"The above allotments do not, of course, include the enormous expenditures in our District for the various other governmental programs such as Soil and Water Conservation, Rural Electrification, Farm Security Administration, Farm Tenancy, NYA, COG, Federal Housing RFC loans, etc."

to operate its schools than it did last year, State Supt. L. A. Woods estimated Wednesday. This is based on the assumption that the county will have the same number of students next year as it had last year.

Supt. Woods said the action of the state board of education in raising the per capita from \$22 to \$22.50 was another step toward bettering the educational facilities of Texas.

Supt. Woods has led the fight for increased state per capita appropriations to schools since he came into office. The per capita when Supt. Woods was first elected was \$16, and it has been raised year by year until the \$22.50 mark has been established.

Supt. Woods pointed out that increased state assistance to schools, plus more efficient management and improved teaching methods have been largely responsible for Texas being raised to 18th educational rank in the union from the low mark of 36th which it held in 1932.

It is not expected that the additional per capita appropriation will increase state expenditures as a whole, Woods pointed out, since the scholastic population has decreased in some localities.

\$29,432. Paid To County's School During Past Year

Report of the state auditor shows Callahan County received \$29,432 rural school aid last fiscal year, out of a total of \$5,386,825 distributed over Texas, Supt. S. R. LeMay of Athens pointed out this week.

LeMay has proposed distribution of rural aid funds by an automatic method, free of political pressure, so that schools may know in advance how to plan their budgets. He is a candidate for state superintendent.

"Lacking confidence in the present administration of the Department of Education, the Legislature several years ago created a joint legislative committee to supervise rural aid," LeMay said. "I intend to restore the confidence of the public and the legislature in the Department."

MORAN TO HAVE PICNIC AND BARBECUE SATURDAY AFTERNOON JULY 19TH

Fines Recently Assessed By AAA Give
Notice Regulations Will Be Enforced

Fines recently assessed against Cameron county residents for violations of the marketing quota provisions of the Agricultural Adjustment Act leave no doubt but that the AAA will enforce these regulations, J. Lester Farmer, chairman of the Callahan County ACA com- long ago and grass hides the spots. However, there is a legend that on dark and quiet nights, music from an old organ can be heard faintly; and that, if you pass by the cemetery at the exact stroke of midnight, your car will stop—if you are out of "gas."

None of those who bought his wares knew that he was a former school teacher in Mexico, but after coming to Texas, was never able to learn more than a few words of English and so he went about, selling tamales day after day and week after weary week. But on Cinco de Mayo, he would come into his glory for then he would read a patriotic poem of his own composition (in Spanish, of course), and deliver the chief oration while the handful of Mexicans in the town, in their bright costumes, cheered. A few fleeting hours—and then back to peddling tamales for another year.

Federal Judge James V. Allred assessed fines ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000 against the two partners in a San Benito gin, the book-keeper for the firm, and a farmer, all of whom pled guilty to violating the marketing quota regulations. The two owners were fined \$10,000 each with \$9,000 suspended pending good behavior for three years. The bookkeeper was fined \$1,000 and the farmer \$2,000, both fines suspended upon good behavior for three years.

The owners and the farmer had been indicted for conspiracy to defeat and evade the AAA act of 1938 and to defraud the U. S. government of penalties due on cotton sold in excess of allotments granted to certain farms. All four defendants were indicted for conspiracy to violate the 1938 act and to defeat, evade and impair the agricultural policy of the U. S. Government by submitting false and fraudulent reports.
