AN IMPORTANT ISSUE

The President in his message to Congress indicated quite clearly that he is not satisfied with the decisions of the Supreme Court that have been adverse to new deal legislation, especially that which conflicts with the NRA statute. He says:

"The vital need is not an alteration of our fundamental law, but an increasingly enlightened view with reference to it. Defficulties have grown out of its interpretation; but, rightly considered, it can be used as an insteument of progress and not as a device for prevention of action." "Means must be found to adapt our legal forms and our judicial interpretation to the actual needs of the largest progressive democracy in the moldern world." Toward the end of his message he adds, "The judicial branch also is asked by the people to do its part in making democracy successful."




