A. increase of 2.8 per cent over the preceding month and 22.3 per cent over the corresponding month last year. Cities in which the increase in employment and pay rolls over May last year exceeded the average increase for the State were: Amarillo, Corpus Christi, El Paso Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, and Waco.

Industries with increases better than the State average were Foundries-machine shops, millwork, clothing and textiles, cotton and textile mills, cotton compresses, bakeries, flour mills, meat packing and slaughtering, petroleum refining, business and personal service.

From April 16, through May 15, 27 establishments reported general wage-rate increases, averaging 9.2 per cent and affecting 4,773 workers out of a total employed 5,545. From January through May 15, 122 establishments employing 23,869 workers reported general wage-rate increases averaging 8.5 per cent, affecting 22,023 workers.

Since January 1 only two estabments have reported wage rate decreases, with a total of only 11 employees affected.

### TEXAS SCREWWORM CASES INCREASE IN MAY

Screwworm infestations in wounds of animals reported from Texas increased from 3,665 to 7,-831 in May, which is a little more than one-fourth of one per cent of the animals of which reports were obtained. An infestation of two per cent or more of the animal population is considered as an outbreak proportion and one that can cause noticeable losses among animals.

Of the cases reported during May, 5,518 of them occured in cattle and 1,961 in sheep. ### NEW COTTON FUTURE LAW FOR TEXAS

Our attention has just been called to a proposed law in the Texas Legislature proposing to bar trading in cotton futures and making it a heavy penalty.

Article 543: "If any person in this state shall make for himself and future contract as defined in Article 539, of the penal code of this state, he shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars, and may be confined in the county jail not less than ten, nor more than thirty days, provided it may be shown in defense of any prosecution under this law that the transaction out of which the prosecution arose was a hedge con


