Make unions equally responsible with management before the law for their acts, including living up to contracts once entered into. 2. Insure the greatest possible efficiency in production by taking managerial functions and supervisory staffs out of the area of legally required collective bargaining; and 3. To promote industrial peace by establishing procedures which will result in the genuine collective bargaining to low levels.

Experience has proven that when labor unions believe Government will support their demands against the employer, the temptation to short circuit orderly collective bargaining procedure is almost irresti- met for the first time on the first able.

The machine is called the 'Eniac." short for "electronic numerical interragator and computor." It adds, subtracts, multiplies, divides, computes square roots and does the most complex calculations.



Colds are almost as popular a topic of conversation as the weather. And, as with the weather, few people do anything about them. Many people, of course, have their favorite remedy for colds but even they find that colds keep coming

back. While people do not die just from colds, the common cold often leads to serious illnesses which may cause death. Not only that, colds are a nuisance and very disagreeable things to have. They can make a person miserable and lower his capacity for work and for the enjoyment of leisure.

Medical science does not claim to know all the answers about colds. It does know enough important facts about them, however, free to all weekly papers of this to help people avoid catching colds or, once they have them, to indicate how to care for them to pre-

vent colds from leading to more serious illnesses. It is important to remember that

or we give a cold to someone else. There would be fewer colds if people always remembered to cover their mouths when sneezing or coughing, if they were careful not to drink from glasses or cups used

by another person. One way to avoid catching colds is to keep away from people who

have them. We can't always do this, so we should keep our bodies in such healthy condition that they are able to resist colds. This means getting sufficient rest, eating wellbalanced meals, which include fresh fruits and vegetables, and seeing the doctor periodically, even if we think we are perfectly well.

If we do catch a cold we should not neglect it. A cold may lead to influenza, to pneumonia, to ear trouble. It may so weaken the system that we become a ready prey to tuberculosis.

Children are particularly apt to develop ear trouble after a cold. When they have bad colds they should be kept away from school until the worst is over. While at home, they should be kept quiet and should not be permitted to play with other children.

It is not always necessary for an adult to stay at home with a cold but it is often the wise thing to do. If the cold is accompanied by fever. both adults and children should by all means stay in bed.

Rest and diet are important factors in curing a cold. Weakened by the cold, the body needs extra rest and easily digested foods. Rich, heavy foods should be avoided. The diet should include plenty of liquids-water, fruit juices and





Q. Are weed seeds normally long-lived?

A. It is hard to believe, but never-theless true, that weed seeds may produce plants as long as forty years after the seeds ripened. For this reason, the fight against weeds must be continuous and unrelenting.

What causes some turkeys to de-velop a crop which is excessively long, flabby, and pendulous?

A pendulous crop may be due to heredity, to climatic conditions, or both. Gorging water after going without it during hot; dry periods, or the consumption of coarse dry grass or other high fibrous materials are contributing factors.

Considering the feed cost to be 2 cents per pound, the U. S. Depart-ment of Agriculture estimates that the money-loss for a dead pig is as follows:

Pig dead at birth.....\$2.80 Pig dead at weaning..... 5.20 Pig dead 8 weeks after 7.20

weaning... Adding the cost of labor and overhead, the cost of each dead pig reaches an even higher total. Fortunately, scientific manage-ment and sanitation practices have substantially reduced losses from cholera and other preventable diseases.

Does the feeding of wheat germ oil boost the fertility of dairy

No: this conclusion was reached after extensive research at the Research Farm of Purina Mills in 1936, and has since been confirmed by work done at Cornell University.

Does the presence of large and numerous "milk veins" in the udder of a cow indicate that she will be a heavy milk producer?

Probably not, says the U.S. Department of Agriculture. These external veins assist in carrying blood away from, and not to, the udder. Moreover, the internal veins are apparently large enough to return all the blood from the udder.
