Mr. House, who can tell one story after another so fast they run together like a politician's denying he stole something before it was discovered missing, admitted that though he has traveled around, this was his first trip to Madisonville.

"What do you think of the town?" he was asked.

"And that reminds me", he said, finishing up one story and starting on another without hearing us, "of the negro who had a diamond stick-pin about the size of a small fist. 'Is that a genuine diamond?' he was asked. 'It bettah be, or I shore got stuck for a dollar and six bits.'"

Mr. House, author of several books, of articles in the Saturday Evening Post and the Frankston Citizen, was back from Hollywood where he was technical adviser for "Boom Town", a movie centered around a Texas oil town. He wrote some of the lines for Clark Gable and Spencer Tracy but said he slowed down when it came to Hedy Lamarr, who photographs so well she doesn't have to talk.

In three minutes flat in this office, Mr. House covered most of the range of literature, mixing up what De Maupassant told Flaubert about the individuality of Paris cab horses with why Shakespeare had to leave Stratford in a hurry. "California may have warmer

Callahan County Favors 1942 Cotton Marketing Quotas

The cotton marketing quota referendum held on December 18th carried by 89.6 percent vote in favor of keeping farms under the restrictions of cotton marketing quotas for 1942.

The votes cast in the election represented about one-third of the eligible voters in the county.

Three Defense Training Centers in Callahan County

As a part of the National Defense Program, defense centers for training out-of-school youths have been set up in the following fields and at the following places: Metal work including simple welds, tempering, drilling, shaping, and machinery repair—under the supervision of Peek Ault in the Alexander Building at Baird; Woodwork (rough construction)—under the supervision of Roe Curtis in the Vocation Agricultural Building at Baird; Operation, care,

and repair of automobiles, trucks, and tractors—under the supervision of Arthur Burlison at Baird. The people in the vicinity of Cross Plains, also, have shops in Cross Plains in which the above mentioned service is available, with O. B. Edmondson, vocational agricultural teacher in charge.

All eligible persons who desire this training are urged to attend the classes. These shops have been set up to accomplish a two-fold purpose: to give defense trainees aple projects to work on and at the same time to make such needed repairs on farm machinery and equipment.

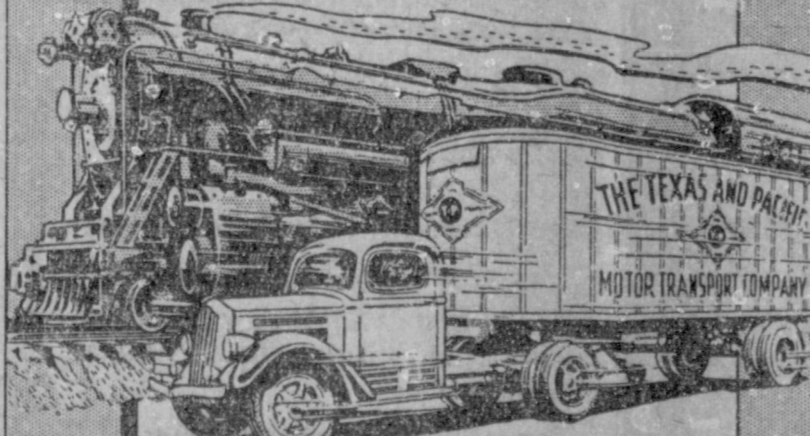


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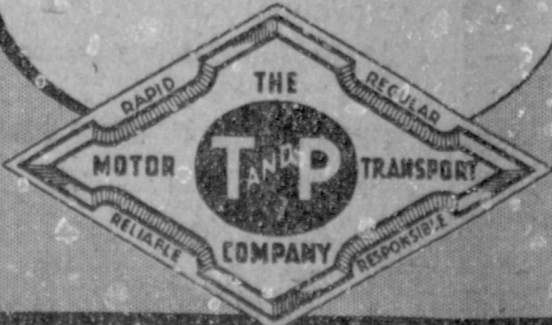
