

BLANTON SUES GARRETT FOR \$100,000

Thomas L. Blanton filed suit against Clyde Garrett of Eastland. and others in the 42nd district court at Abilene before Christmas for \$100,000 damages to his reputation and good standing in the 17th congressional district. E. E. Layton; and J. W. Cockrell of Gorman, newspaper man, were joined in the suit. Mr. Blanton filed a 44 page brief alleging various letters, papers and other literature that was sent out which was damaging and misleading as to his character and record as a congressman, which caused his defeat in the August primary in 1936. A number of suits of this character have been filed in time but we have no record of one being won. The laws and the courts give politicians a great deal of latitude in making charges. Anything that is a matter of record in the way of an official can not be classed as libelous and a campaign like the Blanton-Garrett campaign the literature circulated was more in the nature of criticism than in facts or charges.

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

There is no law that we know of that requires a corporation to bid on anything they do not want to sell. This only brings to light more clearly the true condition of legislation attempting to control everything from Washington.

We think that the present congress should pass some good wholesome laws that will give every citizen a chance with every other citizer, which has not been done by the New Deal. The present administration has been trying to build up a purchasing power of a few classes that will bring recovery, and destroying other classes that are entitled to just as much consideration as the ones they are trying to build up. We would not argue that there isn't more money in the country than there was in 1932, and that business is not better: but with five billions of dollars spent in one year business is bound to be better. But has general prosperity returned with millions of men walking the streets with no employment and multiplied millions suffering for the want of more food and shivering for the want of more clothes? 


