delivery of the additional seven engines is scheduled for January, 1947.

General Motor's Electro-Motive Division is also building for Texas and Pacific's new streamlined passenger trains (now under construction) a total of four 4,000 H.P. Diesel Electric passenger locomotives, the first of which is scheduled for delivery in January, 1947 and the remainder coming out in March, 1947.

Of the twenty-nine streamlined passenger train cars (other than sleeping cars) the American Car and Foundry Company state shipment should begin in the second half of January, 1947 and be completed during first half of March, 1947.

Of the nineteen streamlined sleeping cars, the Pullman Standard Car Manufacturing Company advise that complete delivery will be made during the week of April 14, 1947.

All of these delivery schedules on passenger cars are conditioned on no additional delays in production by further causes or contingencies unavoidable or beyond control of the builders.

Earl Beasley of the Admiral community was in Putnam Saturday getting his John Deer tractor repaired. Mr. Beasley reported plenty of rain and stated they would have the largest acreage in grain for 1947 yet.

TEXAS OIL INDUSTRY TO INAUGURATE DRIVE

Tentative plans for the launching of an associate membership drive throughout the counties of West Central Texas Oil Gas association in a meeting at the Windsor Hotel last week.

The directors also approved plans to compile and publish an informational for general distribution showing the part which the oil industry and the affiliated business play in the welfare of the district.

The association membership drive first of which will be started about October 1, will be directed to business men and the general public who profit indirectly from the oil industry, for the primary purpose of increasing the membership strength of the organization.

The drives generally will be conducted in various towns and cities of the district in cooperation with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Abilene campaign is not expected to begin before November.

Present for the meeting were directors from Abilene, Stamford, Cisco, Coleman, Ranger, Graham, Eastland, Brownwood, Breckenridge, Ft. Worth and Dallas.

SERIES OF 13 FARM BUREAU MEETINGS TO BE HELD IN OCTOBER

A series of 13 district Farm Bureau meetings will be conducted throughout the state of Texas during the month of October, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, state Farm Bureau president.

One of the meetings will be held in the Brownwood Hotel at Brownwood on Friday, October 11. Raymond McElrath of Coleman, state director, will preside. The meeting, which will begin at 10:00 A.M., will be attended by Hammond and State Organization Director Marvill Carter.

"The chief job of organized agriculture is to maintain farm prices at a fair exchange level," Hammond said. This was not done following World War I and the result was depression. After the other war farm prices dropped 53 percent. By 1935 two million farmers were enclosed. Industrial goods dropped only 14 percent.

COTTON GINNED 1,248,545 BALES

Census Bureau reported that 1,248,543 bales of cotton had been ginned from 1946 cotton crop to the night of September 16, this figure counting round bales as half bales and did not include linters.

The quantity ginned in the same period last year was 1,021,617 bales and to same date in 1944, it was 1,824,262.

Texas ginnings in 1945 was 500,700 bales and this year 445,144 bales, with an indicated yield of 1,900,000 for the season.

ASK FARM YOUTHS TO HELP IN PREVENTING HUGE LOSSES BY FIRE

The sharp eyes and keen powers of observation of farm youths are called upon by the National Fire Protection Association, sponsors of Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12, and aid in discovering and getting rid of the common causes of farm fires this week and throughout the year.

Pointing out the authoritative estimates indicate an increase of 22% in property losses from fires during 1946 over an \$5 million dollar loss suffered this year, plus the fact that nine out of ten fires are preventable by the use of reasonable care and precaution, the NFPA urged farm youth to enlist in the fight.

The Association declared that many 4-H Clubs have rendered valuable aid in the fight against farm fires and suggested that all 4-H Club members could perform a valuable service to their communities by cooperating with their Co. Agents to learn the common fire hazards on farms and then carrying on a concerted drive to correct them on every farm in their area.

Failure To Stop And Render Aid Carries Threat Of Prison Sentence

Texas highway laws provide penalties for failure of operators of motor vehicles to stop and render aid after colliding with any person or vehicle containing any person.

The law requires that the driver of said all individuals in control of the vehicle shall stop and render aid to the person struck or to the occupants of the other vehicle collided with.

That assistance shall include the carrying of the injured parties to a physician or surgeon for medical or surgical treatment, if that is needed or if such carrying is requested by the person or persons struck.

The driver and person having or assuming authority of such driver shall further give to the occupant of the struck vehicle or to the person struck, if requested at the time of the collision or immediately thereafter, the number of the striking vehicle, the name and address of the owner thereof and the names and addresses of the passengers not exceeding five.

Any person violating any provision of this article is punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary not to exceed five years or in jail not to exceed one year or by fine not exceeding \$5,000 or by both such fine and imprisonment.
